The sincerest tribute we can pay to America's war dead is to appreciate what our American system of individual freedom, opportunity and enterprise really means to each of us. The Americans who died for our Nation believed in a better future. it is up to you to "Be counted again" and work for this future.!

Some Americans believe it is fashionable today to be "Right on" with the left liberal movement and political militant groups in ridiculing anything connected with patriotism, law and order, the military and patriotic holidays in general. Americans who ignore or even ridicule our war dead should be reminded that they have their free speech and their good life today only because of the sacrifices of those who were willing to fight and, if necessary, to die for those precious rights.



May 24th through May 28th should be the time to spray pecan trees to control the pecan nut casebearer predicts County Agent De Gordon. This date is determined by examining the insect activity in pecan orchards and from reports from growers south and east of Eastland County.

Gordon emphasized that the insect development will vary from one party of the county to another part. Growers should check their own trees for egg deposits and feeding of newly hatched larvae to determine the optimum time to spray. When one to two percent of the young nuts have been punctured by the casebearer it is time to spray, the agent said.

Commercial pecan growers should have their sprayer and insecticides ready and make daily checks in the orchard or grove to observe egg deposits and feeding of the small worms. Adult moths deposit small

eggs barely visible to the naked eye on the tips of the pecans. Eggs hatch in four or five days and the young larvae migrate to buds below the nuts to feed. After a day or two they enter the nuts at the base. The insecticide when a should be majority of the eggs are hatching and before the young worms enter the pecans.

The insecticides that can be used by the commercial grower of these casebearers are Guthion, Thiodan, Malathion, Zolon or Sevin. Gordon suggests that either Malathion, Zolone or Sevin be used on yard trees. Use these insecticides according to directions given on the label of the container.

Thorough coverage is essential for the control of this insect. Be sure that the spray is applied to the tree to the point of run-off. If growers wish to spray twice for more effctive control the agent suggests spraying on May 23rd and May 30th.

## Area Law Enforcement Agencies

## **Get New Equipment**

Law enforcement agencies in Coleman, Eastland and Knox counties will become equipped with modern and highly sophisticated radio communications equipment subject to the decision of the elected officials in those areas to participate in the WCT COG regional radio communications program. Les Wilkerson, WCT COG Criminal Justice Coordinator, said that as of the first of May he had re ceived commitments to participate in the programs from most of the governing bodies of the agencies involved. In addition, the WCT COG Executive Committee authorized the staff, on April 24, to submit an application to the Texas Criminal Justice Council for a grant to fund seventy-five percent of the cost of including the three additional counties in the network. Estimated costs total \$80,000 for th eproject, which will include the equipment purchase, as well as the system design work required for each county.

The installation of the equipment for the additional three counties will complete the region-wide law enforcement network. Equipment was completely installed and was operation in sixteen of the region's ninetten counties as of the first of May. The regional radio network, when completed, will become an integral part of the statewide radio network, being established by the Governor's office.


The overall objective of th eprogram is to "reduce crime by decreasing resp onse time and increasing clearance and

conviction rates through improved radio communication among criminal justice agencies"

WCT COG Exectuve Director Bob Gallagher had high praise for the new system's potential in reducing crime. Gallagher stated that the rapid exchange of information is a key to good law enforcement. He pointed out that the new system, coupled with the existing regional landline teletype network, would give all local law enforcement agencies the capability to exchange accurate information with other city, county and state agencies, as well as access to the Texas Crime Information Cente rin Austin and the National Crime Information Center in Washington.

Gallagher further pointed out the fact that the clearance rate of auto theft in the West Central Texas Region was fifty percent in 1973, an improvement of some sixteen percent over th eprior year's clearance rate of thirty-four percent. He emphasized that a large amount of the credit for this very impressive clearance rate must be given to the improved communications and information systems. Rapid access to DPS and NCIC stolen property files is also credited with the identification of stolen vehicles before they are abandoned and the consequent arrest of the suspect while still in possession of the stolen vehicle.

The City Council of Rising Star has voted to participate in the new regional communication system.
