

Deposits At Record High Here

Reflecting the influx of of money from the peanut crop now being harvested, the Fi st State Bank this week reported the highest deposits in its history in response to the call of the State Banking Commission er for a statement of condition as of October 30.

Deposits were reported as \$4,128,325.19, nearly \$400,000.00 above the figure reported for June 21, last, the date fo the previous call.

The figure was even higher on Tuesday this week, Cashier Lane Wells said. Deposits at that time had climbed approxmately \$170,000.00 above the call date figure, he said.

The Wildcats come home Friday night of this week to meet the Evant team in a conference game at Wildcat field. Kick-off time is set for 8 o'clock.



There was some trashiness in peanuts dug from tight soil due to the dryness, but a rain of onehalf inch to an inch or more last Saturday softened the soil and made the digging easier and the peanuts cleaner.

He received about 1,000 votes to 3,000 for Conner in returns reported Wednesday morning. Kirk received 105 of his total
