Clark Home Burns to Ground

The home of Lynn and Cynthia Clark on East Ross Street just east of Rising Star burned to the ground Friday afternoon, October 22. The fire apparently started near the front of the house in the attic and the probable cause was the electrical wiring. No one was at home at the time of the fire.

Flames leaping above the treetops were spotted by Betty Griffin as she went to her mailbox. She ran to her neighbors the Billy Zirkles, who called the fire department. Mrs. Griffin and Mrs. Zirkle went to the burning house and called out to find out whether someone might be home. Mr. Zirkle arrived and moved the Clarks' pickup from the driveway (the keys



were in it); Jay Ware pulled the car away from the fire area with his tractor, then checked inside the house to make sure there was no one there. Ware carried the family dog and puppies to safety, then began carrying furniture from the den. He managed to save the television, a couch and

chair before the smoke and intense heat prevented him from re-entering the burning building.

The fire trucks arrived and one fireman managed to carry out a few more items after donning his fire gear.

Three fire trucks from Rising Star responded to the fire

and the Cross Plains Volunteer Fire Department was called for their assistance.

The Clarks are the parents of three children. Upon request, Mrs. Clark gave the family's clothing sizes to The Rising Star editor. Chris wears size 5 slim pants, size 5 shirts and size 10 tennis shoes; Duane wears size 10 pants, size 10 shirts and size 2 tennis shoes; Kim wears size medium in misses' blouses, size 12 misses' pants and size 6 or 6½ shoes; Cynthia wears size 40-42 blouses, size 36 pants and size 7-7½ shoes; and Lynn wears size 17-17½ short sleeve shirts, size 40x32 pants and size 9½D shoes.

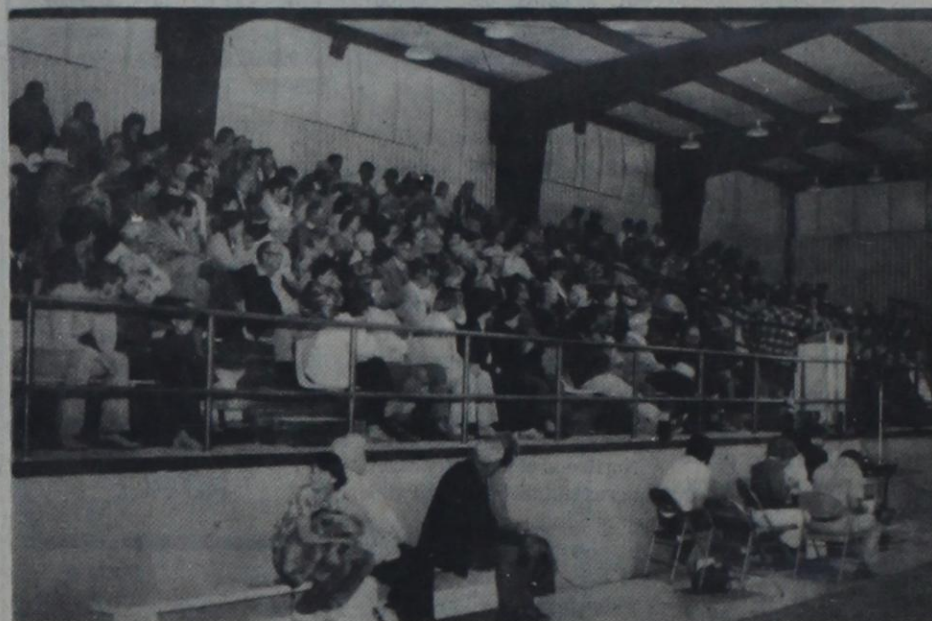

Proposals to Solve Financial Woes Aired in Town Meeting

The proposed budget for the City of Rising Star and suggested increases in ad valorem taxes and utility rates, which would bring the expected revenue to a higher total than proposed expenditures, were aired before a crowd of more than 400 Rising Star area residents on Monday, October 25, in the school gymnasium.

Mayor Pro-tem Doug Owen asked for a calm meeting, declared that the former mayor was correct in stating that the proposed budget was too high for the expected revenues and called for co-operation of the residents of Rising Star in seeing to it that revenue due the city, ad valorem taxes and utility bills, be paid promptly to aid the city in becoming financially solvent. "We must run this city as we would our business," Owen said.

He also informed his listeners that the payment to FHA for the updating of the utility systems had not been included in last year's budget. This payment is in the neighborhood of \$30,000; citizens might draw the conclusion then, that after that payment was made last December and revenue from the gas system, lower than



expected because of a mild winter, dwindled with the onset of warm weather, the council was faced with a drastic need to take action. They did raise gas rates, but too late in the year to bring in enough revenue to cover the unbudgeted

FHA payment plus the also unbudgeted but unexpected repair to the water tower. At that time, payments to Dynamic Products ceased. The gas expense debt to Dynamic Products is about \$125,000 and the city owes another \$24,000 to

the transporter of natural gas.

The council will consider proposals to increase the ad valorem taxes from the current rate of \$.44 to \$.60 per \$100 valuation and to increase utilities from a projected total revenue of \$277,000 to

Mayor Killion Resigns

Mayor H. L. Killion called a meeting of the City Council Thursday, October 21, in a last effort to terminate the service of Police Chief Curtis McGlothlin, and in his endeavor to cut the proposed budget of the police department drastically. Having failed to achieve his goal by a 3-2 vote of the City Council, Killion resigned his position as mayor at 10:30 a.m. Friday, October 22, saying he was wasting his time and effort.

The called meeting came as surprise to residents of Rising Star, but the mayor saw McGlothlin's contradictory statements concerning his participation in the drug raid two weeks ago to

the press, as the means for attaining his objective. Councilman Johnny Lee, supporting the mayor, made the motion to terminate the employment of McGlothlin; the motion was seconded by Pete Starks. Those two councilmen voted for the motion and Mark Cooksey, Willie Vandivere and Doug Owen voted against it.

The council and mayor went into an executive session, which is closed to the public, then voted in open session.

The crowd of citizens which had dwindled from about 50 to 30 during the lengthy executive session, applauded at the outcome of the vote.

Rate Increase Announced

Effective November 1, Advertising display rates are being raised \$1.00 per inch. Classified advertising will be \$3.00 for the first 25 words and \$.05 for each word over the 25. Subscription rates November 1, Eastland and adjoining counties...\$6, other Texas counties...\$8.50, out-of-state...\$12, and foreign...NONE.

The subscription card files are set up so that all subscriptions expire each January. (If you paid for a full year for a new subscription in some other month, the office will be glad to give you credit on next year's subscription; just give us the date the subscription was taken out and the rate.)

Publisher H.V. O'Brien has announced that advertising rates of the Eastland County Newspapers will be increased on November 1st of this year. The Eastland County Newspapers consists of The Cisco Press, The Eastland Telegram, The Ranger Times and The Rising Star. Advertising may be placed for any one of the four papers or for a combination of the four.

Local rates will be increased 10 cents per column inch, from \$1.90 per column inch for one paper to \$2.00 per column inch. For any two papers the new rate will be \$3.00 per column inch, for any three it will be \$4.00 and for any four it will be \$5.00.

Repeats of the same ad will be half-price, if there are no changes and no editions of the paper are skipped. Political announcements will be \$75.00 for county, district and state offices, and \$35.00 for precinct, city offices and school elections. The payment of these prices entitles the candidate to have their name in the political column throughout the campaign, pictures if desired and two statements of reasonable length at time of, or within 30 days before election.

All political ads will be paid by cash in advance. Monthly displays will be increased by one dollar per paper per column inch. For one paper, the rate will be \$6.00 per column inch; for two, the rate will be \$9.00; for three, the rate will be \$13.00; and for four, the rate will be \$15.00. No monthly display ads will be accepted smaller than 2 columns by 2 inches.

Eastland County Newspapers will no longer offer mini-billboard (1x1) ads for the classified pages. Classified ads will be \$3.00 for one insertion (up to 25 words) in one paper. Repeats of the same ad will be \$2.00 per time. A card of thanks of reasonable length will be \$5.00.

Advertising deadlines will be Monday at 5 p.m. for the Thursday edition, and Thursday at 5 p.m. for the Sunday issue.

Construction costs will be paid with private funds and the building will be leased to the Postal Service for a basic period of 10 years with renewal options for 20 additional years. The building is expected to be completed in April 1983.

2. If items are to be added to the agenda of a meeting for which 72 hours notice has already been posted, a supplemental notice listing such items must

be posted at least two hours prior to the meeting, stating the emergency that requires action on the additional items.

what it takes to get the news media off us."

Residents who spoke up were in agreement that increasing revenues is a necessary step to avoid another deficit in operating the city this year. Non-residents from the countryside offered their support to Rising Star; many of them have businesses here and their children attend Rising Star schools.

Citizens were not in agreement, however, about the number of policemen needed in Rising Star.

Mrs. Cliff Hall Sr. said, "If you work at night in a store, you need two policemen." Doris Griffin agreed, as a senior citizen "I'd like to keep our policemen." Also in agreement are mothers who are deeply concerned for their children because of the high rate of drug trafficking in Rising Star.

Many citizens see no need for an extra policeman because, as former mayor H.L. Killion stated, "the town has always had just one policeman...." Still advocating cutting budgets, Killion said that he "does not want to overburden residents," and many agree with that sentiment.

Eastland County Sheriff Johnnie Mor-

ren said that "Rising Star has never called the sheriff's office that we didn't respond." A deputy sheriff lived here for some months until recently and Morren informed the citizens that "I was told by a commissioner I had made a bad choice when I put a deputy here; he said Rising Star hadn't requested a deputy." Morren also said, "Anytime you need us, just call."

Keeping the city afloat has become a common bond among the city residents and many voiced their support for the city council in whatever must be done to achieve that aim. The council must finalize a budget when it meets again with the city auditor October 28.

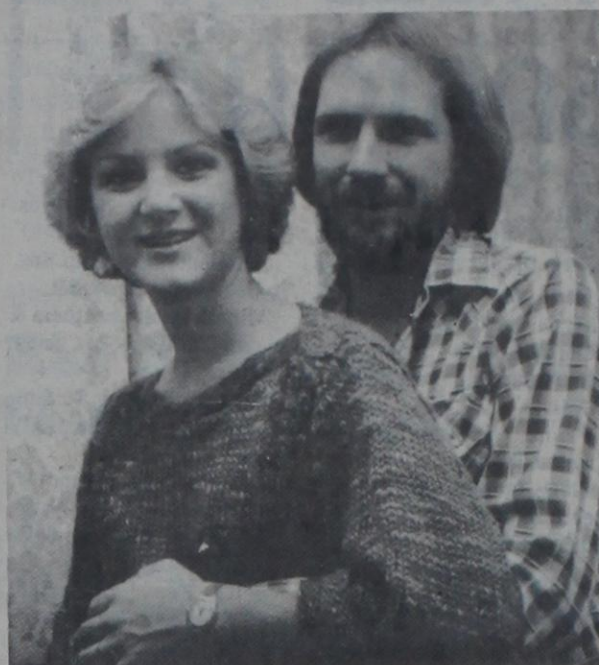

Head Lice

Human lice historically have been associated with social upheavals, crowded living conditions, poverty, wars and lack of personal hygiene.

Head lice spread easily, however, and infestations often occur under the best conditions, especially among school children who are in close, daily contact.

The adult female cements her eggs on a hair of the head near the scalp. They usually attach the eggs to hair behind the ears and on the nape of the neck.

Since personal items such as hats, combs, wigs, hair brushes and towels often transfer, they should be washed or cleaned thoroughly after each use. Certain medications, available as dusts, lotions, ointments and shampoos from pharmacists or on a physician's prescription, can be used quickly to exterminate lice and their nits (eggs). To avoid possible injury from these medications, follow precisely the directions.

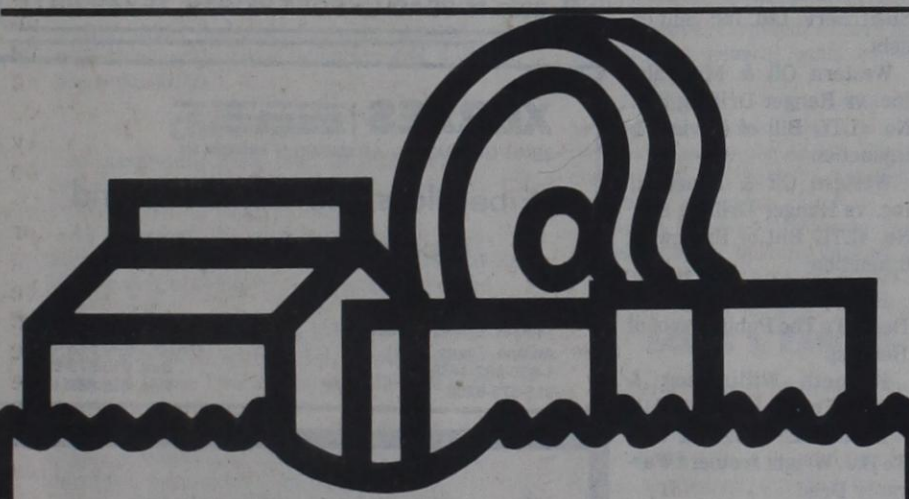

HONEST ANSWERS TO FAIR QUESTIONS

Our Customers are Concerned About The Cost of Quality Electric Service, and So Are We. Here's a Sample of the Questions They're Asking and the Answers We're Giving.

- Q. Why is WTU asking for a rate increase?
A. There are three related reasons: Inflation, the rising cost of capital, and WTU's massive construction program. Mainly, the request is based on capital expenditures during the past year.
- Q. When was the last time you raised retail electric rates?
A. WTU has had only three rate increases in its history, while it has lowered rates 14 times. The last increase was February, 1982, and it amounted to an average of just over 8 percent.
- Q. Why is WTU having to raise its rates again so soon?
A. The rate relief granted to us by the cities and the Public Utility Commission of Texas last time proved inadequate. It did not keep up with the cost of additional plant, inflation and high interest rates. Our revenues have not provided an adequate rate of return.
- Q. What are other utilities doing about rates?
A. Without exception, all electric utilities are having to increase their rates. Some have been filing rate cases every year. Bill comparisons reported by the Public Utility Commission of Texas show that WTU's rates are second lowest among investor-owned utilities in Texas.
- Q. Why are you building a big new plant? Isn't energy use declining?
A. Energy use in WTU service area is growing. This summer our peak demand reached 994 megawatts. Our current generating capacity is 1,054 megawatts. The summer peak left us with insufficient reserve margin. We will purchase power from neighboring utilities as a stop-gap measure, but the time has come when we must expand our own generating system, if we are to continue providing service our customers are used to.
- Q. What would happen if you could not get a rate increase?
A. The financial condition of our Company would deteriorate rapidly. Our credit rating would suffer. We would no longer be in position to attract capital at reasonable interest rates to finance necessary major construction. We would have to pay higher interest rates at the expense of our customers.

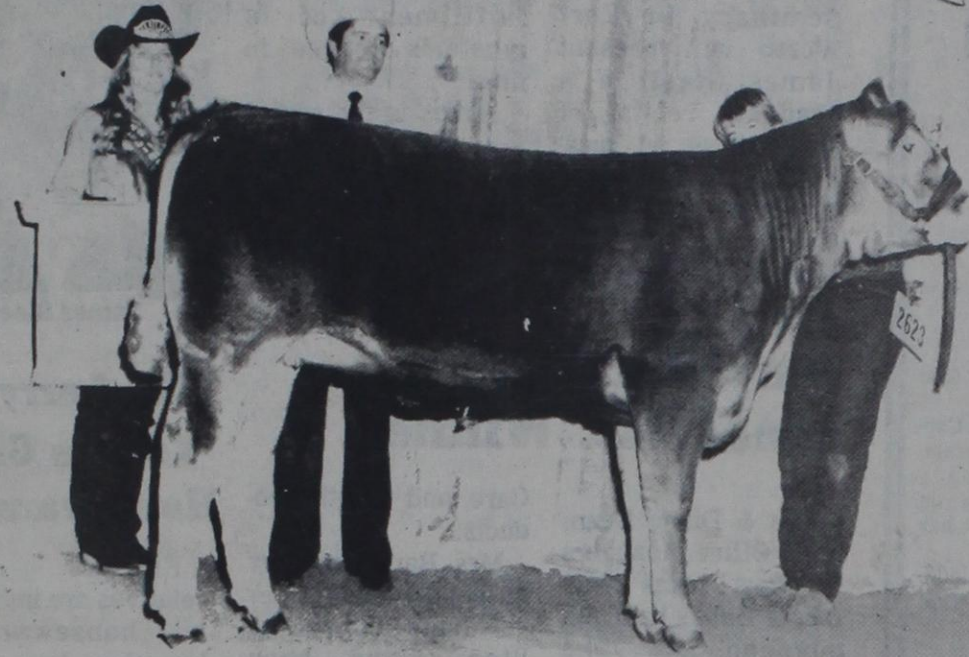

There is coming—a One-world Political System Revelation 13:7, A Major One-World monetary System Revelation 13:16-17; A One-World church Revelation 13:8-15. Why are the prophetic books of the Bible important? The prophetic books and their predictions are important for several reasons, 1. They are part of God's Word. 2. All Scriptures are from God and profitable (II Timothy 3:16) 3. Our faith must operate on the whole Word of God and be supported by it (Rom. 10:17) 4. They inform of Israel's historical value, especially by relating how God dealt with His original chosen people. 5. They reveal God's plan and timetable—knowledge which the Church must have. Have all prophecies been fulfilled which would prevent the Lord's Coming for the Church? No, they have not. However, the rapidity with which prophecy is not being fulfilled is bringing us closer to that event. Father, I will that they also, whom thou hast given me, be with me where I am; that they may behold my glory, which thou hast given me; for thou loved me before the foundation of the world. O righteous Father, the world has not known thee; but I have known thee, and these have known that thou hast sent me.

WTU Negotiates for Cheaper Gas Supplies

West Texas Utilities Co. has entered a gas purchase agreement with Haskell Gathering Co. which could result in lower fuel cost at its Paint Creek Power Station.

WTU has begun taking a small volume of low Btu gas, and is expected to take more when the gathering firm's pipelines are extended to additional wells in Haskell and Throckmorton coun-

ties. The Paint Creek plant is on Lake Stamford in southeastern Haskell County.

The gas is cheaper than WTU's main supply, but is of lower quality, according to Walter Meller, WTU's manager of system production.

"Because it is a lower Btu gas, it must be blended with other gas before it can be burned in our boilers," Meller said.

"But we are doing everything we can to buy gas where there is a price advantage."

He said WTU is in the process of negotiating for low Btu gas at some of its other power plants. The company's contract with its principle supplier, which was renegotiated this past year, permits WTU to purchase gas from

other sources, and WTU does so when it is available. The Company has eight major power plants, all of which burn natural gas as the primary fuel.

DRUG BUST AND FINANCE: These, in my opinion, are the two most common woes that have our entire country plagued today. As you know, Rising Star is probably in number 1 position concerning turmoil and publicity which is the most important here in our city? I would classify the on a 50-50 ratio, both problems must be corrected.

Before expressing my views, I would like everyone to know my sentiments. I am not criticizing the governing body in any way personally, but I most certainly am their decisions on some issues.

Concerning Chief McGlothlin, I can not say this has not turned into some personal differences, along with KTAB-TV in Abilene. The "null" remarks made to the news media by some people of Rising Star did not say "null" but in fact are just that. They can not back up what they said. The statements I am making are true and can be proven as such.

I will start with the events of October 4, 1982. This being a regular City Council meeting, the Council was told we would not have the money to pay either Policeman on their payday October 15—nothing came of this. October 11 I called a special meeting suggesting the termination of both officers and again to remind there were no available funds for their payday the following Friday 15. One councilman was absent; one made a motion for termination. None of the other three seconded the motion: we still had two policemen on the job without monies for Friday

The morning of October 12 the marijuana seizure took place, this then taking the front seat in most news media and a few outspoken local citizens. The media started swarming our little city, taking interviews from everyone. KTAB-TV, Abilene, interviewed me along with other people Monday, October 18, 1982. In their newscast this same date, Monday 18, they stated the marijuana raid was made and I called a special meeting that night asking the council to terminate both policemen. There was NOT a word of truth to this statement. I did state the Rising Star police were working outside their jurisdiction and they were. Now Chief McGlothlin, in the Brownwood Bulletin, Oct. 19, stated the Rising Star Police Department never left the city limits—this was also an untrue statement. As he so admitted to me Wednesday morning, Oct. 20. In the Rising Star issue of Oct. 21, he stated he and Ranger Kea "patrolled" the area in the ranger's car at the request of DPS narcotic officers and provide for their

continued stakeout. Would it seem sensible to have McGlothlin riding "shotgun" where he could be so easily recognized by anyone around here? I don't think so.

About the only comment I could credit him with was he said he got a tip on the marijuana and instantly called Texas Rangers and D.P.S. Narcotics. This was his duty and that should have been the end of his active involvement. After all, I understand the Texas Rangers and D.P.S. Undercover and Narcotics plus Brown County Sheriff Department were on the job. I am sure all of these people are competent and could complete their job without any other involvement. They, in my opinion, should be raised for the job they did in Brown County. McGlothlin should have stayed on the job he was hired for inside the city limits, his jurisdiction. Again, between some of the media and local citizens, they want the public to think I wanted him terminated because of the marijuana find. This is not true.

This brings us to October 21, 1982, Council Meeting which I call to again ask for the termination of McGlothlin. "Not much mention about Officer Hall." My four reasons I put before the council were: 1. Financial—this was my first; 2. He proved to be untruthful; 3. He had no business outside the city limits on this affair; 4. He has not kept his city bills current—and should not

be allowed these privileges.

He has been paid his \$1,150.00 monthly salary even though his last payment was by the citizens.

This brings us down to 10:30 Friday, October 22, 1982. My resignation. There are some reasons for this other than what has been stated. I never did agree with the near \$53,000.00 budget and still don't. Prior to this the Council passed several things I didn't approve, but didn't really object to them enough, I guess. But, to even think about a \$53,000.00 police budget in the financial condition the city is in was too much for me. To meet a budget like this and pay for approximately \$10,000.00 yearly for street lighting which I'm opposed to, along with the approximately \$145,000.00 outstanding debts (which has not been included on this years budget) would, if taxes and all utilities are raised to do such, would overburden the citizens of Rising Star. Would it be sensible to cut the police budget in half—street lighting more than half? I think it would. If you do, talk to your Councilmen. I guess Mr. Graham was invited by someone. I would really like to know his thoughts being indebted to his company for seven or eight years. Wouldn't you think he would enjoy seeing that budget and street lighting money in his bank account? I would.

I do think the city financial problem can be worked out without further increase in ad valorem tax. I do think

increases are overdue on water and sanitation, and should be raised some. The gas rates were raised at the beginning of the summer. It will make money this winter, they just haven't given time to prove out.

I would like for people to understand the Council does not have an easy job. They all like me—have a living to make and also run city affairs to the best of their ability. Their monthly salary was \$3,000.00, my salary was: (I would like to take credit with one more zero) \$3,000.00. So I would hate for some concerned citizen to ask them to cut their salary.

I think the present Councilmen have done their duty—but their ideas on issues I have discussed don't coincide at all with mine. The reason for my resignation was I do not want to be involved with raising rates on everything and overburdening the citizens.

I would like to say thanks to the people who have supported me these past five and one-half years.

Dear Sir:

I feel compelled to respond to a letter to the editor, recently seen in your paper, bearing date of October 7, 1982.

Specifically, that letter, in numbered paragraph 8, referred to a suit against the City of Rising Star "That already has cost our financially ailing community over \$9,000.00 and the fight has not even begun."

Since I am the attorney for certain plaintiffs in the only suit I know of pending against the City of Rising Star, I would like to briefly address that issue:

1. I see no way the City of Rising Star could possibly have spent \$9,000.00 on defense of the suit for the reason that the suit asks NO MONEY of the City of Rising Star and asks, in fact, that if monies have been wrongfully taken from the City of Rising Star, they be returned to the City.

2. The persons bringing the suit ask NO MONEY of the City of Rising Star or anyone else, in fact, are not even asking for recovery of costs and attorney's fees they have paid out of THEIR pockets.

3. The suit has merit and ample grounds for relief, the extent of which will be determined by the Court. I, personally, do not, knowingly, take on frivolous suits.

4. The suit seeks only to have officials of the City of Rising Star, dealing with the City of Rising Star in a questionable manner, to stop such dealings and this COULD HAVE BEEN and COULD BE accomplished by agreement, without necessity of any expense on the City's part, or any other parties.

5. If the City officials decided to expend \$9,000.00 on attorney's fees, by retaining one of the largest law firms in Ft. Worth, to defend the suit of which I speak, then it's little

wonder, with such fiscal judgement, that the City of Rising Star is broke. I only wish I was able to command that size attorney's fee.

I can assure you that none of the persons I represent have anything but the best interests of the City of Rising Star in mind (they have, by the way, been asked, through the lawsuit, to pay for the attorney's fees occasioned by the defendants in the lawsuit) and certainly seek no monies for themselves nor for me.

In the prosecution of my lawsuit against the City of Rising Star's officials I hope to IMPROVE the lot of the citizens, not make it worse. I can say, that in the prosecution of the suit, I have found the current group of City officials to be good, if somewhat misinformed, people who are TRYING to do a good job under circumstances that will NEVER allow the City of Rising Star to prosper.

In conclusion, it is easy to look for a scapegoat in times like those now faced by the City of Rising Star but to do so only places the problem under camouflage and does not bring it into the open to be dealt with.

I would be happy to, and will allow first (1st) priority to those

residents of Rising Star calling me for further discussion on this subject. My number at work is 915/356-5262 and my number at home is 817/893-5718.
