

Until the last few days the winter has been unseasonably warm and dry. Some people are worried that their fruit and trees are going to begin blooming too soon. This is not likely to happen until we have more cold weather first. Fruit trees require a certain number of hours below 45 degrees before they will set a crop of fruit. This is

known as chilling requirements. Peach trees need 750 to 950 hours of temperature below 45 degrees in the winter before they will set a crop. The number of chilling hours required depends on the variety. At this time we have not had enough chilling hours for most varieties of fruit.

thing about the weather, we should concentrate our efforts on those management jobs we can do. One of those important jobs to perform on our fruit trees is the annual "lube" job. This refers, of course, to an application of dormant oil to control scale insects.

RISING S'

Why control scale insects? The answer is simply to

save the trees. If a scale insect such as the San Jose scale or white peach gets started, it would kill your trees.

Dormant oil can be purchased at many different stores where garden supplies are sold. Be sure to follow all label directions and apply the mixture when the temperature is between 40-70 degrees F. Do not apply if a freeze is likely with 48 hours after application, and do no apply after the tree has budded out. Dormant oil is applied when the tree is dormant. Spraying blooms and leaves could cause leaf burn and flower

drop. Scale insects are difficult for most people to detect, so dormant oil should be applied once each year. Sooner or later your trees will probably be attacked by scale insects, so be ready by guarding against them with an application of dormant oil. Dormant oil should be applied to all kinds of fruit trees and it won't hurt your pecan trees. Scale is not

generations each year. A dormant oil spray now will be a big help in controlling the insect. However, other applications may be needed throughout the year. They spread to new foliage during the crawler stage which first appears during May. As crawlers begin to feed, a wax covering forms over the insect.


Summer oil will control adult euonymus scale. Malathicn or diazinon added to the summer oil and water mixture will control crawl-

Be sure to follow directions on the insecticide labels when spraying for all types of insects.

Another job that needs to be done to your fruit trees is pruning. Pruning a young tree controls its shape by developing a string, well-balanced framework of scaffold branches. The open center pruning system is being suited for stone fruit trees. Since most fruit trees bear fruit on wood that grew the previous year, this wood is regrowth from year to year. New growth needs full light or it will shade out and die with all the production occurring on the outer perimeter of the tree. The open center system maximizes light penetration to all parts of the tree, resulting in fruit production over the entire

The crappie hot spots have been reported in both the Sandy and Hubbard Creek areas and well baited boat house in the main lake area. Black bass wise, numerous 6 to 8 pound fish are being taken on a regular basis. It has been reported the Sandy Creek side of the lake is the prime area. Exact locations are being very well guarded.





It's Not All Work!

Pastor John C. Jones just returned from his recent annual trip into the Amazon Jungle of Brazil to minister. His "ministry of faith" was introduced to a group of 25 or more interior jungle ministers, natives of Brazil, and it was there in that jungle village that the ministers learned the "principles of faith" to take back to their congregations deep in the jungles. The village the seminar was held in was on a lake that is river fed, and like all Amazon Jungle villages interior, there are no roads leading into the town. Transportation in the Amazon is mostly by the vast network of rivers that inter-feed and finally form the great Amazon. The pastor and jungle pilot/missionary, Bennie DeMerchant (Amazon missionary for 24 years), flew the float plane through a very bad storn during the night to arrive at the village (Maues) where the seminar was held. Rev. Jones carried into the country from America airplane pistons, cylinders, beef jerky, a microwave rotating plate, marshmellows, children's toys, etc (this has been six years of transportation these airplane parts to keep the missions planes going as we have two float planes there ... a 4 passenger and a 6 passenger).

The pastor finalized the

agreement with a jungle lodge on the Juma River to serve as "master guide" for American fishermen he will be bringing into fish that area for the Peacock Bass (see picture of the over 30 inch, approximately 18 pound Peacock Bass he is holding caught on fly rod). The pastor will incorporate this work with his present travels and still be away from the congregation no more per year than what he presently is.




