# German Extermination British Bombs At Stalingrad Continuing Duesseldorf

#### **Prisoners Are** Denouncing Leaders

Other Points Taken By Reds In The Caucasus Sector

MOSCOW, Jan. 28. (AP)-The Russians continued the merciless extermination of the doomed Germans before Stalingrad today, quoting prisoners as denouncing Hitler and officers who "ran away and left us," and widened the Caucasus front westward by capturing two cities close to the Maikop oil fields.

(The Germans announced a new retreat wets of Voronezh to a shortened line. The communique said their Stalingrad forces shattered new attacks.

Pravda reported 60 German aviators were captured near Stalingrad when the Bed army was driving the foe from be-hind into the city. They were caught throwing gasoline their planes when the Soviets captured the last German airdrome. The loss of 48 more tanks in the last 12 hours greatly weakened the Germans near the cen-

The eruption of new fighting in the western Caucasus was disclosed with the capture of Apsheron skaya and Neftegorsk.

Aspsheronskaya is little more than 19 miles from Malkop and Neftegorak is 25 miles southwest of the oil center which was burned and blasted by the Russians be fore they moved out in the face of the German advance early last summer. It was held unlikely that Hitler's troops were able to get much oil out of the Maikop fields.





WASHINGTON, Jan. 28 UP-A pipeline is "the most dependable method for meeting military and essential civilian requirements for essential civilian requirements for petroleum products" on the east coast next winter, and construc-tion of a second such carrier from Texas to Seymour, Ind., probably will begin in March and be com-pleted by September 1, Adminis-trator Ickes of the petroleum ad-

ministration for war announced.

The pipeline, to cost \$44,000,000 will be 836 miles long and built of 20-inch pipe. It will deliver 235,000 barrels of light petroleum prod ucts daily to railroad loading points at Seymour and Norris City, Ill. Contracts will be let as quickly as possible, the PAW declared. The line will originate at refineries in the Beaumont-Houston areas of

Feeder lines will include: 83 miles of 16-inch pipe from Houston to Beaumont; 32 miles of 10 3-4 incl pipe from Port Arthur to Beau 8 5-8 inch pipe as refinery tie-ins near Baytown and Texas City.




