## Through The Editor's Specs

Jack Cox, personable and able young Breckenridge business man, came to Rising Star last week in the approved fashion of the air age and talked about his campaign for the highest State office. He landed at the football field adjoining the high school grounds where the student bodies of both Rising Star schools were present for the thrill of seeing a candidate drop out of the skies in a "whirlybird", symbolic of the jet-age methods which Mr. Cox declares must be applied to the languishing finances and administrative problems of the State government. The helicopter set itself down easily upon the limited confines of the football field and Mr. Cox spoke briefly to the students about those freedoms which will shortly become their responsibility as citizens, and then turned to the older and voting folk to say why they should vote for him for Governor in the Democratic primaries May 7.

I recall that about 15 years ago another candidate for a high office made a statewide campaign in a similar fashion, dropping out of the skies in almost every hamlet and town to speak to groups of voters in the issues in the campaign for the U. S. Senate. That young man was elected by a narrow vote and went on to become one of the most powerful men in the nation, leader of the Democratic party in the U. S. Senate and prominently mentioned as a candidate for President. He is, as you recognize, Lyndon Johnson.

I do not know whether the method of campaigning is any guarantee of success in a political campaign, and whether or not Mr. Cox will receive a majority of the votes that will be cast in the May voting, but I do predict that a lot of ballots will be marked in his favor.

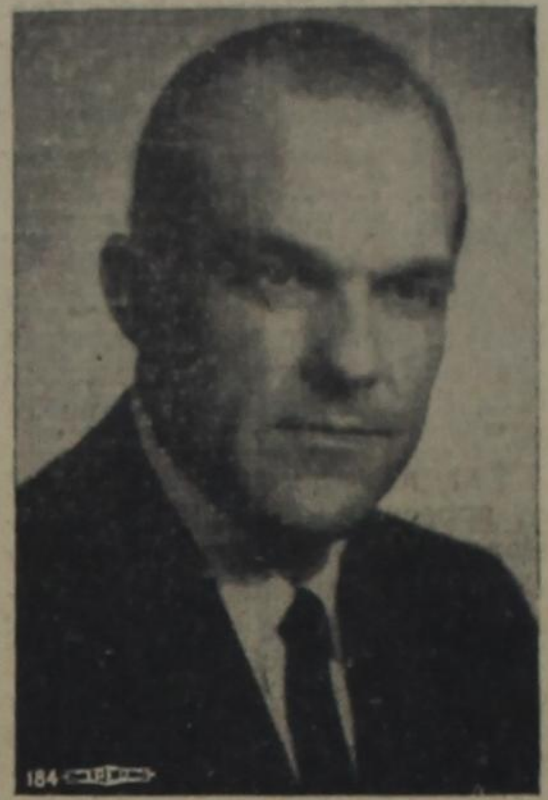

## Jack Cox Visits Here Thursday in Race for Governor

Jack Cox of Breckenridge, candidate for Governor of Texas, came to Rising Star Thursday of last week in the interest of his campaign. He arrived at Wildcat Field by helicopter where he spoke to the student body of Rising Star High School and afterward to a group of his supporters and friends.

Cox is advocating a "vigorous, decisive" administration to solve such state problems as those now existing in the fields of education, insurance, medical aid to needy old people, and taxation.

A native of Breckenridge, Cox attended the University of Texas and holds a degree in Government from North Texas State College.

He served five years in the Navy during World War II, following which he served three terms in the Legislature.

He is married and has two children. He is a member of the First Christian Church of Breckenridge, where he teaches a Sunday School class.

Cox is vice president of the Pico Drilling Company of Breckenridge, and in addition to his business activity he has spent a great deal of time speaking all over the nation on the subject of Americanism.

In recognition of these speeches, he received the Freedom Foundation award at Valley Forge, Pa., on February 22, 1958, for outstanding achievement in bringing about a better understanding of the American Way of Life.

He was appointed to the National Americanism Committee of the American Legion in October, 1959.

Cox, a former service station operator, is past president of the Texas Service Stations Association.

He is active in Future Farmer work and received the Honorary Lone Star Farmer degree on July 16, 1959, from Future Farmers of America.

Appointed to the Texas Commission on Higher Education in 1954 by Governor Allan Shivers, he is still a member and now serving as secretary of that commission.

The Rising Star High School girls won the District title in High School girls volleyball by defeating, first, Desdemona and then Gorman in a tournament here Friday night of last week.

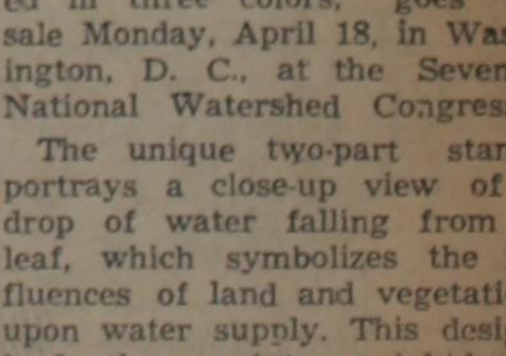
The team will go to Stephenville Friday, April 22, to participate in regional championship play.

## Water Conservation Stamp on Sale Soon



This is a black and white reproduction of the 4-cent water conservation stamp that goes on sale April 19 at the post office here. The stamp, printed in three colors, goes on sale Monday, April 18, in Washington, D. C., at the Seventh National Watershed Congress.

The unique two-part stamp portrays a close-up view of a drop of water falling from a leaf, which symbolizes the influences of land and vegetation upon water supply. This design leads the eye into a right-hand panel depicting an actual small watershed panorama. People and industries in the town in the foreground are dependent for their water upon the watershed above, which ideally includes conservation farm and forest children.

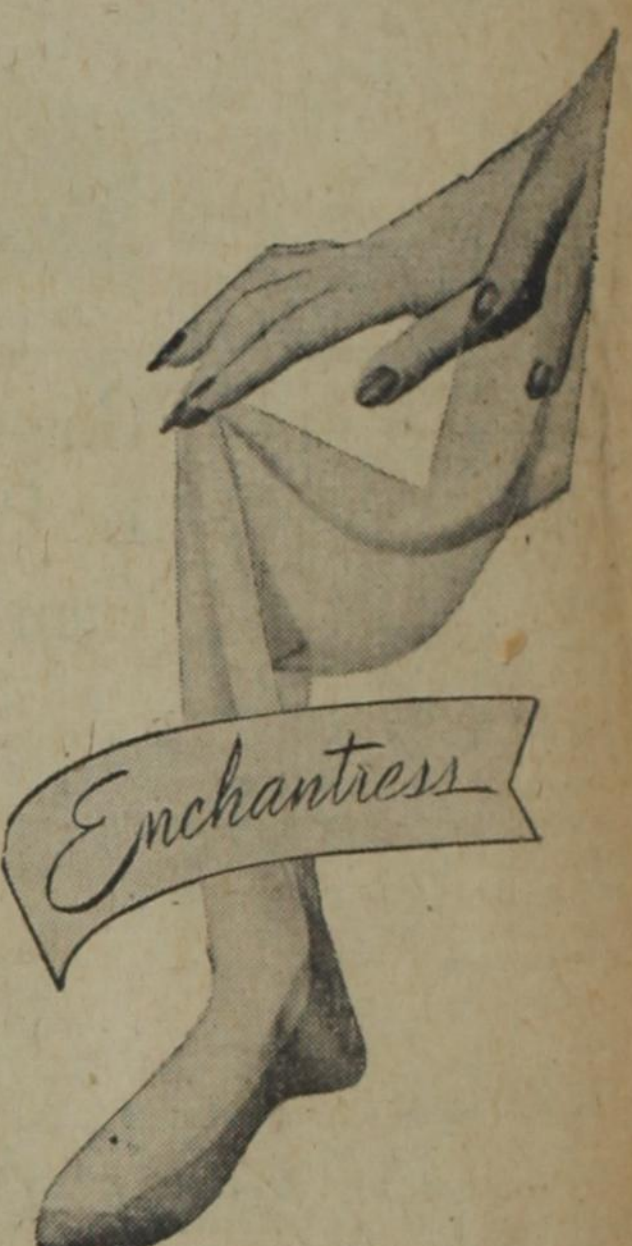

### Missile Race and Taxes Among WTCC Topics

SAN ANGELO. — The missile race, taxes, Congress, and finances are some of the subjects for speeches here April 18 and 19 at the 42 annual convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

Beginning at 2 p.m., April 18, in the Cactus Hotel and ending following lunch on April 19 in the Town House Hotel, the convention will present the following principal speakers:

Alvin A. Burger of Austin, executive director of the Texas Research League, will discuss "The Texas Tax Picture: Where We Stand, Where We're Headed."

O. Clark Fisher of San Angelo, member of Congress from the 21st District of Texas, will tell about "The Course of Congress."

At the dinner the first night, the editor and publisher of Farm and Ranch Magazine, Tom Anderson of Nashville, Tenn., will present "Straight Talk."

"The Effect of Texas' Tax Problems on Continued Economic Growth" will be explained on April 19 by Ben H. Sloane, manager of the Point Comfort operations of Aluminum Company of America.

O. Dooley Dawson, vice-president of Houston's Bank of the Southwest, will tell of "West Texas' Greatest Opportunity for Basic Economic Development."

Concluding the convention will be a luncheon address by Lt. Gen. Bernard A. Schriever on "The Status of Our Missile Program." He is commanding general of the Air Force's Research and Development Command, Andrews Air Force Base, Maryland.

Press panels being arranged by Bill Collyns will question Burger, Fisher, Sloane, Dawson and Schriever following their addresses. Collyns is editor of the Midland Reporter-Telegram and vice-president of District VI of the West Texas Chamber.

### FIELD BORDER STRIP Successful Soil Conservation Practices Make Good Home for Balanced Wildlife

Soil, water and plant conservation practices successfully carried out by farmers and ranchers produce a home for a balanced wildlife. A balanced wildlife tends to balance the insect population. When this condition exists the fungus and bacterial life in the soil becomes balanced and a live soil results. A live soil makes healthy plants and healthy animals. A dead soil makes poor plants and animals that are sick.

Stubble mulches and crop residues, conserved by the farmer, furnishes waste grain and other seeds that are choice food for quail and other game birds.

The better grass covers on improved ranges furnishes nesting places and hide aways for grassland game. Many farmers leave fence rows, road-dor roads, corners of fields and other such odd areas to wildlife.

Grassed waterways suggest silt free ponds and streams. The grassy edges provide nesting places, travel lanes, shelter and food for wildlife.

Strip cropping is usually a good sign of good game bird hunting. This soil conservation practice furnishes game food and shelter.

The many farm ponds not only have provided a better supply of water for wildlife but have improved the migratory bird population all over the United States.

Smart fishermen and hunters look for conservation farms and ranches. In addition to providing more wildlife, the conservation farm is generally owned by folks who are friendly to the considerate sportsman.

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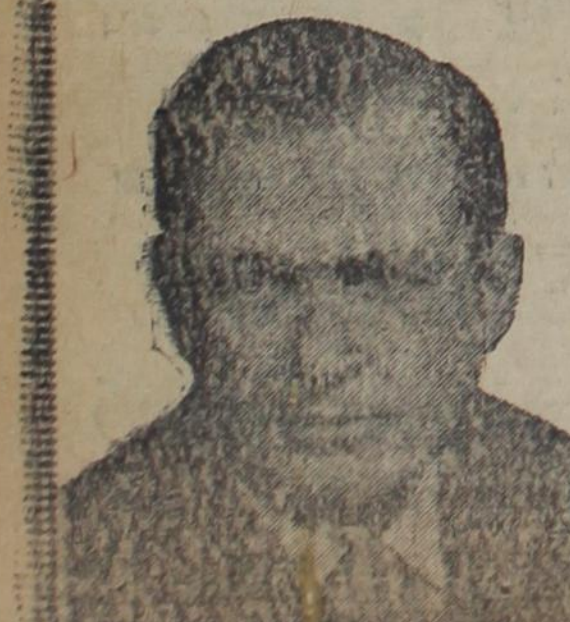

The pace of life is such in smaller communities that people have time to sit and visit—or at least stop long enough on the street for a little conversation.

For a year, I had an office in a building in Dallas. Every now and then, I'd ride in the elevator with another tenant. All I knew about him was his name and that he was an attorney. 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### New Type Tax Return Cards For Employers

Employers will receive a new type card-punch tax return, Form 941 (Social Security and Withholding Tax), and a separate paper schedule for listing employee wage information instead of the form printed on a single sheet of paper for the quarter ending March 31, 1960, according to A. E. Fogle, Jr., Administrative Officer of the Abilene office.

Use of this punch-card tax return is part of the Internal Revenue Service mechanization program designed to provide better and more economical processing procedures. The format is substantially the same as the Form 941 previously used and employers should have no difficulty in preparing it, A. E. Fogle, Jr., said.

This new type form will be mailed automatically to employers each quarter as in the past. The first mailing was scheduled for the end of March. Included with the new form will be an announcement of the change and brief instructions for the use of the new form.

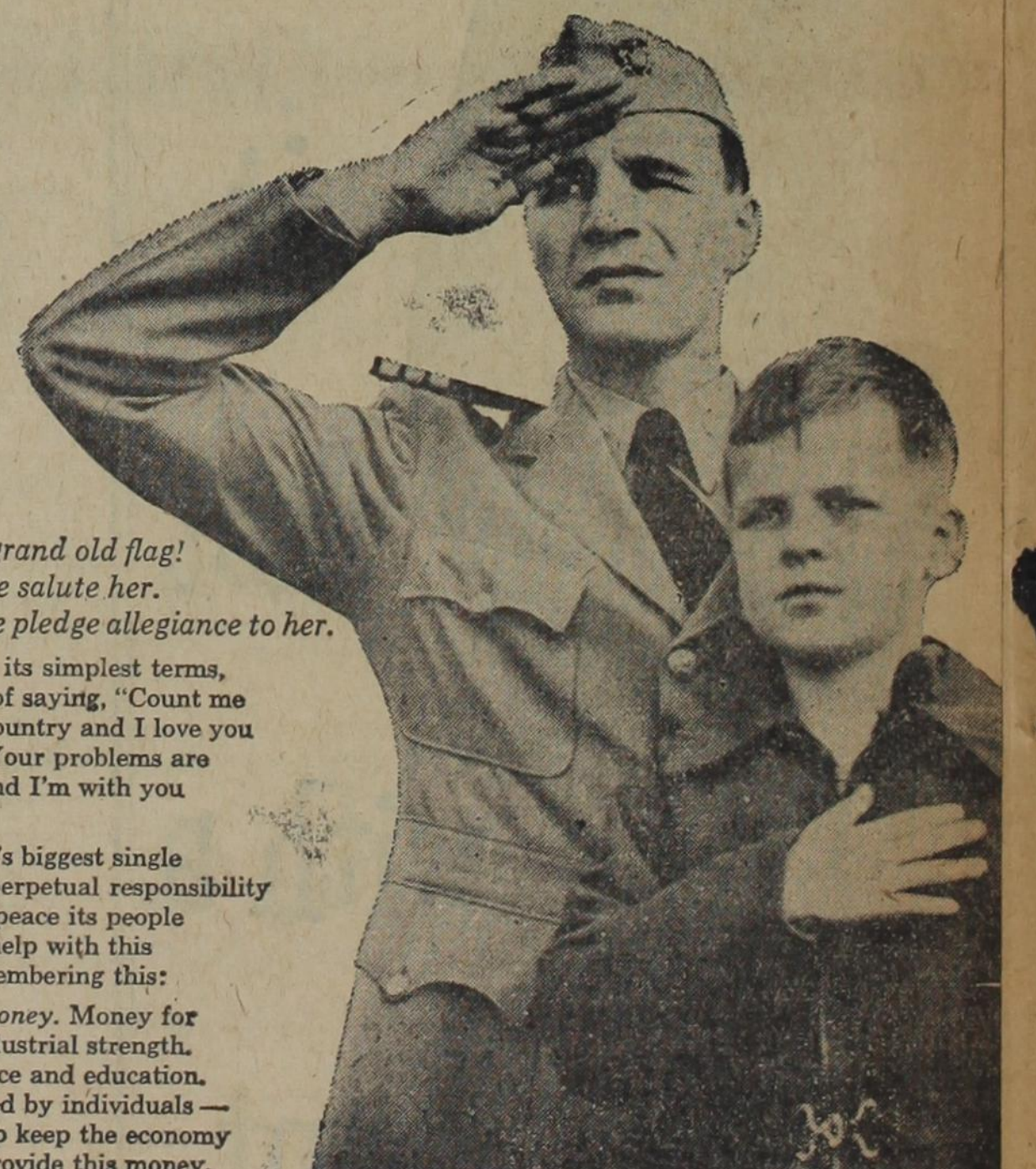

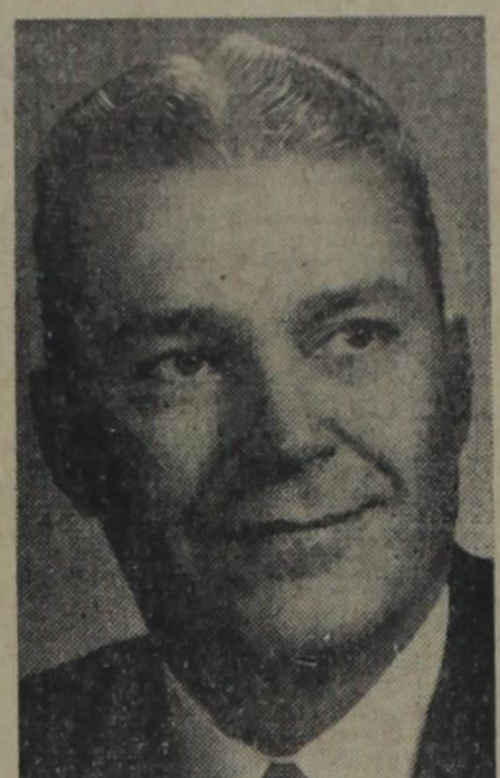

## Plant Diseases Can Cut Profit From Livestock

COLLEGE STATION. — The prevention and control of plant diseases are important in livestock production because profits depend on maximum yields from pastures and crops.

In many instances, says Harlan E. Smith, extension plant pathologist, the weather, soil or planting seed get the blame for low production when plant diseases cause the losses. Too, he adds, poor quality feed or forage often results from damages caused by plant diseases. Such feed does not contain the vitamins, minerals and other essentials necessary for good animal health, says the pathologist.

The fungi, bacteria and other germs which cause plant diseases cannot be seen with the naked eye. And plant diseases are difficult or impossible to control once they have infected a crop. However, says Smith, many can be prevented. For example, the treating of planting seed with a good fungicide will aid in controlling some feed and forage crop diseases.

The pathologist suggests that good, carefully selected seed, which is dry, sound and free from combine injured seed coats be planted. Also that the seed be planted in a warm, mellow soil. Cold and wet soil favors seedling diseases.

He recommends that rotation be followed with annual feed and forage crops because growing the same crops on the same land year after year tends to increase plant disease problems. If a disease resistant crop variety or hybrid is available, Smith strongly urges its use. For as he puts it, an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure in preventing plant disease losses.

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## ABOUT YOUR HEALTH

The Texas State Department of Health several years ago, started a program of services for medically indigent children who are severely impaired in hearing.

Those who are eligible are examined medically, and the degree and type of their hearing loss is determined. Many still retain some hearing ability, provided sounds are made loud enough through use of hearing aids.

Under this program, administered by the Division of Maternal and Child Health, the use of such equipment is arranged. For those who have been impaired from birth, or through accident or disease during early childhood, the new sounds which they hear must be identified. Training in listening must be provided.

One of the first steps in this training is the identification of sounds made by objects around them. These include passing cars, barking dogs, closing doors, running water and the voices of people.

through attentive observation and association such as hearing the telephone ring and someone then answering it, or pressing a ring on the steering wheel to sound a horn.

Preschool clinics to test hearing and sight and uncover dental defects are in operation in various parts of Texas.

A team of maternal and child health specialists from the State Health Department are available to aid local health departments and communities to set up programs which they can operate independently.

The clinics usually take place in the spring with the help of parent-teacher associations in registering the preschool children for testing.

When hearing, sight or dental defects are found, the parent is encouraged to have the child examined further and corrections made. Often simple corrective procedures remedy the difficulty.

The uncovering and correction of such defects before a child enters school, permits both child and each to devote time and energy to learning and teaching alone.

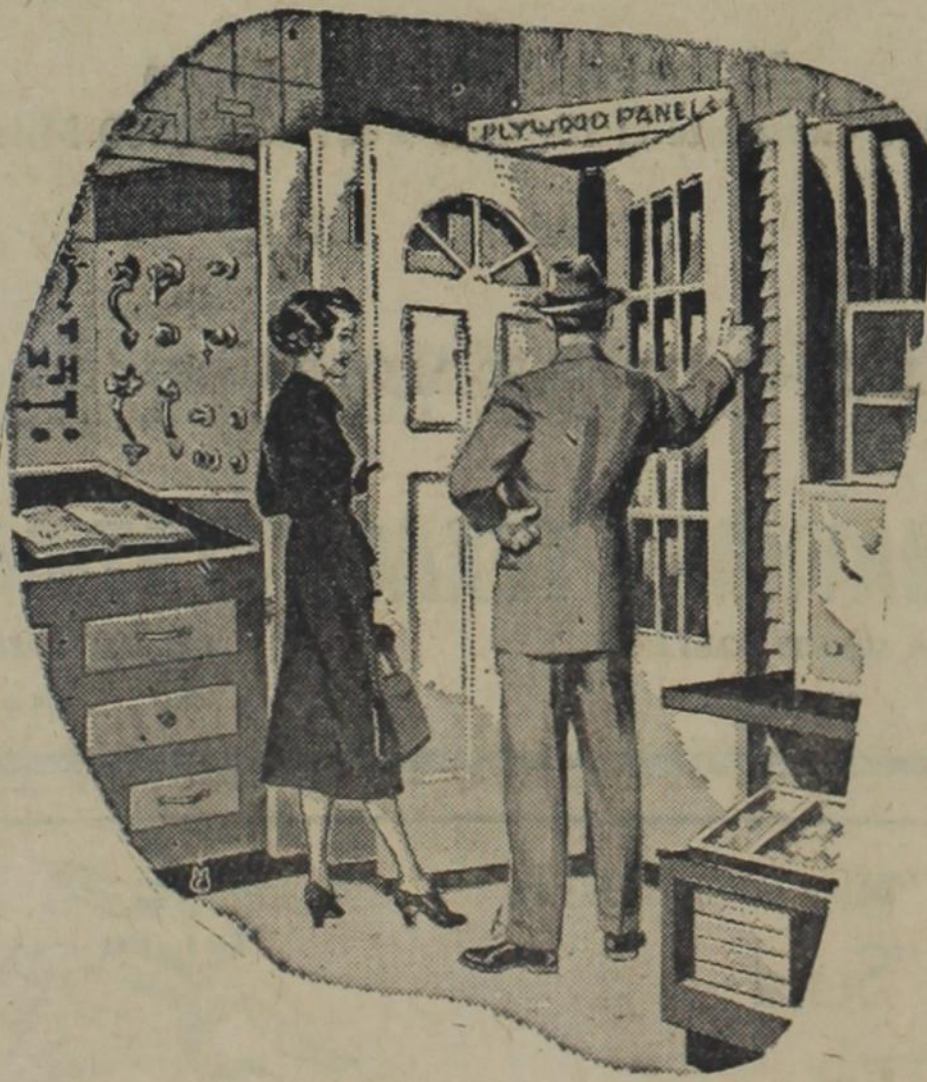
