Doctor Frank C. Payne died May 27, 1979 and was buried May 30, 1979 in Breckenridge, Texas. He was born in Rockwall, Texas in 1902. After becoming a doctor he moved to Rising Star, Texas during the depression where he resided from 1930 to 1940. He was on call night and day without thought of being paid and had great love and compassion for his patients. Many will remember him as a true friend!

He served on the Rising Star School Board and had a big part in the building of the present football field, donating time and labor to that project; men who owed doctor bills were given credit on them with labor done on the football field.

Dr. Payne and his wife Lucile were the

parents of four boys: Frank C. Jr., now a pediatrician of Dallas, Texas; Jimmy, a principal of Ozona Schools, Ozona, Texas; Jerry, a doctor in Hereford, Texas; and Ronnie, who is in Real Estate in Breckenridge, Texas. Lucile wife of Dr. Payne now resides at 1110 E. Hellums, Breckenridge, Texas.

Dr. Payne moved to Breckenridge in 1940 where he helped in building a hospital, supported the schools, served as a civic leader and was an active member of the Episcopal Church.

He will be remembered as a "Doctor With A Heart". In his retirement years he was spoken of by friends and business men as "A Grand Old Man".

1978 Production Announced For Eastland County

Thursday, June 7, 1979

With another year of production at the maximum efficient recovery rate in nearly all the state's fields, Texas crude oil output last year again topped one-billion barrels. This is a level that has been achieved annually since 1965, although a downward trend in production continued for the sixth consecutive year. If this trend persists throughout 1979, it is unlikely the billion-barrel figure will be achieved this year.

The output of the nation's No. 1 oil producing state in 1978 was almost 1.1-billion barrels, thus pushing the state's cumulative production since 1889 to more than 43.7 billion barrels. However, last year's output was

more than 61 million barrels below 1977 production and nearly 224 million barrels less than the all-time peak production year of 1972.

H.B. (Hank) Harkins of Alice, president of the Dallas-based Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association, notes that the decline in production in 1978 corresponds to a drop of almost 777,500,000 barrels in Texas' reserves of crude oil. The decline from approximately 8.5 billion barrels to some 7.7-billion barrels amounts to a 9.2 per cent drop. But, Harkins sees a brighter future for the Texas petroleum industry despite the recent drop in production

and reserves. Eastland County, which has had recorded production since 1917, last year produced 880,731 barrels of crude oil at a rate of 2,413 barrels per day. Production in 1978 boosted Eastland County's production total through the end of the year to 126,089,247 barrels.

In 1978, 24 counties produced more than 10 million barrels of crude oil, a decrease of two counties from 1977; a decrease of three from 1976 and six from 1975.

The following chart shows 1978 production figures for the state's five top producing counties, all with production in excess of 47 million barrels. Yoakum retained its spot as the state's top producing county, while Gaines, moving from fourth to second, exchanged places with Scurry County. Ector remained in third place and Hockley in fifth place for the fourth consecutive year.

Pressure Canning Clinic Set By Extension Office

Fresh vegetables are beginning to mature enough to can. So why not see if your pressure canner is in good working order.

First of all you will want to have your pressure canner dial gauge checked. If it does not register correctly, then your food may spoil. The Eastland County Extension Homemakers Council is sponsoring a pressure canner gauge clinic on Tuesday mornings, June 5 and 19th, from 9:30 to 11 a.m. in the County Extension Office at the Courthouse. Charge for testing a canner gauge for accuracy is 50 cents.

If you canner has a gasket, check to see if it is allowing steam to escape. If the pressure can't reach 10 pounds, buy a new gasket.

You will want to wash the bottom or kettle part of your canner -- inside and out -- with soapy water. If the outside is stained, you can use fine wool with soap as a cleaner for those other than the porcelain coated ones. To clean the inside, fill the canner half full of water and add one cup vinegar. Put it on the range. Be sure you have the rack in it so that it will be cleaned too. Let pressure go to five pounds for 10 to 15 minutes. Slide canner from hot range unit and let cool until gauge reaches zero. Let it sit four or five minutes, then open petcock and remove the lid. Pour out the vinegar water, rinse and dry canner.

Do not put the canner lid in water; this will damage the dial gauge and may cause the petcock to become clogged. Instead, wipe the lid with a soapy cloth and then with a clean, damp one.

Clean the openings in the lid by drawing a string or pipe cleaner through them. Take off removable petcock and safety valve, wash and dry thoroughly; occasionally soak these parts in vinegar and wash and dry. After cleaning, put all parts back together carefully and correctly.

The Eastland County Extension Office has free food preservation bulletins on canning, freezing, jellies and jams, pickles and relishes, and drying of fruits and vegetables. Everyone is invited to call or come by the County Extension Office for your free food preservation bulletins.

GORDON SPOT

The conditions are ideal for screwworms now. Animal owners should watch for signs of screwworm infestations in their livestock and pets.

Thanks to the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program, there have been only a few cases of the insects reported this year in Texas. The eradication program needs full cooperation of livestock and pet owners if it is to be successful.

Livestock and pet owners are reminded to do three things. Inspect animals frequently. Treat all wounds with an approved product. Collect and submit worm specimens that might be screwworms to the Screwworm Laboratory at Mission, Texas, for identification. Positive cases then can be given sterile fly treatment. This treatment will not be given unless the worms are sent to the laboratory for positive identification. We have mailing vials and cartons in the Extension Agents Office. I would suggest that all livestock owners keep a mailing carton in their possession so that samples can be sent to the lab.

Weeds and brush are abundant throughout the county this year. Control of these unwanted plants will boost the grazing program.

Products containing 2, 4-D or dicamba (Banvel) and used for weed control while 2,4,5,-T is used for brush control. Products containing 2,4,5,-T (Banvel 2 plus 2, Tordon 225E and Silvex) were suspended from use on forestland, rights-of-ways and pastures on February 28. The Environmental Protection Agency defines pasture as "land producing forage for animal consumption, harvested by grazing, which has annual or more frequent cultivation, seeding, fertilization, irrigation, pesticide application and other similar practices applied to it."

It has been determined that

all cultural practices must be carried out before a plot is a pasture. Also, any grazing land with woody plant problem can be treated with 2,4,5,-T because, by definition, it is rangeland. Rangeland can be broadcast with 2,4,-D amine or a low volatile ester or 2,4,5-T compounds. Spot treatments with kerosene, 2,4-D or ammate can be used on specific weeds.

Water, plus a commercial surfactant, is the standard carrier for pasture weed control. A water-diesel emulsion plus a surfactant is needed for woody plant control. Herbicides can be applied with hand sprayers or by aerial or ground broadcast.

For herbaceous weeds, apply herbicides when the weeds are young and soil and air temperatures are 70 degrees F.

Control woody plants after leaves mature but before they develop a waxy coat. Weedmaster or Tordon 225E are suggested for hard-to-kill rangeland snakeweed. Tordon 225E and Tordon 10K pellets are restricted herbicides and should be applied by a certified applicator.

Easy-to-kill weeds (bitter sneezeweed, cocklebur, annual broomweed, pigweed, ragweed, snow-on-the-prairie, sesbania and croton) can be treated with 2,4-D. When weeds are slightly mature or under stress, Weedmaster produces better results.

Cool-season annuals, such as western bitterweed, can be treated in late winter or early spring before plants bloom. Make sure soil moisture is adequate and the air temperature is about 70 degrees F. for herbicides to be effective.

Treadleaf groundsel, goldenweed and broom snakeweed can be treated in spring or fall.

For satisfactory and economical weed control, know which herbicide to use on which weeds.

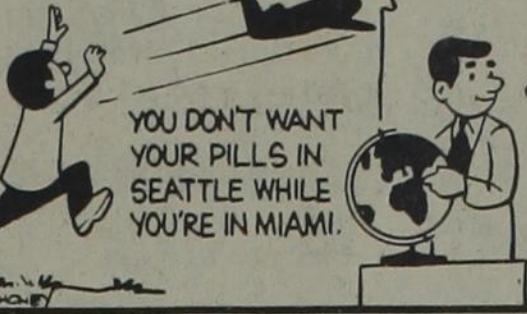

Avoid Burglaries

Did you realize that every 20 seconds — somewhere in the United States — a home or apartment is being burglarized? Senior citizens are susceptible to these crimes and following are some tips on how to keep your home safe:

— Make things tough for burglars by using locks that must be opened and closed with a key. See a local locksmith for advice on force and pick-resistant locks.

— Get good locks for all outside doors, not just the main entrance. If a burglar has trouble with one door lock, he'll often-times check the other doors for

— Locking windows is just as important as locking doors. The latches on double-hung windows can be jimmied open. They can be locked securely by sliding bolts into holes drilled through the bottom and into the top frame.

— Sliding glass doors are another favorite means of entry for burglars. They are often easy to "jimmy" open and usually don't have adequate locks. A locksmith or hardware store owner has special locks for sliding glass doors that will provide much better security than those usually built into the doors.

Appliance Care

Your new refrigerator will operate better and longer if you follow a few simple tips:

- Be sure the unit is level. Models without forced ventilation around the condenser should have adequate space above, behind and on the sides for air circulation. Never place next to a kitchen range.
- Don't let frost in freezer compartment build up more than one-fourth inch.
- Clean the interior regularly with a solution of baking soda and water.

Church of Christ

Mike Peters has been preaching some very good sermons this week in our series of gospel meetings. Sunday night, his lessons came from I Peter. He pointed out that wearing the name of "Christian" was a very high honor and that it should mean very much to us. He said it is not so much something you do but something a person is. If we are indeed a Christian we will do Christianity. Mike also pointed out that being a Christian is being surrendered to Christ as a husband and wife surrendered themselves to each other and indeed it is surrendering all of our beings, body, soul, heart and mind in Christ.

Mike pointed out seven-fold surrender in I Peter that Christians make. Let me share them with you briefly. 1. Christians surrender to suffering joyfully. This is the proof of our faith when we suffer as a Christian (because we are a Christian) and still glorify God in this behalf. 2. The Christian also surrenders to "strange reactions" from those who have not surrendered. Mike gave an example of a man on a football squad who was invited to go out

with the rest of the guys and drink, dance, and "have a good time". This fellow met with strange reactions because of his refusal of the invitation to sin. Yet, the Christian was victorious; he converted his buddy to Christ. 3. The Christian surrenders to a sanctified heart. We are to be a holy nation, and a royal priesthood and sanctify in our hearts Jesus Christ as Lord. 4. We are also to surrender to our role as a spiritual steward. Each one has been given some gift, or talent. We should identify that gift or may be those gift and use them to his glory. Being lazy and selfish is not being a Christian. Mike pointed out, "It is better to burn yourself out than to rust yourself out". 5. The Christian is a person who has surrendered the words of his lips. There can be no deceit nor insult in the words that come forth from Christian lips. 6. A Christian surrenders to a deep sympathetic love for people. Peter calls it sincere love of the brethren. Love knows no bounds in fulfilling the demands made on its time, for Christ gives us time; it knows no bounds in giving of our money and material blessings, for Christ gave us all these things; it knows no bounds in using our lives to his service, for Christ gives us that life.

A Christian doesn't mind being inconvenienced; he delights in going the first and even the second mile, because Christ also is walking with him every step of the way. And 7. a Christian is surrendered to sacrifice. There is no joy in Christianity until the Christian learns to give and do on a level of being sacrificial. We offer our lives as Paul said in Romans 12 as a living sacrifice to God because we were redeemed by the grace

of God through faith when we repented of our sins and confessed his lordship over us as the only begotten of the Father, and we were adopted as His Children when we were born again in baptism (John 3), therefore, we also should sacrifice our lives to Christ. 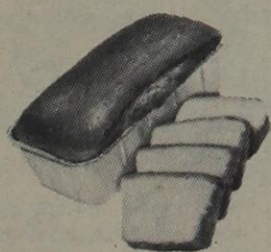
