

Toby Long was chosen to attend the Youth Range Workshop at the Texas Tech University Center at Junction June 19-24. Selection was based on outstanding projects or interest in range management. Toby's local sponsor is Eastland County S.C.S., a strong supporter of range education and leadership development of local youth.

The weeklong Youth Range Workshop, sponsored by the Texas Section of the Society for Range Management, is arranged to recognize outstanding range and ranch youth and to provide them an opportunity for complimentary training in range management and leadership skills. According to Barron Rector and B.J. Ragsdale, workshop coordinators from College Station, participants will learn to identify range plants, evaluate rangeland potential and current condition, manage rangeland for livestock production and wildlife habitat and practice ranch planning. Leadership training will feature discussion of interpersonal relations, communications skills and group leading practice. Field trips away from the Center will be to Kimble County ranch and the Kerr Wildlife Management Area in Kerr County.

From 4.2 to 6.5 inches of rain north of Rising Star were reported early Wednesday morning. The rain began in very brief showers Tuesday and began a steady downfall in the evening, continuing for several hours.

The Sabanna and Leon Rivers where they cross Highway 183 were out of their banks Wednesday morning. Comanche reported 10 inches of rain with flooding

and Highway 377 closed. Brownwood had 6 inches, Cisco 3.3, Lake Cisco 4.5 and Eastland 4.4 inches.

Some farmers had completed planting peanuts while others had not begun planting. I didn't notice any bad washing in fields on the drive from Rising Star to Eastland, but there is erosion at points where work had been done on highway right of way.

Reports will have to be done in compliance with state rules and regulations. Records of meetings and reports will need to be audited by the City Council at regular meetings the second Tuesday of each month.

Johnny Hubbard moved to adjourn the meeting at 8:23 p.m. Cole White seconded the motion and it carried unanimously.



## I've Been Wrong Before

I once ventured the opinion that the news was managed. "Ridiculous", snorted a numbskull. "A barge exploded yesterday on the Mississippi. How do you think anyone could manage that?"

I am an incurable channel-hopper and during the special feature sections of news broadcasts I often wondered if something in another networks program might interest me more. When one features agitation to clean up the Hudson River and I switch only to get efforts to clean up Lake Erie followed by a switch to the third channel with pollution of Chesapeake Bay I wondered. A week later we get the same seeming coordination on poverty in one Central or South American country and try to figure what they are agitating there. With no big story or natural disaster one just wonders why our gaze is being focused in that direction. About that time another man makes the public claim that news is being managed and proposed to prove his point by showing video recordings of too many news features to be coincidental. He was quickly brought to court and his tapes seized on claims of "Copyright violation". That ended any chance of public exposure of the practice.

Having squeaked by that one the networks became a bit more cautious and separed such "coincidental" reporting by a few days. After all, the average citizens memory isn't very long. The problem is that the managers sometimes forget about the story of the man who drowned in a creek that only "averaged" three inches deep.

Have you ever gotten tired of the same news several days in a row when it really wasn't that important? Maybe they were only trying to drive a point home or maybe they spent so much developing the story they are only trying to get their moneys worth out of those pictures.

Naturally an editor must decide what might suit his readers most and if a lot of things go on the same day "ALL the news fit to print" may be one papers moto but there simply might not be space for ALL of it. With that we have no argument. However, when news of a political nature that is genuinely important but not printed or if it comes out in the "out of town" issue but fails to be in the local edition of Dallas Morning News for example we might suspect censorship.

Another cute trick in news papers is to print a story the management would rather not have widely exposed is to bury it in back pages on obituary page, in the sports section though it has nothing to do with sports, or sandwich it between grocery ads. Then if an irate reader hears about it from distant sources the editor can honestly (?) state "We did print that." Not his fault if you failed to digest all thirty or more pages of the big town paper. Right?

Now just suppose I wanted to manage news in this land of "free press". First I would gain editorial control of the wire services or find ways to influence the editors who screen what comes in or goes out. The control by ownership of all the wire services would violate anti-trust laws but influence is another matter entirely. Thus, since fewer and fewer news papers can afford to hire reporters to roam this land and the World in general, an unwanted story would never get out of the town where it happened.

Recently a story broke in Southern Calif. It had national significance and brought into question alleged acts by national figures but I my Mother had not clipped it from the San Diego paper I would never have known of it. A spin-off story came over TV a couple weeks later but had less impact without the original.

Thus the statement, "All I know is what I read in the newspapers," (made before TV) can mean less and less if forces are permitted to control and distort news. The observation by one of the Founding Fathers that "A free press is vital to proper working of representative government" may be proven in the converse to the extent that control is permitted to exist.

There is no need for total control as long as the chief aims of evil men can be accomplished with partial control. Indeed, a partial control is bound to excite less opposition if any at all if a semblance of freedom is permitted to continue.

At any rate the problem is still with us and by the failure of that Flying Dutchman barge and other TV publicity a really practical solution is still waiting.

My nephew in El Cajon, Calif. said they had a highly promoted disposal plant which operated for a while then shut down and he couldn't learn why. If someone would pay my expenses I would try to find out. My problem is that most people who would want to buy me a ticket to anywhere would want it to be a one-way instead of a round-trip.

Land fills are popular until something like those smart Californians building a school happens. There was all that land the city owned already and the neighborhoods were spreading out around it. So they spent a bundle building a school only to abandon the fine building when methane (biogas) began seeping up all around.

## Senna: A Cattle Killer

College Station-A drought hardy plant that's thriving in parts of Texas is killing cattle and goats- and the situation will get worse as dry weather continues.

Twinleaf senna, which is at its best when desirable pasture and range plants are suffering from dry weather, currently is causing a lot of problems for goat and cattle producers, said Dr. Barron Rector, a range specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service.

Cases of livestock poisoning from the plant have been reported in Bandera, Blanco, Edwards, Gillespie, Kerr, Kimble, McCulloch, Menard, Schleicher and Sutton counties. And the situation is going to get worse, Rector said, even if rains come soon. That's because the mid-point of the growing season is at hand, and desirable grasses will not be able to produce the kind of growth that they would with favorable moisture conditions in the spring.

Twinleaf senna has been found throughout central and western areas of Texas in the past, so ranchers need to be on the lookout for this poisonous plant. Its presence is often dictated by moisture conditions and grazing management practices, Rector said. Twinleaf senna

usually is found on shallow limestone and caliche hills and slopes.

Twinleaf senna has a deep taproot and thus stays green while less hardy plants succumb to drought conditions. The plant is named for its leaflets which are in pairs. It grows up to 2 feet high and has showy yellow to yellow-orange flowers with five petals. Its seed pods are about 1 1/2 inches long.

Twinleaf senna is most toxic to livestock when in the bloom to early seed pod stage. Goats and cattle tend to be more susceptible than sheep, with younger animals, especially goats, being particularly vulnerable.

Sudden death is likely in young animals grazing twinleaf senna. Early signs of the poisoning include disorientation, weakness and wobbliness. Animals may develop diarrhea and have coffee-colored urine. Most affected animals die within 24 hours after symptoms develop. Adult cattle may take on the "downer cow syndrome" and live for two to three days.

No treatment is currently available for animals affected by twinleaf senna poisoning, said the range specialist.

So, grazing management is the key to avoiding this

problem. First, a rancher should check his pasture or range to see if twinleaf senna is present. If so livestock should be removed at once unless there is a sufficient amount of desirable forage available for grazing. If other forage is available, most livestock will not graze this poisonous plant. Alternative grazing pastures may be found in deeper soils of creek bottoms which may be free of twinleaf senna.

A lack of phosphorus in the diet may prompt cattle to graze poisonous plants, Rector said. Therefore a good nutrition and mineral program can help prevent plant poisoning in animals.

If an animal dies and twinleaf senna poisoning is suspected, a post mortem examination may be in order. Consult a veterinarian to send a fresh sample of the rumen content along with affected muscle and cardiac tissue and the liver to the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory at Texas A&M University. A veterinarian or the county extension agent can also assist in diagnosing plant poisoning problems in livestock. The best approach to reducing toxic plant problems on pastures and ranges is to have a sound nutritional and forage management system, said Rector. That means continued attention to grazing management based on forage availability as affected by weather conditions and forage use by livestock.

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

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
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# Area News Briefs

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A FEW YEARS EARLIER, the newspaper didn't have as many readers. But its merchants advertised a lot, and there were more available dollars to hire writers and advertising sales people.

THE TOWN PROSPERED and its population grew to attract new, bigger businesses that came in to compete for customers from throughout the entire region. But some of those bigger businesses tried different ways of advertising, or reduced their own dollars for advertising when they took command of the market. Some small firms left.

TIMES GOT TOUGHER for the newspaper in spite of helping it's town grow. In just 18 months, the price of newsprint increased 30 percent, and it cost 20 percent more just to mail the same newspaper. The newspaper faced the same higher taxes, increased minimum wages and all of the other new challenges to business as did everyone else. Just the cost of keeping its doors open increased to \$526 per day for every 2,500 circulation. \*

The newspaper was forced to reduce its staff a bit, along with some of its local coverage because the dollars just don't have the same reach as prior years.

THE TOWN STARTED LOSING its close kinship and upbeat manner. And its citizens became less interested in ideas for the future of a town in which they were losing contact . . . and information.

## Church of Christ

SATURDAY OR SUNDAY?

Which should be the weekly day of worship, Saturday the sabbath, or Sunday the first day of the week? If Christians are required to keep the sabbath day we should easily find the command to do so in the New Testament, which is the law for Christians!

After the Israelites were freed from Egyptian bondage they were told to keep the Sabbath day (Deut. 5:13-25). We have no record of any people other than the Jews being told to keep that day. Christ kept the sabbath and all the Jewish laws because he lived under the Law of Moses. (Gal. 4:4).

In his death Christ nailed the law to the cross. (Col. 2:14). The law He took away (Heb. 10:9) included the 10 commandments (Rom. 7:4-7; 2 Cor. 3:6-13). Of course we must live by however much of the law is included in the New Covenant for Christians. The Bible no where commands members of Christ's Church to keep the sabbath day.

The Bible records no meetings of Christians on the sabbath day. However, the Apostle Paul did preach at some Jewish (not Christian) meetings on some sabbath days. (Acts 13:14-46).

On the first day of the week occurred the crowning event of all events! What event is as great as the resurrection of Christ? Following the example of the inspired apostle Paul and the early disciples, Christians met upon each first day of the week to commemorate the death, burial and resurrection of Christ. (Acts 20:7; 1 Cor. 11:26, 16:2).

Beginning with the book of Romans and continuing through Revelation we find 22 New Testament books that are written to Christians instructing them how to live. In those 121 chapters of the Jewish sabbath is mentioned one time. (Col. 2:16-17). In that passage the apostle Paul tells us not to let people judge us by binding the sabbath day on us.
