### **Jail Contracts** Postponed

Eastland County Commissioners Monday deferred consideration of Jail Contracts with the cities until the

next Court meeting July 24. This will give City officials more time to work out details of an all-County agreement under which City prisoners will be kept in the County Jail. The present contracts become void July

At a meeting June 26 the Commissioners requested that City officials negotiate a new contract which would be acceptable to all cities. It will then be subject to agreement by the County. Under the old arrangement, each city had a

different agreement. Some progress on a new contract was reported, but more work was apparently needed on clarification.

Chief of Police Cecil Funderburg of Gorman said officials form that city had looked over four different contracts, and "we can't sign the last one."

## **Peanut Contracts** Due July 31

David Martin, County Executive Director of the Eastland County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. reminds peanut producers and handlers that contracts drawn up to sell 1989 crop additional peanuts for export or crushing must be filed by July 31. Additional penuts are those grown in excess of the farm's poundage quota or on a farm that does not have a poundage quota.

Martin said peanut producers and handlers are responsible for contract agreements and they should check to see that the peanut contract is in their best interest.

Peanut contracts submitted to ASCS for approval must contain the name and address of the producer and handler, the handler's registration number, the

code of the sate and county in which the additional peanuts are to be produced, the pounds of segregation 1, 2 or 3 peanuts contractd, the contract price shown as a percentage of the quota support rate and the signatures of the producer and handler.

"Additional items may be included in the contract. However the additional items may not negate any of the required provisions of the contract," Martin said. In the event of a contract

dispute, ASCS approval of the ocntract does not constitute a determination of the respective rights and obligations of the handler and producer.

Peanut products and handlers who have entered into contracts must submit the contracts to each respectie contracting prducer's local ASCS office before the July 31 deadline.

## **CRP Signup Opens July 17**

The U.S. Department of Agriculture will open a ninth sign-up period July 17 through August 4 for the Conservation Reserve Program (C RP).

"To enroll in the program farmers must submit bids indicating the per acre rental payment they would accept to keep their land out of crop production and into conserving uses for 10 years," David Martin, County Executive Director of the Eastland County Agricultural Stabililzation and Conservation Service, said. Applicants must also provide a cropping history for 1981 through 1986, he said.

In addition to highly erodible cropland, farmers may bid to enter filter strips, cropped wetlands, certain water bank program acres and cropland subject to scour erosion into the CRP. According to Martin, Bringing these acres into the program will produce environmental benefits "

The CRP allows each farmer to receive up to \$50,000 per year, based on the bid per acre and the number of acres under the 10-year contract. Rental payments are made annually to producers with approved contracts, and cost-share payments are made after the conservation practice is completed.

To date approximately 3787.4 acres of Eastland County farmland have been accepted in the CRP. Eastland County farmers will received about \$132,500 during 1989 in annual rental payments for CRP land under 10-year contracts.

Nationally, more than 30 million acres have bdeen enrolled in CRP under contracts entered into during the first eight signups. The goal is to bring 40-45 million acres into the program by the end of 1990. The CRP is designed to help farmers prevent or control critical soil erosion and help adjust the production of surplus a gricultural commodities.

A topic connected with previous meetings was mentioned Monday. One of the Commissioners said he had been told that more than 200 names had been collected on a petition (or petitions) opposing the location of a prison in Eastland County. It was also stated that a 1 year payback on \$650,000 for a prison site would probably require an 18¢ per \$100 tax raise, rather than the 14% quoted at a previous meeting.

On County Jail matters, Comm. Billy Bacon reported that 22 prisoners were currently in the jail, with 4 of these belonging to TDC. The Texas Department of Corrections is now operating on a monthly quota system. Billings are being kept on the TDC prisoners, in hopes that this cost will someday be reimbursed by the state.

Commissioners Richard Robinson and Billy Bacon indicated that the cost of operating an Ambulance Service in Pcts: 1 and 4 was taxing their budgets, and they might need to look into an election for funding this serv-

A report on projected tax revenue for 1989-90 showed that tax revenue would be down this year, and that a raise in taxes was likely to meet County operating expenses. Final budget approval is expected in late summer, with the fiscal year beginning

### An Editorial A TIME TO TALK

Judging from statements made in an article printed here in the last issue and the resulting comments heard about the article, it would seem that a general town meeting might be in order to provide facts and answer questions about a proposal for a penitentiary in this county.

The article was written by a newspaper staff member who Thursday afternoon met with a group of citizens in Carbon, who are referring to themselves as the Silent Majority.

The writer reports that the main thrust of the meeting from the citizens was that the County Commissioners Court had rescinded an earlier order calling an election in connection with the prison proposal. Ineffect, the interviewer says, the citizens feel that since the election had been called off, that the prison might be forced on them without their having had a say in the decision.

Understandable a number of citizens have concern about the possibility of a prison "next door" to their homes, and in the article, expressed opinions generally in that regard. Judging from a number of statements quoted in the article, it would seem that a great deal of clarification on a number of matters might be in order.

The group has launched a length. petition which reportedly will go to T.D.C., Austin, listing that signers think will be ing the location of the prison

burdens: on the hospital, fire protection, law enforcement, court systems, schools, water and sewage, and cause a great debt on the county residents. At last report they had 200 signatures.

One of the quotes form a citizen asks where have the reported 38 lectures been held? It would seem that a 39th should be scheduled with lots of advance publicity to help answer some questions again. (Many of the points mentioned in the article have been covered in stories and articles previously printed in this and other newspapers.)

No one questions the right of any citizen to be heard on this and/or other matters, and certainly these important topics should be discussed at

And it's understandable that some of those advocathere might take exceptions to some of the statements attributed to the Silent Majority.

Few would question the economic boost that such a facility could provide the county, and there's no doubt but that the county certainly needs a job-providing lift right

A number of citizens have objected to receiving "proprison" pamphlets in their local bank statement, and bank officials have been criticized for distributing that information.

And so, it might be time for more talking before there's more misunderstanding between good neighbors and good friends.

Surely we can disagree without being disagreeable because the future of our county is at stake. Many of us believe that the benefits of a state prison here would outweigh negatives, Perhaps as

many feel otherwise.

This newspaper is attempting to be fair in presenting both sides, and even within our organization, there are differences of opinions. This writer favors the location of a prison in this county for economic reasons, believing that there would be no more threat from those who are held behind walls that than from the greater number of paroled and/or pardoned felons who live outside the walls.

Others of our staff disagree and feel that the disadvantages outweigh the advan-

But we're all trying doubly-hard to keep our personal preferences out of news articles and to be careful to label our opinions as such.

Let's all just keep talking, and be fair.
