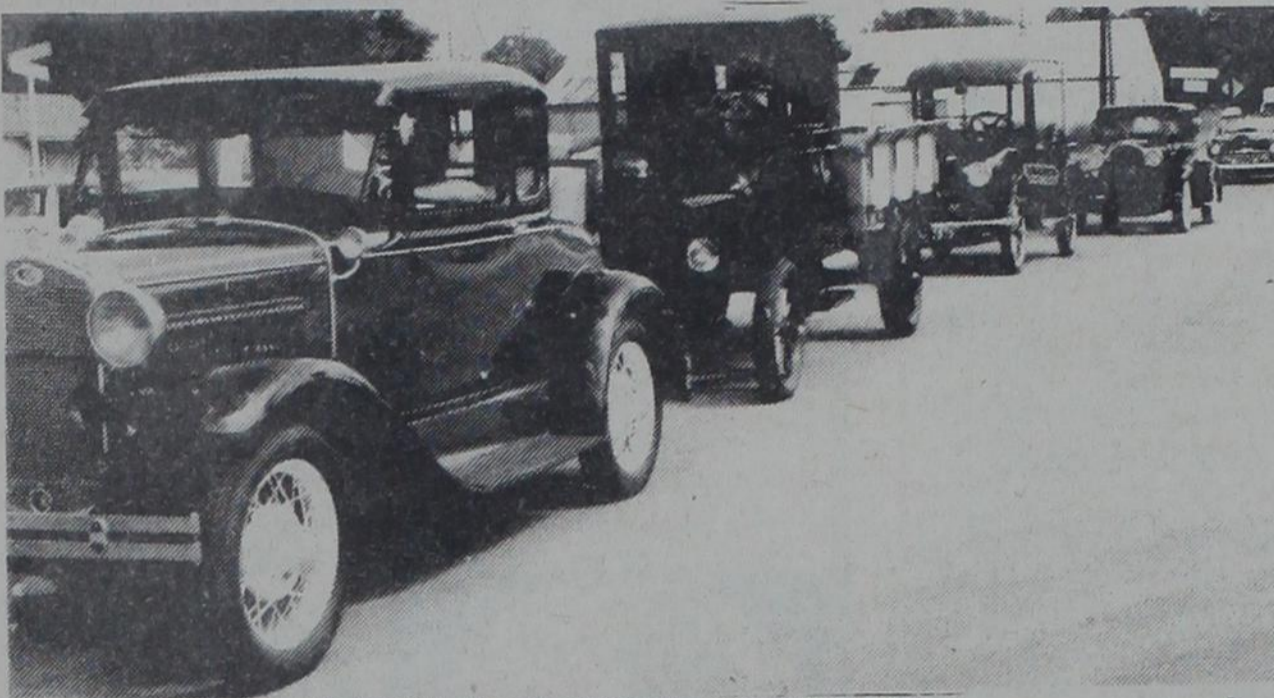
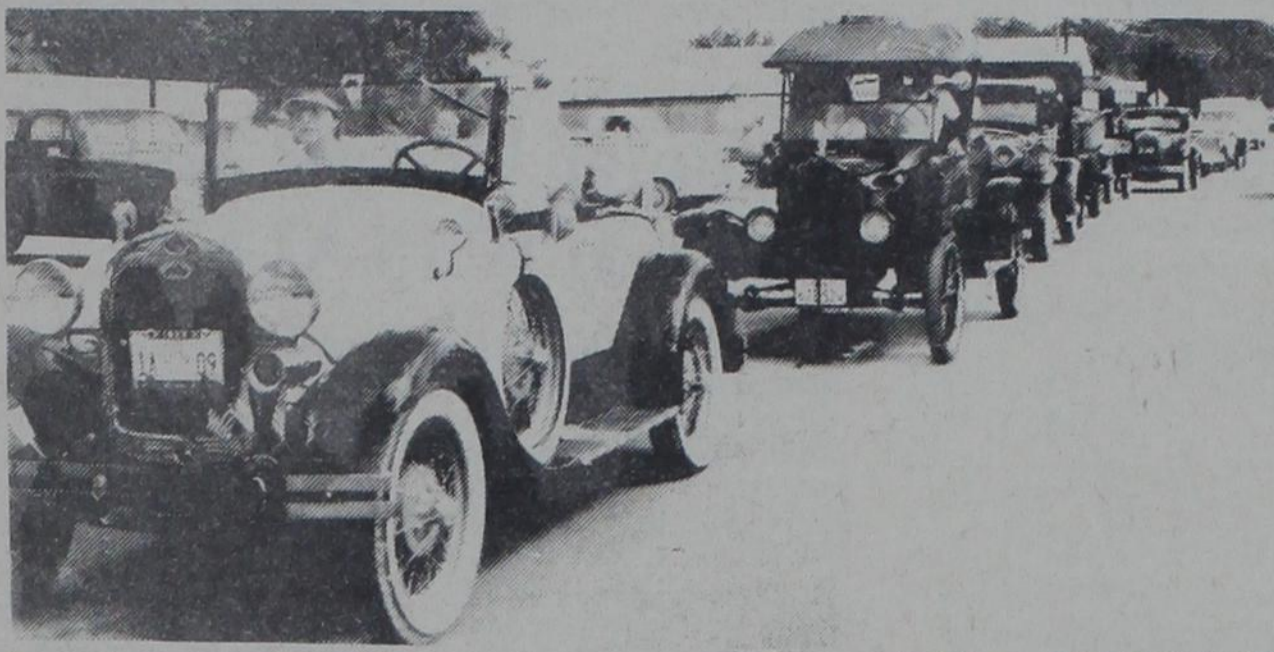


Carrie Bean played an important role of any gathering; she helped pick up trash and tossed it into a nearby trash barrel.

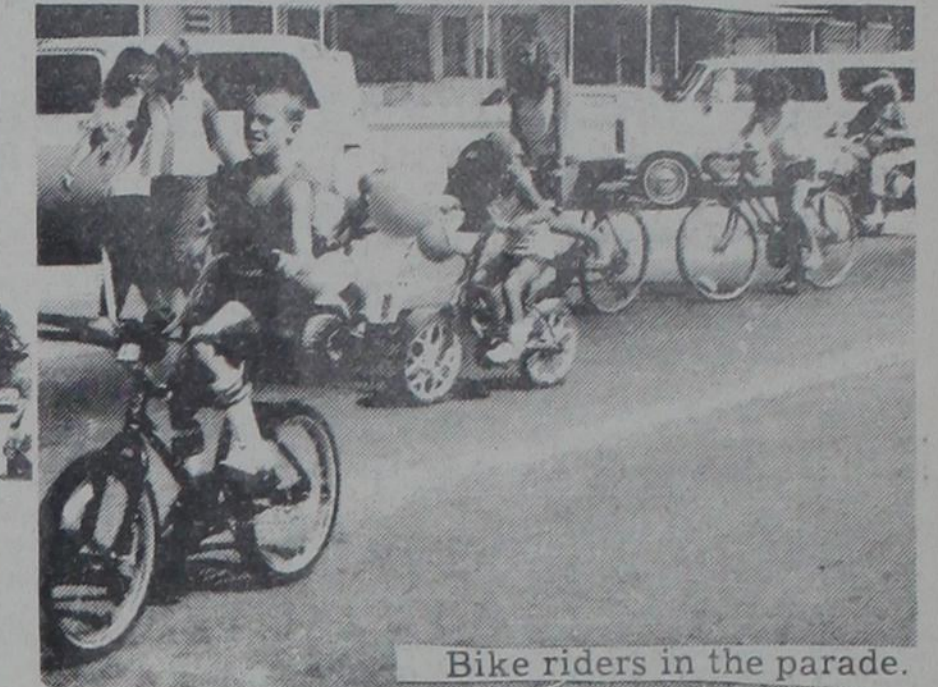

Most recently Miss Cox represented the County along with the ECEDC staff at a meeting of the State Board of Corrections on July 10th. It was pointed out by Board Chairman Charles Terrell that more progress and more facilities improvements had been made during the past two years than in all of the history of the Department of Corrections.

Texas Senate Resolution Honors Memory of Mary Claborn

C.A. Claborn recently received a letter from Senator Bob Glasgow informing him of a resolution which was introduced in the Texas Senate on April 3, 1989 in memory of C.A.'s wife, Mary. Sen. Glasgow enclosed a copy of the resolution and also a copy of the Senate journal for that day which

holds the record for this resolution.

The impressive looking parchment resolution which bears the Texas Senate Seal was signed by the president and the secretary of the Senate, as well as Sen. Glasgow, and reads as follows:

WHEREAS, The death of Mary A. Claborn of Rising Star on September 3, 1987 was greatly mourned by her fellow residents; and

WHEREAS, Born April 1, 1912 in Santa Anna, she married C.A. Claborn on September 18, 1934 and had lived in Rising Star since 1944; and

WHEREAS, She attended Texas Women's College before receiving a bachelor of arts degree from Howard Payne University and a master's degree from Hardin-Simmons University; and

WHEREAS, For 41 years she educated children in Okra, Crosbyton and Rising Star; she was a counselor and friend to a multitude of grateful students; and

WHEREAS, A member of the First United Methodist Church, she sang with the choir and served on the administrative board for many years; and

WHEREAS, She was a member of the Saturday Club and the Texas Teachers Association and was chairman of the Board of Directors of the Rising Star High School Ex-Students Association; her contributions were always to the benefit of her community; and

WHEREAS, She leaves a legacy of compassion and commitment that will remain cherished by those who lived and worked with her; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED by the Senate of the State of Texas, 71st Legislature, That sympathy hereby be extended to the family members of the late Mary A. Claborn; her husband, C.A. Claborn; her sisters, Lois Tucker and Gene Brewer; her nieces, Mary Gene Musgrove and Jamie Hamm; and her nephew, James Brewer; and, be it further

RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be sent to her family as an expression of deep regret from the Texas Senate, and that when the Senate adjourns this day, it do so in memory of Mary A. Claborn.

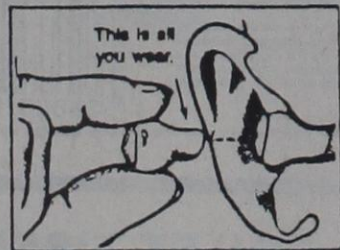
