Planting And Grain Harvest Push Farmers

A new cold front, moving into the Rising Star area early Wednesday morning. dumped one and a half inches of rain upon this section. halting the grain harvest and forcing another delay in peanut planting.

Delayed by rains which extended well into the peanut planting season, farmers of the Rising Star area were making the dust fly this week, working against time to get a grain crop out of the fields and peanut seed in the soil before the July dead-

One of the biggest plantings of grain was turning out a below-grade yield due to the rains which came late and lasted well into the harvest season. Fields were just getting dry enough at the first of the week for combines to be moved into them to cut and thresh the crop and the bulk of the harvest was just beginning to come in at mid-week.

Oats Low in Quality

Oats, the principal grain crop in the area, were turning out poorly on the whole. Both the yield and the quality were down. After the first series of rains there were prospects that one of the biggest and best oat crops in the history of the section would be cut, but the continued heavy precipitation cut that prospect materially. Growers in some sections estimated that the yield would average about 35 bushels per acre as compared to the anticipated 50 or 60. Weight is down from three to five pounds below the standard 32 pounds per bushel. An exception was a crop cut from the E. E. Hardin farm which tested 33 pounds per bushel. The market was

Wheat, rye and barley crops were much better, growers said. Wheat did not fall as did oats due to the heavy rains. There will also be quite a yield of vetch seed, dealers reported. There was no shortage of pea-

nut seed, dealers said. Despite the bad effects on the oat yield, however, the farm and ranch picture was the brightest in many years with the outlook excellent for a bumper crop.

About 47 percent of Texas producers sell some goats to neighbors or individual buyers, but over half the total annual volume passes through stockyards and auctions. About 27 percent market goats through livestock auctions and approximately 20 percent use the Union Stockyards San Antonio. Marketing season starts in March and April and is relatively steady through July, but a larger volume is marketed in August, September and October.

Spanish goats are produced for meat, brush control or slaughter and stocker sales. Angora goats are raised primarily for the production and sale of mohair, but i are also useful for brush control and eventually are sold for
