Peanut Field Day To Offer Something For Everyone

Something for everyone--that's what the 1980 Peanut Field Day at the Texas A&M university Plant Disease Station here has to offer.

The field day is slated for Sept. 25 and will begin at 1 p.m., announces Dr. T.E. Boswell, associate professor with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, who is in charge of research work at the Yoakum station.

Tours of field research plots will be conducted from 1 to 3:30 p.m. followed by a program featuring discussions on seed certification, peanut market outlook, activities of the Texas peanut Producers Board, and energy and fuel alternatives.

Four discussions will deal with peanut breeding and varieties, growth characteristics of the peanut plant, skip-row planting and other production practices, soil-borne diseases and their control, weed control, and breeding for resistance to foliar diseases.

Visitors will also be able to see research plots dealing with peanut maturity testing, solar pasteurization to control soil-borne diseases, seed treatments, no-till vs. standard tillage, biological control of Late Leaf Spot and Southern Blight, seedling and root disease tests, forage grasses, and peach breeding lines and selections.

Farm equipment displays and educational displays and exhibits will deal with such things as peanut recipes and food products, forage grasses, aflatoxin, plant insects and diseases, seed quality, and new seed treatment and peanut drying equipment. An alcohol-powered car developed by chemical

engineers at Texas A&M University will also be on display.

Boswell invites everyone in the South Central Texas area to

attend the field day. The Plant Disease Research Station is located two miles east of Yoakum on Texas Highway 111.

COMMENTARY

In I Thessalonians 4:13-18, he considered a different aspect of the Second Coming. This brief passage on the Rapture is the most direct and clear teaching on the Rapture in the New Testament. It speaks only of believers, living and dead. Nothing is said about the wicked seeing Christ at this time. Paul described Jesus as coming in the air but nothing is said about his feet touching the earth, as we are told elsewhere they will at His return (Zechariah 14:4). It is the moment when I John 3:2 will be fulfilled, and we shall be like Him. The same Greek word used in I Thessalonians 4:17 for "caught up" is in Acts 8:39, to describe Philip's being "caught away" after baptizing the Ethiopian. The latter verse states that the Spirit of the Lord caught Philip away—identifying the source of the power that will

remove believers from earth at the Rapture. In 2 Thessalonians 2:1 Paul called the Rapture "our gathering together unto Him." The Greek word for "gathering" is the same as the one used for "assembling" in Hebrews 10:25, referring to the assembling of Christians for worship. It is a picture of the saints congregating around Christ at His coming for them. The supernatural removal of godly individuals from earth is not unknown in Scripture. The outstanding event in the life of Enoch was his miraculous disappearance from earth after years of walking with God (Genesis 5:21-24). The author of Hebrews called this experience a translation, bypassing death (Hebrews 11:5).

Although some aspects of Elijah's translation differed from Enoch's, it also involved the sudden removal of a believer from the world without experiencing death (2 Kings 2:1-13). First Corinthians 15:51-54 deals with the same event as: I Thessalonians 4:13-18. Here also Paul spoke of the changes that will take place in both living and dead believers at the Rapture. He called this a mystery (1 Corinthians 15:51), a truth previously unrevealed but made known to him by the Holy Spirit. In Phillipians 3:21 Paul connected the Lord's coming to the time when "our vile body" will be changed—another reference to the Rapture. Passages which pertain to the Rapture describe the coming of the Lord for His people. Passages which refer to the revelation of Christ describe the coming of the Lord with His

Saints. Colossians 3:4 speaks of believers appearing with Christ at His coming. Jude 14 also foresees the Lord's return with His people to execute the judgment referred to in many other passages relating to His public appearing.

Since Scripture does not contradict itself, it seems reasonable to conclude that the passages describing Christ's coming for the saints and with the saints indicate two phases of His coming.

A few examples are questions about Medicare, requests for retirement benefit estimates, address changes from social security beneficiaries to insure prompt delivery of their monthly checks, beneficiaries' reports of earnings, questions about the disability provisions of the law, and inquiries about supplemental security income. EMERGENCY FEED APPROVED
The County Committee has requested and the State Committee has approved the implementation of the Emergency Feed Program (EFP) in Eastland County due to drought.

In order to qualify the livestock owner must:
A. Have suffered a substantial loss (at least 40 percent) in livestock feed normally produced.
B. Not have sufficient feed on hand, and
C. Be required to make feed purchases in quantities larger than normal.

The beginning of the feed period will be the date of application. The assistance is 50 percent of the cost of additional feed, not to exceed 3 cents per pound.

FmHA OFFERS DISASTER LOANS
Eastland County has been declared a drought disaster area eligible for emergency Farmers Home Administration loans. Further details may be obtained by contacting the FmHA office at Room 311 of the Eastland National Bank Building or phoning 817-629-8508. **SBA EMERGENCY LOSSES**
Emergency loans are available from Small Business Administration (SBA). The nearest office is: Small Business Administration 5555 North Lamar Austin, Tex. 78757.

ASCS has no administrative responsibilities in granting the loans, but must certify to all losses claimed on SBA loans. A small supply of forms needed are available at this office.

PEANUTS ABANDONED OR BALED
What does a peanut producer do if he decides to abandon or bale peanuts? First, he needs to visit the county office and file an application for disaster credit on Form ASCS 574. If the peanuts are going to be baled, arrangements for an appraisal of the potential production prior to the time the peanuts are baled should be made.

DISASTER AFFECTED GRAIN SORGHUM, CORN, COTTON
In order to qualify for disaster payments, producers who have corn, grain sorghum or cotton that fails due to disaster must file an application for disaster credit and have the crop appraised before baling, grazing or plowing, or any other use made of the crop.

Information Needed To File An Application For Emergency Feed Assistance

Inventory of all livestock owned by applicant and where the livestock are located. Amount of hay produced since April 15, 1980. Amount of any other feed grains produced since April 15, 1980. Amount of all feed of any kind sold since April 15, 1980. Number of times applicant normally cuts hay and approximate date of last cutting. Total amount of all feed of any kind on hand-as of date of application. Sales receipts for any feed on hand that has been purchased. Ending date that applicant will have control of all types of grazing. Estimated loss (percent below normal) on all pastures and any other crop normally used for grazing from date of application to end of crop year. All Sales Receipts--without exception--

No.1-K Autry is a planned 3,900-foot test for the Mangum, West (3,100) Field.

It will be drilled five miles southeast of Cisco on a 40-acre lease.

Location is 2,173 feet from the north and west lines of Section 27, Block 3, H&TC Survey.

Other venture is No.1-B Hugh Bushnell, a proposed 3,850-foot test for the Foster (Marble Falls) Field eight miles northwest of Rising Star.

Drillsite is 1,938 feet from the south and 1,305 feet from the west lines of Mary Ann Clark Survey, A-51.

Brittany Drilling Co., Abilene, completed a Brown County well five miles southwest of May in the Miklar (Strawn) Field.

It is No.1 Woodson Emfinger, spotting 1,780 feet from the north and 1,650 feet from the east lines of Section 19, HT&B Survey.

Absolute, open flow was 1,800,000 cubic feet of dry gas daily from

perforations at 1,325-31 feet with the 4 1/2-inch casing set at 1,424 feet. Total depth was 2,820 feet and plugged back to 1,331 feet.

A well, producing from the Marble Falls, was completed in Brown County Regular Field five miles southwest of May.

It is Trans-American Development Corp. No.1 T.Boyd, spotting 3,571 feet from the north and 330 feet from the east lines of Section 82, HT&B Survey.

The well had a six-hour potential of 24 barrels of 41 gravity oil, plus one-half-barrel of water.

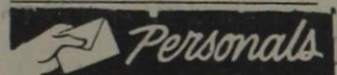

How Profitable Are Stocker Cattle?

Thursday, September 25, 1980

For profitable stocker operations, producers must base management decisions on sound budgets, says an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A & M University. Variable costs generally run about \$400 a head for a 130-day grazing period on wheat, including the cost of a 400 pound

steer. This would require a breakeven price of \$75.56 per hundred pounds with a 1-pound daily gain or \$60.68 with a 2-pound gain. As the rate of gain increases, the breakeven price drops. Producers can boost the rate of gain or the stocking rate through a supplemental feed program.

High Costs Vs. High Calf Prices

Even with recent high calf prices in the 80-to-90 cents-a pound range, cattlemen are barely breaking even due to rapidly increasing production costs, says an economist in livestock marketing with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A & M University System. A recent USDA report shows production costs per cow totaled \$295.25 in 1978, \$371.73 in 1979 and are projected at \$420.64 in 1980. Cost per feeder calf sold was \$67.32 per hundredweight in 1978, \$75.67 in 1979 and is projected at \$86.75 in 1980.

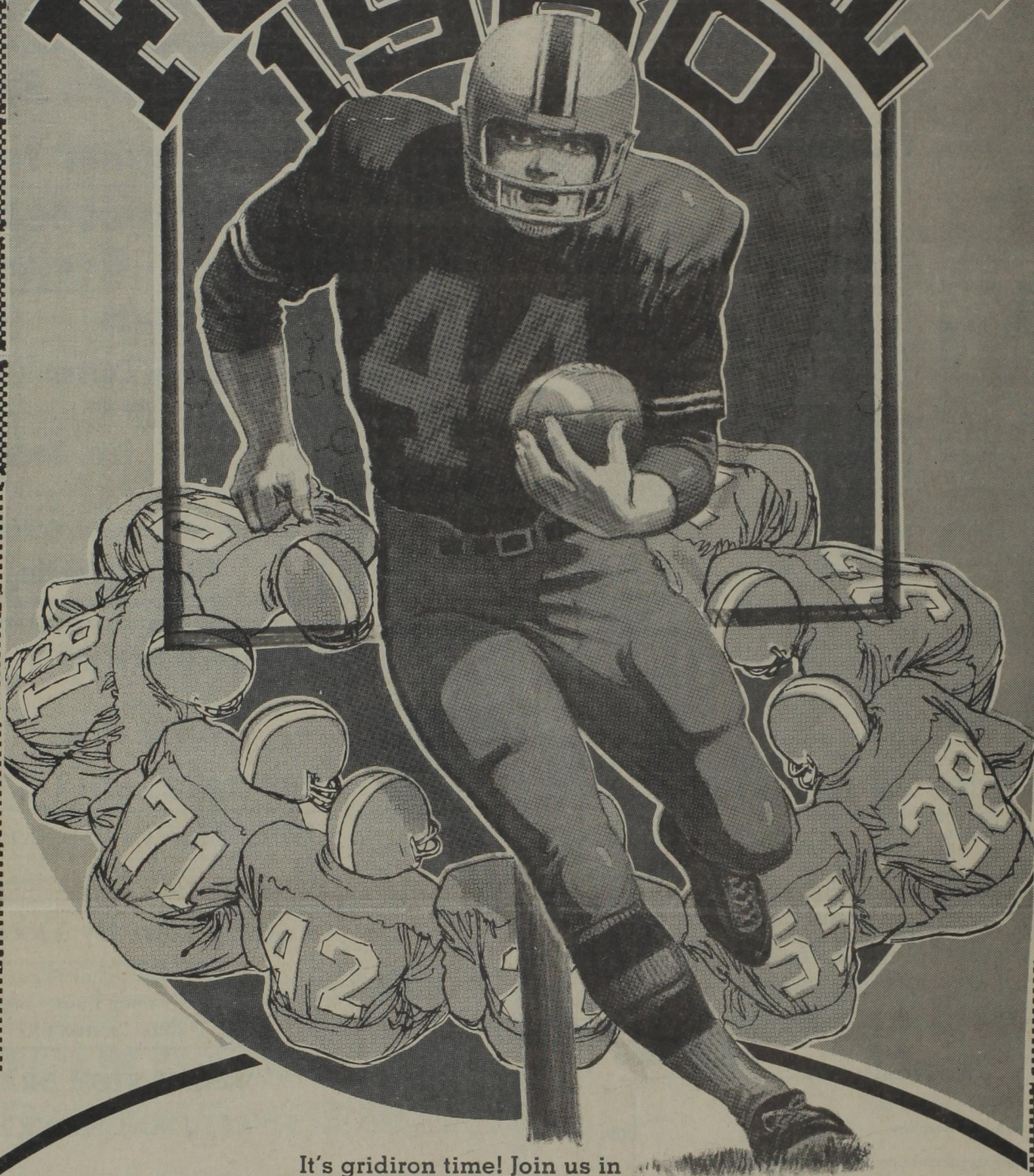
