the intestinal tract, may be present on the outer surface of the egg shell. Proper fumigation with formaldehyde gas will not only reduce this source of infection, it will kill other organisms as well.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service has recently released a leaflet, L-506, which contains plans for and recommendations for use of a fumigation cabinet. A cabinet of this sort is fairly easy to build, and the increase in sanitation realized would more than pay for the cost of materials. For a copy of this leaflet,

which contains specifications, a list of materials, and fumigation procedure, contact your local county agent or write the Agricultural Information - Office, College Station, Texas.

\$5.75 Per CWT Is Average Milk Price

The minimum uniform price that Central West Texas producers will receive for 4.0 per cent milk delivered to plants of regulated handlers during November 1960 will be \$5.75 per hundredweight, according to an announcement by Byford W. Bain, Market Administrator. This price is subject to a location adjustment. For each point (0.1 per cent) that the average butterfat content of producer milk varies from 4.0 per cent, a butterfat differential of 7.4 cents applies. This price is 16 cents above the minimum uniform price for October and 13 cents above the minimum uniform price for November 1959.

During November there were 473 producers on the Central West Texas market compared with 504 during November 1959. These 473 producers delivered an average of 509,283 pounds of milk per day. The average daily delivery per producer during November was 1,077 pounds compared with an average of 972 pounds in November 1959.
