## County Commissioners

### Grant Proposal Public Hearing

In a Called Meeting Monday Eastland County Commissioners held their second and final hearing on a Grant Application for assistance in repairing an earthen dam and spillway on Eastland Lake. This Grant Application is a joint one between the City of Eastland and the County.

County Judge Scott Bailey called the meeting to order, and Cindy Helton, Coordinator for the City, detailed the Proposal. She said the Grant Request was for \$360,000, with \$115,000 more expected to be spent by the City. The repair would include raising the dam 5.2 ft. and widening the spillway up to 400 ft.

Helton said the State of Texas Department of Commerce will consider this Grant Proposal sometime in October. The meeting will be held in Abilene.

The Commissioners designated Eastland City Manager Paul Catoe as a representative. Richard Robinson, Comm. of Pct. 1, was designated as a representative of the County during the previ-

ous meeting.

County support of this proposal was listed as "crucial," with the Grant request having a good chance of approval this year. The same request was sent to the Department of Commerce last year, but was passed by.

Eastland Lake was involved with the Oct. 13, 1981 flooding of the North Fork of the Leon River through Eastland. About 13 inches of rain fell in one night on the watershed of the Lake.

On other matters, Judge Bailey said that the Commissioners Court would continue to meet in Room B-10 of the basement until the new elevator is installed. It may be six weeks until all the work is finished on this, he said.

The Commissioners took time to compare rain totals and rejoice over the cooler weather. Billy Bacon of Pct. 4 said he caught .80 in his rain gauge last Thursday, and 1.25 more since yesterday. (Sunday) Lesser amounts were reported from the south and east side of the County.

House numbers will be assigned and existing numbers changed if necessary. The required size and placement of the numbers were reported.

The council members were told that the fire alarm was ready for the electrician to connect.

## Vandivere-Steubing Exchange Vows

DeLana Mechele Vandivere and Walter Clay Steubing were united in marriage Saturday, July 7, at 7 p.m. in First Baptist Church of Rising Star. The Rev. R.D. Williams of Brownwood and Dr. Dan Murray of Stephenville officiated the doubling ceremony.

The candlelight setting was created with a brass 18-light double-heart candelabrum entwined with grape ivy. The altar featured two 17-light heart-shaped candelabra surrounded with grape ivy and burgundy bows. The baptistry was decorated with an arrangement of burgundy, mauve and pink roses. The altar rail was draped with ivy, an arrangement of pink and mauve roses, baby's breath and burgundy rose buds and accented with bows of burgundy satin. Large plants flanked each side of the altar. Above the piano and organ were double hearts of grapevine with an arrangement of burgundy roses, pink baby's breath and doves with gold rings. 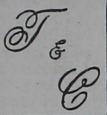



## Mammography Service to Be Here July 29

The Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit of Odessa, which services Rising Star, is certified by the American College of Radiology Mammography Accreditation Program.

Mammography is an x-ray examination of the breast, which the American Cancer Society and other medical experts see as the best means for the early detection of breast cancer.

The program is voluntary and is designed to insure that women receive optimum quality mammographic examinations. The process is done through a peer review evaluation of the facility's staff qualifications, equipment, quality control and quality assurance programs, image quality and breast dose. The accreditation must be renewed every three years.

The accreditation program was instituted because of the concerns of radiologists, other national medical organizations and the public that qualified personnel perform and interpret mammograms and that dedicated mammographic equipment be used. The American College of Radiology received an American Cancer Society Control Grant which was used to pilot test the Accreditation Program.

Breast cancer will strike one in ten American women. The American Cancer Society predicts that about 41,000 women will die of breast cancer this year. As there is no way to prevent the disease, early detection and treat-

ment offer the greatest hope for survival.

The American Cancer Society recommends that women do monthly breast self-exams and have regular physical breast exams by a doctor. It further recommends mammography on the following schedule:

A baseline mammogram (for reference) between age 35-39.

A mammogram every one or two years between age 40-49.

An annual mammogram from age 50.

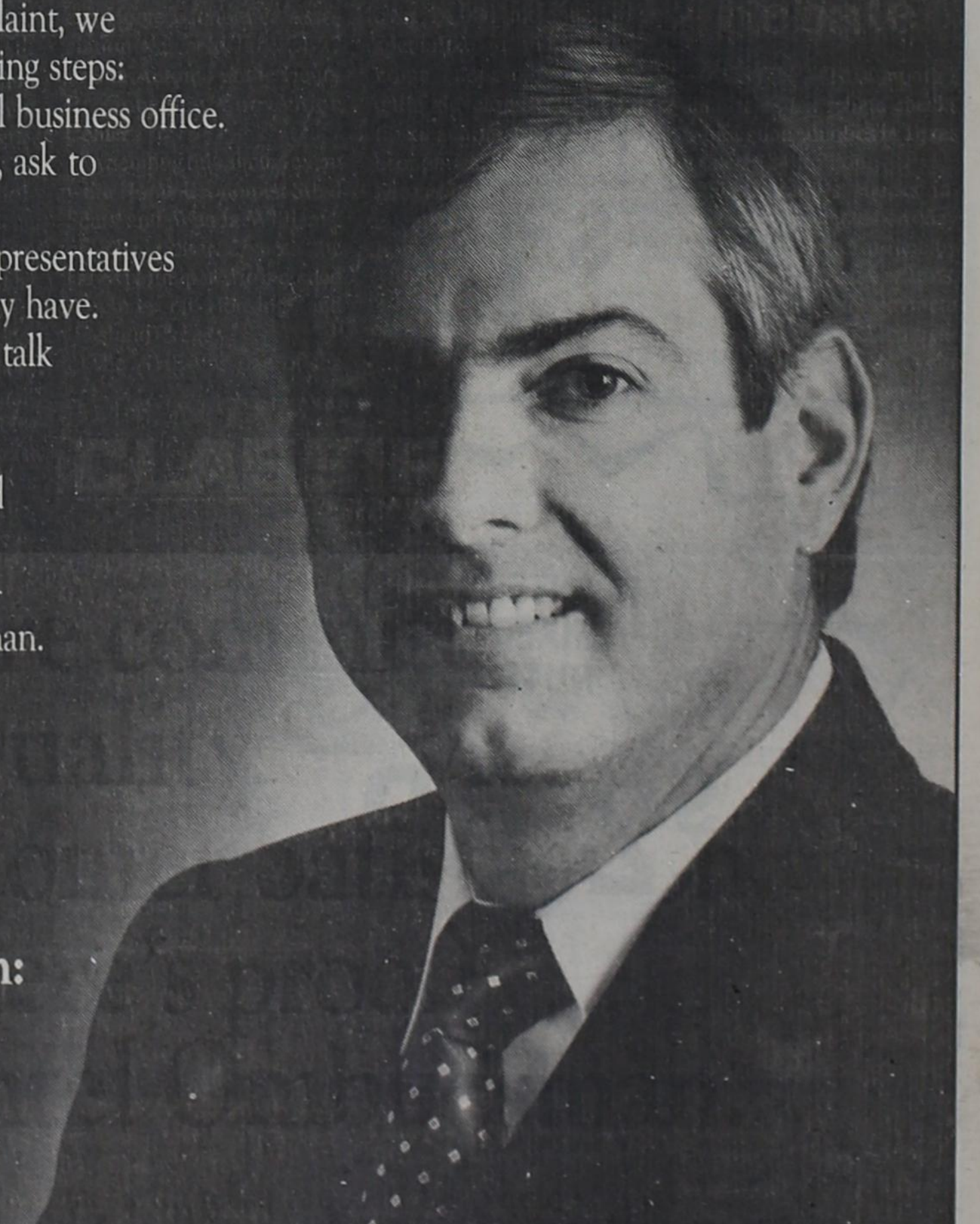

## Dental Dialogue

### Hidden Sugar

Q. What foods (besides the obvious ones) contain sugar?

A. Sugar, of course, is a major cause of tooth decay. Some foods that contain "hidden" sugar are: ketchup (some brands contain more sugar than ice cream), pickles, peanut butter, salad dressings, non-dairy creamer, saline crackers, mayonnaise, cottage cheese, canned vegetables, processed cheese, instant breakfasts and frozen entrees. Remember, removing sugar from the mouth takes away the food that bacteria feed upon. Limiting the exposure time of sugar to the teeth to three times a day or less (mealtimes) can keep decay to a minimum.

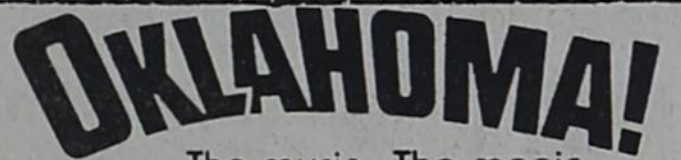

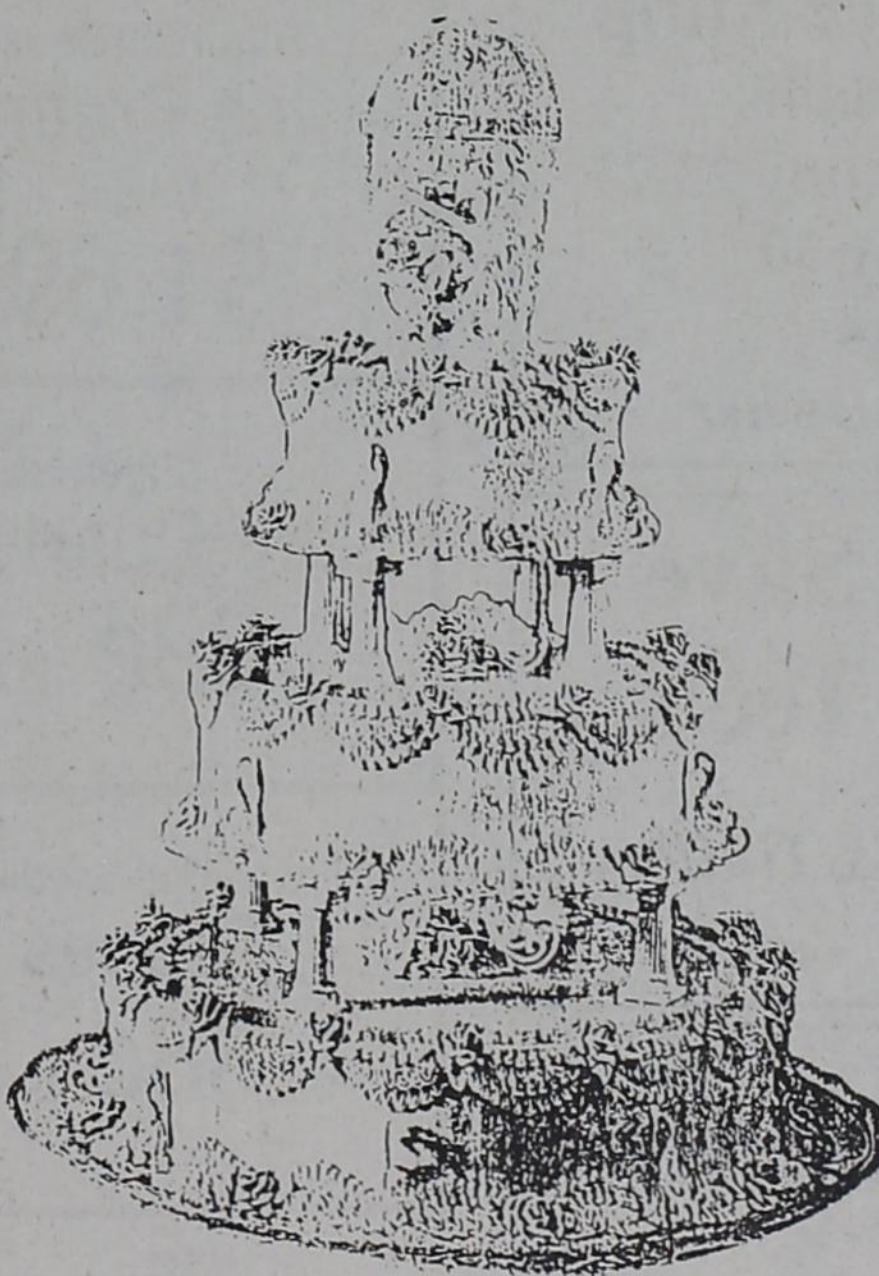

## Agnew Completes Congressional Internship

Washington, D.C. - Paula Agnew of Abilene has recently completed a month-long internship in the Washington D.C. office of Congressman Charles W. Stenholm.

Agnew was one of four college students from the 17th District selected to serve on the Congressman's staff as part of the Omar Burleson Intern Program.

## SW Peanut Growers Assoc. Meets July 27

The 1990 Annual Meeting of the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association will be held in Ardmore, Oklahoma on Friday, July 27. The meeting will begin at 10 a.m. at the Holiday Inn.

SWPGA President Bill Boswell points out that it is very important for peanut producers to be present at this meeting, since 1990 is a Farm Bill year. He appeals to peanut growers throughout the area to either attend the meeting or encourage their local and county leaders to be present.

Boswell says that everyone knows this is a crucial time for peanut producers, with this Farm Bill awaiting floor action in both the House and Senate. A program challenge is expected to come in the House from Congressman Dick Army.

The main emphasis in this year's meeting at Ardmore will be on the 1990 Farm Bill, with particular attention to the Peanut Title. The peanut industry also continues to watch developments from the International Sessions - especially the world agricultural trade agreement through the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT). That subject will also be addressed by speakers at the meeting.

Producers in North Texas and Oklahoma will have a rare opportunity to hear an effective spokesman for agriculture and a strong peanut program. He is third-team Congressman Bill Grant of Florida.

Congressman Grant is a Republican serving on both the House Agricultural Committee and the Subcommittee for tobacco and peanuts. His leadership on the current Farm Bill is considered outstanding.

Larry Meyers, Washington grower/consultant, will also

be a featured speaker. He will provide timely reports on the sequence of events surrounding the Peanut Title of the Farm Bill as well as the bill's current status and outlook.

A brief business session with annual reports of the SWPGA fiscal year ending June 30 will be completed prior to the general program. Fiscal reports and others will be provided by Assistant Manager Dale Curb, followed by general wrap-up of the SWPGA year by manager Ross Wilson. Results of mail balloting in districts 1 and 2 in Texas will be announced. The meeting will conclude with a luncheon at noon.

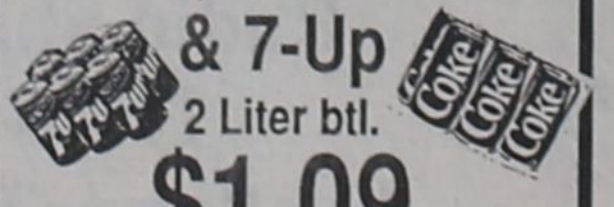

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated

that over 37,000 women die each year as a result of breast cancer.
