Rising Star Now Has Citizens Band Emergency Club

Rising Star has joined millions of other American families by forming a Citizens Band Emergency Club. The club was formed March 6, 1972, and is growing quite rapidly. President of the club, C.B. (Nick) Nichols, said that the club is to be a community affair, not a profit-making organization. The members strive to help in emergencies of all types such as: wreck, weather, disasters, etc. They are in constant communication with Brownwood, Abilene and Cisco.

The club will be affiliated with REACT, a nationwide organization which stands for Radio Emergency Associated Citizens Team. This organization has approximately 40,000 trained volunteers who cooperate with their local police departments, fire departments and civil defense organization.

A recent development has been made by the Federal Communications Commission to aid the C - B operators. This is the designation of Citizens radio Channel 9 as an official motorists assistance and emergency Channel. In addition to reporting accidents, disasters and other emergencies, motorists call for

road service, traffic information and travel directions to reach a destination.

The chances are excellent, almost anywhere in the country, that your message will be received by one of the tens of thousands of both volunteer and official assistance stations that are listening to the emergency channel 24 hours a day, seven days a week to handle just such situations as yours. The monitor in turn telephones the nearest appropriate authority and in a matter of minutes, help is on the way.

In addition to the emergency frequency, 22 additional channels are available for personal or business communications. For considerably less than \$150, a radio may be purchased on which you can communicate on all 23 channels.

Citizens radios are as easy to use as a telephone - flip the selector knob to the desired channel, and push a button on the microphone to talk. Release the button to listen. No tests or special technical knowledge are required, but you do need an FCC license, obtainable on request. The fee is \$20 for five years. The requirements for ownership are very simple. Citizens radios can be pur-

chased at many department stores, electronic distributors and radio shops.

All together, the Electronics Industries Association estimates that nearly three million citizens radios already are in use in homes, boats, on the farm and in vehicles - not only to help out in emergencies but for personal communication by the average citizen.

The Rising Star Club meets the first and third Thursday night of each month at 8 p.m. above Nichols Cleaners. All visitors are welcome to attend.

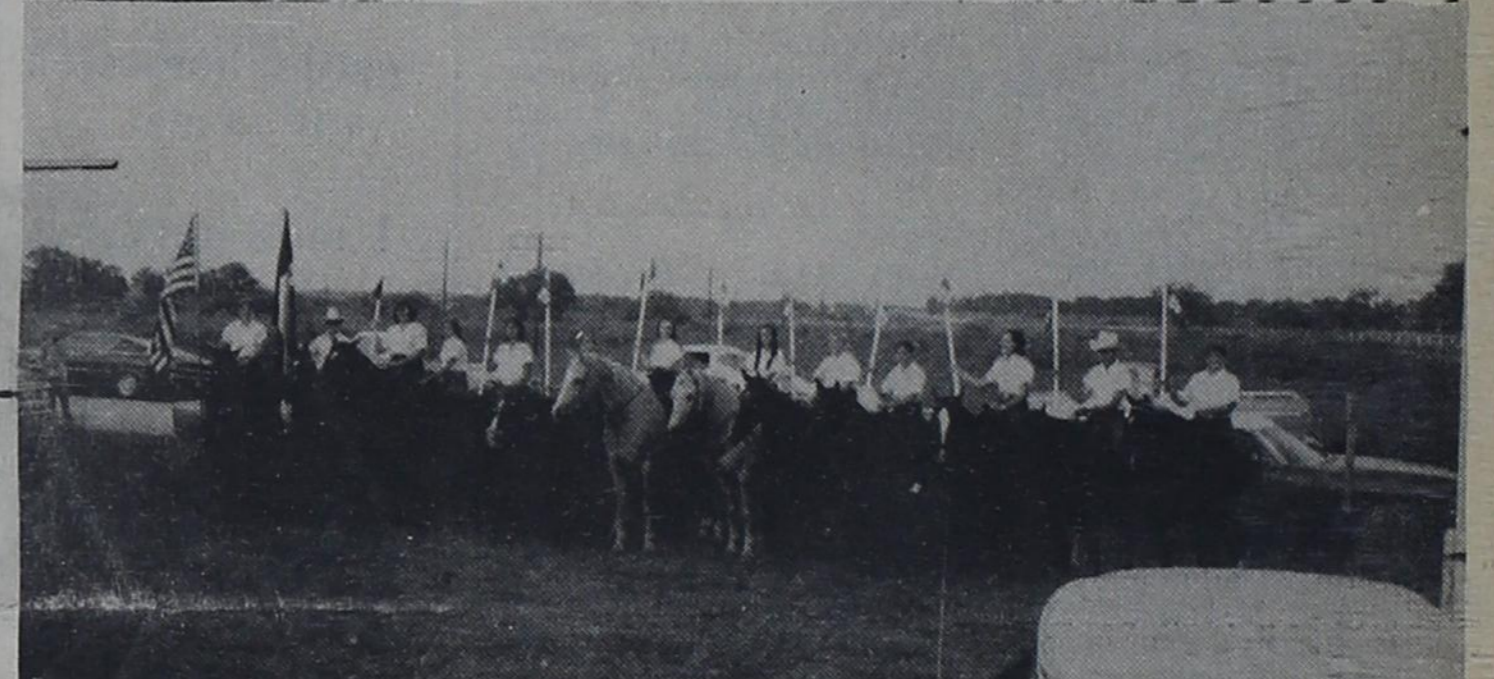

AVIATION CORNER

You have been flying over 40 hours now and the big day looms ahead when you will be taking that FAA flying test. You have perfected the various maneuvers required for the test, things such as stalls, slow flying, steep turns, spirals, emergency landings, and maybe even your instructor showed you what a spin was like and how you should recover from it, even though this maneuver is not required on the test.

Now your instructor will bring out a little pamphlet which has the required items needed for the test. You get in the plane full of confidence, after making a complete pre-flight. You yell "Clear!", checking to make sure that no one is near the propeller and then start the engine. You taxi slowly to the runup area, and turn the airplane into the proper position. Sweat shows up on your back as you try to remember everything. You start to run up the engine, and the instructor reaches over and pulls the throttle back to idle. "You just flunked, even before you got started," he states. Over and over in your mind you try to remember what you did wrong, and after what seems hours you finally remember. "My check list", you state weakly. Every airplane has a check list of the various things you need to check without having to revert to memory and perhaps forget one little very important item. You get the clipboard with the checklist on and start doing it by the numbers as you have been taught in the past. The airplane checks out and you taxi up to the yellow or hold line until the tower releases you to take off. Making sure of traffic you line up on the centerline of the runway, add power and you take off. You get to the practice area to do the various maneuvers and then the instructor puts you through the paces. You make errors, re do them and correct them glancing out the corner of your eye to see if your instructor is smiling or frowning. "Let's go home", he'll say after you have sweated over a gallon of blood and somehow you manage to make it back to the airport and even make a landing without bouncing.

At the flight school, the instructor gets you into the office and at last tells you that he thinks you are ready for the final test. He types up your recommendation for the test and then he will introduce you to the FAA examiner or his 'designee' who will give you the test. Your knees feel like butter

through this. You will agree on the day for your test, maybe that afternoon or the next day.

You report to the examiner at the appointed time and he takes your student pilot license from you and starts to ask you various questions about flying. He won't ask you tricky questions and if you have done your studying faithfully this should present no problem. I should have said almost no tricky questions. My examiner asked me one day while taking the test for my Multi - Engine, what a little hole near the right door of the airplane was for and I didn't know. I found out later it was where the rubber bumper for the baggage door was suppose to go but was missing. Now he starts to ask you various questions about the airplane itself. Some you will be expected to know and some you won't. If you don't know, he will tell you but don't try to bluff your way through. He'd rather have an honest, "I don't know", than a wild guess out of the blue. You make a preflight under his watchful eye and then you both get into the airplane. As you leave the runway on your "smooth" take off he may tell you stay in the 'pattern' and make a landing. You'll probably do this three or four times making short field, soft field or cross wind landings and takeoffs. Now you leave the pattern and go out to the practice area and do various maneuvers, maybe even flubbing up on them. The examiner knows you are nervous and will make mistakes, but what he really wants to see is how you correct for them. Now he may ask you to fly to a certain airport and you get out the chart to get the proper bearing to get there. Using your radio equipment, you manage to get there and then he has you make a landing. You may stop there for a little while and have a cup of coffee and probably be asked even more questions. Again you

in the air and he has you don the 'hood'. I'll explain about the hood later. Now, not being able to see outside, you have to really start watching instruments carefully. He'll tell you to look down, make a few abrupt maneuvers and then yell to you to take over. Is the plane diving, climbing, in a turn or what? You make a quick scan of the instruments, find out you are in a dive, bring back on the throttle and bring the plane back to level flight. He'll do this some more and somehow you manage to bring the plane back to normal flight. Now you head back to your airport and on the way he'll ask

you to point out your location on the map. Checking ground references you are able to do this. You make that final landing, while working the radio like a pro and taxi up to your parking space. You tie the airplane down and follow the examiner into the office, not knowing if you passed or flunked. You both sit down and while he is typing up some forms he may tell you, that was a lousy approach you made, or that you really goofed up on that steep turn. He signs some papers and then hands you a private pilot license, and with a big grin on his face shakes your hand. You are a Private Pilot and feel like jumping through the ceiling. Now you can go where you want in and take up your friends or wife. Your elation slows down some when he then tells you that you still have a lot to learn and that you are a beginner still and now have a great responsibility not only for your own safety but for the safety of others.

About that 'Hood' I was telling you about earlier. This is a plastic cover with a headband that will allow you to only see straight ahead and when adjusted right, all you can see is the instrument panel of the airplane and nothing else. It is the same effect as being in clouds only safer as the pilot with you can look outside for traffic and help you out. A Private Pilot only gets about four hours of hood time, just enough so that he can get out of trouble if he has to. Remember that with this training you are not an instrument pilot and are not allowed to fly through clouds or when the weather is considered bad enough to be instrument weather only. So keep clear of clouds and fly only on the good days and you'll have plenty of flying and fun. Myself, I like to fly on instruments, but it's bad for your passengers as they like to look out at the scenery. Vertigo may set in when you are in that cloud, even though your instruments tell you that you are straight and level, you feel that you are in a dive or that you are turning. This is the one time you have to believe your instruments because if you don't, that ground is mighty hard when you make that final contact.

Small airports are just that, small. They may have one or two runways, they may be paved, gravel, dirt or just plain grass. Usually they are short, but more than safe with an experienced pilot. Most of them don't have a control tower, but usually they may have a 'Unicom' radio. With this they can give you barometer pressure, and wind direction. Also if there is traffic in the area and what runway is being used. Remember, they can only advise, the rest is up to you. Your charts will tell you the length of the runway and the elevation. You will find that those first few landings on grass or dirt to be quite and

experience. But until you get many hours of experience in, don't tackle those small fields. A good many of them have high trees, or wires nearby, or they may be at high elevations where it is almost impossible to take off with a load. Unattended fields are very dangerous because no one looks after them. They may have a ditch across them, holes in the runway, even cattle grazing on them. Make precautionary runs above the runway two or three times and check the ground closely before you make your landing.

If you have been taught flying from a small airport, then that first time you land at a big one will be scary for you. The same as if you have been flying from a big one and have to land at a small one. The large airfields have control towers and they will give you instructions on how and where to land. Normally they have a lot of traffic and you may have to follow two or three airplanes ahead of you before you can land. Now you become aware of such things as wake turbulence, cross winds, much more use of your radio than normal, switching frequencies and a thousand other things. Everything seems to be in a hustle and it is.

Later, I will tell you more about these airports and how to adjust to them.

Now that you are a Private Pilot, wear that title proudly and safely. Don't be a show off and when you take your passenger for his first ride, remember he is scared to and by taking it easy, making slow turns and smooth landings, you may also win him over to flying.

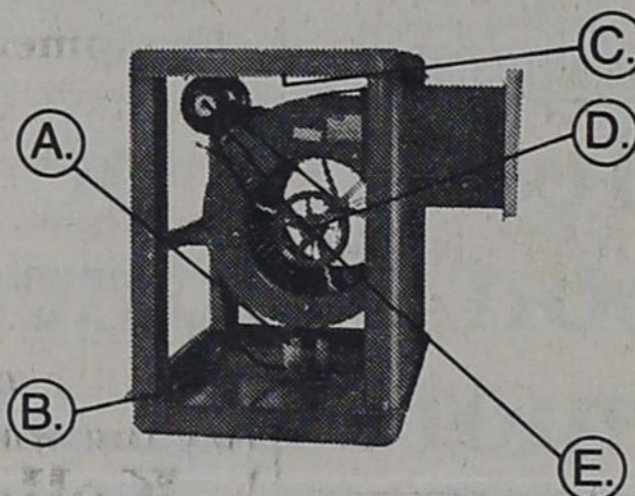

'Tune' Tires First To Save Time For Summer Fun

Motorists' chances of truly enjoying the lyrical "lazy, hazy, crazy days of summer" are a lot better if they bone up on warm weather tire care.

These maintenance and safety tips to drivers preparing for summer vacation trips or, traditionally, just more time on the open road:

- Make sure you have enough tread on your tires to last on long trips. If you're near the minimum safe tread depth of 1/16 inch in two or more grooves you may want to make replacements before you take off for isolated areas.

- If you buy any new tires remember the law requires the seller to register them if they were made after May 22, 1971. In the unlikely event a recall is necessary because of possible safety defects the manufacturer will notify you directly.

- Check for proper inflation when tires are "cold", before starting out. Follow the car manufacturer's recommendations in your owner's manual, or posted in the glove compartment or affixed to a door pillar. Add up to four pounds of air per tire for long periods of highway driving at high speeds, but never exceed the maximum pounds per square inch (example: 32 p.s.i. max.) marked on the sidewalls.

- Use your own air pressure gauge if possible. Studies have shown station air towers are often inaccurate up to plus or minus four pounds per square inch.

- Vacation trips often mean heavy loads. Make sure the weight is distributed as evenly as possible, including weight in any towed vehicle. Check your owner's manual or a tire dealer for the maximum load limits of your tires.

- Driving on snow tires for any prolonged period in warm weather is poor economy. Abnormally high heat buildup in these thicker tires can wear down the tread faster than in regular tires. It may also cause sudden disablement.

- When the rain comes, beware of skidding on "summer ice". Water mixes with oil and gas films already on the road to form a slick surface. The risk of losing control is five to ten times more likely on wet pavement.

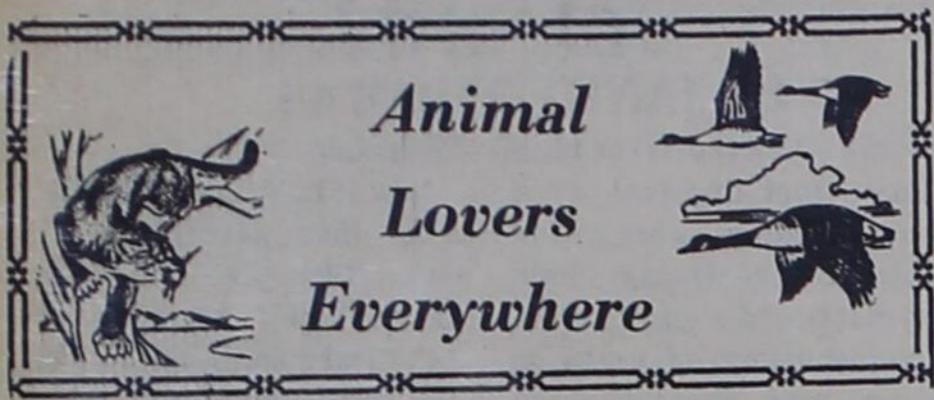
- Check front end alignment frequently, especially if you notice uneven tread wear or "pulling" to one side while driving. Back roads or a few solid bumps on any surface can throw alignment out, even if it was recently adjusted.

- Check for debris such as stones and glass embedded in the tread and in the grooves before starting out.

- Rotate your tires according to the recommendations in the owner's manual. If you notice abnormal tread wear or seem to be getting a bad ride, this is a good time to have your tires balanced.

- Let experts check your tires for proper inflation, cuts or other damage. You'll like the folks at

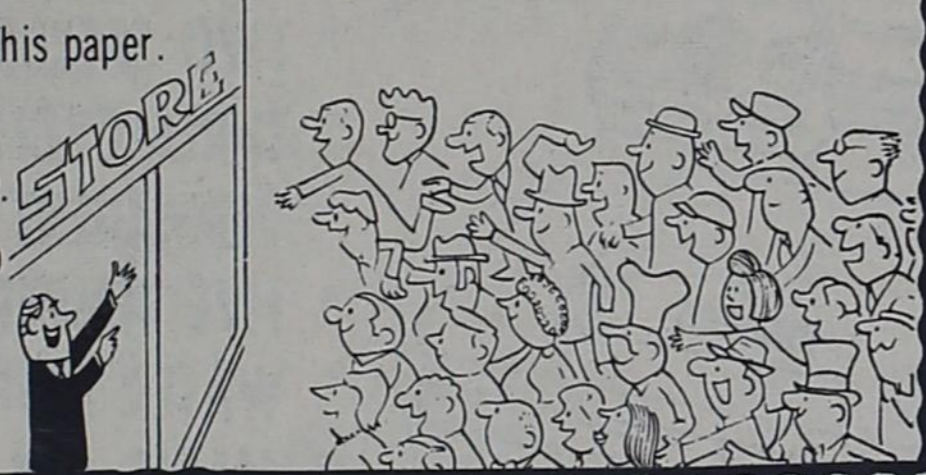
