Polo Match to Benefit Cancer Center Programs

HOUSTON—When most people think about polo, they envision an event on a rolling

green countryside with spectators dressed in suits and dresses, but The University of Texas M.D. Anderson Cancer Center's Board of Visitors has put a new twist on the game.

On Saturday, April 22, some 1,000 Texans are expected to don Western gear and head for the prairies of West Texas for a polo match and a barbecue to benefit several research programs at M.D. Anderson.

"We're going to have met. on horses, but this is no rodeo; this will be a true blue polo match," said Mary Anne McCloud, a member of M.D. Anderson's Board of Visitors, who is chairing the event along with her son-in-law, Henry Musselman, a Midland oilman. The Board of Visitors is a group of 140 community leaders who assist M.D. Anderson with private fund raising and efforts through community awareness events.

The third "Polo on the Prairie" match begins at 4 p.m. at the Musselman Brothers' Lazy 3 Ranch, located 12 miles east of Albany. The match will be followed by a barbecue supper at 6 p.m. and a country-western dance.

"The efforts by our Board of Visitors to maintain M.D. Anderson's reputation as a world-class cancer center have been tireless," said Dr. Charles A. LeMaistre, president of M.D. Anderson. "The success of previous events speaks to their commitment to M.D. Anderson's program in cancer prevention, research and education."

"Polo on the Prairie was a tremendous success last year, with more than \$40,000 raised," McCloud said.

Funds generated by this year's Polo on the Prairie will support a variety of programs at the comprehensive cancer center. Five areas selected to receive funding including the Anderson Network, a state-wide group of former patients who provide support and encouragement for new patients, and the beauty and barber shop, whose volunteers provide wigs and education on proper hair and scalp care for patients during cancer treatment.

Additional funds will support research programs in breast cancer, skin cancer, and cancer prevention through nutrition.

Preregistration for Kindergarten May 10

Parents are asked to preregister their children who will enter kindergarten next fall. All children who will be five on or before September 1 may enter kindergarten.

A screening schedule will be arranged for May 10 for each child. Parents may call 643-2431 or come by the elementary principal's office prior to that time. The screening will take about 60 minutes.

Each student's hearing, vision, speech, motor skills and developmental growth will be evaluated at this time. Parents will be given a report on the child's progress at the time of the screening.

Parents are reminded that to enter school in Texas a student must have a state

approved birth certificate and a current immunization record. The immunizations required include 3-in-a-series DPT and/or booster after four, oral polio series, measles, mumps and rubella. Please bring birth certificate, immunization records and social security number at the time of registration.

Early childhood screening will be conducted at the same time. The early childhood program is to help those children aged three to five who show to be developmentally delayed or handicapped in any way. If you have or know of a child who may benefit from this service, please call the elementary school.

Commitments for Prison in County Sought from Glasgow and Parker

A team of six members of the Eastland County Economic Development Council visited in Austin this past week to garner support for Project HOOS-GOW, the effort to obtain a state prison for Eastland County.

Specific plans called for brief meetings with State Representative Jim Parker and Senator Bob Glasgow at the State Chamber of Commerce Legislative breakfast. Telephone calls had been made in advance requesting such a conference.

The Eastland County team was deeply disappointed that only Mr. Glasgow attended the breakfast and could only talk with the group for a few minutes. Mr. Parker did not show and when two members of the party visited his office following breakfast he was not available.

Fortunately one member arrived in Austin early and was able to contact both legislators the previous day.

In general the team found both legislators less than fully informed about the Texas Department of Correction (TDC) prison program and seemed to easily intermix funding and construction requirement of the Pardon and parole Board, the Texas Youth Council, Private Prisons and County jails with that of the TDC. Even though since early January both were informed by letter as to Eastland County's desire for a large 2250 bed state prison and had promised in phone calls to support our program, there was little evidence that either are adequately doing anything meaningful to help Eastland County get the prison.

This in spite of added letters sent on February 28, March 28 and 29 and April 5 only one reply has been received; that from Mr. Parker of no date stating that his staff could make an appointment for us in Austin and it seemed impossible to see us in Eastland County or his home of Comanche County.

It is obvious that we have not done a very good job in letting our legislators know what has to be done. However we were under the impression that legislators could perhaps have a better feel of how to handle the task of getting support for a large state prison.

In brief conversations on April 5th and 6th they were "pushing" other prison programs such as boot camp, early release and private contract prisons. While Eastland Countians believe there may be a place for this type of modified incarceration which allows prisoners to mix somewhat with the local populace and perhaps be maintained under minimal security standards it is not what we are willing to accept.

It would seem that many legislators are looking primarily at the initial cost of con-

struction for modern, safe prisons and are willing to accept old army camps and the like as detention facilities because they are cheap.

This will be poor economy in the long run, violates basic principles espoused in Federal law (Ruiz vs Lynaugh case) and cannot adequately protect our citizens.

Eastland Countians, like other law abiding people of Texas are willing to pay the price to incarcerate those who break our laws and threaten our safety. We have no other choice.

We hope that many local citizens will write our legislators and demand that they become very active in doing what we in Eastland County want. We want them to make valiant efforts to convince other legislators that they should follow our example.

Specifically it would be good to mention that we want prisons in West Texas where we can get some economic benefit from payroll and any products purchased locally. We have been paying taxes in this state for over 75 years supporting prisons in East and Southeastern Texas. We want our fair share.

Glasgow, Parker Commitments Sought

Specifically we want adequate consideration for Eastland County to have a state prison sited here. Our location on a freeway, cheap adequate water and utilities and our closeness to major cities make our county an ideal location.

Secondly advise them that we want maximum security for prisons in our county which means that we can obtain a new and properly constructed 2250 bed unit.

Thirdly, to get state prisoners out of our county jails (which is very expensive for us) will require statewide construction of at least 11,000 beds this year as recommended by the Department of Corrections and Governor Clements.

Let's insist they quit arguing about the method of financing and recognize that we have an emergency situation which must be taken care of immediately!

The Eastland County Economic Development Council as well as other interested citizens will be visiting Austin again on May 8th for a meeting of the Texas Board of Corrections.

The council has invited both of our legislators to have breakfast with us that morning and go en-masse to the

Board meeting. This will let the Board know that we seriously desire a state prison in this county and, if

our elected legislators attend with us, that they are support vigorously their constituency in this cause.

Brazos Electric Asks for Rate Decision

Brazos Electric filed a motion with the Public Utility Commission March 30 to request continuation of the cooperative's temporary rate reduction.

The temporary rate reduction, effective during the months December 1988 through March 1989, meant consumers saw an average reduction of about \$7.00 per each 1000 kilowatt hours used. If approved, the continued reduction will be at a level of about \$5.60 per 1000 kilowatt hours. It will allow the cooperative to maintain reduced rates pending a permanent rate reduction later this year.

"Our mission is to provide reliable power at the lowest possible cost," said Richard E. McCaskill, executive vice president and general manager of Brazos Electric. "We constantly monitor our needs to maintain our finan-

cial strength," he said. "But when there is an opportunity to pass on savings to our consumers, we do it, happily."

Brazos Electric had planned to ask the PUC for a permanent rate reduction by April 1, but it will now conduct additional studies of potential rate structures before doing so. The Cooperative plans to file a request for a permanent rate reduction of about \$23 million by June 1.

Since January 1983, Brazos Electric has reduced the average cost of its wholesale electric power by more than 18 percent.

Headquartered in Waco, Brazos Electric provides wholesale power to 20 member distribution cooperatives, seven municipal customers and Texas A&M University. These wholesale customers serve 240,000 consumers in 66 counties of Texas.

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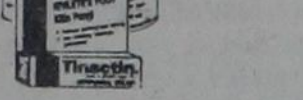


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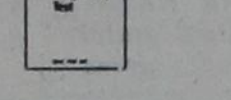
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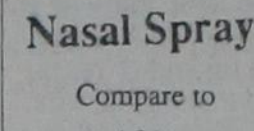
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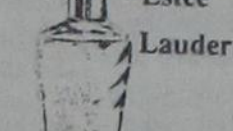
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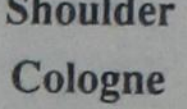


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News Briefs

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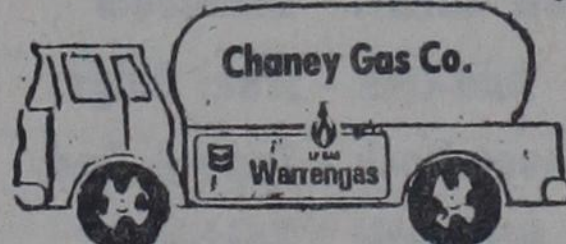

The following is an extraction from Robert Fulghum's best seller, **All I Really Need to Know I Learned in Kindergarten.**)

All I Really Need to Know I Learned in Kindergarten

By Robert Fulghum

Each Spring, for many years, I have set myself the task of writing a personal statement of belief: a Credo. When I was younger, the statement ran for many pages, trying to cover every base, with no loose ends. It sounded like a Supreme Court brief, as if words could resolve all conflicts about the meaning of existence.

The Credo has grown shorter in recent years - sometimes cynical, sometimes comical, sometimes bland - but I keep working at it. Recently I set out to get the statement of personal belief down to one page in simple terms, fully understanding the naive idealism that inspired.

The inspiration for brevity came to me at a gasoline station. I managed to fill an

old car's tank with super-deluxe high-octane go-juice. My old hoopy couldn't handle it and got the willies - kept sputtering out at intersections and belching going downhill. I understood. My mind and my spirit get like that from time to time. Too much high-content information, and get the existential willies - keep sputtering out at intersections where life choices must be made and I either know too much or not enough. The examined life is no picnic.

I realized then what I already know most of what's necessary to live a meaningful life - that it isn't all that complicated. I know it.

And have known it for a long, long time. Living it - well, that's another matter, yes? Here's my Credo:

ALL I REALLY NEED TO KNOW about how to live and what to do and how to be I learned in kindergarten. Wisdom was not at the top of the graduate-school mountain, but there in the sandpile at Sunday School. These are the things I learned:

Share everything.
Play fair.
Don't hit people.
Put things back where you found them.
Clean up your own mess.
Don't take things that

ar-n't yours.

Say you're sorry when you hurt somebody.

Wash your hands before you eat.

Flush.

Warm cookies and milk are good for you.

Live a balanced life - learn some and think some and draw and paint and sing and dance and play and work every day some.

Take a nap every afternoon.

When you go out into the world, watch out for traffic, hold hands, and stick together.

Be aware of wonder. Remember the little seed in the Styrofoam cup: The roots go down and the plant goes up and nobody really knows how or why, but we are all like that.

Goldfish and hamsters and white mice and even the little seed in the Styrofoam cup - they all die. So do we.

And then remember the Dick-and-Jane books and the first word you learned - the biggest word of all - **LOOK.**

Everything you need to know is in there somewhere - The Golden Rule and love and basic sanitation...Ecology and politics and equality and sane living.

Take any one of those items and extrapolate it into sophisticated adult terms and apply it to your family life or your work or your government or your world and it holds true and clear and firm. Think what a better world it would be if

we all - the whole world had cookies and milk about three o'clock every afternoon and then lay down with our blankets for a nap. Or if all governments had as a basic policy to always put things back where they found them and to clean up their own mess.

And it is still true, no matter how old you are when you go out into the world, it is best to hold hands and stick together.

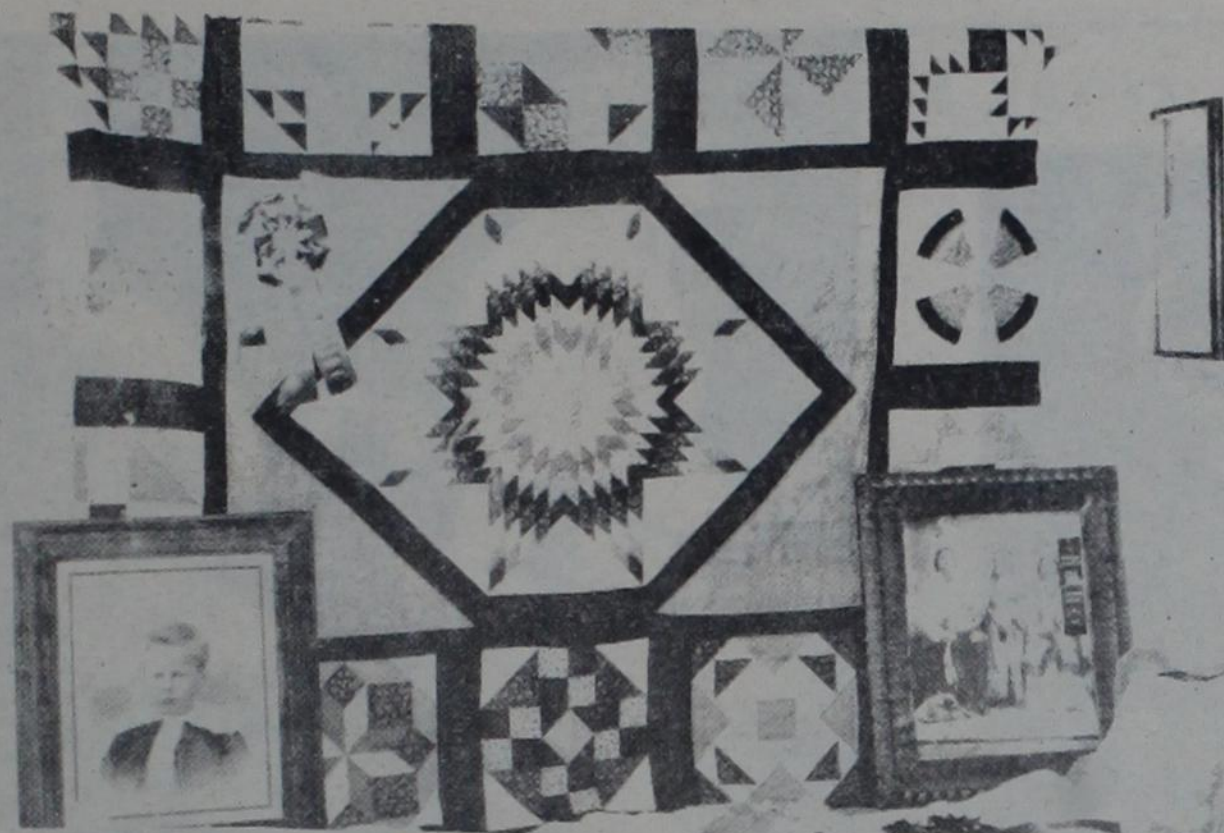

Trained Dog Act New To Festival

At 3:30 p.m. Saturday, April 22, and 1:30 p.m. Sunday, April 23, there will be a special exhibit for Festival-goers. It will be a demonstration by the Hill Country Working Dog Association of Austin, Tx.

This type dog, a "schutzhund," is a German terrier for a working dog, also meaning protection dog. It began near the turn of the century when it was not as much a sport, but a test of breeding stock.

In order to be a good schutzhund, a dog has to have a stable temperament and be athletic and structurally correct. Since schutzhund work

is very demanding, physically and mentally, a dog who is not stable will not have the temperament and drive that is needed.

These unique German shepherds and rottweiler will demonstrate many exercises, and promise to be a real treat for Festival visitors.

Birds Of Prey Program To Be Back At Festival

Dennis Smith of Dallas, who is a federally licensed raptor handler, or falconer, will be at the Cisco Festival Saturday, April 22, to teach visitors of the roles of birds of prey in our environment, and about their unique characteristics.

Mr. Smith uses actual

falcons, hawks, owls, or other available raptors, that he is currently training or rehabilitating. At his last visit in 1987, he entertained the audience with hawks and owls, including fuzzy baby owls, which were a big crowd pleaser.

The raptor program is scheduled for 11:30 a.m. to 1

p.m. but Mr. Smith usually visits with the Festival crowd before and after the show, and answers questions people might be curious about.

For a real entertaining and educational treat, be sure to come to see this outstanding program about the birds of prey.

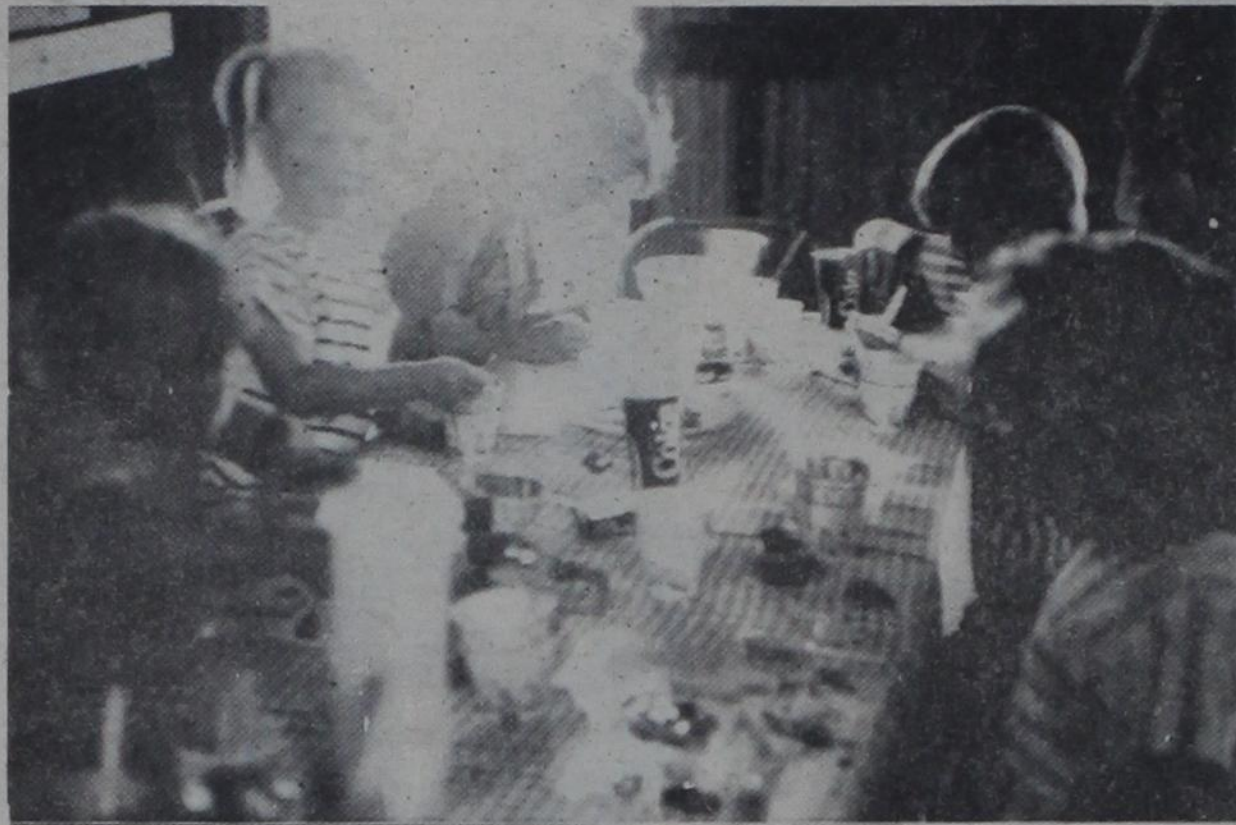

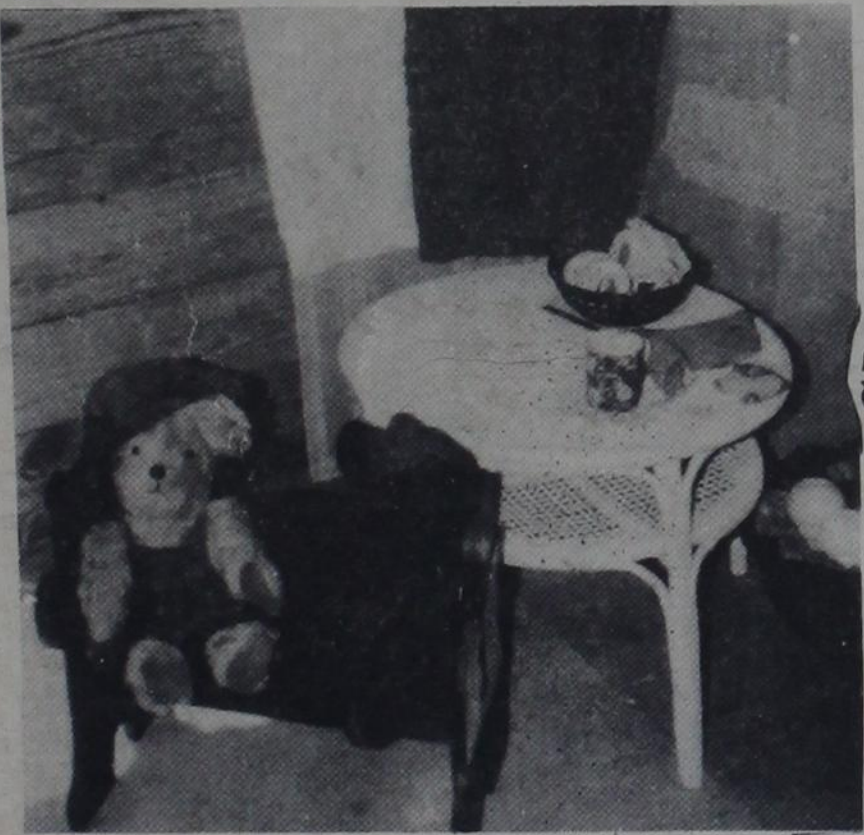

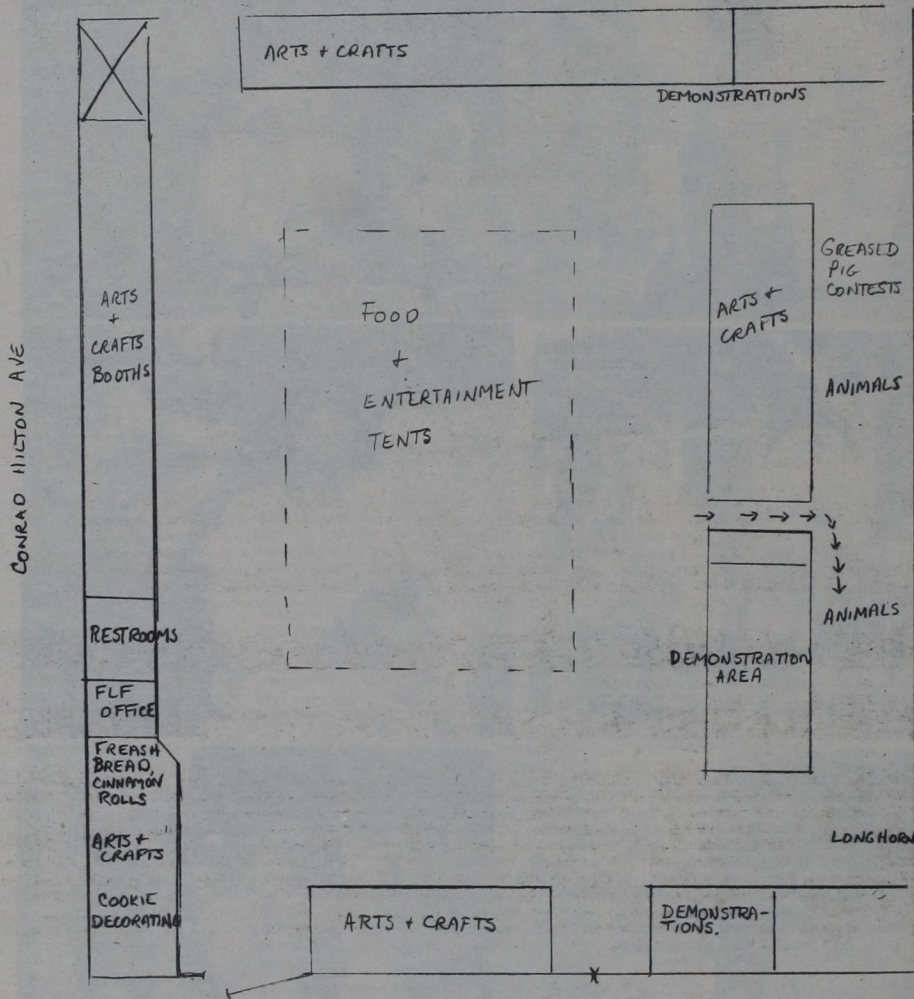

One worker had cackled that she would get back to egg production when her working conditions and fringe benefits were what she

expected. When threatened by a definite lay-off by management, that worker and others seem to have had a change in attitude.

At last report, egg production had increased, and several chickens were even seen assuming around-the-clock involvement. At press time it was not known if there will have been enough 24 hour days which are required to produce baby chick for the Festival visitors' pleasure.
