


Local Contractor Expands Business



Sam Justice and his brother, Dave, of Potosi have completed their first house ready to move in their joint venture.

Sam Justice, a local contractor, and his brother, Dave, of Potosi have joined together in expanding their construction businesses to include the building of houses ready to be moved.

The Justice brothers returned to the Big Country from Oklahoma City about eight years ago, one shortly after the other. They had lived with their family in Cross Plains when they were growing up and each had a yen to return to this area.

The two have worked in construction for twenty years or more, in Oklahoma and Texas. Dave was Building Inspector for the City of Abilene for a few years after leaving Oklahoma City.

Pooling their experience and resources, Sam and Dave decided a few months ago to use their spare time to build houses to be moved. Dave drives from Potosi to the construction site, Sam's property two miles east of Rising Star.

The Justices now have one house completed. The 960 sq. ft. house is completely finished except for the carpet, which will be installed after the house is set on its foundation. In this way, Sam said, the carpet would be kept new and fresh for the owner.

With other plans available, the brothers can build different sized houses, pricing them from \$9,500 up. The houses are to be

moved to the home buyer's lot; the foundation and setting the house on it are included in the price of the house. Sam cautions that lot owners should have clear deeds to their property before a house can be set there.

The Justices will also sell houses as hulls or partially finished, to be completed by the owner.

They offer 90% financing to qualified applicants.

Rising Star School NOTICE

The Rising Star school serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy lunch for 90 cents for grades K-5 and \$1 for grades 6-12. Breakfast costs 60 cents.

Children from families whose income falls within the level shown on the attached scale are eligible for either free meals or reduced-price meals for 40 cents for lunch and 30 cents for breakfast.

To apply for free or reduced price meals, please fill out this application as soon as possible, sign it, and return it to the school. Please answer all questions on the form.

An application which does not contain the total household income, the names of all household members, social security numbers of all household members 21 years or older or a statement that the household member does not have one, and the signature of an adult household member cannot be processed by the school.

VERIFICATION: The information on the application may be checked by the school or other officials at any time during the school year.

REPORTING CHANGES: If your child is approved for meal benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increases by more than \$50 per month (\$600 per year) or when your household size decreases.

REAPPLICATION: You may apply for benefits at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now, but have a decrease in household income, become unemployed, or have an increase in family size, fill out an application at that time.

FOSTER CHILDREN: If you have foster children living with you, they may be eligible for these benefits. If you wish to apply for these benefits for them, please contact the

school and they will help you complete the application.

NONDISCRIMINATION: Children who receive free or reduced-price meal benefits are treated the same as children who pay for meals. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age, or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

FAIR HEARING: If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the result of verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have the right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing the following official: Gene Williams, 643-3521

CONFIDENTIALITY: The information you provide will be treated confidentially and will be used only for eligibility determinations and verification of data.

HELP WITH APPLICATION: If you have any questions or need help in filling out the application form, please contact Weldon Hill at 643-2431. You will be notified when the application is approved or denied.

NOTICE OF APPLICATION FOR FLUID INJECTION WELL PERMIT

McDaniel Oil Corporation, 1107 Cotton Exchange Bldg., Dallas, Tx. 75201 has applied to the Railroad Commission of Texas for a permit to inject fluid into a formation which is productive oil or gas.

The applicant proposes to inject fluid into the Caddo Lime Gooch, Well Number 10. The proposed injection well is located 1 mile west of Pioneer in the Eastland County Regular Field, in Eastland County. Fluid will be injected into strata in the subsurface depth interval from 2458 to 2466 feet.

hill country home and an arrangement of colorful fresh flowers accented the table with the Bride's Book.



May Says Goodbye to Landmark

May just said goodbye to an old landmark located on the north corner of the blinking traffic light where Highway 183 and Comanche Avenue intersect.

The building has really been an eyesore for May for some five or six years, ever since a large transport truck driver lost control of his vehicle and slammed into the front of the beautiful old store building, knocking out

all the roof braces and letting the front of the building fold up. Since then, winds, rain and time have added to the disintegration.

The May 4-H Club offered to dismantle the derelict, and owner Charles M. Campbell agreed to a contract allowing the club one year to complete the job of clearing the lot and stacking the materials.

The 4-H'ers rallied members

and set to work early Saturday, August 20. By nightfall the building was flat on the ground and all materials were moved and stacked on the designated lot. Debris filled the old basement and a bulldozer was to level the ground and complete the clean-up job this week.

Fifty-three volunteers participated. Area residents came with two large trucks, four
