The annual summer series of weekly rodeo programs will begin with a parade at 5 o'clock Friday afternoon, May 31, through the business district and to the rodeo arena on Highway 36 east of the city where the initial performance of the summer season will begin at 8 o'clock. Jack Jackson, president of the Rising Star Roping club which sponsors the program, promised that the club will have one of the most exciting performances it has ever offered to start the season, including bronc and bull riding, calf and goat roping, boys and girls barrel races, and a number of new events.

Invitations to all the riding clubs and sheriff's posses in this part of the state asking them to take part in the parade, have been sent, said Charles Rutherford, chairman of the parade committee.

"We want to make this the most colorful and varied parade that has ever opened a rodeo season here," said Mr. Rutherford. "There are no restrictions on entries. We are not asking for elaborate floats. People are too busy with getting ready for the farming season. But we would welcome any sort of odd or amusing entry—old vehicles, or cars, humorous get-ups, and anything that will excite a laugh or attract interest. There are lots of stunts that can be pulled and unusual entries that can be entered and which will require very little time. Trot them out and let's have a big parade, a good time and plenty of fun. It's one way to celebrate the good rains we are having."

Expected to appear are the Eastland County and Callahan County sheriff posses, the Buckaroo posse from Breckenridge, the Blanket Roping Club, the De Leon Riding Club, riders from Cisco and many other places. Invitations to High School bands in the area have also been extended.

Anyone desiring to enter the parade is welcome to do so. Mr. Rutherford will be glad to receive the entries and will furnish the information requested about the organization and the march of the parade.

The summer series of rodeo programs have been one of the most popular attractions that Rising Star has ever offered, drawing contestants of the highest order from all over the southwest and attracting rodeo fans from a wide area of this section. So popular have the performances been that the capacity of the arena east of the city is not large enough to accommodate the crowds and plans are now afoot to enlarge it and to add more pens. This would make possible adding other contests and attractions to the program, said Mr. Jackson.

### Church to Observe Conservation Week

Soil Conservation Week, May 26-June 2, will be observed at the First Methodist Church next Sunday morning with a special service honoring farmers, ranchers and stockmen of its congregation, it was announced by the pastor, the Rev. R. A. Brooks, Jr.

"The morning sermon will emphasize the importance of working with God to protect the thin 9-inch layer of soil that has been given us by God to provide mankind's good supply," said the minister.

"God has given us the soil to use," said the pastor. "It is a loan to us, like a loan from the bank. When we have finished with it, we must give it back to God. A loan draws interest, and I am sure that God would like to have this land draw interest, too, by using the right soil conservation practices. It has been proved that the man who applies good soil conservation methods to his land is blessed by God and the man who refuses to apply tested and proven methods in the end loses his land to the elements of Nature. Let us be good stewards of the soil."

## Group Favors Merger Of 2 Phone Plants

The Rising Star Chamber of Commerce, without a dissenting vote, Tuesday noon went on record as approving the proposal that the Kizer Telephone systems in Rising Star and Cross Plains be merged into one exchange, without toll charges between the two systems, and recommending that the City Council grant the increase in rates necessary to effect such a merger under the present program of the Kizer Telephone Company.

The increase would be \$1.25 per month for business phones and 50 cents per month for residential phones. All toll charges between the two systems would be eliminated and each subscriber in either town might then dial any number in the other town directly and without charge other than the monthly rental.

In the event of a merger the increase in rates would not become effective until the merger actually takes place, E. O. Kizer, president of the company, said.

Before the merger can take place both the Rising Star and Cross Plains communities must approve the rate increase.

The chamber of commerce has also asked the Kizer Telephone Company to negotiate for the purchase of the May telephone system and is conducting a survey of May sentiment with regard to such a proposal. More than 60 names of May residents had been signed to a petition requesting such a move, it was announced.

The Kizer Telephone Company was recently approved for a loan of \$545,000 from the REA at Washington to finance a program of enlargement and improvement of its systems here. The program as now contemplated would result in a total of over 1,000 customers in the system, Mr. Kizer said.

### Mrs. Sarah Lane Buried Thursday In Services Here

Mrs. Sarah L. J. Lane, 86-year-old long time resident of Rising Star, who died at her home here at 9:35 p.m. after an illness of seven weeks, was buried in Rising Star cemetery Thursday, May 16, after services at the First Baptist Church.

The Rev. Ed Jackson, pastor of the church, officiated and Higginbotham Funeral Home directed the funeral arrangements.

Mrs. Lane came to Texas 65 years ago from Sibley, La., where she was born October 18, 1870. In 1896, she was married to Edward C. Lane at Rising Star and lived in this community for the remainder of her life. Mr. Lane, a farmer, died in 1942.

Two step-daughters and one foster son survive. They are Mrs. Ella Wells of Rising Star; Mrs. Linnie Zellars of Andrews, Texas, and Virgil Smith of Tulsa, Okla. A sister, Mrs. T. A. Smith of Fort Worth, and eight grandchildren and 19 great-grandchildren also survive.

Pallbearers for the services were Clark Crownover, Weldon Roach, Timmie Johnson, Clifford Watkins, Curt Smith and A. A. White.

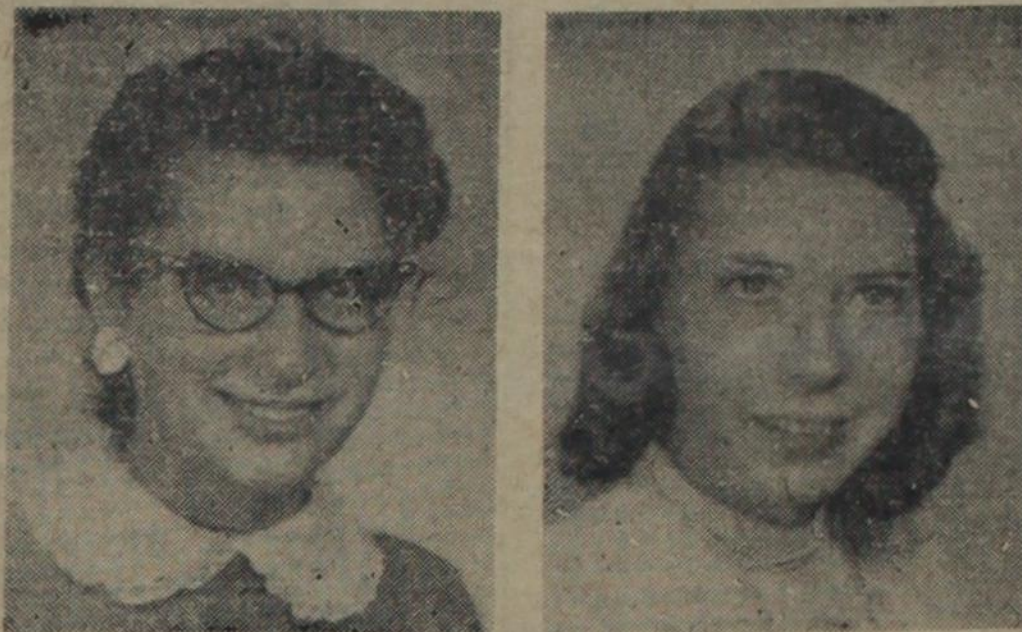

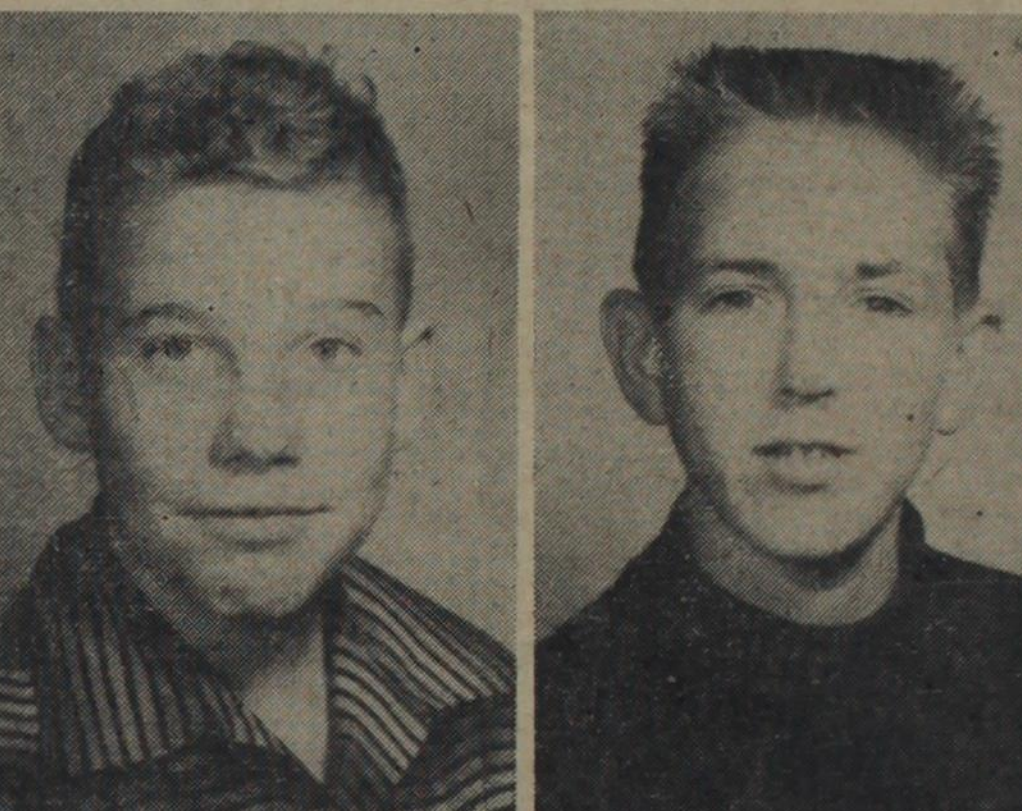

The chamber delegated authority for the organization and conduct of the fair to a committee of three to be chosen by the officers of the CofC and agreed to let this group select suitable dates for holding this popular fall event.

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### Where Women Are Wiser

The largest single group of shareowners in American enterprise consists of housewives and women who have no jobs, such as widows. They account for more than 34 per cent of all the shareholders in the whole country.

That rather remarkable fact is reported by Virginia Kachan, of International News Service. Miss Kachan goes on to tell more about women as investors. For example, women take a different attitude in buying stock than do men. The head of a large brokerage firm told her: "A man with \$1,000 comes in with an apology for the smallness of the amount and asks if we will consent to take him on as a client. But a woman comes in with \$200 or \$300 and wants to know what we have to offer."

In this instance the woman is far wiser than the man. The age when stock investment was limited to those with big money has long passed. Today all established brokers extend the welcome mat to people with small sums they wish to put into stock. Some time ago a Monthly Investment Plan, popularly known as MIP, was started and has met with an enthusiastic public response. Under it, a person can put aside modest sums each month or quarter, and gradually increase his share holdings on a pay-as-you-go basis. If he stops, for any reason, he doesn't lose—he gets whatever number of shares he has paid for.

We have reached the point in this country where almost everyone, if he wishes, can become a capitalist, owning shares in America.

### Uncle Sam Big Winner

Photo services recently carried pictures of beaming holders of winning tickets in this year's Irish Grand National Sweepstakes. A waiter in an eastern restaurant won \$140,000.

The beams must fade a good deal, however, come taxpaying time. For the federal income tax on \$140,000 is over \$84,000, leaving only \$56,000—which makes Uncle Sam the really big winner.

### 12.5 Millions in New Vet Land Loans OK'd

AUSTIN.—A major step was taken last week to put a new phase of the Veterans' Land Program into operation.

The Veterans' Land Board approved what amounts to the issuing of \$12,500,000 in bonds to finance new loans through the program.

The Board actually called for bids to buy the bonds.

The fund created from the sale of these bonds will be the

first part of the \$100,000,000 program extension approved by voters last November to be used for loans to veterans.

Bids on the bonds will be received until 9 o'clock, May 28, when they will be opened.

SPUR.—Citizens of Spur voted by a 2 to 1 margin Saturday to lease the city light plant and electric distribution system to the West Texas Utilities Company.

The relatively heavy vote was 281 "for leasing" to 128 "against leasing".

The proposal approved by the voters authorized the City Commission to lease to WTU the City of Spur's municipal electric plant and system for a term of 40 years. The lease arrangement will include a 40-year franchise for the utility company.

### Blackwell Switchgrass Well Adapted to Local Conditions, Says Guyle Greynolds

Blackwell switchgrass is proving to be a locally adapted high producing grass on the Guyle Greynolds farm three miles south of Rising Star in Brown County.

Greynolds, a Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District cooperator, conservation farmer and livestock producer, believes Blackwell switchgrass to be the grass that he has been looking for. Over a period of eight years he has planted 12 varieties of grasses on four hundred acres of his nine hundred acre place.

"I have tried about all of them including buffel grass and sorghum alnum and in view of past experience I believe that this is the grass I have been looking for. My cattle have always preferred switchgrass over blue panic, the lovegrasses, KR bluestem and the others", Greynolds remarked.

Greynolds planted the grass in a clean seedbed on April 23, 1956, in 38-inch rows with a two-row planter owned by the Soil Conservation District. A 10-20-0 fertilizer at the rate of 100 pounds per acre was applied in bands about three inches below the seed. The grass was planted at the rate of two pounds per acre on ten acres of good sandy loam soil.

"I planted the grass for seed harvest primarily and to my surprise I managed to harvest over three hundred pounds of good clean seed the first year. Ordinarily we can't expect a seed harvest until the second year and considering too, that last summer and fall was exceptionally dry I was really fortunate in getting some seed," he said.

According to Greynolds the total moisture received during the growing season of this grass was

about six inches. Blackwell switchgrass is an upland variety of switchgrass and has been certified for seed production. After the first year, it should produce up to three hundred pounds of seed per acre. Under range conditions it will produce up to 7,000 pounds per acre.

It is an excellent grass to plant under the Conservation Reserve feature of the Soil Bank program. Over one hundred acres have been planted in the Rising Star area this year.

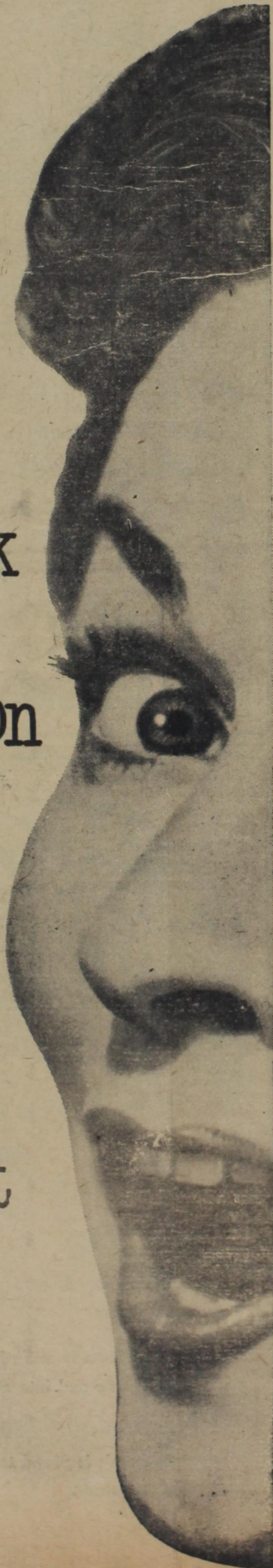

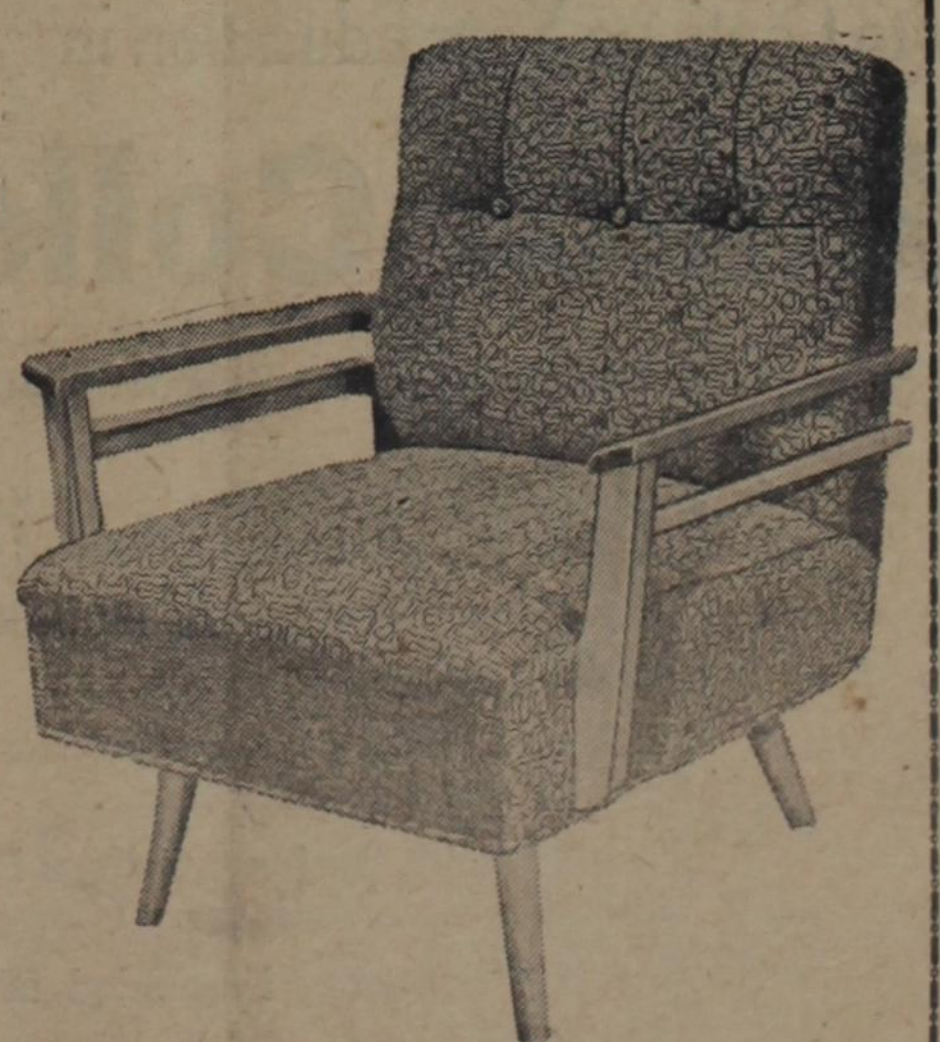

the bedroom. 4. A new wall covering of cotton muslin with baked-on oil coating is easy to apply. It won't tear, and paste won't soak through. A well lighted mirror requires two tall boudoir lamps, which throw an even light on the face. Bedroom built in closets and wardrobes are indispensable.

5. The bath room is not complete without a dressing room, and two lavatories. Wall-hung toilet, newly available for homes, makes cleaning easier—you can mop under the fixture. It saves floor space. Tank is installed in wall. Two long brackets with fluorescent bulbs give ideal light at a bathroom mirror.

6. One of the new kitchens has the ovens and cooking units built into brick corner. Counter top and splash back are of brick-colored ceramic tile. The floor is of embossed linoleum. Breakfast nook is an L shape. Automatic dishwashers match the many wonderful features of kitchen aids. Food mixers, coffee makers, cake mixers and such tend to lighten kitchen work.

7. Refrigerators with revolving shelves put all foods within easy reach. Electric ranges give satisfaction as work savers.

8. Keep toys where children play, all through the house. It is natural for children to like to be near their mothers, when they play. When it is pick-up-time, children form tidier habits.

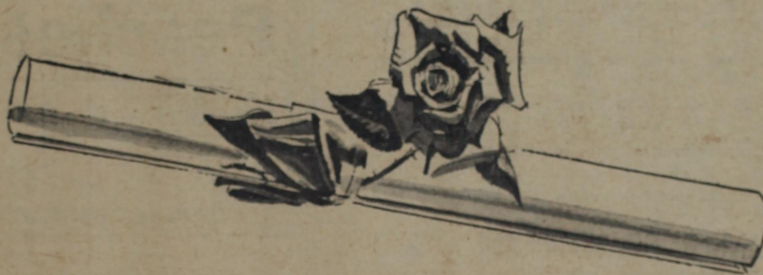
