More and more emphasis is being placed on projects for constructing water conservation and flood control reservoirs on Texas rivers and particularly now, on the Brazos river within the watershed of which the Rising Star area lies. Twenty-three projects are now listed on the Brazos River Authority's plan of development, twenty-one of which are designated specifically for flood control with a total capacity of more than six million acre feet of water.

Without any intent to minimize the value of such structures, it nevertheless should be said that the emphasis placed upon such large projects certainly detracts from upstream and watershed programs—what we might call "on the land" water conservation programs—which are more important to soil fertility and the nation's agriculture than are big dams. The interests seeking the construction of the large reservoirs and dams are better organized and more vocal than the unorganized groups of farmers and landowners and small business men who would like to see the water which falls upon their soil conserved and used there to the greatest possible degree.

There are a lot more of these individuals than there are of those interested in big reservoir construction, but unless they can generate effective organizations, a policy and a voice strong enough to be heard, their demands will not be heard. And if they are not heard and the better organized interests put their programs over, eventually the big dam projects will have acquired such obligations and such rights that no local programs of "on the land" water retention and use can be developed. The water will have been pre-empted.

Communities such as Rising Star, Cross Plains, Cisco, Eastland, Ranger, De Leon and so forth are limited in their possibilities of growth by the available water, both for use in crop and pasture production and for municipal purposes. It seems to me it is very important that these communities take steps right now, when there is such an emphasis upon water conservation and when the prospect of increasing controls upon the use of water dominated by the growing urban interests of the state is certainly clear—it seems to me that right now we should begin to organize and to make our voices heard in the councils which have to do with the disposition of water rights.

The people on the Rush Creek Watershed have a program under way to secure the benefits of such water as falls on that watershed to the people and communities thereon. But the difficulty of getting such a program approved and working is quite well demonstrated in the slowness with which the appeals of the Rush Creek organization are being heard. It takes a lot of squeaking sometimes to make the little wheel heard above the roar of such machinery as our federal and state governments have developed, but it is certainly the little wheels that determine the value and soundness of any program in the final analysis.

It cannot be doubted that control of water flow on the land is the best flood insurance that can be had. It is Mother Nature's way, and it brings multiplied benefits because it first makes the soil fertile and productive and then controls the floods by regulating stream flow with its secondary and important benefits to the whole country.

Rising Star, De Leon, and Cross Plains presently depend upon wells. That source of supply may be sufficient at present, but wells are not a dependable source of supply for future growth. We need re-

Fair Weather Boon To Short Peanut Crop

With varying reports being received on the condition of the crop and the yield, the peanut harvest in this area was well under way this week. Fair weather, denied the growers for so many days, was at last smiling on efforts to salvage as much of the crop as possible, while dry northerly winds did much to lessen the effects of heavy moisture, including a pre-Thanksgiving snow which set several kinds of records Sunday, November 24, here.

It was the earliest snow on record and the largest in many, many years. More than nine inches were recorded in some portions while the fall generally ranged from five to eight inches throughout the Rising Star territory.

Some farmers, particularly those whose plantings were late, reported that they would make a good yield of nuts, although the grade would suffer some. Others reported that the nuts were rotting from the vines and in many cases no effort was being made to harvest the crop. The vines, damaged by successive frosts and rains, were in most cases lost, except as humus matter for the soil.

The size of the crop yield and its quality could not be determined until the harvest was further advanced, but there were credible predictions from many growers that the yield would be better than expected. That, however, was no insurance of a considerable income, because in most cases the expectations were pretty low.

Local Firm Is Low Bidder On Phone Bldg.

Rutherford and Steel were awarded contract for remodeling the exchange and office building of the Kizer Telephone Co. in Rising Star on their low bid of \$9,882.37 at the formal bid opening at the telephone company offices here Tuesday afternoon.

Five construction companies submitted bids on the project. Only four bids were considered, however, one being disqualified. Other admitted bidders were Waldrop and Hensley of Brownwood; Horn Construction Co. of Abilene; Hawkins and Westbrook of Abilene.

The plans call for rearrangement and improvement of the offices, lobby and work and store rooms in the interior; a brick, tile, and aluminum front in modernistic design and central air conditioning and heating of the building. The building was designed by Tucker and Lindberg, architects, Abilene. Joseph D. Hinton of Abilene is supervising architect.

Engineer for the company who will oversee the construction is C. J. Wimer of Dallas. The REA will be represented by Carl H. Dahlgren of Lubbock.

The reconstruction of the office building is the first step of a system-wide reconstruction and expansion project which will give Rising Star and Cross Plains one of the finest automatic dial telephone systems in the country. The reconstruction in the towns will be carried out by the Kizer company with its own crews. The work of rebuilding and extending rural lines will be done and reconstructed line will be built. Bids on the rural sections of the system will be opened December 12 at Rising Star.

About a year will be required for completion of the program.

Nueces County Farmer New Farm Bureau President

WACO.—(Spl.)—J. H. (Harrell) West, 57, the new president of the Texas Farm Bureau, is a strong believer in the opportunities offered by the American free enterprise system.

A share-cropper when he started farming 34 years ago, West now is a successful farmer who lives on his own productive and well-run farm a short distance east of Bishop in Nueces County.

West succeeded J. Walter Hammond, 69, of Tye, Taylor County, as president of the state's largest farm organization Nov. 20 following the annual meeting in Dallas. Both men have been leaders in Farm Bureau for the past two decades, with Hammond serving as president for 18 years.

West was first elected to the board of directors of the organization in 1937 and has been re-elected as District 12 director each year since then. He was named secretary-treasurer in 1938, a post he held until chosen vice-president last year.

The new president was born in March, 1900, in Grandview, Johnson County. He attended public schools there, receiving his high school diploma in 1918. He studied at a Fort Worth business college and attended Baylor University.

Rising Star Joins Co-op E

The Rising Star Commerce voted other communities County to sponsor a booth in the Stock Show's indoor next January.

The booth and project are being under the leadership of Baker, publisher of Progress, who appears at the Chamber of Commerce's noon meeting Tuesday. Baker last year headed a very successful program at the Fat Stock Show similar to the county wide plan but sponsored entirely by Gorman business men. The success of last year's booth, he said, prompted its expansion into the countywide project. Cisco has already agreed to go along with the project and serious consideration is being given to the project at Eastland.

Charles Rutherford was named to direct Rising Star's participation in the project which will call for a large booth at the Fort Worth industrial exhibit in which each participating community will have adequate representation, some person advertising of the community by means of Rising Star representatives who will be assigned at least two days at the booth; and the distribution of large amounts of literature advertising the county and individual communities.

Highway Improvement. County Commissioner Bob Carter appeared before the Chamber of Commerce to urge that Rising Star make a more aggressive effort to secure improvement of State Highway 36 from the western county line through the city.

He pointed out that unless the community insisted upon such a project, the Highway Department would be inclined to let matters rest and devote its efforts to other sections where improvements are demanded.

The group instructed the president to name a committee to join with Mr. Carter in making an appeal to the Highway Commission.

Carl H. Dahlgren of Lubbock, chief engineer for the REA, which is financing the improvement and expansion program of the Kizer Telephone Company, was presented by Ralph Kizer, of the company, and explained that the rebuilding of the system will require at least a year, and that when completed Rising Star and Cross Plains will have as fine a telephone system as can be found in the nation.

Bids on remodeling the Rising Star exchange of the system were to be opened Tuesday afternoon, he said, and bids on reconstruction and expansion of the system in the rural areas are to be opened December 12. Work of rebuilding the system in Rising Star and Cross Plains will be done by the company itself, he explained, while work outside the towns will be done by contract. The program is being carried out by the Kizer Telephone Company and not the REA, which is only financing the project, he explained. His duty as chief REA engineer is to see that standards set by the financing agency are met.

The overall refinancing, reconstruction and expansion will involve upwards of half a million dollars, it was explained, and during the time of the rebuilding a number of new lines will be here.

sources of surface supply for future growth. We need resources of surface supply, such as the development of watershed programs can make available. There is now only one stream in the Rising Star area that is not developed for water supply. It is the Sabanno river. It seems to me that we would be very wise indeed to stake a claim on this resource right now by promoting a program for watershed conservation covering the Sabanno river. If we do not need it for municipal purposes later on, our farmers, ranchers, and the economy of this section certainly can use such a program for increased productivity and value.
