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
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
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




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Area News Briefs

CISCO Jason Phillips and Jill Reynolds have been named recipients of the Cisco Rotary Club Citizenship Awards for 1988, according to Eris Ritchie, Chairman of the annual Awards program. The two Cisco High School graduating Seniors were chosen by a Committee from the Cisco High School faculty. The Awards is based on meritorious conduct in some dozen traits of good citizenship.
