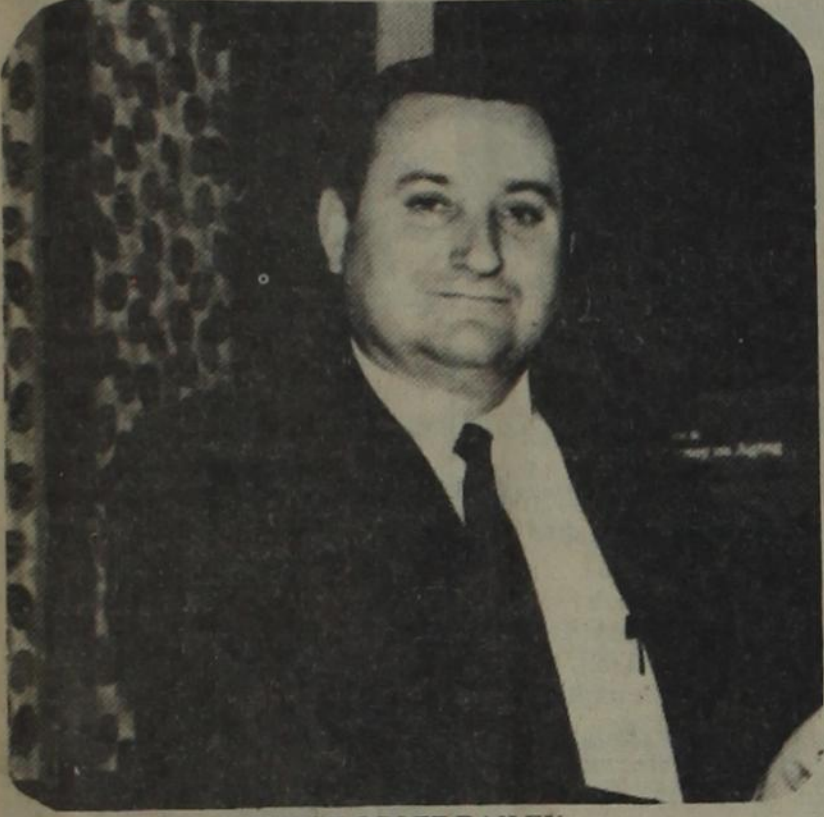

County Judge Looks To New Year With Apprehension

The New Year of 1979 comes with a different aspect to each citizen of Eastland County.

But Judge Scott Bailey, with his interest in public affairs, naturally thinks of what may happen in the field of County Government.

During a lull in Court cases this week he took time to glance back over 1978 and to reflect on the future. He had just finished hearing a D.W.I. case in the oak-paneled Judge's Chamber in the Eastland County Courthouse, but stepped into a smaller office nearby.

The Judge is dark-haired, hazel-eyed, and straightforward in manner -- but with an expression suggesting that justice is tempered with mercy in his Court.

The people of Eastland County evidently consider him an impartial Judge, for he has served the Court for sixteen years and was reelected to another four-year term in November, unopposed.

When asked if he got many D.W.I. cases, he answered simply: "Too many."

"I wish I could be optimistic about 1979," he continued. "But I am concerned -- actually apprehensive. Our nation has had a time of plenty, and it appears to me we are going into a time of austerity. I do not see how we can escape it. The high cost of energy, and the heavy taxation, and the high cost of food and every product we buy--these are draining too much from the economy. Our people emigrated from Europe to escape high taxation -- now they have it here."

He glances out the window, watching traffic flow past the Courthouse square. A ray of sunlight breaks through the clouds, touching the electronic clock on the Bank. The time flashes, and moves restlessly on.

"I wish I could give a brighter picture. I was born in Eastland County -- in Cisco -- and live there now with my wife and two children. My father was a carpenter, and I saw him trade his work for food during the depression when necessary. But we are not in the barter system any more. We can't go out and trade an hour's labor for something to eat, for few people are in a position to raise their own food, much less for someone else."

"But fortunately we have several things going for us in this local area. The County has a Homestead Tax Exemption, and we have been blessed by newly discovered oil and gas, which has brought new jobs and revenue. Of course this has meant extra road maintenance, and the replacement of two bridges during the year. But the oil discovery has been a plus."

Income Tax Meet In Eastland

Farmers Income Tax reporting will be the topic of a meeting Thursday, January 4 in Eastland. There are several important changes in the 1978 income tax reporting that will affect farmers. To help farmers understand these changes the Agricultural Extension Service will conduct the meeting. It will begin at 9:30 a.m. and will be held at the Texas Electric Reddy Room, 112 East Commerce in Eastland. The meeting will last until 3:00 p.m. or as long as there are questions concerning income tax.

County Agent De Gordon said the meeting is planned to help farm families with their income tax reporting. Everyone who has a question and needs help on their 1978 farm tax report is encouraged to attend the meeting.

James S. Denton Jr., Area Economist-Management for the Agricultural Extension Service, will discuss the new changes in the tax law and will discuss other items of interest to those attending.

The 1978 Farmer's Tax Guides are now available in the County Extension Agent's office and the guides will be distributed at the meeting. Gordon said a source of farm record keep-

ing books will be discussed. Everyone is welcome to attend all or any part of the meeting. Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are for people of all ages regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, religion, or national origin.

The Journey To Save A Way Of Life, Family Farm

The journey to save a way of life, the Family Farm will start January 22, 1979 from various points around the nation when the American Agriculture Movement launches the Parity Protest Parade, a National Tractorcade, to the nation's Capitol, Washington, D.C. The Family Farm has been programed and earmarked for extinction. Barry Bosworth, economic adviser to the President from the Office of Budget and Management, wants no more than 250,00 farms by 1985. He told Iwayne Peterson, AAM supporter, that when the price of cattle reached 55 cents it was time to open the floodgates to imports and drive the price down. He said that by reducing the number of farms, manufacturers would not be able to sell to farmers, who represent 40 percent of consumer America, their products.

They would have to lay off union workers. When the unemployment reached up toward 50 percent, the unionists would not have the guts to strike. Inflation could then be controlled. Secretary of Agriculture, Bob Bergland, has said that the cost of production plus a small profit should be restricted to the farmers who are investing millions of dollars in farming assets. Thomas Von Garlem told peanut farmers he intended to eliminate the dry land peanut farmers when he designed the new peanut program. The President vetoed the Cyclical Beef Import Bill so that he could control the import quotas of foreign beef and, therefore, keep the price of American beef down. Under this system there are 2,180 farmers going broke weekly. Another source reports 52 farmers going broke per hour. Some farmers who are working on the side are being able to remain in business. Many are living on their equity to wait out the worst. Many will have mortgaged their assets to the hilt to

farm next year, I spoke with some young farmers recently who said that if they did not come out this coming year they would consider going to some foreign country to farm.

Family farmers grubbed this nation out of the hillside and put a dear price upon it. They gave it a cornerstone and character, the family unit. They worked during the week and went to church on Sundays. They met under brush arbors during the summers to pray for their country. They stayed at home, produced and trusted the country to pay them a profit for their products. They have learned the hard way that they will have to become involved in the agricultural process until their products reach the consumer. As they approach this Christmas season, they are being told that their children cannot pray and sing religious carols in school because it interferes with the rights of atheists. They have launched the American Agriculture Movement, a movement of the heart, to save a way of life and their country.

American Agriculture leaders have requested that the Secretary of Agriculture increase loan levels on all basic commodities to 90 percent of parity, which he has the power to do under the 1977 Farm Bill. American Agriculture has requested Set Aside provisions be established at a level that will insure a balance between supply and demand.

AAM has also requested now legislation to protect livestock producers and to restrict imports until prices

Winter Zaps County

It may take a while to remember to write "1979" but the weather that accompanied the new year's entry won't be soon forgotten in Eastland County.

Moving in as the old year ground to its end, the front hit Saturday, bringing sleet and snow flurries, which continued through Sunday, glazing the entire area with a not-so-thin sheet of ice.

Unaccustomed as Eastland Communities are to negotiating icy roads, it pretty much became a case of "staying in" unless it was absolutely necessary to get out.

Most churches reported low attendance Sunday morning, and a good number cancelled Sunday night services, as well as New Year's Watch Night Services because of the bad. Several churches continued their Sunday night activities however.

Monday's New Years Day was another "stay close to home" situation except for those who had to be out.

Travelers who were going cross-country, found solace and warmth in Eastland County churches and homes. Local wreckers worked virtually around the clock recurring travelers, particularly large trailer trucks which could not manage the icy hills. A part of I-20 at the Ranger Hill area was closed for some time as skidding vehicles were pulled, pushed and persuaded back into the right directions.

Many activities throughout the county were cancelled and/or postponed due to the foul weather.

As Countians "returned to work" Tuesday morning, over glazed roads, and slippery streets, it was a slow-paced scene, as cars slide into curbs, and had to be "hand-helped" away as tires failed to find traction.

There was a mad rush for tire chains, and those who had them in stock, were reportedly doing a brisk business. With the advent of larger and wider tires, many found that stored chains of earlier storms, no longer fit, and had to be spliced and or traded in hopes of keeping enough traction for forward momentum.

Texas Highway Department Crews were busy sanding bridges and busy intersections in an effort to keep traffic moving.

In all it was a time of Wintering in" for most Countians--who generally are not used to such weather.

Electric utility companies were asking for voluntary reduction of all non-essential electric power use, in order to help take the strain off of what was called an already over-stretched system.

There were no reports of power failures in this area, but the Dallas area had severe losses due to iced lines breaking, and lines snapped by iced falling trees.

The generating plants were reportedly operating at and at times above capacity to provide enough energy.

And there were a number of sprained wrists, ankles and some broken bones as Countians tried to maneuver on the ice.

Most suffered the indignity of slippery feet and flaying arms trying to retain an upright position.

Blustery frost has frozen much of the Big Country this long New Year's weekend, but icy conditions have brought something extra to

schoolchildren and surrounding local towns another day of vacation.

But a spokesman for the National Weather Service says a warming trend Tuesday and Wednesday should raise temperatures even if it lowers the hopes of youngsters wishing for another extension of their winter break.

The news of a rise in temperature may hearten area ranchers who have had to feed their livestock hay and grain cubes rather than rely on pasture short grains which are covered by a blanket of ice.

Dave Drummond, NWS forecaster, said fair skies are expected through Wednesday and temperatures should be in the mid 20s Tuesday and mid 30s Wednesday. The low Monday was 13 degrees reported at 8 p.m., although Drummond said he forecast 3 degrees for Monday night.

He said no more ice should fall "at least through Wednesday" but a travelers advisory remain in effect through Tuesday because of accumulated ice. Temperatures Wednesday through Friday should be "back up to the seasonal normal." Drummond said. The average temperature for January is 43.7 degrees, and the first day of the new year averaged about 16 degrees.

December's average temperature in 1978 was 43.3 degrees, 3.1 degrees lower than normal average for the month, Drummond said.

The weather service reported freezing rain in east and southeast Texas and along the coast and scattered snow in the Panhandle and West Texas. Dalhart and Amarillo recorded minus 5 degrees and the mercury in Brownsville hit 44.

Schools reporting cancellation of classes Tuesday were Abilene, Wylie, Buffalo, Gap, Sweetwater, Trent, Eula, Eastland, Ranger, Gorman, De Leon, Gustine, Comanche, Cross Plains, Anson, Rotan, Highland, Hawley, Hamlin, Borden County, Ira and Hermligh. A spokesman for the Snyder schools will announce Tuesday morning whether classes will be held.

Spokesman for Trailways Bus System and Greyhound Bus Lines reported buses would be running Tuesday "depending on the weather." They said service Monday had been late with Trailways buses two to four hours behind schedule.

Gun Safety Rules Given

Some millions of American males—along with more than a few females—are taking to the woods this fall, firearms in hand, in search of live targets.

These are the hunters among us. The American Medical Association has a note of caution for those who are planning a fall safari into the fields and woods in search of birds, small animals, deer and other game.

Before you pull the trigger, know what you're firing at. The hunter who blazes away at everything that moves is a highly dangerous animal. His quarry might well be another hunter.

Each year several hundred hunters return from fall outings via hearse. Thousands of others return with a load of bird shot or a rifle bullet to be dug out. Behind almost every hunting accident is one cause—carelessness.

Never cross over or through a fence or climb a tree with a loaded gun. It might fall and discharge. Unload first and reload after crossing. Don't shoot at a hard, flat surface. Glancing bullets can carry long distances.

Even a small bore rifle has considerable range. Know where your bullet will stop before pulling the trigger.

Keep guns away from children. Never leave a weapon unattended without unloading it. Store guns and ammunition beyond reach of youngsters, preferably under lock and key.

Always carry a gun so that you can control the direction of the muzzle if you stumble. Be sure the barrel is clear of mud, snow or other obstructions. A clogged barrel may burst. Keep the safety catch on until ready to shoot.

Leave your liquor bottle at camp, and wait until you're through the day's hunting and the guns are unloaded to take that first drink.

There is a special hazard for rabbit hunters. This is rabbit fever—tularemia. It is a serious illness. Many wild rabbits are infected. One rule of thumb is—if the rabbit doesn't run briskly when he is flushed, leave him alone. The bunny who lopes slowly along, or stands and waits, likely is sick.

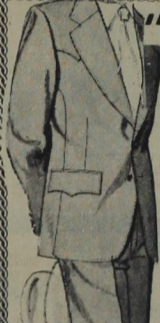

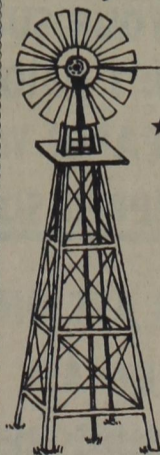

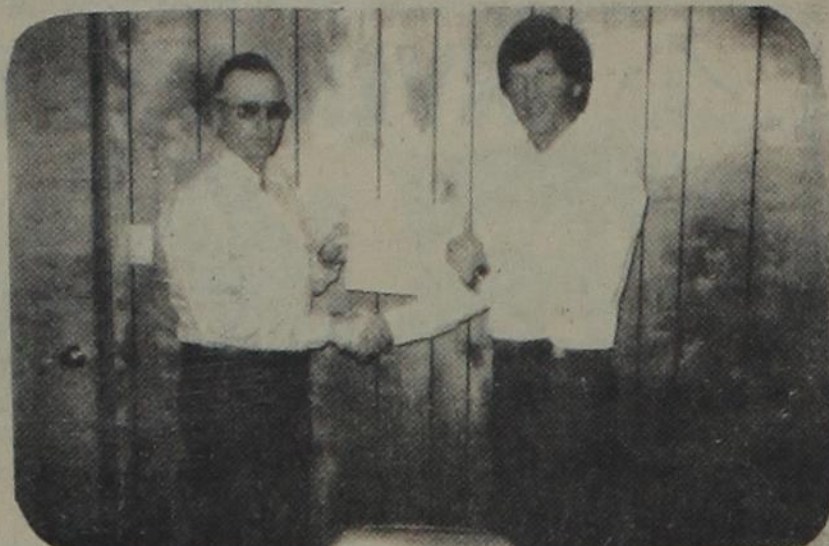

Claud Hunter of Llano will drill two wildcats six miles southwest of Bangs.

Each is located on the C.H. Sheffield 160-acre lease and slated for 1,300 feet.

No. 1 Sheffield will be drilled 300 feet from the south and 990 feet from the east lines of George Waters Survey 114.

Site for No. 2 Sheffield is 300 feet from the south and 1,554 feet from the east lines of the same survey.
