History Books Arrived

The Eastland County History Book is finally in Eastland, and it is being distributed to those who have paid for copies in advance.

Since this huge book, which has taken three years and untold hours of volunteer labor to compile, is being published and distributed by a non-profit organization, prepublication sales were neces-

sary to pay for the printing. Unfortunately some mistakes have been made by the volunteers who have worded for weeks at a time on the book and have paid some expenses out of their pockets. Their only reward is to finally see the historic past of this county recorded in a beautiful book.

In their efforts to hold the cost of the History Book as low as possible, they projected the cost of printing the book a little low and sales a little high. The books ended up being bigger, and thus more expensive to print, than anyone estimated, so the books actually are costing more to print than what they

have been sold for. The Committee collected

sales tax on the books, but they have since learned that since it is a historical book which is being published and sold by a non-profit group such sales taxes do not have to be paid to the state.

It just happens that the amount of tax collected on each book is equal to the additional printing cost incurred on each book due to its excessively large size. And postage costs on the books are now more than was col-

The Committee, which has worked for free and hasn't received any profit from the History Book, now needs financial help to make up the difference. Since they also don't have any money for postage to refund the tax, they are asking the book purchasers to allow them to use the money collected for tax to pay the rest of the printing cost for each book.

And if the committee is to break even on this project, they must sell some more History Books. A limited number are available at the after publication price of \$72.50 plus \$5. for shipping

and handling.

Lee Home Reduced to Ashes

Area citizens woke to record low temperatures with readings of 8 and 10° below zero Saturday morning. The Lee family of the Williams area woke to a blazing house.

Don and Pat Lee, their daughters and Pat's mother, Johnnie (Mrs. Frank) Madison, escaped the fire with Don and daughter Kim suffering frostbite on their feet and daughter Rhonda avoiding smoke and flames by jumping from the second floor of the house.

The Lees hadn't lived in their new home very long and were building a connected addition for Mrs. Madison, who has lived with the Lees most of the time since her own house burned a couple of years ago. Most of the newer addition, a smaller house, was saved but the primary home burned to the ground.

Mrs. Madison, who has limited mobility with the aid of a walker, slept downstairs and an exploding sound woke her about 6:30 or 7 a.m. She could see the reflection of fire in the windows of the smaller house and yelled to the sleeping family upstairs until she awoke Pat who woke the others.

Thinking they could put the fire out themselves, Don and other members of the family began to carry water to the fire area, only to discover that the fire was already out of control. The family thinks a water heater exploded; this would spread the fire and feed it from the outset.

Rhonda Lee, a student at Tarleton State University, ran upstairs to the bedroom immediately above the water heater to save what items she could throw out the window. When she tried to leave the burning house, smoke and flames prevented her from using the stairs so she went out onto the roof

Meanwhile other members of the family threw a few of the Christmas packages out the door, then concentrated on getting Mrs. Madison to safety and moving the cars from the reach of the flames. Fire burned the telephone

wires before Pat could tell the operator the location so the fire department could be alerted. Rhonda then drove to the nearby home of her paternal grandmother, Mrs. Jewel Lee, and called the fire department. The family is staying with Mrs. Lee since the fire.

The Lees managed to save very little from their home. They did save most of what was in the small house. which was as yet unoccupied.

Don Lee is principal for May Independent School District and Pat Lee is a special education teacher for Rising Star Independent School District. Daughter Kim was home from her coaching job at La Grange, Rhonda was home from TSU and youngest daughter Vicki, 13, is a student at May School.

Don wears size 34-33 or 34-32 pants, 151/2-35 shirt and size 10 shoes. Pat wears 16 or 18 pants, 36-38 blouse and 91/2 shoes. Kim and Rhonda lost their clothes, makeup and other personal items in the fire too. Kim wears size 5 or 7, Rhonda and Vicki wear size 5, 7 or 9, depending on style and cut and the three sisters wear size 71/2 or 8

All household furniture and appliances were lost.

The Lee home was located on FM 2940, 41/2 miles east of Cross Cut. They plan to rebuild at the same site.

Help may be given to the family through Mrs. Jewel Lee or through Mitch and Brenda Lee of May.

Rivers Home Destroyed

Low humidity, excessively dry grass and weeds and a spark, the ingredients for grass fire, contributed to the loss of two houses and damage to two others in Rising Star Tuesday.

A fire in vacant land between E. Mill and E. Pioneer Streets threatened a home on E. Mill, then as the wind shifted from the north to the southwest, raced across the grass and weeds to destroy two houses, garages and damage two more houses on E. Pioneer.

The home of Bruce Rivers and a vacant house were completely destroyed as firefighters worked to control the rapidly spreading fire as it endangered so many buildings. Rising Star Rural Fire Department volunteers were joined by May Volunteer Fire Department, Sipe Springs Volunteer Fire Department, Cross Plains Volunteer Fire Department and Cisco Fire Department in their effort to keep the fire from engulfing even more territory.

Bruce Rivers, one of the volunteer firefighters who worked to save the houses, was helpless against the

blaze that destroyed his home even as he and the other volunteers attempted to control the fire. The speed with which fire can destroy a home is still shocking even though firefighters have seen it happen time and

Citizens over the entire region are urged to take every caution possible against fire and to refrain from burning anything until it rains or spring returns the vegetation to green. For the third winter in a row, dangerously dry conditions and low humidity are taking a heavy toll in fire damage. Again, caution, preventive measurers for welders and others and no burning are the order as long as it re-

mains dry. Bruce's wife and two young children were visiting in Lubbock at the time of the fire. They have a three-yearold girl and seven-month-old boy. A fund has been set up at First State Bank to aid the family.

Pictures and more details about the Rivers family and the other houses damaged and destroyed are planned for next week's issue of this newspaper.







New Pesticide Regs Published; **Comment Period Opens**

Rules to implement new provisions of the Texas Pesticide Law and to place additional restrictions on sales of five pesticides were published in the Texas Register, Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower has announced.

'Publication of these rules marks the start of an important 30-day period for public comment. We are holding hearings around the state in an effort to make sure that these rules are clear and are understood by everyone who must use them,' Hightower

Five regional hearings are scheduled in mid-December in El Campo, Lubbock, San Juan, Dallas and Austin. Times and locations are listed below.

'The 1989 Legislature made several significant changes in the way pesticide use in Texas is governed. The rules are the step-by-step procedures for carrying out the intent of the Legislature,' Hightower said.

The Texas Department of Agriculture is also proposing to remove five pesticide from the over-the-counter market. Each of the five pesticides has caused a number of complaints over the past few years. 'Our main concern is the relatively long duration of the effects of these pesticides,' Hightower said. 'We recognize a need for their use in certain situations, but we think they should only be used by persons who are trained in correct, safe application methods. Among those proposed for restriction is hexazinone, the active ingredient in the herbicide used to poison Austin's historic Treaty Oak.'

pesticides to perons holding applicator licenses. 'These pesticides have a track record of misuse,' Hightower said. 'A careful study of the files shows that most of the problems are caused when they are used by persons untrained in proper application methods. We want to keep them out of the hands of people who don't know what they are doing.'

The pesticides proposed for restriction in addition to hexazinone are tricloppyr, bromacil, prometon and di-

The proposed regulations also call for significant changes in licensing requirements for private pesticide applicators. Private applicators are persons who use restricted pesticides on their own property in conjunction with production of agricultural commodities.

The old Texas pesticide laws allowed private applicators to be certified for life, with no continuing education requirements. However, the 1989 Lesislature made several changes in the private applicator laws. In addition to spelling out proposed requirements for continuing education for private applicators, the rules would also allow the Texas Department of Agriculture to revoke licenses for persons no longer actively involved in agricutural production. The rules also detail new recertification requirements for private applicators.

Private applicators holding certificates dated prior to January 10, 1989, do not have to apply for new licenses at this time. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency

may impose additional requirements on these private applicators in the future, but for now, those holding the old certificates may continue to buy and use restricted pesticides.

Other highlights of the proposed rules include:

·A clarification that complaints about possible pesticide misuse may be made orally as well as in writing. · A guarantee that in most

instances, complaints about pesticide misuse may be made anonymously.

·An expansion of current provisions for prior notification of aerial application of pesticides to include airblast and mistblowing equipment.

Bullock Report

State Comptroller Bob Bullock says that shoppers in Carbon will begin paying 1 percent in city sales tax on January 1st.

"Voters in Carbon approved the city sales tax last August and we're ready to make the start up as smooth as possible," Bullock said.

The tax increase in Carbon brings the total sales tax rate to 7 percent for area shoppers. The city tax is added to the six percent state sales tax.

Bullock said that all area taxpayers with an active tax permit were sent a notice from the Comptroller's office on December 6 explaining the rate change.

Merchants collect the state and local sales taxes and send them to the Comptroller's office with their tax returns. The state keeps its 6 percent share and sends local governments their portion of the sales tax each month.

Coming out late we discovered something strange: it was still daylight, at say, 11 or 12 midnight. What gives? we asked, and the guides explained "White nights," wherein there are but 2 hours of darkness this time of year. A month earlier it had been light all night. The next morning brought a quick tour of the museum. The Hermitage, which is made up of the 1,057 room Winter Palace, and adjoining buildings, facing the river on one side, and Revolution Square on the other. It is a treat with 300,000,000 relics (guides quote) from the Russian past, dating to Peter the Great, Catherine the Great, Ivan the Terrible, etc. etc. and I'd hate to have to take a test on that history. There was so much dealing and doubledealing among the rulers. The museum is one gold-leafed, satined, crystalled, precious stoned, room after another. imagine, the reason for the revolution, and you can see to the Russian attitude toward the church, when you realize that it too, was intertwined in corruption with the Czars and Cyarrinas. Such extravangza you've never seen. Art seen here included some by Leonardo De Vinci, Michelangelo, Rembrant, Picasso,

I beleive it was here that Lidia paid Gay Nell and me, what we later decided, is the supreme Soviet compliment. At one of our bus loadings when other members of our group were tardy, she told us, "You're to be complimented. You'rewell disciplined."

In the afternoon we went by hydrofoil into the Bay of Finland to the Summer Palace of the Czars, the Petrovets. These sophisticated boats ride on a curtain of air, and holding some 100 passengers, are as smooth as silk, with only the aft part touching the water. We learn that they are built in several models and sold around the world, including the U.S. (There's even a small four-seat model).

The Summer place, like mush of Russia, was virtually destroyed during the war and is still under reconstruction. We walked its grounds, photographed its elaborate fountains, and inspected the small cottage that Peter the Great, who succeeded in westernizing Russia, built himself. The Germans occupied the main palace and sacked the treasures. We were bussed back to the hotel and passed may apartment buildings.

The evening program was taurant for a feast and ultratypical musical entertainment: consisting primarily of stringed instruments including the balilikia, three string guitars, models of which our people bought at \$7 each in the shops. On top of the caviar, vodka, champagne, wine, offerings included fancy crepes which looked a lot like pancakes to us, onto which they put sour cream and some

A trip to St. Isaac's Catherdral proved interesting. Naturally it's a museum, and the most ornate former house of worship you can imagine. When in use, 14,000 could

stand (the Russian Orthodix manner for worship) in it. Rich tapestries, the famous Russian icons (religious figures painted on wood), and of course a goodly number of tombs. The church was heavily damaged during the war and is being repaired. It's a favorite visiting place for locals and tourists. There's a lot of gold leaf to be seen.

Last tourist call in Leningrad was the Peter and Paul fortress, an island compound in the river where political prisoners were held prior to therevolution of 1917. Tombs of practically all the Czars and their families are seen in the Cathedral of 1700's here. The prison is of course, a dreary place, and the small cells are marked to this day by flowers placed in honor of Russia's first freedom fighters. Out from the tyranny of the czars and into that of Soviet. Will history repeat

Leningrad, like Moscow, is metropolitan; heavily industrialized, and as you might guess, polluted. It was interesting to note that guides were careful to point out that much is being done to improve the environments, and it sounded almost like a recording made in the states, when they began to say, "The trees are lungs of the city, and we're adding more green spaces for the enjoyment of our people, and to improve the quality of the


Allcorn Given Plaque






