# **Local School Board Lowers Tax Rate**

The Rising Star Indepenent School District Board of Educaion: Mr. Larry Wilson, President; Mrs. Doug Owen, Vice-President; David Harris, Secretary; Mr. Bud Vicars, Mr. Tony Long, Mr. Ronnie Green and Dr. Charles Barnes unanimously voted to reduce the school district's tax rate by two cents from \$1.40 to 1.38 per 100.00 valuation. These men are to be commended for their stand against raising

taxes.

The \$1.38 tax rate is .18 cents less than the effective tax rate recently published in the Abilene Reporter News and The Rising Star. Major cuts came in the area of personnel changes and trimming budgeted items that will not negatively affect a quality educational program.

The board adopted a \$900,680 budget. This figure is down from the 86-87 budget in the amount of \$917,382 and down from the 85-86 budget of 646,237.

While the same number of employees have been retained and salary increases were absorbed, categories are budgeted in the following




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# **Band Contest Added To Eastland County Fair**
