## Rising Star Fair Rules

The Rising Star Livestock Show and Fair will be held Saturday, March 5 at the Market Building. All fair entries will be due by 9 a.m. Friday with entry blanks.

The three divisions in the fair are 1-8 grade, 9-12 grade, and adult. Fair entries will consist of seven categories which include Art, Photography, Clothing, Needlework, Hobbies & Crafts, Foods and Men's Food.

The classes in the Art category are oil, acrylic, watercolor-tempra, crayola, marker, misc.

The classes in the Photography category are nature-animal, scenic-sunset, flowers, people, general.

Classes in the Clothing category are sports, dress-after 5, daytime-tailored, daytime, misc.

Classes in the Needlework category are embroidery, needlepoint, knitting, crochet, afghans, quilts, cross stitch, misc.

Classes in the Hobbies &

Craft category are ceramics, macrame, china painting, woodcarving, toys & dolls, holiday, woodwork, metal work, misc.

Classes in the Foods category are cookies, quick bread, yeast bread, pies, decorated cakes, other cakes, canned goods, candy.

Classes in the Men's Food category are pies, cakes, cookies.

Food items should be placed on white paper plates and wrapped in plastic wrap. Six cookies will constitute an entry. Recipes should be turned in with entry blanks.

Decorated cakes should not use mixes. For more information contact Linda Webb at 643-3362 during school hours.

The money made from the donated food items will be split in two ways. Two-thirds of the money will go to the Rising Star Livestock Raisers Association. ## High School Football District Changes Are Announced

The long-awaited U.I.L. realignment for the '88-'89 and '89-'90 school years was released Wednesday evening. The alignment determines sports and competition classifications which range from class A to class AAAAA, and which schools will make up each district for a two year period starting in the fall.

District 13AA will become 15AA with only one change, Hico dropped to class A and will be replaced by Tuscola Jim Ned. Teams making up the district will be Cisco, DeLeon, Dublin, Ranger, Jim Ned and Eastland.

But the new districts aren't set in concrete yet, they are subject to change for about a month. Just as an example, if Albany had rather be in 15AA and Jim Ned had rather be in 7AA with Anson, Hamlin, Stamford, Haskell and Hawley, they could appeal and they might get swapped.

Dist. 15AA teams will meet dist. 16AA teams at the Bi-District level of the playoffs. Dist. 16AA includes Early, Bangs, Coleman, Goldthwaite, Hamilton and San Saba.

For '88 in football Eastland and DeLeon will probably be the favorites to make the playoffs in dist. 15AA, but they will be pushed by Cisco and Dublin at least.

In dist. 16AA Early and Coleman will probably be the favorites. All of the class AAA teams in this area: Clyde, Breckenridge, Abilene Wylie, Comanche, Graham and Ballinger make up dist. 7-AAA, and it should

be a strong district. The class A and Six-Man districts in this area really got split-up and rearranged.

Cross Plains, Rising Star, Gorman, Hico, Lometa and Evant now make up dist. 16-A.

Baird has moved to dist. 13-A with Roby, Rotan, Roscoe, Aspermont and Throckmorton.

In Six-Man Dist./2 consists of Carbon, Gordon, Strawn, May, Sidney and Blanket.

Moran moved to dist. 11 with Lueders-Avoca, Haskell Paint Creek, New Castle, Woodson and Rule.

Dist. 7-AAAA includes Brownwood, Cleburne, Granbury, Joshua, Mineral Wells and Stephenville.

children from all over the country. We are also offering playwear competition where they are dressed in a playtime garment of their choice. Also offered is Baby Glamour/Handsome where the boys and girls are judged only on their facial features and one winner for each title. Talent is another phase of competition that is open to boys and girls between the ages of 3-17 years. Each talent presentation must be more than three minutes. A top five finalist will be selected from each age division and the winners will advance to national competition.

A beauty competition will be offered for girls only. Beauty is made up of interview, casual wear and formal wear (short dress ages 3-12 years and evening gown 13-17 yrs.). A top five finalist will be selected from each age division and the winners will advance on to national competition. Glamour/Handsome is also for the young ladies and men ages 3-17 yrs. and is judged strictly on facial and physical appearance. Clothing and modeling is not scored in Glamour Competition.

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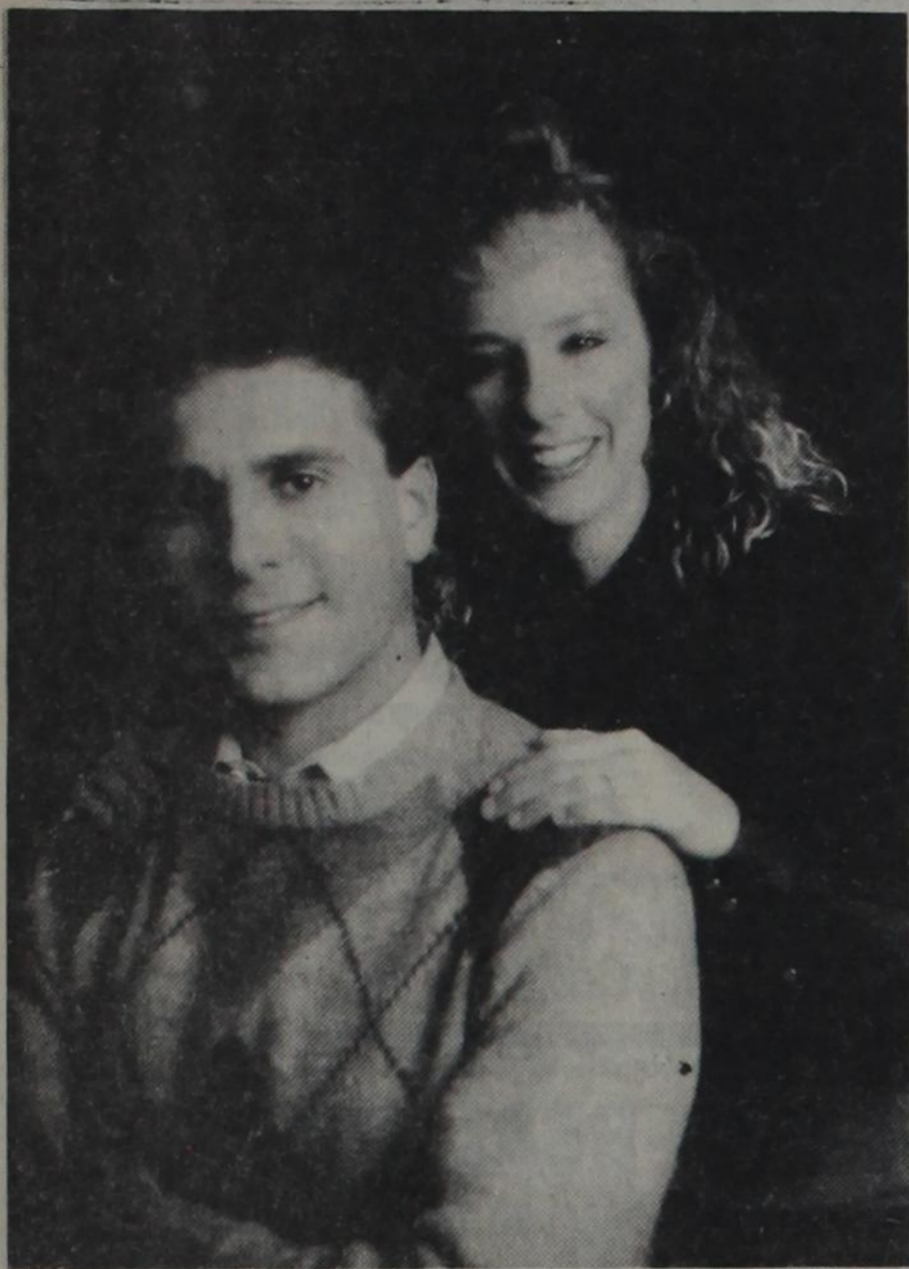

# Homemaking Hints

From Janet Thomas, County Agent

## BEWARE OF FISH OIL CAPSULES:

Popular fish oil capsules may cause a deficiency of vitamin E, according to the new study by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Previous findings have shown that some capsules on the market may contain dangerous levels of vitamins A & D and cholesterol.

Dr. Slim N. Meydani of the USDA, working at Tufts University's Human Nutrition Research Center on Aging, found that mice given fish oils require six to seven times more vitamin E. The researchers are now studying human reactions, but caution against use of fish oil supplements until the final word is in.

Elderly people may be more vulnerable to a Vitamin E deficiency because the aging body needs more the nutrient. Dr. Meydani says, that because the fish oil in capsules is so concentrated, the risk of vitamin E deficiency is greater than with fish itself. It's not yet known if the vitamin E added to fish oil capsules is enough to prevent a deficiency.

# Polo On The Prairie Committee Visits M.D. Anderson Hospital

Polo on the Prairie is a fund raiser held in the spring to benefit M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute. Mrs. Mary Anne McCord of Eastland and her son-in-law, Henry Musselman of Midland, are the organizers of the event.

The Polo match is held on the Lazy 3 Ranch near Albany. Although all of Texas is feeling economic stress, West Texans were able to raise \$25,000 last spring for M. D. Anderson.

The funds were used to make a film about children with cancer. It will be shown on PBS. The funds also helped provide a hospitality room for the Anderson Network, an organization of volunteers who have been patients at the hospital. They are an information and support group designed to work with current patients in their fight against cancer.

While visiting M. D. Anderson, the committee was given a tour to see some of the advancements the institute has made. They have become very sensitive to the needs of patients. During their period of rapid growth they recognize a need for expansion in their patient coordinators as well as having an office for patient advocate.

M. D. Anderson has recently opened a new area for chemotherapy treatment which has private rooms for each patient. There were many impressive advancements but the needs are great also. While touring the facilities, the group was presented with proposals to consider for the 1988 proceeds of Polo on the Prairie which will be held April 16.

"There were several encouraging thoughts which stayed with us as we left Houston," a member of the

committee said. "First, the doctors, nurses and staff love their work and really believe in what they are do-

ing. Also, there is a great deal of research being done in the area of cancer prevention. Most authorities agree that the conquest of cancer ultimately lies more in prevention than in treatment. The most important thought to remember is that cancer is no longer a death sentence. The percentage of

cures is rising but early diagnosis is vital."

## HOW THE DELEGATE PROCESS WORKS IN TEXAS

During the Special Session, the legislature passed S.B. 4, which set up a same-day March 9 Primary for President and all state-local Democratic offices.

Aside from the same-day provision, the bill was amended in the House Elections Committee to fit all Party preferred positions. There was no way to pass a split-day primary because the 6-10 million cost could not be justified during state budget deficit problems.

Critical changes include:

a. No less than 75% of the delegates will be directly allocated in proportion to the popular vote. Voters will vote directly for the Presidential candidate. Individual delegates reflecting the 75% directly allocated by popular vote will be chosen through the convention process.

b. Up to 25% of the delegates may be selected from the caucus/convention process in the manner all delegates were selected in the past, as in 1984-in the County/Senatorial convention, signing in with your Presidential Preference (caucus name or uncommitted).

Those pledged delegates will be carried to the State Convention.

Be sure and mark your calendars for the Precinct meetings March 8th, after the Polls close, Precinct One will meet at 7:30 p.m. in the Court House. This provision keeps alive the precinct meetings.

Texas' 25% is greater than most states delegate totals, so candidates will have to return to Texas after March, since delegates will still be at stake.

We get one precinct delegate for every 25 votes cast for Governor Mark White in November, 1986. One State Delegate for every 300 votes cast.

The Democrats and Republicans will hold back to back State Conventions in Houston. The Republicans meet June 9-11, and the Democrats gather June 17-18.

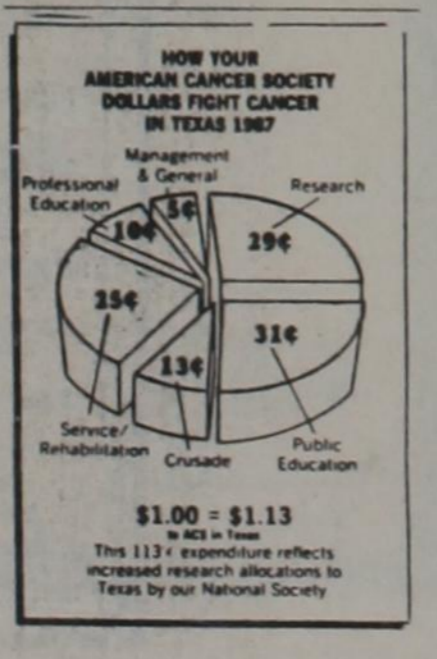

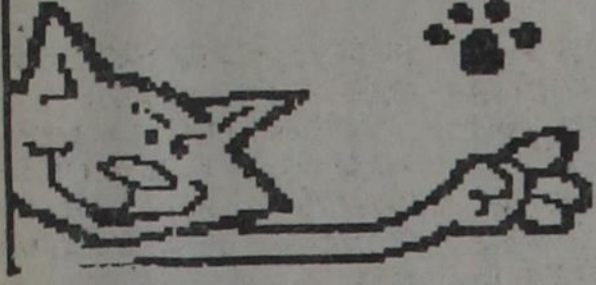

### Scholarships Are Available

It is time for the Senior Class of '88 to start making arrangements, if they haven't already, to further their education in a college or university of their liking.

Maybe you as a high school senior haven't made any plans for college because you don't know if you can afford the large cost of a college education.

Or maybe you are a parent who wants your son or daughter to get a college education, but the money isn't there.

If you, or your son or daughter, happen to be currently enrolled and active in 4-H, and a graduating senior with a recorded S.A.T. score of at least 800 or A.C.T. score of at least 18, there may be a solution.

Tens of thousands of dollars in scholarship money is going unclaimed, we are told, because students who can qualify and who need the scholarships don't apply for them.

The 4-H Foundation Opportunity Scholarship program makes thousands of dollars available to qualified students through various scholarships.

You must plan to attend a college or university in Texas and be able to meet its entrance requirements to qualify.

In order to qualify for one of the scholarships, a student should have an outstanding 4-H career, make good grades, take plenty of "solid" subjects, participate in school activities, know why he or she wants to go to college and what he or she wants to major in, and actually need the scholarship.

Scholarships are provided for the program by several individuals and organizations who may require additional qualifications.

If you think that you or your son or daughter might

be able to qualify, contact your 4-H Coordinator or another County Extension Agent and ask for an application. And they will probably give you additional information or counseling on the subject.

But don't wait, most applications have to be mailed in before March 15.

When applying, remember that a scholarship is not a reward but an investment in the future of a young person, and that person must convince donors that he or she is a good investment.

### O'Brien Is in Research at Houston

Eastland County Native H. Vance O'Brien is presently a student-researcher at the Baylor College of Medicine Howard Hughes Research Center at the Texas Medical Center in Houston.

His present work is in epidermal skin proliferation and differentiation (with possible applications to skin cancer) and laboratory work extracting proteins to isolate an enzyme that restructures proteins.

The Center is doing extensive research in gene therapy of inherited metabolic diseases, regula-

tion of gene expression, X-Ray diffraction and is utilizing transgenic mice as a model for gene cloistering and insertion.

O'Brien's previous work was research in the mechanisms of oncogene expression and molecular biological correlates of metaplasia and possible oncological intervention.

He was awarded a yearly stipend for study and research leading to a doctorate.

He is a 1981 graduate of Eastland High School and 1985 graduate of Hardin-Simmons University. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. H.V. O'Brien.



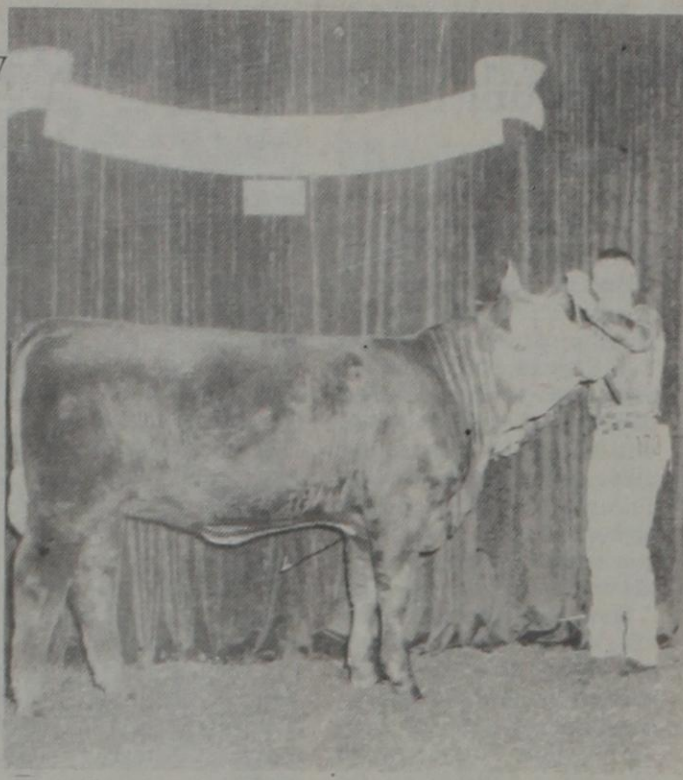
