

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



According to Glyn hammons, Social Security District Manager in Abilene, students 18 to 22 getting Social Security checks are reminded about important recent changes that will reduce or eliminate future benefits. How students are affected will depend primarily on the type of school they are in and when benefits started:

1.If you attend college (or other postsecondary school)-Payments can continue until you finish school, reach age 22, marry, or through April 1985, whichever comes first, provided you meet both of these conditions: You were entitled to a Social Security heck for August 1981 when the law was

changed; and you were attending (not just enrolled in) a postsecondary school full time before May 1982. However, be aware of these changes:

.You will receive no checks for May, June, July, and August even if in school full time.

.You aren't eligible for cost-of-living increases that are given most Social Security beneficiaries each summer.

.Your benefit will be reduced 25% each year, starting with the September 1982

chech(due October 3). If you attend postsecondary school and first became entitled to a Social Security check for a month after August 1981, benefits can be paid only for months of full-time attendance through July 1982)including May, June, and July if you are in school or intend to return to school). You are not eligible after that.

2. If you attend high school--Starting August 1982, payments generally can continue only up to the month you are 19 or until the end of the semester or quarter in which you reach 19, if later. If

your school is not on a semester or quarter basis, checks will be oaid until you complete the course or for 2 months after the month you are 19, whichever is first,





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Maximum recovery rate hits 10th year

DALLAS-The 10th consecutive year of production at the maximum efficient recovery rate in nearly all of Texas' oil and gas fields pushed the state's output of crude oil and condensate last year to nearly 929-million

The total of 929,710,351 barrels included more than 897-million barrels of crude oil. Figures compiled by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association also indicate that more than 31-million barrels of condensate were produced.

Texas' drilling boom, spawned by crude oil price decontrol, continued last year. Figures from the

Ranch. Drillsite is 2.5 miles southeast of Graford.

At a location 11 miles northwest of Palo Pinto, Kadane Oil Company has finaled a new gas producer in Palo Pinto County's B.R.A. Field.

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Railroad Commission's Oil & Gas Division show 24,998 new holes drilled in the state last year, an 18.1-percent increase from the 1980 total of 20,490 wells. Oil completions stood at 15,627, up 21.2-percent from 1980, while drilling applications jumped 17.8-percent between 1980 and 1981. A total of 47,940 applications were received last year, compared to 39,442 in

Last year's crude oil and condensate production total was 31.6-million below the 1980 figure, a decrease of 3.3-percent. It marked the ninth consecutive year of a downward trend since Texas' output peaked at near 1.3-billion barrels in 1972. However, 1981 production from the nation's No. 1 petroleum producing province pushed the all-time cumulative total since 1866 to more than 46.6-billion barrels of crude oil and conden-

Avery Rush, Jr., of Amarillo, chairman of the Dallas-based Association, noted that although the production decline continued last year, the 1981 decrease reflected a slowing in the rate of decline. It was the lowest percentage drop in the past five years.

"It is very encouraging to see that the unprecedented drilling activity of the past two years is beginning to have a positive effect on Texas production," Rush said. "Only by increasing our reserves can we eventually turn around our production decline. And the only way to increase reserves is by drilling," Rush said.

Eastland County, which has had recorded production since 1917, last year produced 1,837,637 barrels of crude oil and condensate at the rate of 5,035 barrels per day. Production in 1981 boosted Eastland County's production total through the end of the year to 130,107,557 bar-

Just as in 1980, 21 counties produced more than 10-million barrels of crude oil. The following listing shows 1931 production figures for the state's five

top producing counties, all with production in excess of 42-million barrels.

Gaines became the state's top producing county, with Yoakum, the 1980 leader, dropping into second place. Ector, which has held third place for six consecutive years, dropped to fourth behind Pecos, fourth last year. Gregg retained the fifth place spot it held in

Texas Crude Oil Production 897 Million Barrels in 1981

Dallas- The 10th consecutive year of production at the maxefficient imum recovery rate in nearly all of Texas' oil and gas fields pushed the state's output of crude oil and condensate last year to nearly 929-million barrels.

total The 929,710,351 barrels included more than 897-million barrels of crude oil. Figures compiled by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association also indicate that than 31-million barrels of condensate were produced.

Texas' drilling boom, spawned by crude oil price decontrol, continued last year. Figures from the Railroad Commission's Oil & gas Division show 24,998 new holes drilled in the state last year, an 18.1-percent increase from the 1980 total of 20,490 wells. Oil completions stood at 15,627, up 21.2-percent from 1980, while drilling applications jumped 17.8-percent between 1980 and 1981. A total of 47,940 applications were received last year, compared to 39,442 in 1980. Last year's crude oil

and condensate pro-

duction total was 31.6 million barrels below the 1980 figure, a decrease 3.3-percent. It marked the ninth consecutive year of a downward trend since texas' output peaked at near 1.3-billion barrels in 1972. However, 1981 production from the nation's No.1 petroleum producing province pushed the all-time cumulative total since 1866 to more than 46.6-billion barrels of crude oil and

condensate. Avery Rush, jr., of Amarillo, chairman of the Dallas-based Association, noted that although the production decline continued last year, the 1981 decrease reflected a slowing in the rate of decline. It was the lowest percentage drop in the past five

"It is very encouraging to see that the unprecedented drilling activity of the past two vears is beginning to have a positive effect on Texas production," Rush said. "Only by increasing our reserves can we eventually turn around our production decline. And the only way to increase reserves is by drilling," Rush said.

Eastland County, which has had recorded production since 1917, last year produced 1,837,637 barrels of crude oil condensate at the rate of 5,035 barrels per day. Production in 1981 boosted Eastland County's production total through the end of the year to 130,107,557 barrels.

There is nothing more discouraging to the houseplant lover than to find plants suffering the effects of insect attack: leaves with holes, ragged edges, brown spots, and stems that are stunted and dying.

If you have houseplants, you're likely to have insect problems at one time or another. The following precautions and remedies for houseplant insect attack are suggested.

It is relatively common for new plants to already be infested when they are brought home from the store. Also, tiny insects can come in every time you open the door or raise the window. And if houseplants are taken outdoors during the summer months, they will be susceptible to the same insects as the plants and flowers growing in your garden.

APHIDS -- These plant lice are softbodied, round or pearshaped, and come in many colors. Typically, aphids cluster on the undersides of tender leaves and stems. Aphids feed by poor growth, stunted plants and distorted

plants. They are found first on the undersides of leaves and when numerous spread to other plant parts. These sucking pests particularly troublesome during warm, dry weather. Infested foliage appears rusty or bronzed. As feeding progresses leaves may drop from

plants. WHITE FLIES --These small, wedgeshaped, white insects fly away when disturbed. They resemble small snowflakes or bits of paper ash. White flies are found on the underside of leaves. They damage plants by sucking the sap. Infested leaves become pale and mottled and may eventually turn yellow and die.

Pesticides, such as pyrethrum malathion, will work wonders in eliminating houseplant pests without damaging plants. But if you are in doubt about which Majestic Theatre spray to use, consult your county extension service. Once the proper spray material has been dertermined, select the right; sprayer for proper application. For more information contact your County Extension Office. And remember always read and follow label instructions.


The Rev. Dick Williams will officiate. Burial will be at Rising Star Cemetery.




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
