to be used in the clean-up project.

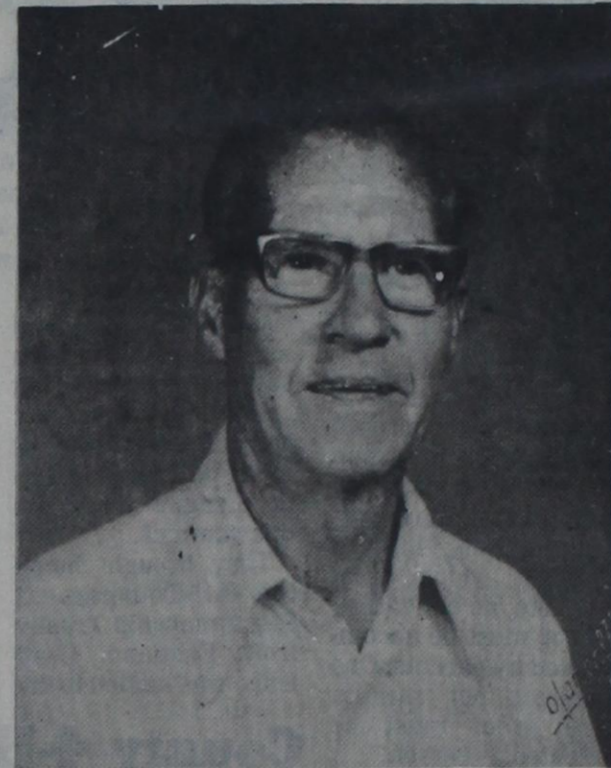

Help Available in Energy Crisis

Austin—Low income Texans faced with home energy cutoff for heating or cooling may qualify for payments from \$3 million in federal funds set aside for energy crisis intervention (ECI), according to the Texas Department of Human Resources.

The money, made available to Texas counties, will be distributed to energy suppliers on behalf of eligible households.

One payment is allowed each household between October 1 and March 31. Another payment is allowed between April

1 and September 30. A maximum of \$90 per period can be paid if the household applies and is found eligible.

Officials at DHR explain that once the fund is exhausted, no further payments can be made.

The department has negotiated contracts with local agencies to handle outreach, applications, eligibility determination and payments to energy suppliers.

Qualification for ECI payments is limited to households with a total gross monthly income of less than \$305.50 for a one-person household; \$499.50 for a two-person household; \$684.50 for three; \$945.50 for four; \$998.50 for five; and \$1,166.50 for six.

At least one person in the household must be a U.S. citizen or a legally admitted alien. If a household's past due energy bill exceeds \$90, and funds from other sources are not available, the household might not qualify for ECI help. The goal of ECI, officials emphasized, is to maintain the flow of energy to the household.

Wildcat Tales



FFA News

This week we will tell you how to control Black Pecan Aphid:

(1) Use spray containing 4 oz. 40% nicotine sulphate and 2 qts. of summer oil to 100 gallons of water.

(2) The number of applications will vary with the degree of the infestation and must be judged for each outbreak.

(3) Aphid outbreaks are most common in groves that have been sprayed regularly for scab control or where two casebearer sprays that contained no nicotine were applied.

(4) Control for this aphid should be started as soon as damage becomes evident. Severe outbreaks are very difficult to control.

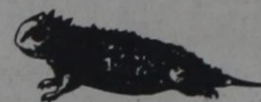

Mission Conference Slated

Seventeen area churches of the Cisco Baptist Association will be participating in a World Missions Conference during the week of October 3-10.

This is the first conference of this nature to be held in this area in some twenty years.

Nine missionaries will be leading in the conference. They will be representing the foreign mission, home mission and state mission work of Southern Baptists in Texas, America and around the world.

All meetings will be held in the participating local churches with the missionaries rotating from church to church.

The missionaries will familiarize the churches with the work being done on the various mission fields and challenge individuals and churches to become more personally involved in and supportive of mission work.

The conference will be in keeping with Southern Baptists' Bold Mission Thrust which has the goal of presenting the gospel to all the world by the year 2000.

The missionaries who will be present for the conference have a wide range of experience and come from varied backgrounds.

Mary Summers, missionary to Brazil, is working toward her doctor of musical arts degree while on furlough here in the United States. Her current assignment is that of professor of voice and other music subjects at the Baptist Theological Seminary in Recife, Brazil.

William Swank is a Home Mission Board appointee who serves as Baptist Family

Services and Inner-City Work Director for Tarrant Baptist Association in Fort Worth.

Mr. and Mrs. Lehman Webb are mission associates of the Home Mission Board and serve in directing Church Extension work in the state of Arkansas.

Elmin Howell of Mesquite, Texas works with the Baptist General Convention of Texas in state missions and serves as the coordinator of the River Ministry along the Rio Grande.

Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Adkins served in the area of home and church evangelism in Hong Kong from 1958-1973. They are currently assigned to Gaza where they have been involved with the Baptist Hospital, the Baptist Library, Study and Activities Center, as well as being involved in church work.

Clinton Watson of Weatherford, Texas, has served as a mission volunteer and is now Director of Missions for the Parker-Palo Pinto Baptist Area. He has been actively involved in the Possum Kingdom Resort Ministry.

Morris Wright has served with the Foreign Mission Board since 1950. He has served in Japanese language and evangelistic work in Tokyo. He has also served with the Caribbean Mission in Kingston, Jamaica. His current assignment is with the Baptist Publishing House in El Paso, Texas.

Hay Show Is October 1

All hay producers in Eastland County are urged to attend an educational program on hay production on Friday, October 1 at the Eastland County Livestock Show grounds. The program will be a part of the County Hay Show and will begin at 1:30 p.m. in the new show barn.

Dr. George Alston, Extension Service Agronomist, will discuss the hay show results and other topics such as quality hay production, soil fertility, feeding value and forage testing. Implement dealers will have hay harvesting equipment on display at the program.

Extension Agent DeMarquis Gordon reports that there were 41 entries in the hay show. Ribbons and plaques will be presented to exhibitors during the afternoon program.

On Friday morning Dr. Alston will judge the hay entries. The

chemical score (crude protein) will be averaged with the physical score to determine the final classification score. The physical factors include maturity, texture, leafiness, freedom from foreign material, and color. Ribbons will be awarded based on final score. Plaques will be given to exhibitors with the highest scoring entry

in each of the following classes: Alfalfa, Coastal Bermuda grass, Sorghum-Sudan Hybrids, other perennials and annual grasses.

The hay show and program will help hay producers do a better job of producing hay quality forage for livestock says Gordon. Everyone interested is invited to attend.

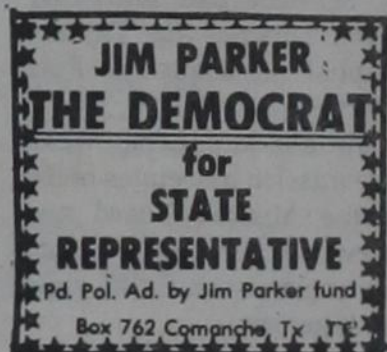

TO THE CITIZENS OF EASTLAND COUNTY:

Drug traffic can be stopped in Eastland County. I have been working with the Grand Juries of Eastland County for some time regarding the drug problem in the county because it is evident that the problem is getting worse. Several years ago, a jury assessed a 99 year prison sentence for delivery of a marihuana cigarette and that sentence scared the dope pushers. Afterwards, the Texas Legislature reduced marihuana possession of less than 4 ounces from a felony offense to different misdemeanor offenses, depending on the amount possessed.

When the state legislature reduced the possible penalties of various drug offenses, it appeared that the public became somewhat apathetic about the drug problem. There are some who contend that smoking an occasional marihuana cigarette is no worse than a youth drinking an alcoholic beverage. That contention is incorrect. In the first place, it is not in the best interest of a youth's health and development to drink alcoholic beverage or occasionally smoke "pot" because of the possible consequences and long term effects. In the second place, seldom, if ever, does a person go from alcoholic beverage consumption to "speed", LSD, heroin or other strong drugs, but it is certainly not uncommon for a person to go from smoking "pot" to harder drugs.

Ten years ago, drug usage existed primarily among those persons in their early twenties or older. Today, we are seeing drug usage in teenagers. Within the last year, we have committed youths, as young as 13, to a state institution as drug addicts. You do not have to wait until your loved one or friend is arrested for drug usage to ask for help. There is no such thing as an innocent experiment with drugs because any usage of drugs creates a potential for further usage with the ultimate probability being addiction. In fact, the State Bar of Texas has developed a program to warn pre-school children how to avoid the dangers of marihuana and other drug usage and this program is being given to pre-school children in various parts of the State.

Fortunately, a majority of our Eastland County youth know and realize the dangers of drugs; nevertheless, anytime a person, regardless of age, becomes involved with or addicted to drugs, not only is that person affected but also his or her family and friends.

The various law enforcement officers and school officials are concerned about the drug problem; however, there are certain high court rulings which make it difficult for the law enforcement officers to be as effective as they would like. Consequently, I am glad that the citizens of this county are becoming more aware of the drug availability in the county and are willing to become actively involved in the "war on drugs". Any help that any citizen can be is welcome and gratefully appreciated. Too, the assistance and involvement of any citizen may help save another person from the physical, mental and financial problems that do result from drug usage.

Please help in the "war on drugs"; the life you save may be one you know and love. You, the mother, father, loved one or friend of a young person, can help stop the drug problem by becoming familiar with the various warning symptoms of potential drug usage. For instance: Do you know where your child is tonight?

To The Citizens of Eastland County:
Mr. O'Brien, Editor of the Eastland Telegram, has asked that I give this letter in regard to marijuana and drug use in Eastland County. This unquestionably is the single most important danger in our community. Marijuana and drug use must be supported by money. The only way users can obtain money is by committing theft, burglary, robbery and other crimes.
The single most dangerous myth in our country today is that marijuana is a harmless drug. This myth is based largely on research done in the late 60's and 70's. Scientist now know that marijuana is an 'sidious, subtle and very complex substance, and that moderate to heavy use can damage the lungs, alter the structure of brain cells and produces serious psychological and psychosocial effects. Some would argue that the use of marijuana does not lead to the use of other more dangerous drugs. This simply is not so. For example, it has been proven in other areas that among the 50% of high school seniors who smoked marijuana 43% used one or more additional illegal drugs. Among youngsters who don't smoke pot, the use of other drugs is unknown.
Throughout the State it is shown that during the last three years the age for marijuana use has steadily decreased. In many communities eleven is the average starting age.
I sincerely feel if we can stop this before it is introduced to the school children, by this I mean beginning at the elementary level and nipping it in the bud before it gets out of control with our teen-agers. Marijuana leads to the use of other drugs such as "crystal", "kitchen crank", and other drugs being sold that in many instances the seller has no idea what he is selling.
I want the parents to realize that my office wants to help. When we have the cooperation of the parent and it is brought to our attention as soon as any indication is shown that the child is using any drug, we can help. There are facilities that we, through recommendation or through the courts, can obtain and affect the healing and curing of the use of the problem. There is excellent counseling available as well as the Vernon Drug Center for teen-agers. We have been able to help a great many of our teen-agers by assisting them in becoming involved in the counseling and or getting them admitted to Vernon's Drug Center.

My hope and I believe the biggest step that I can take towards stopping this abuse is by a one on one relationship with the young people through the school system by having a deputy working specifically in the preventative stage by visiting our schools throughout this County on a daily basis. The fact that an officer is around, available not only to the school but to the students, will do more toward curtailing and stopping the use of marijuana and drugs among our school children and the community than all of the arrest and convictions combined.
In short, I believe in preventative enforcement. That takes cooperation from each one of us. If you feel your child is involved or has a drug problem, please call me, let me try to help.

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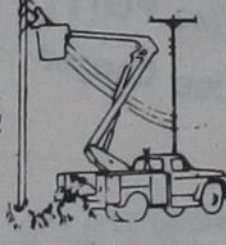

Is our Love for God...Based on an Ulterior Motive?

Satan tells God to use His hand to bring the sorrow, but it is not God's hand that brings the pain. Whose hand is it? And the Lord said to Satan, Behold, he is in thine hand; but save his life. So went Satan forth from the presence of the Lord, and smote Job with sore boils from the sole of his foot unto his crown. (Job 2:6-7) It was Satan who brought the affliction, not God. Again, God limited Satan's ability to touch Job: "but save his life." Job was very precious, very loved of God in the midst of this fiery trial. God had special concern for His servant during this time of affliction. Now let us look at the condition of Job. He had no material blessings left. His children were dead. There was no Soundness in his body. Every test that Satan had proposed had come upon him. Did he curse God as Satan had said he would? Did he stop loving and worshipping God? Was his love materialistic, mercenary? No! Job's love, faith and trust shone more brightly than ever in the flames of adversity. God's trust and faith in Job was completely vindicated as Job emphatically reiterated his faith in God: Though the (God) slay me, yet will I trust in Him. (Job 13:15) Now what about us? Do we love God only for what He has given us? What about our current trials? Did it cause us to stop loving God? Did it cause God to stop loving us? ing well? A minister came one day to what he thought was the lowest point in his life. Several crises struck at once. He faced financial ruin and saw his house and his car slipping away. He had differences with his closest friend who had begun to compromise his life. Because of his standards, he saw a friendship of long standing disintegrating. His past life before he had been saved seem bound to overtake him. He had been saved from very great sin and felt that his reputation and his influence with his congregation was severely threatened. An enemy threatened to come into his Sunday morning service and serve legal papers on him in the presence of his congregation. The minister felt that surely he should resign rather than bring such disruption and disgrace upon the church. With all of these trials hanging heavily upon his heart, this man knelt before God in the greatest dedication he had ever known.

"God, I belong to you," he said. "I'm Yours. If it is Your will for me to be stood on a street corner, stripped, spit upon, laughed at, or even set on fire, that's Your business. I'm in Your hands." GORDON SPOT

The Gordon Spot
A few peanuts are being dug in Eastland County, but most of the crops need four or five more weeks of good growing conditions before they mature.

We had a peanut tour last Tuesday and on Wednesday afternoon four people from M&M Mars in Albany, Georgia looked at several fields with us.

There are some good irrigated peanuts, but over all the Eastland County crop does not look good. One grower told us on the tour that he thinks this will be a worse year than 1980. He believes a number of growers will not be able to continue farming after this year.

It will be most important to leave the peanuts in the ground until they are mature. This is especially true of late planted florunner peanuts. It takes the florunner about 140 days to mature. Because of heavy rains in May and June, most peanuts were not planted until July. Harvesting the peanuts too early will reduce yields and quality.

This past week was Farm and Ranch Safety Week. Agriculture had more fatal accidents in 1981 than any other occupation. Sometimes we get tired hearing about safety, and then we hear of a tragic accident that occurred at Carbon a few weeks back and we realize that safety should always be on our minds.

Producers should recognize that general industry employs thousands of safety specialists to design and promote a safe workplace while a few agricultural safety specialists must reach farm and ranch audiences largely through the media.

Harvest time is probably the most dangerous time for accidents since most crops are harvested mechanically.

Although harvesting machines may be different, they all have a few things in common and a basic set of safety rules:

1. Read and follow the operator's manual on each machine.
2. Make sure all workers are trained in carrying out assignments safely.
3. Keep all shielding in place and stay away from unshielded parts.
4. Always disengage and turn off the engine before working with it, especially when unclogging, adjusting or servicing the harvesting machine.
5. Watch where you're going. Adjust speed to field and crop conditions and avoid ditches, steep slopes, and other obstacles.
6. Keep extra riders off the machines.
7. Wear personal protective equipment when needed. Choose work clothes with adequate skin protection but no loose ends that could get caught in machinery.
8. Take work breaks to maintain alertness and reduce fatigue.

PLANT PARASITIC NEMATODES

Gordon Woolam
Plant parasitic nematodes are slender wormlike animals that move among soil particles and root surfaces. They attack numerous ornamental and garden plants as well as lawn grasses, peanuts, cotton, pecans and many other important plants. They are too small to be seen by the naked eye; however their damage is apparent in stunted, unproductive plants.

The most common nematode encountered by the home gardener is the Root Knot Nematode. The root galling caused by this pest are easily noticeable. Some of the more commonly attacked garden crops are tomatoes, okra, and beans.

If you suspected nematode damage carefully dig up the plant roots and inspect them for root galling. Should nematodes be present control measures are limited and no known measure will completely destroy all nematodes. Chemical control for the home owner is currently limited to Vapam®. This is a liquid which volatilize into a toxic gas after application. This application must be

Make accident prevention part of every farm and ranch activity by becoming educated in safe work practices.

followed with a "water seal" or an airtight cover. Do not use this material around roots of living plants.

Because of the toxic effect of Vapam® on living plants, some home gardeners may be limited in the use of this material due to nearby trees or shrubs in such cases home gardeners may be limited to non-chemical control measures.

First of all remove all infected plants and roots. Next till the soil. Nematodes require water to live and if exposed to the drying effects of the sun would soon be destroyed. Nematode resistant varieties should be used when available to provide natural resistance.

Some of the nematode resistant varieties are: Tomatoes - Big Sweet, Bonus, Better Boy and Small Fry; Southern Peas - Mississippi Silver; Sweet Potatoes - Jewel and Centennial; Sweet Corn - All varieties; Onion - All varieties; and Garlic - All varieties.

FROM YOUR NEXT LT. GOVERNOR

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

CITY AND SCHOOL TAX STATEMENTS TO MAILED OUT

October 1, will begin a new tax year for area residents. Tax statements will be mailed Friday, October 1. Statements this year are a little different than they were last year. One change is that one statement will cover city and school taxes. Another change is that the City has granted a 3% discount for early payment.

All taxes will be collected at the School Tax Office or can be mailed to P.O. 485. A stamped self-addressed envelope should be included for a return receipt.

If you feel an error has been made, you must contact Mr. Steve Thomas at the Eastland County Appraisal Office in the County Courthouse. Mr. Thomas will make all corrections and/or adjustments. This includes exemptions not granted, incorrect lot size, wrong acreage, or any error that will effect your value. This also applies to mineral interests as well.

Remember to pay early and take advantage of the discount.

If your tax statement looks like the one shown below, it means that you are totally exempt and you do not owe any taxes. It is not necessary to do anything with it except possibly to keep it for your own records.
