The Rising Star Wildcats were hosts to the Evant Elks September 24 in Wildcat Stadium, and the 'Cats came out on the short end of the stick, losing 18 to 13.

The Wildcat defense held tough and gave up 224 yards. The defensive line was led by Sam Scott, David Cooper, Tod Herring, Gary Barker and Gerald Barker.

The offense did a superb job moving the ball, rushing a total of 216 yards. Fullback David Cooper rushing for 117 yards, halfback Jaral Pannell rushed for 23 and quarterback Sam Scott rushed for 7 yards. Scott also passed for 69 yards, connecting on passes to Bryan Switzer, Jaral Pannell and David Cooper. The offensive Barker

In the third quarter, Rising Star foiled a fake punt, took the ball at the Evant 41 yard line and drove for a touchdown.

Help Available in Energy Crisis

Austin- Low income Texans faced with home energy cutoff for heating or cooling may qualify for payments from \$3 million in federal funds set aside for energy crisis intervention (ECI), according to the Texas Department of Human

The money, made available to Texas counties, will be distributed to energy suppliers on behalf of eligible households.

One payment is allowed household between October 1 abd March 31. Another payment is allowed between April 1 and September 30. A maximum of \$90 per period can be paid if the household applies and is found eligible.

Officals at DHR explain that once the fund is exhausted, no further payments can be made.



(1) Use spray containing 4 oz. 40% nicotine sulphate and 2 qts. o summer oil to 100 gallons of water.

(2) The number of applications will vary with the degree of the infestation and must be judged for each out-

(3) Aphid outbreaks are most common in groves that have been sprayed regularly for scab control or where two casebearer sprays that contained no nicotine were applied.

(4) Control for this aphid should be started as soon as damage tober 23 by appointment. All work becomes evident. Severe outbreaks are very difficult to con-


DUE DATE FOR PAYING UTILITIES IS THE FIFTEEHTH (15th) OF EACH MONTH. AT THIS TIME RECORDS WILL BE CHECKED TO DETERMINE WHAT AT THAT TIME IS DELINQUENT. NOTICES WILL BE SENT OUT, DUE DATE ON DELINQUENT ACCOUNT NOTICES WILL BE THE TWENTY-FIFTH 25th; OF FACH MONTH. AGAIN RECORDS WILL BE CHECKED; ACCOUNTS THAT ARE STILL DELINQUENT WILL BE SENT A LETTER FROM THE CITY COUNCIL REQUESTING THAT ACCOUNT HOLDERS PERSONALLY APPEARS BEFORE THEM AND STATES THE REASON WHY THEY ARE UNABLE TO PAY THEIR UTILITY BILL.

AT THIS TIME THE COUNCIL WILL DETERMINE WHETHER TO CONTINUE SERVICES WITH THE ACCOUNT HOLDER OF TO PISCONNECT.

IF ACCOUNT HOLDER DOES NOT APPEAR UTILITIES WILL BE DISCONNECTED THE FOLLOWING DAY AND NOT REINSTATED UNTIL ACCOUNT IS PAID IN FULL. THE ONLY WAY THAT METERS WILL BE REINSTATED, WILL BE THAT ACCOUNT HOLDERS PAY A RECONNECTION FEE FOR THE AMOUNT OF THIRTY. DOLLARS (\$30.00) AND A DEPOSIT OF THE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$100.00) IF RENTER AND FIFTY (\$50.00) DOLLARS IF HOME OWNER.

William Swank is a Home Mission Board appointee who serves as Baptist FamiWork Director for Tarrant Baptist Association in Fort

Mr. and Mrs. Lehan Webb are mission associates of the Home Mission Board and serve in directing Church Extension work in the state

Elmin Howell of Mesquite, Texas works with the Baptist General Convention of Texas in state missions and serves as the coordinator of the River Ministry along the Rio Grande.

Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Adkins served in the area of and church evangelism in Hong Kong from 1958-1973. They are currently assigned to Gaza where they have been involved with the Baptist Hospital, the Baptist Library, Study and Activities Center, as well as being involved in church work.

Clinton Watson of Weatherford, Texas, has served as a mission volunteer and is now Director of Missions for the Parker-Palo Pinto Baptist Area. He has been actively involved in the Possum Kindom Resort Ministry.





91st DISTRICT COURT GRAND JURY REPORTS TO EASTLAND COUNTY

The current session of the grand jury met in special session to hear testimony regarding the illegal drug traffic in Eastland County. After carefully considering all testimony presented, we concluded that a serious county wide drug problem now exists. We believe it is our duty and obligation to so inform each of you.

We are not aware of a quick and easy solution to the problem, but believe the first step is to make all residents realize that a problem does in fact exist. We ask each and everyone to become actively involved in helping find a solution, and encourage everyone to cooperate in the apprehension and conviction of the individuals involved. In addition, we encourage each succeeding grand jury to review the situation and evaluate any progress made.

The primary beneficiaries of our efforts will be our children and grandchildren. However, if we continue to ignore the problem, hoping it will go away, some of our children will be harmed and eventually we will all suffer the consequences.

TO THE CITIZENS OF EASTLAND COUNTY:

Drug traffic can be stopped in Eastland County. I have been working with the Grand Juries of Eastland County for some time regarding the drug problem in the county because it is evident that the problem is getting worse. Several years ago, a jury assessed a 99 year prison sentence for delivery of a marihuana cigarette and that sentence scared the dope pushers. Afterwards, the Texas Legislature reduced marihuana possession of less than 4 ounces from a felony offense to different misdemeanor offenses, depending on the amount possessed.

When the state legislature reduced the possible penalties of various drug offenses, it appeared that the public became somewhat apathetic about the drug problem. There are some who contend that smoking an occasional marihuana cigarette is no worse than a youth drinking an alcoholic beverage. That contention is incorrect. In the first place, it is not in the best interest of a youth's health and development to drink alcoholic beverage or occasionally smoke "pot" because of the possible consequences and long term effects. In the second place, seldom, if ever, does a person go from alcoholic beverage consumption to "speed", LSD, heroin or other strong drugs, but it is certainly not uncommon for a person to go from smoking "pot" to harder drugs. to harder drugs.

Ten years ago, drug usage existed primarily among those persons in their early twenties or older. Today, we are seeing drug usage in teenagers. Within the last year, we have committed youths, as young as 13, to a state institution as drug addicts. You do not have to wait until your loved one or friend is arrested for drug usage to ask for help. There is no such thing as an innocent experiment with drugs because any usage of drugs creates a potential for further usage with the ultimate probability being addiction. In fact, the State Bar of Texas has developed a program to warn pre-school children how to avoid the dangers of marihuana and other drug usage and this program is being given to pre-school children in various parts of the State.

Fortunately, a majority of our Eastland County youth know and realize the dangers of drugs; nevertheless, anytime a person, regardless of age, becomes involved with or addicted to drugs, not only is that person affected but also his or her family and

The various law enforcment officers and school officials are concerned about the drug problem; however, there are certain high court rulings which make it difficult for the law enforcement officers to be as effective as they would like. Consequently, I am glad that the citizens of this county are becoming more aware of the drug availability in the county and are willing to become actively involved in the "war on drugs". Any help that any citizen can be is welcome and gratefully appreciated. Too, the assistance and involvement of any citizen may help save another person from the physical, mental and financial problems that do person from the physical, mental and financial problems that do result from drug usage.

Please help in the "war on drugs"; the life you save may be one you know and love. You, the mother, father, loved one or friend of a young person, can help stop the drug problem by becoming familiar with the various warning symptoms of potential drug usage. For instance: Do you know where your child is tonight?

To The Citizens of Eastland County:

Mr. O'Brien, Editor of the Eastland Telegram, has asked that I give this letter in regard to marijuana and drug use in Eastland County. This unquestionably is the single most important danger in our community. Marijuana and drug use must be supported by money. The only way users can obtain money is by committing theft, burglary, robbery and other crimes.

The single most dangerous myth in our country today is that marijuana is a harmless drug. This myth is based largely on research done in the late 60's and 70's. Scientist now know that marijuana is an ' sidious, subtle and very complex substance, and that moderate to heavy use can damage the lungs, alter the structure of brain cells and produces serious psychological and psychosocial effects. Some would argue that the use of marijuana does not lead to the use of other more dangerous drugs. This simply is not so. For example, it has been proven in other areas that among the 50% of high school seniors who smoked marijuana 43% used one or more additional illegal drugs. Among

youngsters who don't smoke pot, the use of other drugs is unknown.

Throughout the State it is shown that during the last three years the age for marijuana use has steadily decreased. In many communities eleven is the average starting age.

I sincerely feel if we can stop this before it is introduced to the school children, by this I mean begin-

ning at the elementary level and nipping it in the bud before it gets out of control with our teen-agers.

Marijuana leads to the use of other drugs such as "crystal", "kitchen crank", and other drugs being sold that in many instances the seller has no idea what he is selling.

I want the parents to realize that my office wants to help. When we have the cooperation of the parent and it is brought to our attention as soon as any indication is shown that the child is using any drug, we can help. There are facilities that we, through recommendation or through the courts, can obtain and affect the healing and curing of the use of the problem. There is excellent couseling available as well as the Vernon Drug Center for teen-agers. We have been able to help a great many of our teen-agers by assisting them in becoming involved in the couseling and or getting them admitted to Vernon's Drug Center.

My hope and I believe the biggest step that I can take towards stopping this abouse is by a one on one relationship with the young people through the school system by having a deputy working specifically in the preventative stage by visiting our schools throughout this County on a daily basis. The fact that an officer is around, available not only to the school but to the students, will do more toward curtailing and stopping the use of marijuana and drugs amoung our school children and the community than all of the

In short, I believe in preventative enforcement. That takes cooperation from each one of us. If you feel your child is involved or has a drug problem, please call me, let me try to help.

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

A few peanuts are being dug in Eastland County, but most of the crops need four or five more weeks of good growing conditions before they mature.

We had a peanut tour last Tuesday and on Wednesday afternoon four people from M&M Mars in Albany, Georgia looked at several fields with us. There are some good

irrigated peanuts, but over all the Eastland County crop does not look good. One grower told us on the tour that he thinks this will be a worse year than 1980. He believes a number of growers will not be able to continue farming after this year.

It will be most important to leave the peanuts in the ground until they are mature. This is especially true of late planted florunner peanuts. It takes the florunner about 140 days to mature. Because of heavy rains in May and June, most peanuts were not planted until July. Harvesting the peanuts too early will reduce yields and quality.

This past week was Farm and Ranch Safety Week. Agriculture had more fatal accidents in 1981 than any other occupation. Sometimes we get tired hearing about safety, and then we hear of a tragic accident that occured at Carbon a few weeks back and we realize that safety should always be on our By DeMarquis Gordon

Producers should recognize that general industry employs thousands of safety specialists to design and promote a safe workplace while a few agricultural safety specialists must reach farm and ranch audiences largely through the media.

Harvest time is probably the most dangerous time for accidents since most crops are harvested mechanically.

Although harvesting machines may be different, they all have a few things in common and a basic set of safety rules:

1. Read and follow the operator's manual on each machine.

2. Make sure all workers are trained in carrying assisgnments safely.

3. Keep all shielding in place and stay away from unshielded parts.

4. Always disengage and turn off the engine before working with it, especially unclogging, adjusting or servicing the harvesting machine.

5. Watch where you're going. Adjust speed to field and crop conditions and avoid ditches, steep slopes, and other obstacles.

6. Keep extra riders off the machines.

7. Wear personal protective equipment when needed. Choose work clothes with adequate skin protection but no loose ends that could get caught in machinery.

8. Take work breaks to maintain alertness and reduce fatique.





CITY AND SCHOOL TAX STATEMENTS TO MAILED OUT

October 1, will begin a new tax year for area residents. Tax statements will be mailed Friday, October 1. Statements this year are a little different than they were last year. One change is that one statement will cover city and school taxes. Another change is that the City has granted a 3% discount for early payment.

All taxes will be collected at the School Tax Office or can be mailed to P.O. 485. A stamped self-addressed envelope should be included for a return receipt.

If you feel an error has been made, you must contact Mr. Steve Thomas at the Eastland County Appraisal Office in the County Courthouse. Mr. Thomas will make all corrections and/or adjustments. This includes exemptions not granted, incorrect lot size, wrong acreage, or any error that will effect your value. This also applies to mineral interests as well.

Remember to pay early and take advantage of the discount.

If your tax statement looks like the one shown below, it means that you are totally exempt and you do not owe any taxes. It is not necessary to do anything with it except possibly to keep it for your own records.
