"Those expressions were copied from that book," said Victor. He indicated a page number beside one of the quotations and turned to that page where the phrase was underlined in the context from which it had been lifted. It was profanity of the rankest.

"This is a textbook furnished by the state for use in Eighth Grade English," said Victor. "Would you believe it? Our Eighth Grade English teacher has refused to use it in her classes. We called Austin and asked that it be removed from our list, and the Education Agency told us that the textbook had been accepted for use in Texas schools provided the objectionable material was deleted and that we had received copies which had not been pur-
