Oil Well Supply Is City's Newest Enterprise

BY B.A. BUTLER Drilling for oil and gas is an activity that can grow almost overnight.

First, a hopeful rig or two setting up, drilling -sometimes "cornbreading it down" as old - timers used to say of a poverty operation - moving and setting up again, like historical remnants of a long - temembered boom hardly to be noticed except in nostalgia.

And then suddenly, it seems, more than a dozen such rigs are feverishly active within a 20 mile radius of Rising Star and crews of young hard - hats come and go around the clock, bringing home fat paychecks and otherwise nourishing the economy with new finds of oil and gas.

The underlying reason for this apparently magical development is the fact that production of petroleum is essentially a matter of harvesting a resource that a long geologic patience has stored deep in earth for the use of mankind. Once located the problem becomes one of making it available by drilling holes into its time - bound reservoirs, a process comparatively swift and increasingly efficient. If production is found within a reasonable return upon risk, the activity spreads as rapidly moved in and crews found to man the venturesome bits.



Must those who believe in Jehovah God, in Jesus as the Christ, the Son of the Living God, and in the Bible as the inspired revelation of God to humanity remain separated? Must there be perpetually a series of "mini-churches", among which the believer must choose? Is this really what God wants? Even a casual reading of the New Testament will show that the answer is :NO!what, then, is the solution? Simply put , it can only be to respect fully the indications of the Scriptures and to abandon human traditions and interpretations. The church (company of believers) must be TODAY what it was in

apostolic days: in doctrine and

practice.

church government over the centuries, there have been other transformations to alter the original nature of the church. For example, the New Testment tells us that in the early days of the church th Christians assembled to worship God and to edify one another (1 Corinthians 14:1-40). To do this, they engaged in prayer, they joined in public discussions of the Scriptures, with special emphasis upon matters pertaining to the Gospel, and they made widespread use of singing (1 Corinthians 14:15, 26 ff; Ephesians 5:19; Colossians 3:16). In connection with the latter, it is to be noted that only singing was used by Christians-never any mechanical instruments of music. These were not used anywhere by Christians until the 7th Century, being then introduced sby the Roman Church. On the Lord's Day (the first day of the week or Sunday), the Christians engaged weekly in two additional actions: the Lord's Supper, in remembrance of the death and suffering of Jesus (Acts 20:7: 1 Corinthians 11:17-34) and in giving (1 Corinthians 16:2), sometimes described as "felloship" (Acts 2:42; Philippians 4:15). Their worship was simple, sincere and extremely spiritual. There were none of the elaborate trappings and ritualism that had so often marked the worship of Judaism and paganism, and which all too often has been preserved, or been re-introduced, in modern religious groups. (More later)






