Areas to be screened are hearing, vision, speech, motor skills and language ability. A developmental growth evaluation will be given.

Prekindergarten Program Is Being Considered by RSISD

The Rising Star I.S.D. is conducting a survey to determine interest in a four year old prekindergarten program. If you feel your child meets the eligibility requirements please contact Mrs. Linda Webb at 643-3362 or Mrs. Susan Harrelson at 643-2431 to set up an appointment between Monday, April 22 and Friday, May 3.

Legal requirements: ...Any school district may offer prekindergarten classes, but a district shall offer prekindergarten classes if the district identifies 15 or more eligible children.

...To be eligible for enrollment in a prekindergarten class, a child must be at least four years of age by August 31 and must be:

- unable to speak and comprehend the English language, or
- from a family whose income, according to standards set by the State Board of Education, is at or below

subistence level.

...Prekindergarten classes shall be operated on a half-day basis. A district is not required to provide transportation for prekindergarten classes.

Eligibility requirements: ...To determine eligibility for students who do not speak and comprehend the English language, school districts shall:

- administer home language surveys, and
- screen students using informal oral inventories.

...To determine eligibility for a student who comes from a family whose annual income is at or below subsistence, school districts shall apply the formula used to qualify for free or reduced-price lunches under the national school lunch program.

Minimum time: The minimum time for the operation of prekindergarten classes on a half-day basis shall be three hours.

Because of the serious threat posed by GATT (General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade) and the possible loss of Section 22 a meeting of all peanut and cotton farmers has been called.

The meeting will be Friday, April 18, at 7:30 p.m. in the Gorman school cafeteria. Explanations of what needs to be done will be given along with some important information.

Ross Wilson, manger of Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association, said, "In our

opinion, this is the most serious threat to the peanut program that we have seen — ever."

The next 60 days are crucial as Congress will decide by June 1 whether to grant the administration's request to extend authority for fast track legislation to implement any further GATT agreement.

Benny Hagan, a director of SWPGA, said, "If we want to keep a profitable peanut program, it is mandatory that we get involved." He urged peanut producers to spread the word about the meeting.

Social Security Needs To Be Contacted About Retirement

"People who plan to retire this year may want to call about their plans soon," Glynn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene, said today. Hammons noted that a 1991 change in the Social Security law that may limit the start of benefits to the month the person actually retires, making it more im-

portant than it used to be to notify Social Security of plans to retire.

"Depending on their earnings, some people may still be able to get additional benefits by applying for Social Security early in the year, even though they won't retiring until later in the year," Hammons said.

In choosing the best retirement date, some things you should consider are your age (the earliest you can start collecting Social Security retirement benefits is the month you turn age 62), expected earnings for the year, estimated benefits, and whether family members will also receive benefits. "We can discuss with you how these factors will affect your benefits," Hammon said.

County Awarded Federal Funds For Emergency Programs

Eastland County has again been chosen to receive a Federal Grant to supplement the emergency food and shelter programs in the area during 1991. This is part of a block grant made to three counties under jurisdiction of Central Texas Opportunities,

Inc. with headquarters in Coleman. Eastland County has received \$5,460.00 to be used in supplementing needy families who need help in buying groceries, paying rent or mortgages to keep families from being evicted, and to help the needy with utilities.

Distribution

A national board to administer these funds is made up of national volunteer affiliates and is chaired by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). A local board also is required to administer the distribution of the funds locally. This board consists of Mike Zuniga, Jr., executive director of CTO, Eastland County Judge Scott Bailey, Susie Thomas of Eastland Goodfellows, Mike Perry of the Eastland Salvation Army and Mary Jo Williams of the Ranger Salvation Army. Sanford Tune, Coordinator of the Emergency Homeless Program for CTO in Coleman, is also coordinator for the FEMA program. Ms. Peggy Roberts is coordinator for the Eastland County area and will be directing the distribution of funds from the CTO Multi-Purpose Center in Eastland. Applications for assistance must come through her office. There will be certain

criteria that an applicant must meet to receive help from this program. This is an equal opportunity program and applicants will be served without regard to race, color, nationality, ethnic origin or religious creed.

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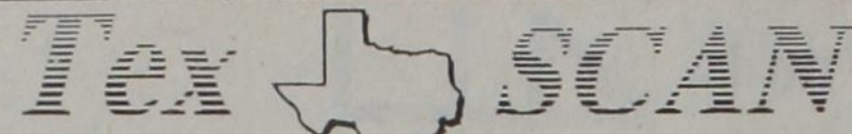

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Assistance From Water Well Owners

As part of a joint study with the Texas Water Commission, Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) technicians will be sampling water quality in wells in thirty-four north Texas counties during the months of April and May. In April, water samples will be taken from wells located in Archer, Wichita, Clay, Baylor, foard, Wilbarger, Hardeman, Jones, Taylor, Shackelford, Montague, Wise and Palo Pinto Counties.

Many of these wells are privately owned, and TWDB technicians would like well owners to know that they are in the area and will be seeking the well owner's permission to take water samples. Copies of the analysis will be sent to landowners upon request, and there is no charge to the landowner for the information.

May samplings will take place in Throckmorton, Haskell, Erath, Collingsworth, Motley, Wheeler, Dickens, Crosby, Floyd, King, Nolan, Fisher, Callahan, Eastland, Jack and Parker Counties.

Critical area ground-water studies are being conducted in response to legislation passed in 1985 which requires the state's water agencies to identify areas in the state that are either currently experiencing or expected to experience critical ground-water problems within the next twenty years.

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Peanut Support Levels Set

The federal support price for 1991 crop quota peanuts is \$642.79 per ton, \$11.47 per ton more than last year, according to David Martin, County Executive Director of the Eastland County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. The support level for additional peanuts is \$149.75, the same as last year.

Martin said quota peanuts are those grown on a farm within the farm's poundage quota. Additional peanuts are those grown in excess of the farm's poundage quota, or those grown on a farm with no poundage quota.

USDA increased the support level for quota peanuts because the cost of producing the 1990 crop was greater than the cost of producing the 1989 peanut crop. Martin said the level for additional peanuts must be set at a rate estimated to ensure no government loss on these peanuts. In determining this level, USDA considers the demand for peanut oil and peanut meal, the expected prices for other vegetable oils and protein meals, and the demand for peanuts in the foreign market.

The ASCS official said 1991 crop additional peanuts owned or controlled by the Commodity Credit Corporation will be sold for export edible use at no less than \$400 per ton, the same as last year.

Hygiene Requirements

Q. What training do dental hygienists receive?
A. Dental hygienists are valued members of most dental offices. Hygienists must be licensed in order to practice, and, in most states, must work under a dentist's supervision. The minimum educational requirement is two years of college level work, resulting in an associate's degree. Some schools offer programs leading to bachelor's, even master's, degrees in dental hygiene. All programs feature classroom, laboratory and clinical training in areas ranging from cheistry and oral anatomy to sociology and first aid. Once the educational program is completed, the would-be hygienist must pass a 6-hour written exam administered by the ADA, as well as a state or regional clinical exam. CERS 104

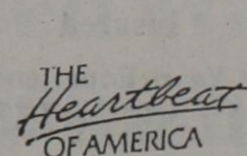

Many people ignore a sore throat or a sore on their lip, mouth, gums or tongue for a couple of weeks or longer, popping lozenges or applying medication in hopes that it will soon go away.

Sometimes such a delay can have serious medical consequences. Dr. Bobby R. Alford, a head and neck surgeon at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, views such seemingly minor conditions as possible signs of head and neck cancer — a relatively unpublicized but easily detected medical threat.

"I am amazed at how advanced the cancer is by the time some patients see the doctor," Alford said. "Sore throats or tongues, mouth or lip ulcers, hoarseness — all can be a sign of some type of head or neck cancer."

Alford, professor and chairman of otorhinolaryngology, believes that more public attention should be focused on head and neck cancers to boost successful early detection rates like those seen in other more common cancers such as in the breast or prostate.

"In 1991, there were an estimated 30,800 new cases of oral cancer resulting in 8,150 deaths," he said. "The incidence is higher men than in women and is most frequent in people past age 40."

Head and neck cancers often result in unnecessary deaths, Alford said, since treatment can be highly successful if the disease is caught early.

Physicians and dentists have the opportunity during regular checkups to see abnormal changes in the lips, mouth or tongue and to detect cancer at earlier, more curable stages.

"A mouth ulcer may be a precursor to cancer," Alford said. "Changes in the membrane lining of the throat or even something as innocent as a 'sticking' sensation in

the throat are other possible warning signs. The earlier patients get to the doctor, the better their chances."

Cancer can affect any part of the oral cavity including the lip, tongue or mouth, and in the throat. Cancer can also be found in the thyroid and saliva glands, the sinuses, the nose and the larynx.

Symptoms may include a sore that bleeds easily and does not heal, a lump or thickening of tissue or a red or white patch in the mouth or throat that persists. Difficulty in chewing, swallowing, speaking or in moving the tongue often occurs in later stages of the cancer.

Treatment usually involves surgery, radiation therapy, chemotherapy or a combination of all three. According to the American Cancer Society, the five-year survival rates are quite good for oral cancer, although the rates vary substantially depending on the site of the cancer.

Five-year survival rates range from 32 percent for cancer of the pharynx (air passageway) to 92 percent for lip cancer. Overall, about 52 percent of such patients survive five years or longer.

Risk factors for oral cancer include cigarette, cigar or pipe smoking use of smokeless tobacco or excess alcohol consumption. The risk increases dramatically for smokers who drink heavily.

The floor of the mouth, tongue, tonsils, middle section of the throat and the larynx are prime cancer sites for heavy smokers. Cancer in the lower portion of the throat, the swallowing passage, is often seen in those who drink excessively. The mouth and gums are affected by chewing tobacco.

Alford believes that one of the reasons people do not seek earlier treatment is that the very agent that causes the cancer prevents them from

Early Notice Of Retirement Important

"People who plan to retire this year may want to call about their plans soon," Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene, said. Hammons noted that a 1991 change in the Social Security law that may limit the start of benefits to the month the person actually retires, making it more important than it used to be to notify Social Security of plans to retire.

"Depending on their earnings, some people may still be able to get additional benefits by applying for Social Security early in the year, even though they won't be retiring until later in the year," Hammons said.

"If we are contacted early in the year, we can look at current earnings and benefit information that can help you choose the most advantageous

recognizing that they have a problem.

"Tobacco abuse and its irritation effects can cause the mucous membranes in the mouth and throat to become chronically irritated or insensitive, so that soreness may not be as readily felt as it would in a non-smoker," he said. "Likewise, the anesthetic effects of alcohol may hide the pain of an ulcer or cancerous growth until the cancer has grown quite large."

Alford stresses good dental hygiene and regular dental and medical checkups, avoidance of tobacco products, good nutrition and abstinence or moderation in the use of alcohol are keys to prevention of head and neck cancer.

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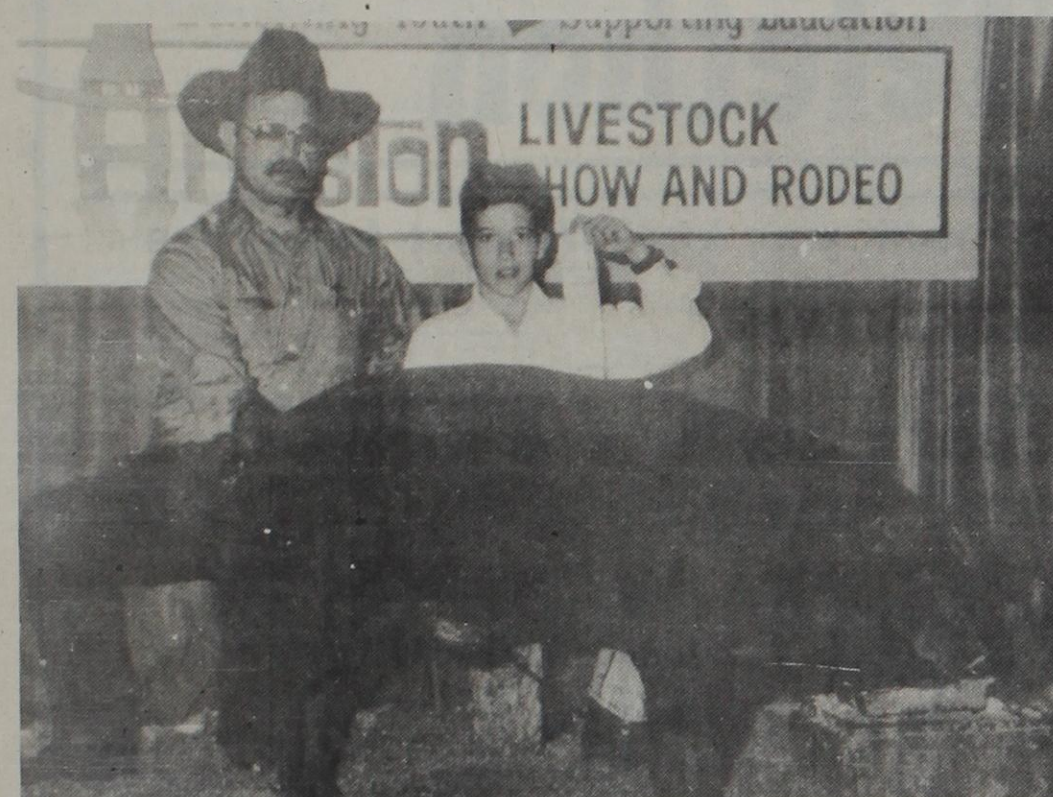
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FFAers Place 3rd in Houston

The age of specialization in sports has caused the value of a good utility player to skyrocket. One such player is Jackie Harris of Rising Star, Texas, a softball player at Northeast Louisiana University. But playing different positions, or even different sports, is nothing new for Harris.

Splitting time between shortstop and left field has not detracted from Harris' play at all. The sophomore health and physical education major leads the team in four categories, batting average at .340, hits with 56, runs with 28 and doubles with eight. Her 56 hits are only four shy of the school record of 60 hits in a season. Her .340 batting average is the highest by an NLU player since 1982.

However, Harris' play at the plate should not be overshadowed by her play in the field. She has a .945 fielding percentage on 136 chances, a very high number for someone who does not know what position she is going to play until she gets to the ball park.

"I am not picky about which position I play," Harris said. "I'll play whatever position benefits the team."

Harris' solid all-around play may be credited to the fact that she grew up playing baseball.

"I grew up playing baseball with the guys, I did not start playing softball until I was 15," Harris said.

After graduating from high school, Harris went to Western Texas College to play basketball. Western Texas made it to the National Junior College Tournament that year, finishing in seventh place.

After one year at Western Texas, Harris transferred to Ranger Junior College so she could play both basketball and softball.

It was at Ranger that she caught the eye of NLU head softball coach Rosemary

Hollaway. "Jackie was a great player in junior college and I knew that she would be an excellent addition to our program here at Northeast," Hollaway said.

Injuries and the loss of key players has caused Harris' first season at NLU to go from one with a bright outlook to one with a bleak ending. Four projected starters have all missed considerable playing time due to injuries.

"It's been disappointing and it's been frustrating, but you

can't let the younger players know that," Harris said. "There are a lot of young people on this team getting some valuable experience."

NLU has posted a 20-33 record this season, which isn't very impressive. But NLU won only 19 games last year and still has 13 more games to play this year.

Harris is already looking forward to her second season at NLU.

"We will definitely be better next year," Harris said.
