The Hope Explained: Rapture and Revelation, Let's proceed to the study of prophetic signs. There are two aspects or stages in the process of the Seconf Coming and both begin with the Letter "R". The first phase is designated as the Rapture and second phase as the Revelation. Revelation 4 describes phase one and Revelation 19 describes phase two. The intervening chapters basically covers a seven year period described as the Tribulation, The Rapture, Chapter 4, precedes the Tribulation, judgements of Chapters 6-18 and the Revelation Chapter 19 follows the seven year judgement.

ment of medium to large-scale commercial plants that are already in the serious planning stages, Texas could have upwards of 200 million gallons of annual capacity online within 18 months to two years, Stenholm explained.

"Both projects have the full support of the entire Texas Congressional Delegation, he said, "with all members joining me in expressing our support to Secretary of Energy Charles Duncan this past week.

"Judging from inquiries to my office regarding the two proposals and from unofficial remarks by sources within DOE, approval of both plans seems very likely," he continued. "If so, this would be a tremendous opportunity for the state of Texas to become a leader in the Southwest and the rest of the nation in the development of alternative energy sources."

It is conducted in an effort to insure that no one is overlooked. If a family is missed in the address checks and doesn't send in a "WERE YOU COUNTED?" form, they"ll be" missing

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Medicare **Premiums**

Effective July 1980, the basic monthly premium for Medical Insurance (Part B of Medicare) will increase from \$8.70 per month to \$9.60 per month. The increase in premium is due to an increase in physician fees, an increase in services provided, and an increase in the use and cost of outpatient hospital services. The premium paid by medicare beneficiaries is less than one-third of the cost. The federal government pays over two-thirds of the total premium cost for medical insurance.

Medical insurance helps pay for doctor's services, out patient hospital services, and other medical services not covered by Medicare Hospital Insurance (Part A).

There was also an increase effective January 1, 1980 in the Medicare Hospital Insurance deductible from \$160.00 to \$180.00 for the first 60 days of a hospital stay. This increase was also due to an increase in hospital costs. The deductible of \$180.00 is about the average cost of one day in the hospital.
