began serving in January of 1979. When the new congressmen organized their group, Charlie was elected secretary and continues to gain respect and prestige among his colleagues. We predict that he will emerge as a true leader in the Congress.

Charlie's voting record in the first session of the 96th Congress reflects the conservation structure of the 17th District very well. He insists that deficit spending is a prime cause for inflation and votes consistently for measures aimed at balancing the budget. He is for a strong defense. He has worked long and hard to help infirm members of Congress from other areas that the oil and gas industry must be free from government control to encourage domestic production, that agriculture producers must have a fair shake, and the business community of the United States be loosed from the shackles of government red tape.

Serving on the Agriculture committee and also on the Small Business committee affords the opportunity for Charlie to directly serve the people of this area most effectively. There are 12,000 farms and some 8,000 small businesses in the congressional district and these form the economic backbone of West Texas.

Agriculture and Small Business were the two committees Congressman Stenholm sought at the very beginning. On Agriculture, he serves on the following sub committees: Livestock and Grains; Cotton, Oilseeds and Rice which included peanuts; and Dairy and Poultry.

There are 24 agricultural congressional districts in the entire United States. With 435 members of the House of Represent-

tatives, these 24 men from agricultural areas have a gigantic task to educate and persuade.

Two of the top milk producing counties in Texas are in the 17th Congressional District. Three of the five top peanut producing counties are also represented by Charles Stenholm.

The "STRABRITES" will provide entertainment in the afternoon. Plans are also being made for several baseball games during the afternoon.

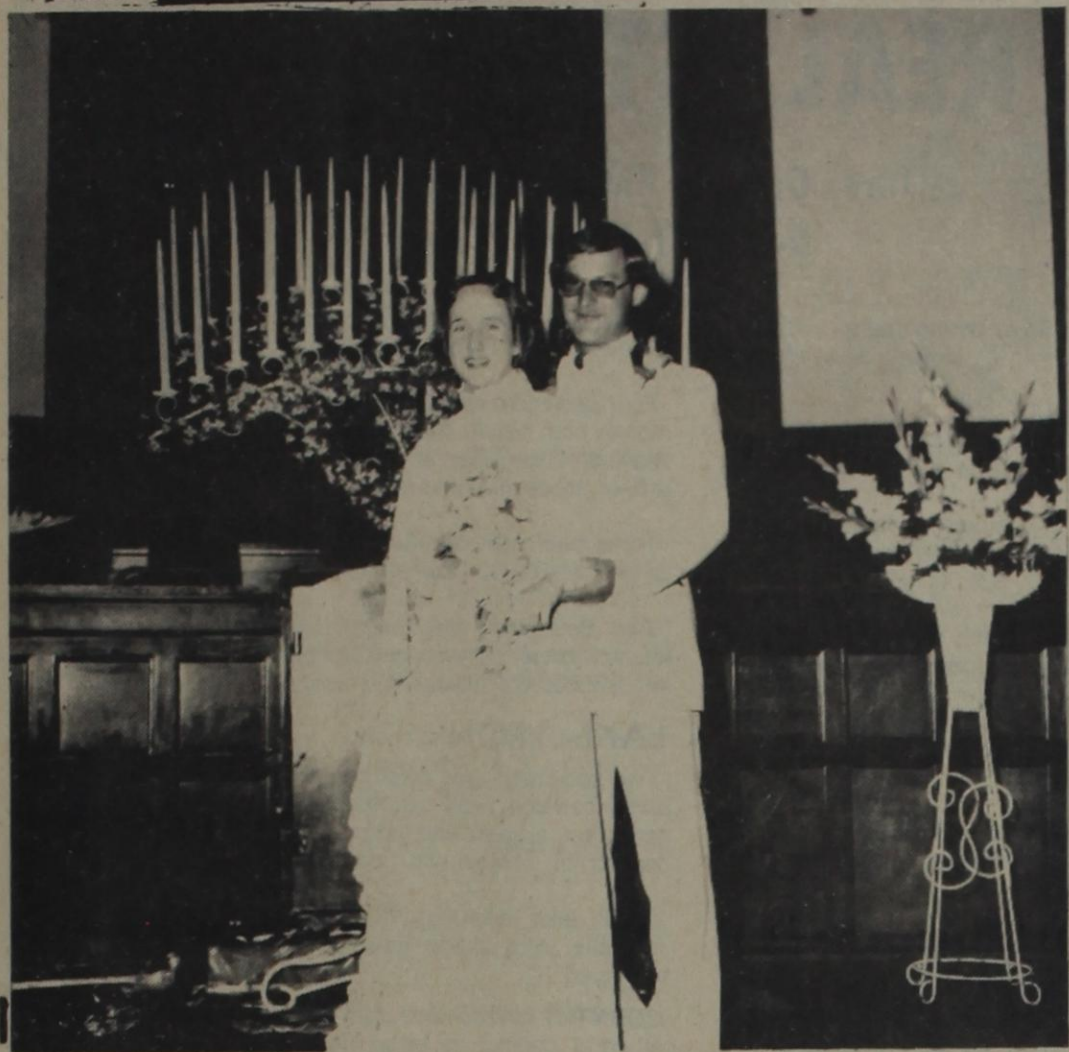

Stan Bonner of Cisco was best man. Donnie Epperson of Breckenridge and Dean Harrison of Ranger were

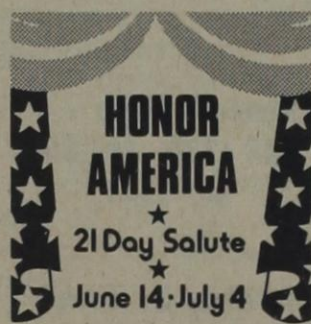
groomsmen. Kirby Guthrie of Cisco, brother of the bride and James Lee brother of the groom were ushers.

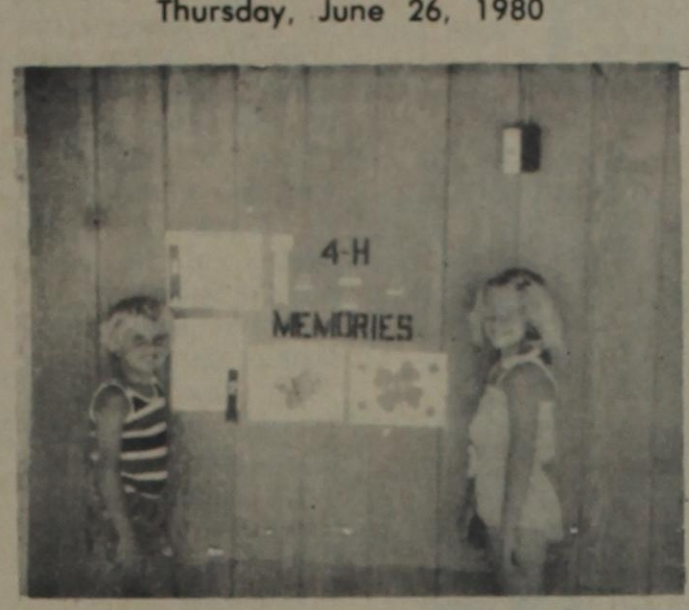
The youngsters had several ribbons placed on their entries as they were displayed in the Courthouse lobby June

WHAT SAITH THE SCRIPTURES?
Jon N. Bailey
QUESTION: How is a person "born again"?
ANSWER: A person is

born again through faith and obedience. Every one who believes in Jesus Christ is given the right to be born again and become a child of God (John 1:12-13). The New Testament teaches us what we must do and how we must do it to be "born

again" into the family of God.

To be "born again" a man must believe and obey God's word. Christians have "purified" their souls "in obeying the truth" (1 Peter 1:22). In doing so they are "born again, not of corruptible seed, but of incorruptible, by the word of God" (1 Peter 1:22-23). The word of God is the

seed through which men are born again (James 1:18; 1 Cor. 4:15; Luke 8:11).

To be "born again" is to be "born of the water and the Spirit". Jesus said, "Except a man be born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God...Except a man be born of water and the Spirit, he cannot enter into the kingdom of God" (John 3:3,5). One

who has received and believed the word of God must then be born of water and the Spirit. This occurs when one is baptized into Jesus Christ. In this act of faith and obedience, the believer has his sins forgiven (Acts 2:38) and washed away (Acts 22:16). He is saved (Mark 16:16; 1 Peter 3:21) and added to the Lord's church (Acts 2:47). From bap-

tism, the believer is raised "through faith in the working of God" (Col. 2:12) to begin walking "in newness of life (Rom. 6:4).

True faith causes one to be born again in baptism. Paul wrote "For ye are all sons of God through faith in Christ Jesus. For as many of you as were baptized into Christ did put on Christ" (Gal. 3:26-27). One who has been baptized into Christ is "a new creature" (2 Cor. 5:17), saved from sin "through the washing of regeneration (rebirth, being born again), and renewing of the Holy Spirit" (Titus 3:5). It is in this way one who believes in Jesus is "born again... of the water and the Spirit".

COMMENTARY

The Hope Explained: Rapture and Revelation, Let's proceed to the study of prophetic signs. There are two aspects or stages in the process of the Second Coming and both begin with the Letter "R". The first phase is designated as the Rapture and second phase as the Revelation. Revelation 4 describes phase one and Revelation 19 describes phase two. The intervening chapters (6-18) basically covers a seven year period described as the Tribulation, The Rapture, Chapter 4, precedes the Tribulation, judgements of Chapters 6-18 and the Revelation Chapter 19 follows the seven year judgement.

Thursday, June 26, 1980

Chapter 4 is a meeting in the air and chapter 19 a return to the earth. Chapter 4 removes the believer from the judgements described in Chapters 6-18, and chapter 19 restores the believer to his earthly sojourn as he returns with Christ to planet Earth. The "come up hither" of Revelation 4:1, is synonymous with the call of I Thessalonians 4:16; "For the Lord Himself shall descend from Heaven with a shout, with the voice of the archangel, and with the trump of God: and the dead in Christ shall rise first: Then we which are alive and remain shall be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air: and so shall we ever be with the Lord.

"Immediately after this event, the seven years of incomparable judgement follows and then Revelation 19:11-16 occur"—And I saw Heaven opened, and behold a white horse: and he that sat upon him was called Faithful and True, and in righteousness He doth judge and make war. His eyes were as a flame of fire, and on His head were many crowns; and He had a name written, that no man knew, but He Himself. And He was clothed with aesture dipped in blood; and His name is called The Word of God.

Alcohol Fuels Industry Moves Closer To Commercial Production In Texas

Two proposals which could move the alcohol fuels industry in Texas closer to commercial production have been submitted to the Department of Energy, according to Congressman Charles W. Stenholm, and early indications point to Administration support for the plans.

The first proposal would create alcohol fuels institute at Texas Tech University which would establish a regional technical support center for the southwest.

The proposed institute is designed to expedite an immediate support need on a relatively short-term basis, Stenholm said. "It would function both as a coordinator of research, development, demonstration and development of the various process technologies and as a center where actual research work in production and end-use of alcohol fuels could be carried out," he continued.

"This would be done without any significant increase of federal employment," he said, "through the utilization of existing university personnel and other technical persons. Most importantly, no new funding would be necessary for the start-up and longer range portions (three to four years) of this plan."

The second plan calls for a concentrated effort to capitalize on Texas' vast resources for establishing Texas as a national leader in the development of commercial production.

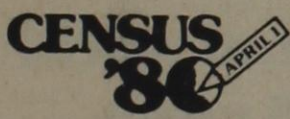

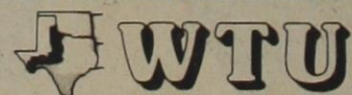
