newsletter tells parents what their child is capable of doing. It tells why the child does what he does (like banging the spoon), and what's he's learning while

he's doing it. The way the newsletter does this is a unique subscription system based on the child's age. If a child is one month old, for example, the parents get the newsletter that tells all about the growth and development of onemonth-olds. The next month they receive the issue that tells about

two-month-olds. "The age-graded factor is what makes Growing Child so useful," says Dennis Dunn, Growing Child publisher. "Parents often don'y have time to wade through a big book just to find one paragraph about their question or problem. When they read Growing Child every month, it talks about a typical child the exact age of their own," he said.

Nancy Kleckner, managing editor of Growing Child, is quick to point out that 'typical' covers a wide range in children.

"Some children do some things early, and other things later," she says. When Growing Child says 'typical', it means that 50% of all children that age have begun to do something. Each parent must observe the individual child and let the child go at his or her own

pace," she said. Nancy Kleckner, managing editor of Growing Child, is quick to point out that "typical" covers a wide range in children.

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The reason Growing

Child points out "typical" behavior is that many problems can be remedied more effectively if they are detected early.

Mr. Dunn, for instance, knows the importance of early childhood development from personal ex-

perience. As a child, he had problems in school. Like many people, he learned to compensate.

But when Mr. Dunn's young son developed similar problems in school, the family sought help from the Achievement Center for Children at Purdue University

lafayette, Indiana. The child develop ment professionals at the center gave the boy a special remedial training program to fill gaps in his early learning experiences. He went on to become a successful university student.

Mr. Dunn was impressed by research findings that many common learning disabilities could be prevented with the right early periences. "I decided that I wanted to help other parents and other children avoid the problems my family had by telling them about child develop-

ment," he recalls. He suggested to the professionals who had helped his son that they write a series of articles outlining the development patterns common to all children. That was the beginning of Growing Child.

The writers are all specialists in children. Their theories are based on real-life observation and experience.

One of them is a practicing optometrist who specializes in visual and perceptual learning disabilities. Another is an internationally known expert on childrens' motor development. Two others ar husband and wife team who are developmental psychologists, speech pathologist and specializing in special children-the gifted, and those with learning disabilities, mental retardidation, emotional disturbance, and speech and hearing

problems.

Another of the writers is a disabilities therapist who develops special educational programs in the schools for children with learning problems. One is a practicing pediatrician who is concerned primarily with the communication of health information to parents. The staff also includes a

a counseling and guidance professional. Altogether, it took the writers and editors eight years to complete 72 monthly installments, and they are constantly updating the newsletters to reflect new research findinds.

A second newsletter, called Growing parent, accompanies each issue of Growing Child. "Growing parent" is written to help parents know themselves, understand others, and just cope with the dayto-day realities of being a parent," Ms. Kleckner said.

# **Homemaking Hints**

Quilts are very popular in home decorating and use. The older quilts that are antiques need special care.

Here are some special hints on the care of quilts:

BLEACHING - If the quilt has some discoloration, it may need to be bleached. Use an oxygen bleach, not a chlorine bleach. Add the quilt to the solution. Remove the quilt when desired or after several hours. Rinse thoroughly to remove any residue.

STAINS - The washing and bleaching procedures remove most stains. However, there may still be some remaining that may or may not be removed.

RUST - Rust stains

can usually be removed by treating the area with an oxalic acid (available at drug stores) solution. Mix 1 oz. oxalic acid crystals with 5 oz. water. Stir until dissolved. Apply the solution to dry fabric. Can leave overnight if needed. Rinse all of the solution out as residue can weaken the fabric. Rust may also be removed by using citric and tartaric acid or commercial

rust removers. MILDEW - If the mildew is fresh, put a 3% peroxide on the stain. Put it in the sun for a short period of time. If the mildew is old, use a paste of powdered chalk and lay it in the sun. Don't leave it longer than needed as the sun deteriorates quilts. (May want to cover the area not being treated).

cleaning the quilt, carefully squeeze out as much water as possible. Gently lift it out of the tub. Support it as evenly as possible. Don't put it up by one end as its weight can break stitches or tear fabric.

Lay the quilt on clean towels or a clean mattress pad. Use other towels or pads to press more moisture from the quilt. You shouldn't machine dry good quality quilts. Spread the quilt on a clean sheet in a warm, dry place with good air circulation. This can be outside under a carport or in the shade. Don't hang the quilt on a single clothesline as it won't be supported and may sag and tear. You might hang it on three or four parallel clothesline. Don't put the quilt in the sun. Sunlight fades colors and increases fiber decay. Increase drying by using a hand hair dryer or an electric

CONTAINERS -Quilts should not be in direct contact with wood or wood products. Wood is acidic and acid destroys cotton and linen. Store quilts in unbleached muslin or a cotton pillow case that has

been washed several times. The guilt can also be wrapped in acid-free tissue paper. If the wrapping is in contact with wood, remember to wash the fabric or change the paper about twice a year. Avoid plastic bags as they hold moisture and increase the change for mildew to form. If a plastic bag is used, leave an open end. Quilts need a constant source of fresh air.

FOLDING - Over the years, quilts can weaken along fold lines. It is best to roll them on cardboard (cover with muslin or acid-free paper) or plastic pipe. However, if this isn't possible lossely fold it. Put crumpled acid-free tissue paper between the folds so the quilt doesn't crease. Air and refold the quilt every few months.

LOCATION - Store quilts in a clean, dark place away from sunlight. Light causes fading and fabric deterioration. It should have a stable temperature of 60 - 70 degrees and be well ventilated with a humidity of about 50%. Thus, avoid hot attics and damp basements. Heat accelerates the deterioration of cotton and linen. Dry heat causes all fibers to become dry and brittle. Mold and mildew form when the humidity is high. When the temperature and humidity fluctuate, fibers expand and contract causing unnecessary stress to a

quilt. INSECTS - This shouldn't be a problem DRYING - After if quilts are properly stored. However, if there is a possibility of moths damaging a quilt, put some moth balls in a fabric bag in the storage area.

**Munching Peanut Brit-**

1 cup peanuts 1 cup sugar ½ cup white corn syrup

1/8 teaspoon salt 1 teaspoon butter or margarine

1 teaspoon vanilla

1 teaspoon soda

Stir together peanuts, sugar, syrup and salt in a 11/2 quart casserole. Place in microwave and cook 7-8 minutes, stirring well after 4 minutes. Add butter margarine and vanilla and stir well. Return to oven and cook additional 1-2 minutes. Peanuts will be lightly browned and syrup very hot. Add baking soda and gently stir until light and foamy. Pour mixture onto lightly greased baking

Queens and peasants, alike, began to quilt; queens to decorate their palaces and peasants for comfort. Clouting or applique was the only kind of quilting known in Europe for several centuries.

Pilgrims The brought their precious quilts to America in 1620. Soon the hard use given them in the cold winter of their arrival, wore them out.

Tax Loopholes President Reagan would do the nation a favor, and raise billions in needed revenues, by proposing to end

tax loopholes not addressed in the 1981 law lowering personal income taxes.

The reason these loopholes were not addressed last vear is that it would have cost supporters of the new law votes needed for passage. A bill aimed only at tax loopholes might find the necessary support in Congress--if Reagan makes clear to the American people the choice and publicizes his efforts sufficiently.

Mr. Reagan, in a separate effort, should also send legislation to the Hill which would change the present system of semi-annual cost-of-living hikes to employees and other federal check recipients to annual adjustments (Economists have estimated this would save \$20 billion and slow inflation.

This proposal, also, is sure to find opposition in Congress. But the president should make the fight, even if he doesn't succeed this year, and again in 1983 if necessary. There is also an unchecked growth in many federal entitlement programs. This too should be brought under control.

These changes, plus perhaps new taxes, would do much to prevent huge budget deficits being predicted, and strangely enough, being accepted by Mr. Reagan. If he doesn't reduce them, he isn't likely to be reelected in 1984.

# Doctor

The thyroid gland, an integral and foremost member of the endocrine system, continues to be the topic of our discussions. Abnormalities, such as too much thyroid activity, too little thyroid activity, and the formation of goiters, have been generally talked about in the last few articles. We still need to bring up one or two remaining thyroid disorders; i.e., thyroiditis (or inflammation of the gland) and tumors.

Today, we'd like to present a general discussion of thyroiditis. Unlike hyperthyroidism, which is caused by too much thyroid hormone production--or hypothyroidism, i.e., too little hormone production, thyroiditis occurs in its most common form as subacute granulomatous thyroiditis, and it's caused by a virus. (There are some other forms of thyroiditis-rare, infrequent, and caused by more complicated phenomena.)

Viral thyroiditis in itself is not very frequently seen in the family physician's office, but it is a thyroid disorder, and we'll discuss it a bit.

Thyroiditis is often caused by the mumps virus and the coxsackie virus (common cold) as a complication of those diseases. Pain in the neck, especially in front, with radiation to the jaws, shoulders, and upper chest is present. The thyroid gland is usually enlarged, firm, and exquisitely tender. Fever is usually present.

Laboratory tests are difficult to assess, and interpretation of lab studies requires much biotechnical

As with all viral infections, antibiotic treatment is usually unsuccessful. The recommended therapy for thyroiditis is aspirin, sometimes cortisone, rest, and patience. After a few weeks there is usually full recovery.




