## GROWING CHILD

What does an infant really see?  
How does a child learn to walk? Feed himself?  
Is the child who keeps banging a spoon against a pan purposefully trying to drive her parents crazy?  
There is a newsletter for parents that answers questions like these. It's called Growing Child, and it tells about the physical and cognitive development of children during their first six years.

It would tell the parents of the child banging the spoon on the pan, for example, that what the child is really doing is learning about cause and effect. She's learning that something she does (moving her arm up and down) causes something else to happen (noise). She's delighted at her discovery, so she does it over and over to make sure it works. The parent who understands that is much more likely to be able to tolerate the noise with some measure of good humor.

Each issue of the

newsletter tells parents what their child is capable of doing. It tells why the child does what he does (like banging the spoon), and what's he's learning while he's doing it.

The way the newsletter does this is a unique subscription system based on the child's age. If a child is one month old, for example, the parents get the newsletter that tells all about the growth and development of one-month-olds. The next month they receive the issue that tells about two-month-olds.

"The age-graded factor is what makes Growing Child so useful," says Dennis Dunn, Growing Child publisher. "Parents often don't have time to wade through a big book just to find one paragraph about their question or problem. When they read Growing Child every month, it talks about a typical child the exact age of their own," he said.

Nancy Kleckner, managing editor of Growing Child, is quick to point out that "typical" covers a wide range in children.

"Some children do some things early, and other things later," she says. When Growing Child says "typical," it means that 50% of all children that age have begun to do something. Each parent must observe the individual child and let the child go at his or her own pace," she said.

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The reason Growing

Child points out "typical" behavior is that many problems can be remedied more effectively if they are detected early.

Mr. Dunn, for instance, knows the importance of early childhood development from personal experience. As a child, he had problems in school. Like many people, he learned to compensate.

But when Mr. Dunn's young son developed similar problems in school, the family sought help from the Achievement Center for Children at Purdue University in Lafayette, Indiana.

The child development professionals at the center gave the boy a special remedial training program to fill gaps in his early learning experiences. He went on to become a successful university student.

Mr. Dunn was impressed by research findings that many common learning disabilities could be prevented with the right early experiences. "I decided that I wanted to help other parents and other children avoid the problems my family had by telling them about child development," he recalls.

He suggested to the professionals who had helped his son that they write a series of articles outlining the development patterns common to all children. That was the beginning of Growing Child.

The writers are all specialists in children. Their theories are based on real-life observation and experience.

One of them is a practicing optometrist who specializes in visual and perceptual learning disabilities. Another is an internationally known expert on children's motor development. Two others are husband and wife team who are developmental psychologists.

speech pathologist and specializing in special children--the gifted, and those with learning disabilities, mental retardation, emotional disturbance, and speech and hearing problems.

Another of the writers is a disabilities therapist who develops special educational programs in the schools for children with learning problems. One is a practicing pediatrician who is concerned primarily with the communication of health information to parents. The staff also includes a counseling and guidance professional. Altogether, it took the writers and editors eight years to complete 72 monthly installments, and they are constantly updating the newsletters to reflect new research findings.

A second newsletter, called Growing parent, accompanies each issue of Growing Child. "Growing parent" is written to help parents know themselves, understand others, and just cope with the day-to-day realities of being a parent," Ms. Kleckner said.

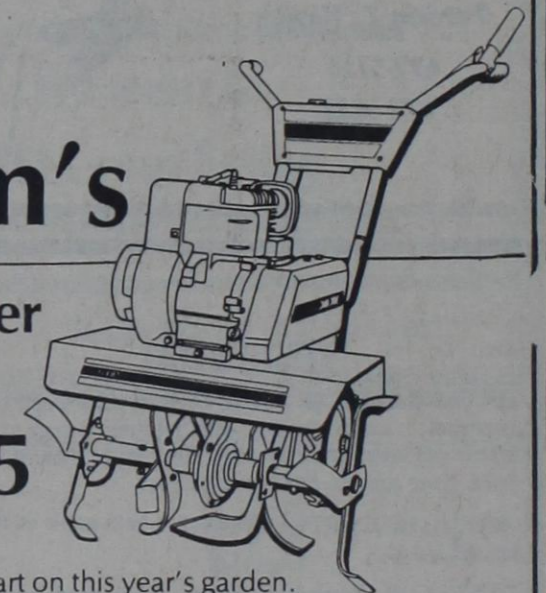

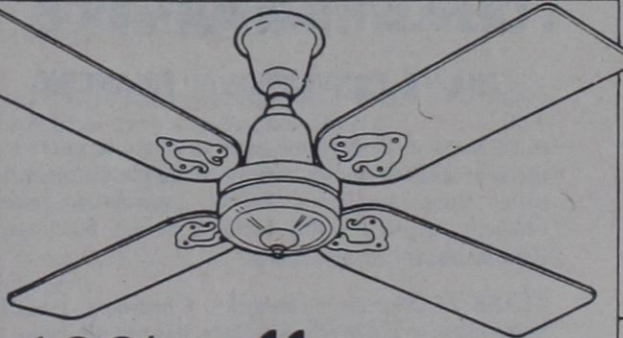

## COUNTY OIL REPORT

A 4,800-ft. wildcat is planned by RAW Energy Corp. of Weatherford at a drillsite 11 miles southeast of Brad, Palo Pinto County. The location is in a 103-acre lease in

the George Freighen Survey. Well's designation is the No. 1 Priddy. It is the N. Branson Field.

An Abilene-based operator

has staked location for the No. 1 Adilena Houston, a wildcat to be located two miles south of Palo Pinto. With projected total depth of 4,500 feet, the well is in a 103-acre lease in Palo Pinto County's T&PRR Co. Survey. The operator is Vermillion Resources Inc.

Clarion Resources of Denver, Colo. has filed first production figures on a new gas well in the Liberty Oaks Field. The No. 11 Caraway-Lowe showed potential to make 380,000 CF per day on a 1 1/2-inch choke. Absolute open flow estimated at 420,000 CF.

The operator has 172 acres leased, with drillsite in Erath County's M. Hagwood Survey, ten miles northwest of Morgan Mills.

The well will produce from an interval 3,531 to 3,636 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depth was 4,592 feet.

Coy Bargley, independent operator from Ranger, has filed for permit to drill the No. 1 C.A. Brown, a 4,150-ft. wildcat for oil or gas located seven miles northwest of Ranger. Drillsite will be in a 160-acre lease in the Texas and Pacific Railroad Survey.

The No. 24C Coalson, a 4,500-ft. wildcat venture, is scheduled for spudding eight miles north of Gordon by Lariat Oil and Gas Inc. of Mineral Wells. Location will be in a 519-acre lease block, with drillsite in the G. Stewart Survey, Palo Pinto County.

Location has been staked by Abilene-based Sun Exploration for a developmental try in the Stephens County Regular Field, one mile east of Caddo. The same operator has filed for permit to drill another wildcat for oil 12 miles north of Breckenridge. It will be known as the No. 1 McGaha, located in a 362-acre lease in Stephens County's Ben J. McGaha Survey. Total permitted depth will be 4,600 feet.

Also planning a Stephens County wildcat is C.B. Hazel Inc. of Ranger. This venture will be designated as the No. 1 Ruby Lee Davis, with drillsite in a 320-acre lease in

Stephens County's TE&L Survey. The well is under permit for 5,000 feet of hole-making.

Sun Exploration of Abilene has staked drillsites for two developmental wells in the Stephens County Regular Field, both located three miles north of Breckenridge. The wells will be known as the No. 118 and No. 119 J.M. Ward "C." The well will be spudded in a 5,058-acre lease assembly in the TE&L Survey. Both carry permit for 3,500-ft. total depth.

An Eastland operator, Ball Producing, has revealed plans to drill two developmental wells in Stephens County's Ball (Conglomerate) Field, 11 miles north of Breckenridge. The No. 1 Merritt will be spudded in a 215-acre lease in Stephens County's W.T. Malone Survey, while the No. 1 Stuard is slated for drilling in a 40-acre unit, Malone Survey. Total projected drilling depths for both wells is 4,600 feet.

choke, the No. 1 Lillie Belle Thompson "A" has been completed four miles northwest of Eolian in Stephens County's Lillie Belle Field.

The new producer showed absolute open flow potential of 520,000 CF. Enre Corp. of San Antonio is the operator.

The well was drilled to 4,546-ft. bottomhole and will produce from a perforated interval 4,087 to 4,089 feet into the hole. It is located in a 320-acre lease in the T&PRR Survey.

The No. 2 Martin Stuard has been successfully completed in the Stephens County Regular Field, five miles south of the town of Caddo, by J.E. Conner of Breckenridge.

It showed potential to make 30 barrels of oil and 35,000 CF casinghead gas daily, pumping open choke. It is located in a 90 acre lease in the T&PRR Survey.

Bottomed at 3,705 feet, the well was perforated to produce 3,308 to 3,320 feet into the wellbore.

Also in the Stephens County Regular Field, Conner has completed the No. 2 Martin Stuard, indicating the same rates of daily potential. Drillsite is in a 5,677-acre lease block, T&PRR Survey, 5.5 miles southeast of Breckenridge.

The well went to 3,531-ft. total depth and will produce from an interval of perforations 3,242 to 3,281 feet into the hole.

Pumping 34 barrels of crude per day, open choke, the No. 113 J.M. Ward "C" has been finished in the Stephens County Regular Field by Sun Exploration of Abilene.

The well will produce from Caddo Formation perforations 3,119 to 3,145 feet, with bottomhole at 3,280 feet. Location is in a 5,058-acre with lease assembly, TE&L Survey, 2.5 miles north of Breckenridge.

Breckenridge-based Shaw Petroleum Inc., has posted first production figures for two new oilers in the Northwest Ranger Field.

Shaw's No. 4 Harnes "C" pumped 25 barrels of oil per day, open choke from a production interval of 3,520 to 3,545 feet into the hole. Total depth was 4,000 feet. Location is in a 40-acre unit in Stephens County's Salvador Flores Survey, four miles northwest of Ranger.

The No. 1 Boney indicated capacity for five barrels of oil per day, pumping open

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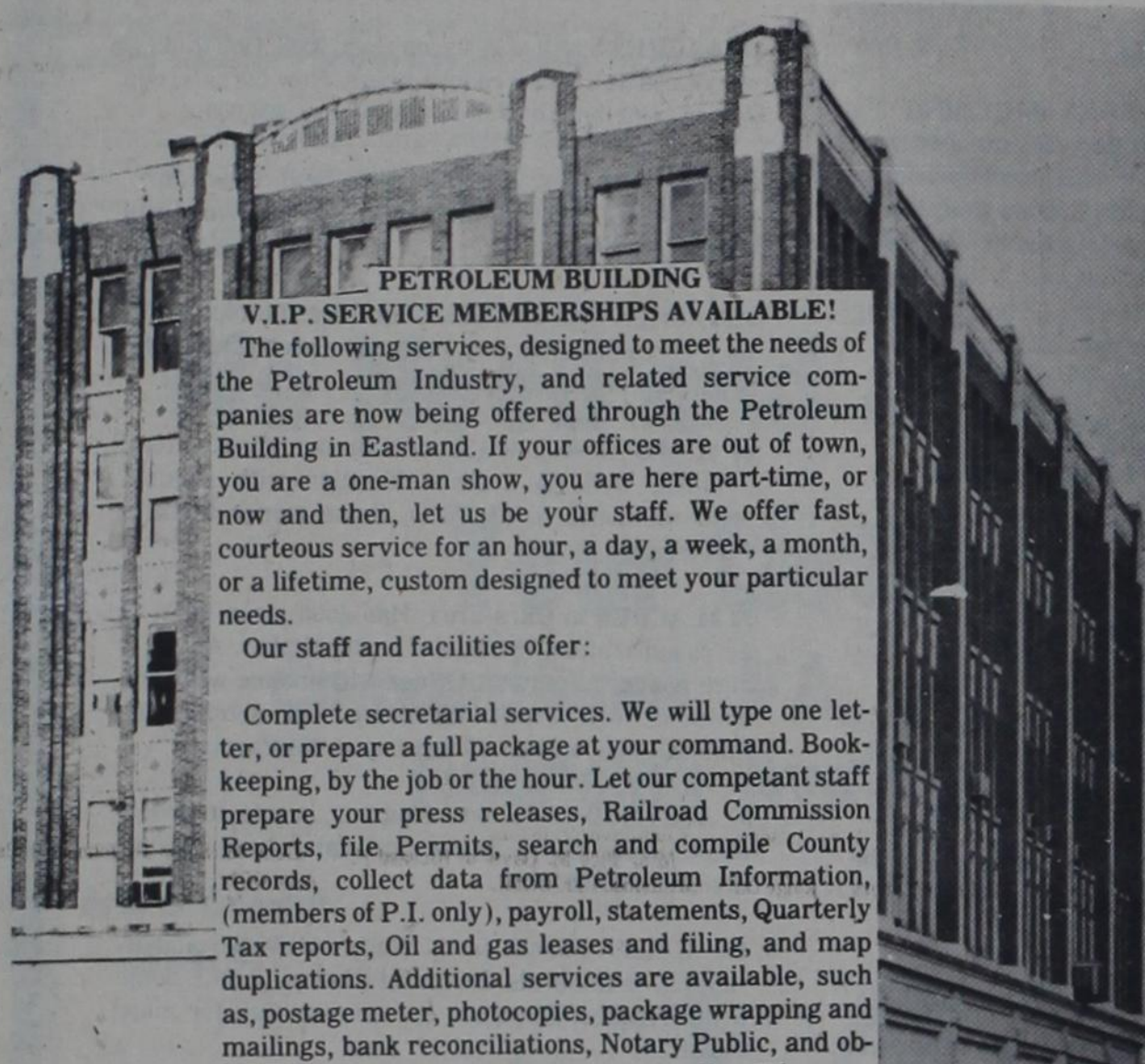
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choke. It is in a 77-acre lease in the T&NORR Survey, six miles north of Ranger. Shaw took the well to 3,800-ft. bottomhole and perforated for production 3,560 to 3,600 feet.

Flowing 143,000 CF natural gas per day on a 12/64 choke, a new producer has been finalized in Stephens County's Lillie Belle Field by Enre Corp. of San Antonio.

Absolute open flow rating came in at 1,000,000 CFD. Located in a 960-acre lease, T&PRR Survey, four miles northwest of Eolian, the well was taken to 4,427-ft. bottomhole. It will produce

from a perforated interval 4,073 to 4,087 feet.

The new gasser is designated as the No. 7 Lillie Belle Thompson.

The same San Antonio firm has completed a marginally successful gas well in the Lillie Belle Field four miles northwest of Eolian. It will be known as the No. 8 Lillie Belle, with indicated potential of 93,000 CF gas per day on an 8/64 choke. Absolute open flow was computed at 1,000,000 CFD.

Location is in a 960-acre lease, T&PRR Survey. The well bottomed at 4,421 feet and will produce from

an interval 4,062 to 4,027 feet into the hole.

Dearing Inc. of Dallas has brought a new pumping oiler on line in Stephens County's Jackson (Strawn) Field, six miles north of Ranger. Dearing's No. 3 Joe Jackson pumped at the rate of seven barrels of crude per day.

It bottomed at 1,800 feet and will produce from an interval of perforations 1,725 to 1,735 feet in the Strawn Formation. Drillsite was in a 160-acre unit, T&PRR Survey.

Lyles Energy Inc., Eastland, will drill two proposed 1,900-foot wildcats one mile south of Carbon in Eastland County.

Each site is located on an 80-acre lease.

No. 2 Wright spots 517 feet from the north and 660 feet from the west lines of Section 34, Block 2, H&TC Survey.

It will be drilled as a south twin to No. 1 Wright, a dry hole.

No. 3 Wright is located 2,310 feet from the north and 330 feet from the west lines of the same section.

A wildcat will be drilled one-half-mile south of Olden as Three Way Energy Inc., Arlington, No. 1 Harbin.

The planned 4,000-foot test is located on a 62-acre lease. Drillsite is 4,489 feet from the south and 330 feet from the west lines of S.J. Robinson Survey, A-423.

M.H.W. Inc., Dallas, spotted No. 7-B Choate as a proposed 300-foot wildcat 12 miles north of Cisco.

Location is on a 50-acre lease, spotting 1,360 feet from the north and 1,913 feet from the west lines of Section 466, SP Survey.

Site is 50 feet west of No. 6-B Choate, completed in the Duffery at 3,908 feet.

Thomas C. Melton, Brownwood, No. 1-A Jamie Barton will be drilled in the regular field one mile southeast of Pioneer.

Having a proposed depth of 2,650 feet, it spots 1,800 feet from the south and 1,345 feet from the east lines of Section, Block 2, ETRR Survey.

The lease is composed of 80 acres.

B&W Exploration, Gorman, filed application to drill No. 1 Faye Kiavagna in the Desdemona Field four miles northeast of Gorman. The planned 3,500-foot ven-

ture is located on a 72-acre lease.

It spots 2,238 feet from the north and 3,071 feet from the east lines of Therese Tyler Survey 50, A-492.

Weatherford's A.E.C. Oil and Gas has filed first production data on a flowing oiler in the Reid-McLennan Field, seven miles north-northwest of Breckenridge.

Indicated daily potential was 46 barrels of crude and 35,000 CF casinghead gas on a 14/64 choke. Tubing pressure came in at 135 PSI.

Located in an 80-acre unit in Stephens County's TE&L Survey, the well is designated as the No. 1 Ball. It was drilled to 4,430-ft. bottom and was perforated to produce from an interval 4,351 to 4,358 feet.

The new gas wells have been completed in Parker County's Southwest Poolville Field by Usemco Inc. of Dallas. They are in the same 295-acre lease, four miles southwest of the Poolville townsite.


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

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## Glenn Hubbards Win Awards

Glen and Merle Hubbard were recognized as the outstanding farm family in the Eastland area by the Eastland Chamber of Commerce at the Golden Deeds Awards Banquet Thursday night.

The Hubbards live at 801 West Moss Street in Eastland. Their ranching operation is composed of 3,200 acres of ranch land and a herd of 150 to 175 registered Angus cattle. The main part of the ranch is the Grover Collins estate, 2,600 acres located southeast of Eastland. They own 600 acres of land near Rising Star. Merle is a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Grover Collins.

The Hubbards have done an exceptional job of soil conservation, range land improvement and improvement of cattle through performance testing and selective breeding.

Some 22 years ago they began operation of the Collins ranch. At that time the ranch was infested with brush and was overgrazed to the point that it would support only 100 head of cattle. Now, after controlling undesirable brush, establishing improved

and native grasses, building more cross fences and constructing water ponds, the ranch will support up to 200 head of cattle and have plenty of grass left for drought years. Because of his work in improving the ranch Glen was named the outstanding Conservationist of zone 5 by the Upper Leon Soil and Water Conservation District in 1977.

The Hubbards cattle herd is recognized as one of the top Angus herds in the state. Glen initiated a gain performance test of Angus bulls in Texas. This has helped cattlemen over the state to select bulls that have faster, more efficient gaining ability. One year the Hubbards had the champion gain test bull in the state. This year they have seven young bulls in a gain performance test at Cook College in Gainesville. One of their bulls is leading the gain test at the present and six of the seven are in the top 1/2 of the test.

This weekend Glen will be installed as vice-president of the Texas Angus Association. This will lead to the office of president of the state association

ir. two years. He has served as president of the Leon Valley Angus Association for the last three years and is a director for the Mid-Tex Angus Association.

For 35 years Glen has been a soil conservation contractor working in a large part of Texas and New Mexico.

Merle is just as involved in the ranch work and management as is Glen. She does all the bookkeeping for both the ranch and the contractor business. Record keeping and paper work is one of the very important jobs of a registered cattle business.

Merle grew up on the ranch near Eastland and Glen is a native of Brown County. Merle taught school at Rising Star and at one time was assigned the job of coaching junior high boys football team. Under her coaching the team won the district championship.

The Hubbards have donated heifers to Tarleton University to help establish an Angus herd there and annually support youth in livestock shows and educational activities. They are members of the Methodist Church.

## Homemaking Hints

Quilts are very popular in home decorating and use. The older quilts that are antiques need special care.

Here are some special hints on the care of quilts:

**BLEACHING** - If the quilt has some discoloration, it may need to be bleached. Use an oxygen bleach, not a chlorine bleach. Add the quilt to the solution. Remove the quilt when desired or after several hours. Rinse thoroughly to remove any residue.

**STAINS** - The washing and bleaching procedures will remove most stains. However, there may still be some remaining that may or may not be removed.

**RUST** - Rust stains can usually be removed by treating the area with an oxalic acid (available at drug stores) solution. Mix 1 oz. oxalic acid crystals with 5 oz. water. Stir until dissolved. Apply the solution to dry fabric. Can leave overnight if needed. Rinse all of the solution out as residue can weaken the fabric. Rust may also be removed by using citric or tartaric acid or commercial rust removers.

**MILDEW** - If the mildew is fresh, put a 3% peroxide on the stain. Put it in the sun for a short period of time. If the mildew is old, use a paste of powdered chalk and lay it in the sun. Don't leave it longer than needed as the sun deteriorates quilts. (May want to cover the area not being treated).

**DRYING** - After cleaning the quilt, carefully squeeze out as much water as possible. Gently lift it out of the tub. Support it as evenly as possible. Don't put it up by one end as its weight can break stitches or tear fabric.

Lay the quilt on clean towels or a clean mattress pad. Use other towels or pads to press more moisture from the quilt. You shouldn't machine dry good quality quilts. Spread the quilt on a clean sheet in a warm, dry place with good air circulation. This can be outside under a carport or in the shade. Don't hang the quilt on a single clothesline as it won't be supported and may sag and tear. You might hang it on three or four parallel clotheslines. Don't put the quilt in the sun. Sunlight fades colors and increases fiber decay. Increase drying by using a hand hair dryer or an electric fan.

**CONTAINERS** - Quilts should not be in direct contact with wood or wood products. Wood is acidic and acid destroys cotton and linen. Store quilts in unbleached muslin or a cotton pillow case that has

been washed several times. The quilt can also be wrapped in acid-free tissue paper. If the wrapping is in contact with wood, remember to wash the fabric or change the paper about twice a year. Avoid plastic bags as they hold moisture and increase the change for mildew to form. If a plastic bag is used, leave an open end. Quilts need a constant source of fresh air.

**FOLDING** - Over the years, quilts can weaken along fold lines. It is best to roll them on cardboard (cover with muslin or acid-free paper) or plastic pipe. However, if this isn't possible loosely fold it. Put crumpled acid-free tissue paper between the folds so the quilt doesn't crease. Air and refold the quilt every few months.

**LOCATION** - Store quilts in a clean, dark place away from sunlight. Light causes fading and fabric deterioration. It should have a stable temperature of 60 - 70 degrees and be well ventilated with a humidity of about 50%. Thus, avoid hot attics and damp basements. Heat accelerates the deterioration of cotton and linen. Dry heat causes all fibers to become dry and brittle. Mold and mildew form when the humidity is high. When the temperature and humidity fluctuate, fibers expand and contract causing unnecessary stress to a quilt.

**INSECTS** - This shouldn't be a problem if quilts are properly stored. However, if there is a possibility of moths damaging a quilt, put some moth balls in a fabric bag in the storage area.

### RECIPE FOR THE WEEK

During the holidays, I enjoyed making peanut brittle in the microwave. The brittle is very good, and best of all, quickly made.

### Munching Peanut Brittle

- 1 cup peanuts
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup white corn syrup
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon butter or margarine
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 teaspoon soda

Stir together peanuts, sugar, syrup and salt in a 1 1/2 quart casserole. Place in microwave and cook 7-8 minutes, stirring well after 4 minutes. Add butter or margarine and vanilla and stir well. Return to oven and cook additional 1-2 minutes. Peanuts will be lightly browned and syrup very hot. Add baking soda and gently stir until light and foamy. Pour mixture onto lightly greased baking sheet. Allow to cool 1/2-1 hour.

Note: If roasted

salted peanuts are used, omit salt and add peanuts after first 4 minutes of cooking.

**SOME OBSERVATIONS OF YOUR CORRESPONDENT**

"Necessity is the mother of invention," once true but a little irrelevant at this point in time (Research has made would-be inventors out of many students and has almost superseded the emphasis on academics in some of our colleges).

Much interest is taken in the art of quilting, not so much because it is a necessity, as it was at one time, but because it has become an avocation.

The art spread over Europe by traders from China and by the return of the Crusaders from the Near East in the thirteenth and fourteenth centuries.

The Crusaders learned that to wear underwear made of two or three layers of material, they prevented the chafing caused by wearing their coats of mail.

European women profited by the idea and when the change in the Gulf Stream brought extremely cold winters warm clothing and bedding became a necessity. Queens and peasants, alike, began to quilt; queens to decorate their palaces and peasants for comfort. Clouting or applique was the only kind of quilting known in Europe for several centuries.

The Pilgrims brought their precious quilts to America in 1620. Soon the hard use given them in the cold winter of their arrival, wore them out.

So much can be said about the history of quilting in America. The varied display of quilts donated to the West Texas Rehabilitation Center

on the recent Telethon, is an example of the interest in quilt-making, but with all interest shown, quilt-making may be a dying art.

only for the younger women to become interested can the art survive. If this generation of young women would become interested much self gratification can result--along with their journals, diaries, or autobiographies, the highlights of ones life can be sewed into quilt blocks. These blocks can be made into wall hangings, pictures, murals or quilts; thus pursuing an art and making a contribution to the arts in the future.

Later, I intend to comment on "learning to Quilt."

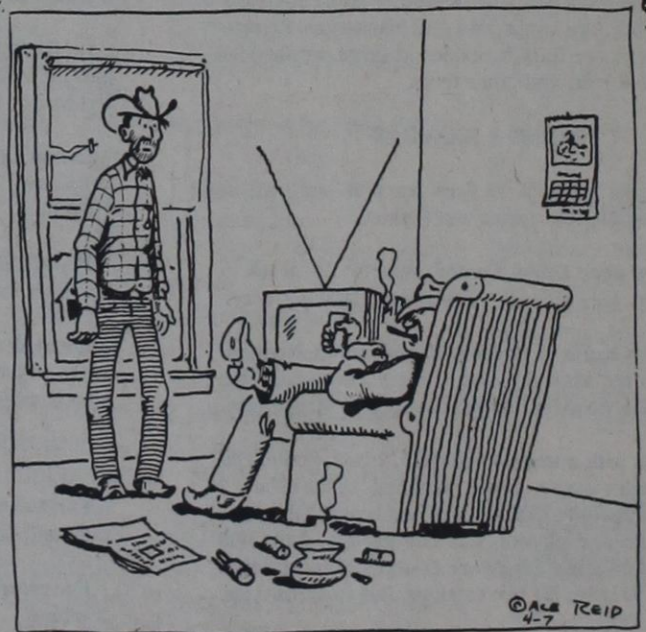

### Tax Loopholes

President Reagan would do the nation a favor, and raise billions in needed revenues, by proposing to end tax loopholes not addressed in the 1981 law lowering personal income taxes.

The reason these loopholes were not addressed last year is that it would have cost supporters of the new law votes needed for passage. A bill aimed only at tax loopholes might find the necessary support in Congress--if Reagan makes clear to the American people the choice and publicizes his efforts sufficiently.

Mr. Reagan, in a separate effort, should also send legislation to the Hill which would change the present system of semi-annual cost-of-living hikes to employees and other federal check recipients to annual adjustments (Economists have estimated this would save \$20 billion and slow inflation).

This proposal, also, is sure to find opposition in Congress. But the president should make the fight, even if he doesn't succeed this year, and again in 1983 if necessary. There is also an unchecked growth in many federal entitlement programs. This too should be brought under control.

These changes, plus perhaps new taxes, would do much to prevent huge budget deficits being predicted, and strangely enough, being accepted by Mr. Reagan. If he doesn't reduce them, he isn't likely to be reelected in 1984.

## Doctor Talk

The thyroid gland, an integral and foremost member of the endocrine system, continues to be the topic of our discussions. Abnormalities, such as too much thyroid activity, too little thyroid activity, and the formation of goiters, have been generally talked about in the last few articles. We still need to bring up one or two remaining thyroid disorders; i.e., thyroiditis (or inflammation of the gland) and tumors.

Today, we'd like to present a general discussion of thyroiditis. Unlike hyperthyroidism, which is caused by too much thyroid hormone production--or hypothyroidism, i.e., too little hormone production, thyroiditis occurs in its most common form as subacute granulomatous thyroiditis, and it's caused by a virus. (There are some other forms of thyroiditis--rare, infrequent, and caused by more complicated phenomena.)

Viral thyroiditis in itself is not very frequently seen in the family physician's office, but it is a thyroid disorder, and we'll discuss it a bit.

Thyroiditis is often caused by the mumps virus and the coxsackie virus (common cold) as a complication of those diseases. Pain in the neck, especially in front, with radiation to the jaws, shoulders, and upper chest is present. The thyroid gland is usually enlarged, firm, and exquisitely tender. Fever is usually present.

Laboratory tests are difficult to assess, and interpretation of lab studies requires much biotechnical skill.

As with all viral infections, antibiotic treatment is usually unsuccessful. The recommended therapy for thyroiditis is aspirin, sometimes cortisone, rest, and patience. After a few weeks there is usually full recovery.

## PARENTHOOD GUIDEBOOK

**By Nancy Moore Thurmond** (author, *Mother's Medicine, Pub. by Wm. Morrow, N.Y.*)

**APPETITE AND WEIGHT LOSS:** A healthy baby has a vigorous sucking reflex. One of the first indications that he may not feel well is a loss of appetite and lack of interest in sucking the bottle or breast.

As a general rule, healthy babies gain around one and a half pounds per month from birth to age six months, at which time the weight gain begins to taper off. Weight loss or failure to gain weight usually means a serious medical problem may be in the making.

**OVERWEIGHT BABIES:** Chubby, roly-poly babies may be cute to look at and a picture of health, but they often have underlying medical problems.

Flabby, fat, listless babies may be overfed and in need of a change in diet. Obesity can be caused by an all-milk diet, if the baby is old enough to be eating solids.

**COUGHING AND BREATHING DIFFICULTY:** If your baby coughs persistently, appears to be having trouble breathing, wheezes, is gasping for breath, or is breathing at an unusually rapid rate, report it immediately.

A good way to test his breathing is to watch his chest. If it heaves and appears to retract with each breath, and his nose flares, your infant may have an infection or allergy in his lungs or throat which needs prompt medical attention. An expiratory grunt with respiration may mean pneumonia.

## RECIPE

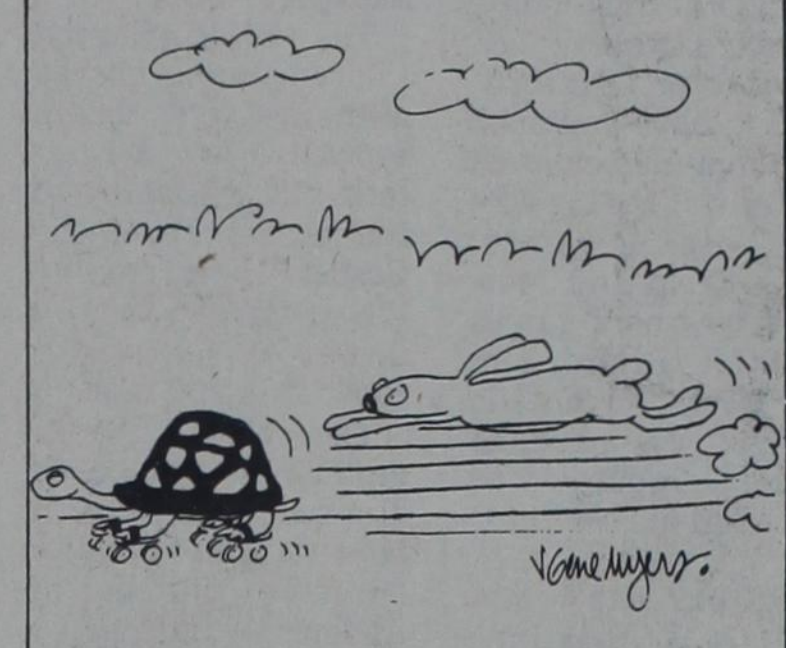

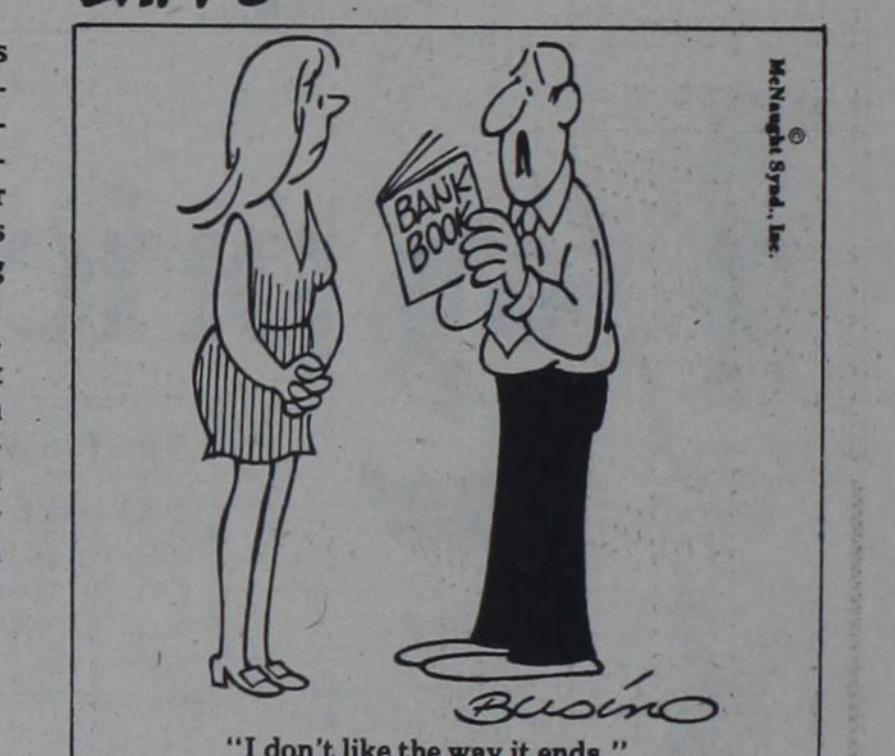
