PETROLEUM MULCH AIDS PLANT GROWTH-Three years of research and testing have demonstrated that a new petroleum mulch technique can, under responsible climatic conditions, vastly increase agricultural output and crop values. Above, a researcher examines at the right soybean plants grown with the inexpensively and easily applied petroleum mulch. Their development is greater than that of the soybeans at left, planted at the same time without mulch. 


