But when one has waited a lifetime for a miracle, a few weeks can be a time of joy. Like watching a bud form and grow - one knows the flower is there and the antidpation of it is often as thrilling as the reality.

Margie went to Mayo's at the urging of her friend and neighbor, Mrs. Dena Semeniuk, who became well acquainted with the Mayo Clinic during the tragic illness of her late husband. Mrs. Semeniuk went with her and stayed with her during her hospitalization.

Mrs. West actually underwent two seperate operations at once. Ordinarily, when both feet of the patient are involved, as in her case, the operations are performed consecutively. But her physical condition was so good that both her operations were done at once, teams of surgeons working simultaneouly, one on each foot.

The surgeons wondered why she had not had the work done long ago. "You are never sure; you keep putting it off; the right time just doesn't seem to come."

Fortunately, she has a lot of time left to enjoy her new feet, and a lot of people are just as happy as she is.
