After the conference, Elder ice in South America and Cuba. commend that the hospital commission of the church send its medical secretary to make a complete survey of the situation, the hospital potential, the cost of putting the hospital into operation under a lease arangement with the local board, the number of doctors needed, etc. Upon the result of this survey would depend a decision on whether or not to take over the operation of the institution, he said.

The Adventists maintain more than 400 hospitals and dispensaries throughout the world, about 45 of them in the United States. In Texas at present they operate hospitals at Beeville, San Marcos, Menard and Santa Anna and are considering a number of other locations to which they have been invited, Elder Dart said.

They also maintain a large medical college in California from which come many doctors to staff hospitals in their connection.

The Santa Anna Hospital is an outstanding example of the success of the denomination in er some ten years ago it has been built into an outstanding example of medical efficiency and service to a small community, with its capacity far exceeded by patient demand. It has a staff of two doctors and a third is being added. If the hospital commission of the conference elects to take over the local institution, it will be staffed with adequate medical, administrative and operating personnel, and it will be operated to meet Medicare standards, the Rising Star men were assured.

But they don't have major league ball yet-not quite They do have the finest home for a minor league club you could imagine. All they need a team for is to advertise it. Forty-six thousand people -and a few thousand whites -streamed into the big bubble Sunday afternoon to see the Astros take a 14-3 licking from the Los Angeles Dodgers.

A person would have to be a very bitter Astro fan not to concede a certain granduer in the scenery of defeat. But I am inclined to agree with James Rutherford that anybody able to spend \$35 millions or so on a house could afford to spend a few millions for something to put in it.



The Rising Star Hospital was closed on July 1, coincident with the effective date of Medicare, but Dr. C. B. Wright still maintains a clinic in the building.


