## May Eighth Grade Honor Students Are Named



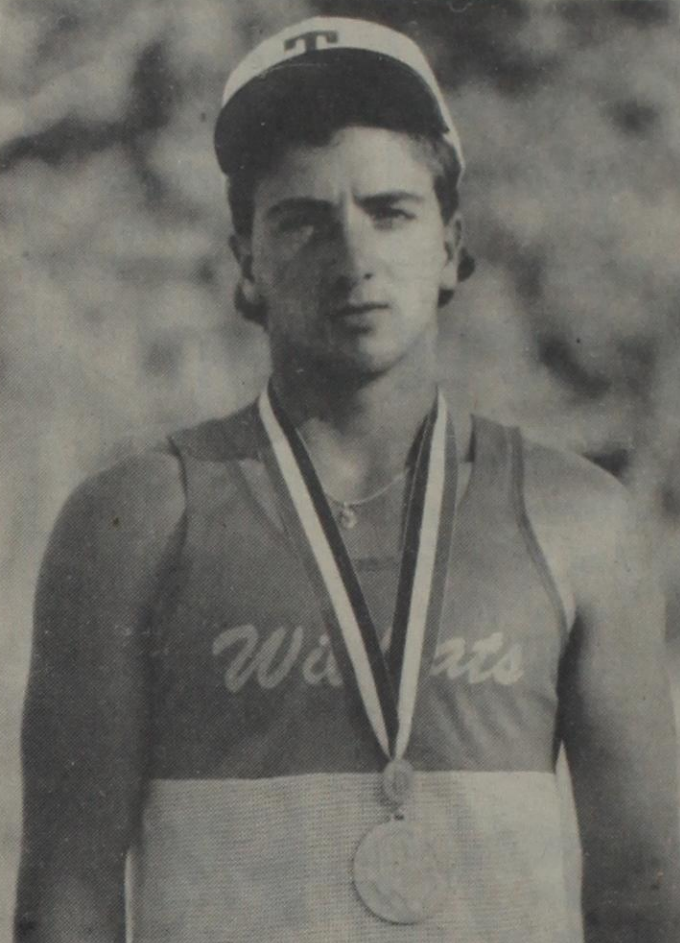
**Traci Hopper, Valedictorian**

## David White Is Class A State Pole Vault Champ

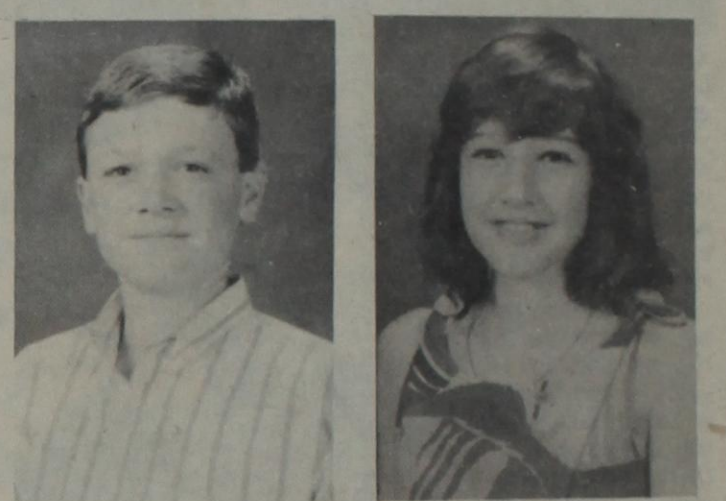
David White, a senior in Rising Star High School, won the Class A pole vault in state track meet at Austin last Friday.  
The win came after a jump-off between David and Janson Corcoran of Follett. Both had cleared 14-0 then missed all three attempts at 14-6, resulting in a tie for first place. Neither had missed at lower heights and a jump-off was the next tiebreaker.  
With one jump at each height, both missed 14-6, 14-3 and 14-0. David's clearing 13-9 while Corcoran missed gave the Rising Star Wildcat his gold medal.  
David had worked hard to improve his pole vaulting this season. He was third place in state last year and is very happy with the state championship.  
In reaching the top in pole vault, David worked at it all four years in high school. He was pole vault District champ three years and Regional Qualifier three years and was second in Regional before winning third place in State last year.  
He was also long jump District champion his junior and senior years and the 400 meter relay team he ran with was Regional Qualifier last year.  
Track is not the only sport at which David works to excel. He was listed in the 1987 District 8-A All-District Team in football in both offense and defense. He was the unanimous choice for Most Valuable Player in 1st Team Offense and was named to the 1st Team Defense as defensive back. He was also Class A All-State 1st Team Offense punter.  
In four years of high school football, David was named All-District defensive back the last three of those years.

## Tax Rebate

AUSTIN - State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$120.7 million to 1,041 cities and 81 counties that levy local option sales taxes.  
"The economy of Texas is recovering," Bullock said, "and the consumer confidence is reflected in the rebates going to local governments."  
May's checks represent taxes collected by monthly filers in March and quarterly filers for the first quarter that were reported to the Comptroller's office by April 21.  
Rising Star received a payment this period of \$2,513.42 as compared to a payment of \$2,596.12 received for this period in 1987 making a percent change of -3.19%. The 1988 payments to date for Rising Star total \$8,055.47 as compared to \$8,746.69 received to this date in 1987 making the change to date -7.90%.

During his high school years, Lance's activities included football and track.

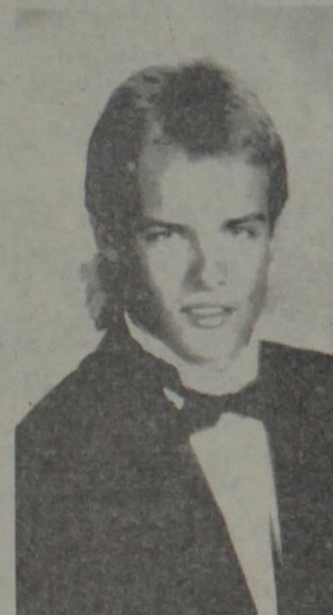
His plans for the future are to attend McMurry College in Abilene where he will major in physical education and minor in history.

Chad's future plans are partially formed at this time. He hasn't decided whether he will attend Cisco Junior College in Cisco or Universal Technical Institute in Houston.



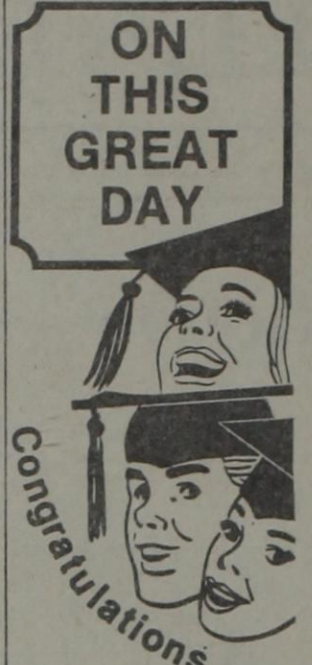

### Understanding Your State Government/The Sunset Process

Texas has a law which forces State government to systematically evaluate its activities and provides a means by which inefficient and ineffective State agencies may be abolished, unless re-created by the Texas Legislature. This program was established by the Texas Sunset Act, which went into effect in August, 1977. Since the inception of this Act, the Texas Legislature has continued 104 agencies, abolished 20 agencies, abolished an additional 5 agencies and transferred their functions, combined 6 agencies, and separated 2 agencies.

One provision of this legislation was the formation of the Sunset Advisory Commission, consisting of 10 members: 4 Senators and 1 public member appointed by the Lt. Governor and 4 Representatives and 1 public member appointed by the Speaker of the House. The Commission members serve four year terms.

It is the responsibility of the Sunset Advisory Commission to review State agencies, including evaluations of all agency programs, and present a final report of its findings and recommendations to the Texas Legislature for its consideration and action.

In 1985, the Legislature established an additional process to review proposed regulatory agencies and advisory committees. This is known as Sunrise. This program requires the Commission to review legislation proposing a new State agency and commission and to send a written response to the author of a bill and the

chairman of the committee hearing the bill during the legislative process. During the most recent Legislative Session in 1987, the Sunset Commission reviewed ten bills that were introduced proposing new regulatory agencies or advisory committees. Only one of the ten bills was passed by the Legislature, and it was vetoed by the Governor.

Of the 20 agencies considered under Sunset in 1987, two agencies were not re-created. Projected net revenue gain due to changes made through Sunset legislation in 1987 is \$62.4 million over the next five years.

The most recent Commission meeting was held on March 24th. Staff reports and public testimony were given on five agencies; alternatives were suggested regarding allocation of research funds directly to the universities as part of the appropriations process; and a 9 member ad-hoc committee was named to study the Medicaid lien provision, which was a part of the sunset review bill in 1987 for the Department of Human Services. This ad-hoc committee held a public hearing on April 28th. (I am one of the Texas Senators who endorses legislation being introduced in the next Legislative Session to repeal this provision, which would allow liens to be placed on homesteads of deceased nursing home residents who received Medicaid.)

There are 30 agencies under review for the next session of the Texas Legislature, which will convene in January, 1989. Among those being studied are the Texas Department of

Agriculture, the Texas Education Agency, the State Board of Education, the State Property Tax Board and the Texas Guaranteed Student Loan Corporation.

The next meeting of the Commission will be on May 12, 1988, beginning at 10 a.m. in the Senate Chamber of the State Capitol. Future proposed hearing dates are June 30 and July 1, 1988. ## USDA Issues Peanut Poundage Interim Rule On Quotas For 1988-89

WASHINGTON--The U.S. Department of Agriculture today requested public comment on an interim rule on poundage quotas for the 1988 to 1990 crops of peanuts.

The following are the most significant changes made by the interim rule:

-In a state where large quantities of quota pounds are in reserve, the State

season, may make a fall quota transfer to another farm if ASCS determine that the farmer made a good faith effort to plant the full quota.

-Fall quota transfer rules have been relaxed for determining the number of pounds a farmer may receive under a fall transfer. The maximum number of pounds eligible to be received will equal the differences between the sum of the farm's ungraded and unmarketed pounds of peanuts of all segregation plus the pounds of unmarketed but segregation one peanuts, and the quota pounds remaining on the farmer's marketing card.

Directors of foundation seed organizations will be permitted to certify that breeder and foundation seeds have been grown for experimental purposes and will not be used for domestic edible use.

The main reason for this is a lack of funds to support the operation of equipment. The current rural fire protection is provided by one rural fire truck that carries 1,100 gallons of water. This covers an area of approx. 100 square miles of range, pasture, farm land, homes and barns. Money to buy, build and maintain this equipment is provided by the city of Eastland. The County of Eastland provides a subsidy to each city in the county of \$200 per month. This amount continues to be less and less adequate. At the present time there is no taxation at a county level that supports rural fire protection. Donations can be made to the Eastland Volunteer Fire Department, 414 S. Seaman St., Eastland, 76448.

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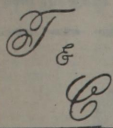
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# Guest Slot

JULY 5TH, 1988 marks the 125th anniversary of the first wedding in Eastland County. On that date in 1863, Miss Sara Jane Blair became the bride of Berry Moore (Coon) Keith at Blair's Fort. It's documented, and will be detailed in the forthcoming Eastland County History Book by descendants of that union.

AND FURTHER, the Eastland County Historic Society is doing preliminary thinking about the possibility of a dramatic presentation and re-creation of that historic event, as a part of the continuing display of this county's exciting history. If developed, it would be similar in presentation to the 1986 recreation of the black bean event which told the story of Capt. Eastland, for whom the county and city are named.

It is initially seen as a major production, perhaps on the stage of the Majestic Theatre, utilizing local talent, in an exciting, entertaining and historically-accurate re-creation of that event. Details are being developed, and descendants of the family have already shown enthusiasm for the effort, and indicated that they would love to take part in such an undertaking. Naturally, it would call for the participation and cooperation of many to be able to stage such an event.

ORIGINAL CONCEPT is envisioned by History Book Laborer Roy Lee Smith, who was struck by the story as he and others worked on the material for the history book. He sees it as an excellent way to vividly display an important part of

the county's history, as well as bring publicity and attention to the county book, which is nearing the production stage.

ALREADY EDITED are some 2,100 family history stories and these will go to the printers (Nelson Publishers) soon for typesetting.

Next phase for the book will be the critical General History section which will tell the complete county history. Under terms of the contract with the publishers, the book will earn a page for general history for each page sold for memorial and/or business section, and the participation in this portion is vital. Firms and individuals are urged to commit for a memorial page to bring attention to a special person(s), or to tell the history of a particular business or organization. Costs for the memorial/business pages are \$250.00 for a full page; \$175.00 for a half page; and \$100.00 for a quarter page.

And with each of these pages sold, the book will earn a free page for general history; so actually it's a two-for-one proposition. Persons interested in securing a page right now, may do so by contacting either Smith, Book Chairman, Ron Bailey or any of the others who are helping put the book together. The typing and preparations for the book are taking untold hours of local preparation, and when finished, the Eastland County History Book is seen as the biggest and best ever turned out—and well it should be.

## Gordon Spot

By DeMarquis Gordon, County Agent—

Fruit growers who were lucky enough to escape all frosts and freezes with no damage to the fruit, need to evaluate their crop at this time. Some trees do have an over abundance of fruit and they need to be thinned. Fruit such as peaches and plums should be evenly spaced on the tree with some 6 to 8 inches between fruit. Best results from thinning are obtained when fruit are thinned prior to pit hardening. Thinning after this point increases fruit size but the effect is not as dramatic. Prior to pit hardening, the fruit can easily be sliced into. Growers should check their crop and stage of fruit development and make thinning decisions accordingly. The earliest ripening varieties should be thinned first.

I know it is tough to take fruit off the trees when we have experienced freeze problems the past three years, but people still like large, pretty fruit and this can be accomplished by thinning the fruit.

Pecan casebearer spray time is fast approaching. Growers should start checking their trees for casebearer eggs on the tips

TIMES GOT TOUGHER for the newspaper in spite of helping it's town grow. In just 18 months, the price of newsprint increased 30 percent, and it cost 20 percent more just to mail the same newspaper. The newspaper faced the same higher taxes, increased minimum wages and all of the other new challenges to business as did everyone else. Just the cost of keeping its doors open increased to \$526 per day for every 2,500 circulation.

The newspaper was forced to reduce its staff a bit, along with some of its local coverage because the dollars just don't have the same reach as prior years.

THE TOWN STARTED LOSING its close kinship and upbeat manner. And its citizens became less interested in ideas for the future of a town in which they were losing contact . . . and information.

BUT THE NEWSPAPER (every newspaper) kept plugging along, attending countless local meetings and events. And its staff worked long hours to find ways to produce a better newspaper for the town, and to provide businesses with a valuable means of selling their goods and services, and informing readers about everything from government to fashions and foods.

TEXAS NEWSPAPERS are always plugging, because they enjoy exercising "Freedom of the Press." But please understand, this freedom doesn't come cheaply. It costs lots of dollars to keep it going. 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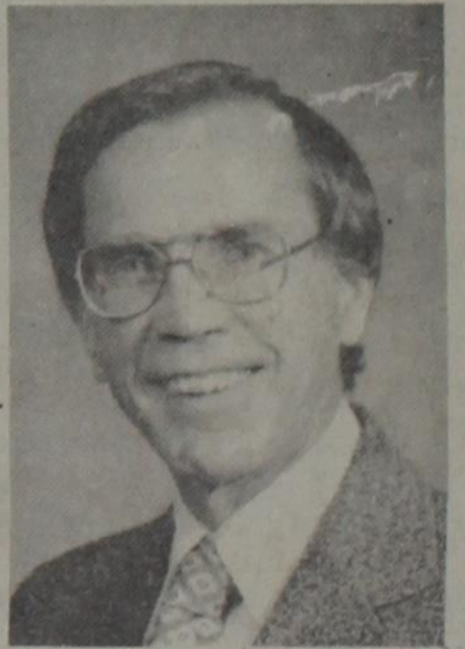
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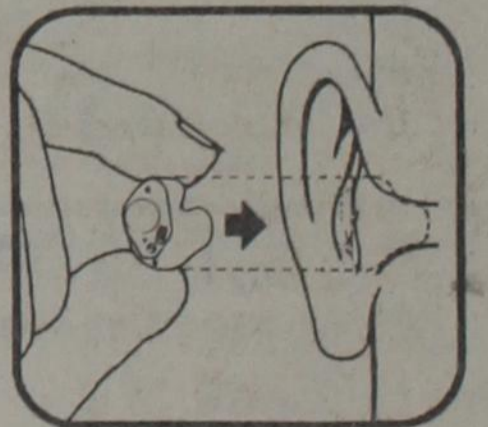

## Dispatch Board Discusses 911 System

A discussion of the 911 Emergency System for Eastland County occupied most of a lengthy County Dispatch Board meeting in the Courthouse last Wednesday, May 11.

Mike Moore, President of the Board, led out in the meeting. Moore is City Manager at Cisco.

Two representatives of Southwestern Bell Telephone Co explained about the Emergency System. An official of the West Central Texas Council of Governments also attended. Representatives from all cities in the County were present - Cisco, Eastland, Gorman, Ranger and Rising Star.

Among other matters, the Dispatch Board talked about the additional costs to the

cities of setting up the Emergency Service.

"It appears that those present were supportive of getting the 911 System," Mike Moore said. "I think we are looking at taking votes in respective cities within 60 days through required Resolutions."

Implementation of the Emergency System, however, is a lengthy process, Moore explained. He said he expected it would take at least two years before 911 could be operational.

Under this System, the County Dispatch would handle all calls for fire, police and ambulance services. The surcharge on telephone service would not exceed 50 cents monthly per access line.

There would be county equipment used in the installation and maintenance, Moore said. There might also be the cost of additional personell at the County Dispatch.

"It would be much easier to set up this System in Eastland County than some other places," Moore said. "Here we already have a unified, centralized Dispatch System. So members of the Board are optimistic about the acceptance of 911."

He went on to say that while the 911 Emergency Number System would benefit everyone in the County, two groups who would benefit most would be the elderly and the children.

Mike Moore indicated that he would be happy to speak
