Eastland County Commissioners discussed income and expenditures during a called meeting (budget workshop) Thursday, Aug. 11. L.T. Owens, Commissioner of Pct. 3, presided.

They requested that all Department heads reconsider their budgets, and return the sheets - whether revised or left the same - back to the County Auditor's office on Tuesday, Aug. 16.

These new budgets will be studied at another called

meeting on Thursday, Aug. 18, 9 a.m.

The Commissioners asked that these new budgets be left at the 1987-88 level, plus additional fixed costs on Social Security, Workman's Comp, and Insurance. There will be salary raise for anyone.

Even "holding the line" on expenditures to last year's level will not solve all the budget problems, Commissioners were told. Ray

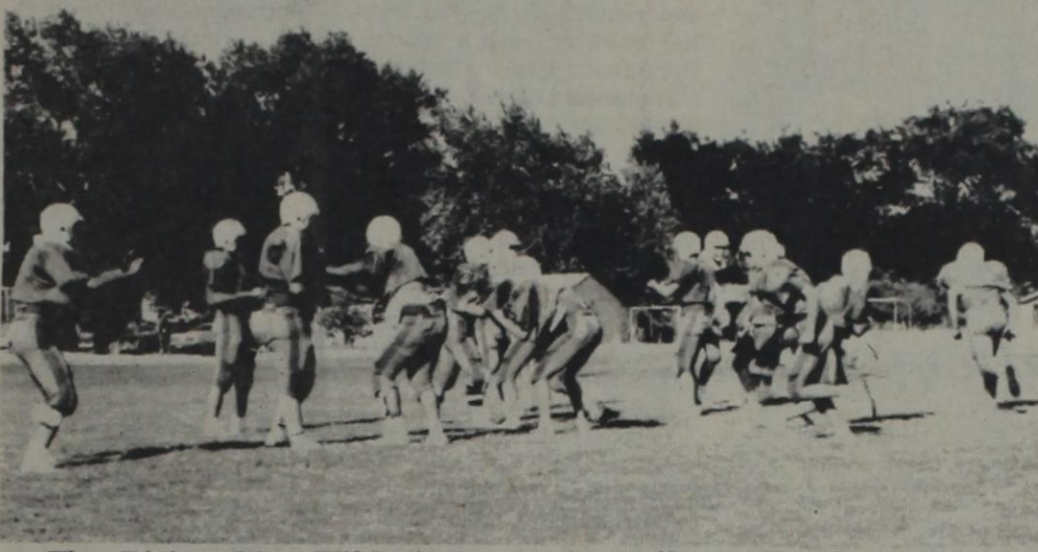

New Coaching Staff at School

The Rising Star I.S.D. announces a new coaching staff for the 1988-89 school year.

The athletic director and head coach is Nathan Allen, a Brownwood High School graduate who played quarterback for Angelo State University from 1979-1983 and spent five years coaching at Hereford, San Angelo, Rockport and Uvalde school systems. While compiling a 22-7 record as a J.V. coach in these class 4 A and 5 A school systems he was a varsity assistant with three district championships. Coach Allen will assume the responsibility for the Rising Star High School boys program.

RSISD Budget Hearing Monday

Rising Star Independent School District's Board of Trustees has set a budget hearing for August 22 at 8 p.m. at the board room in the school office on North Main Street. The board will consider the proposed 1988-89 budget, vote on adoption of the budget and set a tax rate.

The school administration has recommended the board adopt the proposed budget and lower the tax rate from \$1.38 to \$1.36 per \$100 valuation, announced Dr. Donald E. Bryan, superintendent. The proposed lower tax rate is expected to generate \$302,748 in local revenues.

Total revenues and expenditures are expected to be \$969,438 for the coming year. Revenue from the general operating fund is proposed to be \$783,871; this covers expenditures for general operations, \$654,386; band, \$6,790; transportation, \$19,517; lunchroom, \$42,941; cheerleaders, \$1,105; and athletics, \$32,632.

Other proposed revenues and expenditures include Chapter I, \$34,617; vocational, \$5,550; Chapter II, \$2,020; compensatory (SCE) \$37,974; and special education \$105,406. The amount for the mandatory sinking fund which services the school's debt is set at \$28,500.

Should any of the district's taxpayers have any questions about the budget, feel

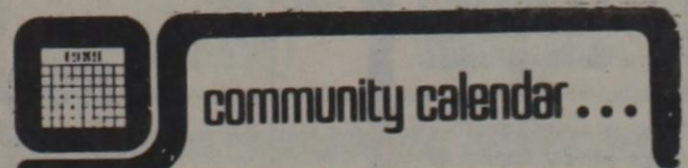

Fire Destroys Garage and Pickup, Damages House



FIRE DESTROYED the garage and damaged the home of J.R. and Edythe Morrow August 7.

Fire completely destroyed the garage and damaged the home of J.R. and Edythe Morrow August 7. Their car and pickup suffered some damage and a pickup belonging to their son, Bob Morrow, was burned in the blaze.

The Morrrows had delayed leaving for a family reunion until J.R. could get some hay out of a field and discovered the blaze about 11 a.m. when they were ready to go. J.R. had moved the family car out of the detached garage earlier to check the water in it and after seeing the smoke coming from the garage, he also moved his pickup out. The flames and heat scorched and melted places on the two vehicles and destroyed Bob's pickup which the men did not have a chance to move.

The apparent cause of the blaze was the deep freezer, located near to the house in the garage. The freezer was filled with a summer's worth of shelled blackeyed peas, snapped beans and other garden and orchard produce by Edythe. She added that she had recently taken advantage of sales and added meat and ice cream to the freezer.

Other items lost to the fire include yard and garden equipment, many antiques and farm equipment and seed. Several tall trees and some shrubs were burned or damaged.

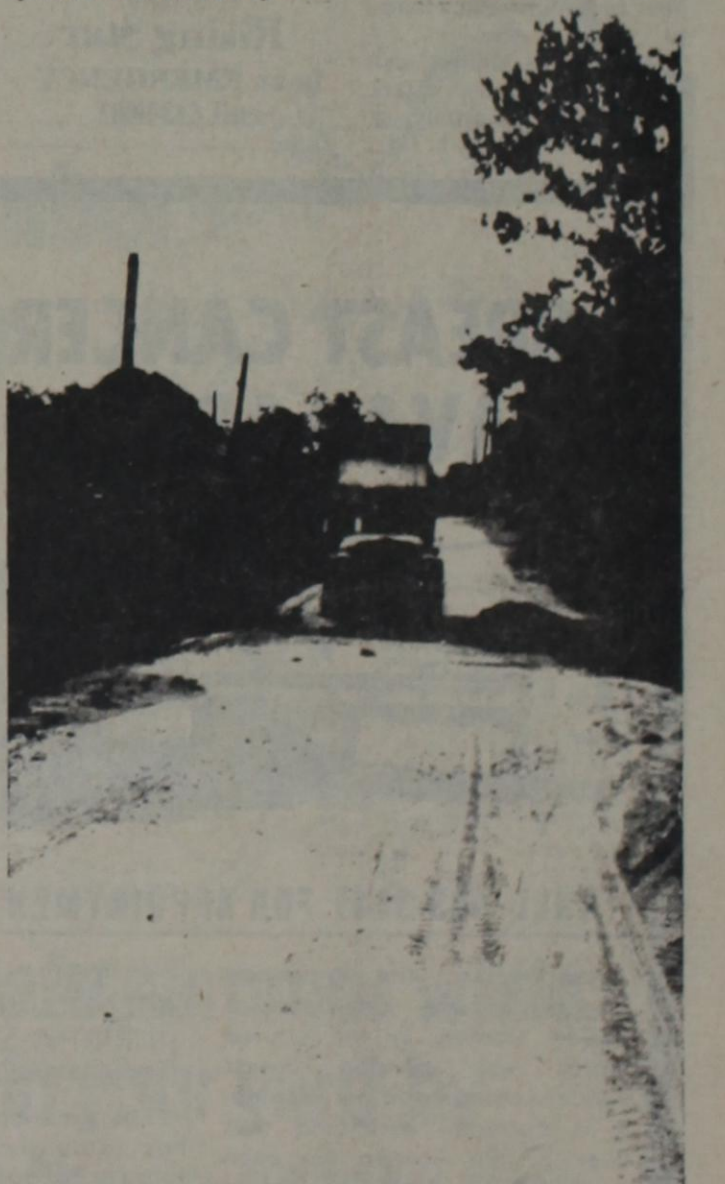
The Morrrows nevertheless state how lucky they were that the fire was contained before more damage was done to their home. The wall and roof near the garage were burned and debris was beginning to fall through the ceiling of the bathroom damaged by the fire.

The smell of smoke had been noticeable but they had trouble locating the source, the Morrrows said. They had searched throughout the house, not realizing the cause was in the garage where they could not see it.

Just as they located the fire, Mike Nall had spotted the smoke from Highway 36 and rode his motorcycle through the Morrow driveway to ascertain whether help was needed. He drove right on out and to the fire station where he sounded the alarm and waited several minutes for other firefighters to respond. When no one showed up immediately, he drove a fire truck to the scene. Later, Fred Rabe drove another truck and the Cross Plains Fire Department also responded.

When Buddy Cook saw the Morrow home threatened by fire, he helped J.R. find the city water line and hook up water hoses to spray the house to keep it from burning. The electricity to the Morrrows' water well was cut off soon after the blaze was discovered. Edythe Morrow raises miniature poodles and she was very grateful to those who helped move the dogs to safety. The heat from the burning garage could very well have killed the small dogs which were housed just several feet away.

The Morrrows said how much they appreciated the help of everyone in putting out the fire and saving their home. Just a little while longer and the house would have been involved beyond the ability of the fire trucks to put it out. To them, the losses they sustained paled in comparison to what they could have lost and, even though they mourned the loss of family antiques and the hard work lost in the once full freezer, the Morrrows repeated, "We're so thankful it wasn't worse."

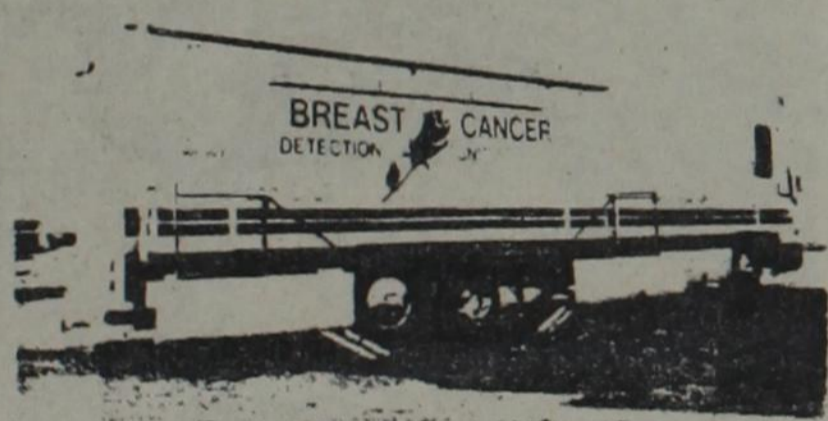

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of eleven women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt. APPOINTMENTS MAY BE MADE BY CALLING 643-3141.

THE MOBILE BREAST CANCER DETECTION UNIT WILL BE IN RISING STAR ON THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 8TH.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

- I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with

significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

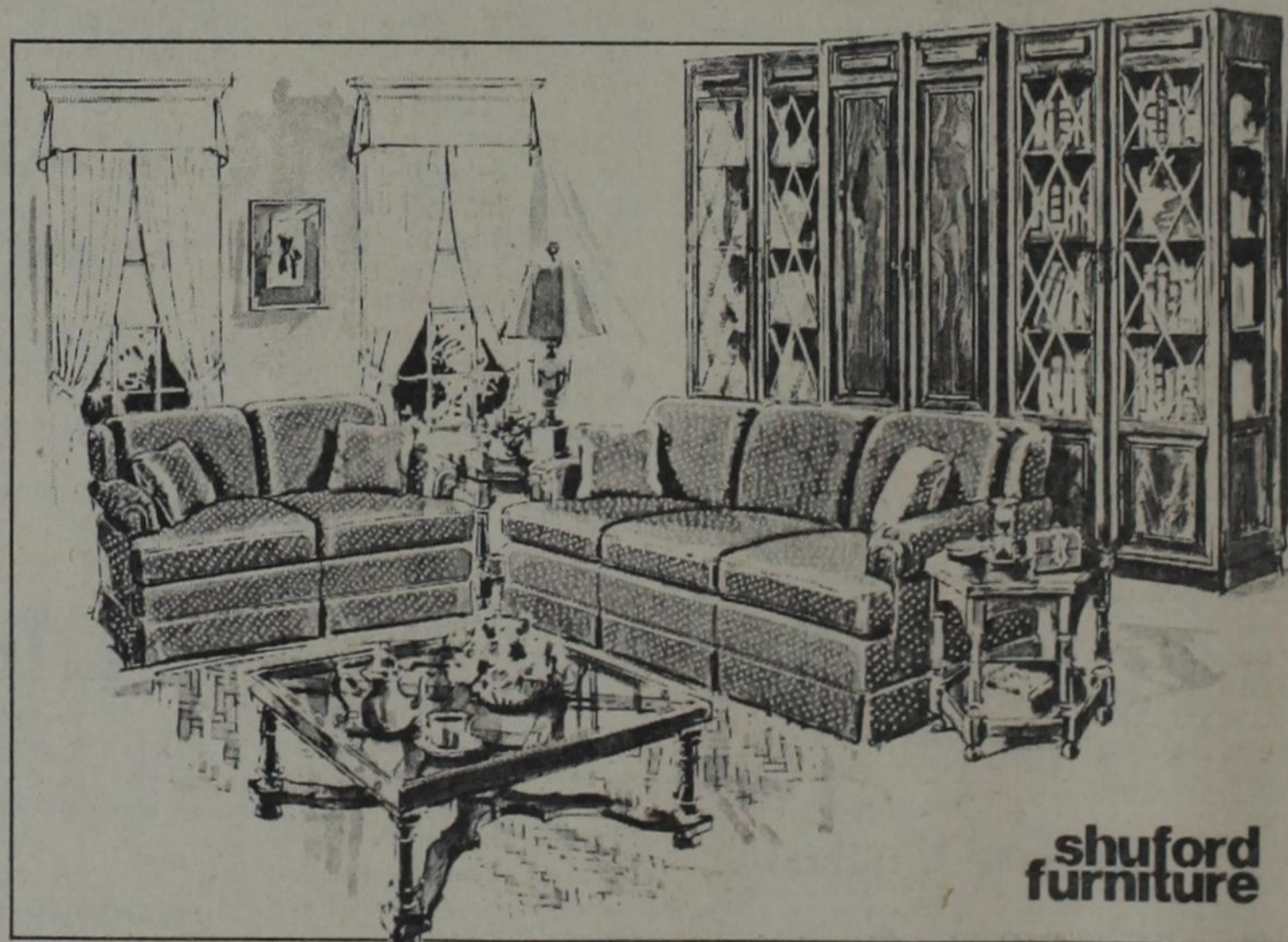
A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

Drought Extends Signup for CRP

Texas producers will have more time to consider effects of the drought because of extension of the current signup period for the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) through August 31.

This move by the U.S. Department of Agriculture should be a "plus" for producers who need more time to analyze the drought's impact, said Dr. B.L. Harris, soils specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The present signup period originally was to have ended August 5.

Harris said cropland which has been hayed in counties approved for drought relief is eligible during this signup for entry into CRP for the 1988 crop year, provided the land meets other program requirements," Harris said.

He said acreage designated as Acreage Conservation Reserve (ACR) and Conservation Use (CU) for the 1988 program year is not eligible for entry into the CRP for 1988.

Under this conservation program, producers receive annual payments to keep highly erodible land out of production and planted with a protective cover which can include trees. Besides the

annual rental payments, CRP participants also receive up to 50 percent of the cost of establishing vegetative cover, Harris said.

He said filter strips, or cropland areas 66 to 99 feet wide with a permanent cover and located next to streams, lakes and estuaries, will be eligible for CRP in this extended signup even if the cropland does not meet the soil erosion criteria.

"This provision was introduced in the sixth signup period last February to permit farmers to use CRP enrollment as a cost-effective option to control nonpoint source pollution," he said.

If trees are to be planted, the land needs only one-third of its total area designated as "predominantly highly erodible" to be eligible for CRP, Harris said. He encouraged producers to plant additional cover to protect wildlife and serve as windbreaks.

Producers should contact their local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) and Soil Conservation Service (SCS) county offices for specific CRP program details.

EPA Field Day Is Friday

Beginning April 1988, the EPA began requiring new labeling information regarding the application of insecticides, herbicides and fungicides through irrigation systems, known as chemigation. The major impact of this label change is the requirements of the system which is used for chemigation.

To help producers better understand these changes, the Comanche County Extension Program Council Field Crops Committee has planned a field day for Friday, August 19, to demonstrate a system that meets the new EPA requirements for chemigation. The field day begins at 9:00 a.m. Eastland County Extension Agent, DeMarquis Gordon says all Eastland County peanut producers are invited to attend. The field day will be held

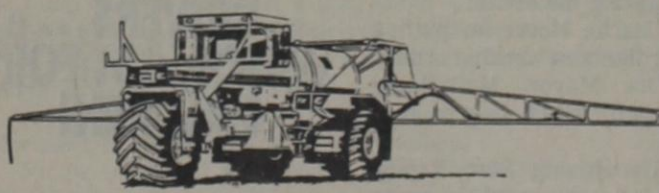
at Travis Welch's irrigation pond which is located approximately one mile north of the store in Beattie on FM 588. To get to Beattie, Gordon says, drive 2.1 miles east from Duster on FM 587, turn south at Bethel Church on FM 2247 for 4.4 miles and turn west on FM 588 and drive 3.3 miles to Beattie.

Dr. Chip Lee, Extension Plant Pathologist, and Leon New, Extension Agricultural Engineer - Irrigation, will

explain the new EPA requirements as put together on the demonstration system. The system will then be operated to demonstrate the required equipment and safety features.

All area producers are encouraged to come out and see this demonstration." If you presently use chemigation in your farming operation these new requirements will affect you" says Gordon.

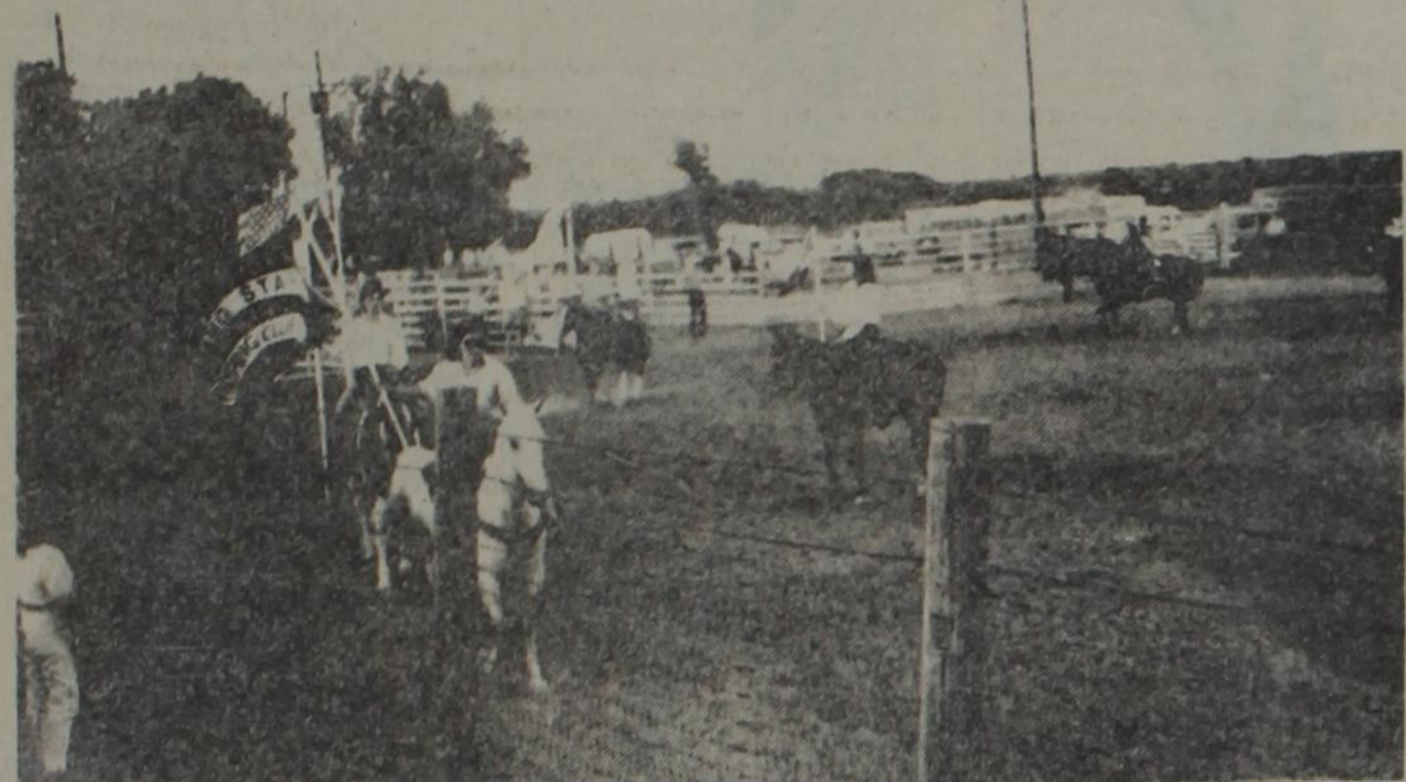

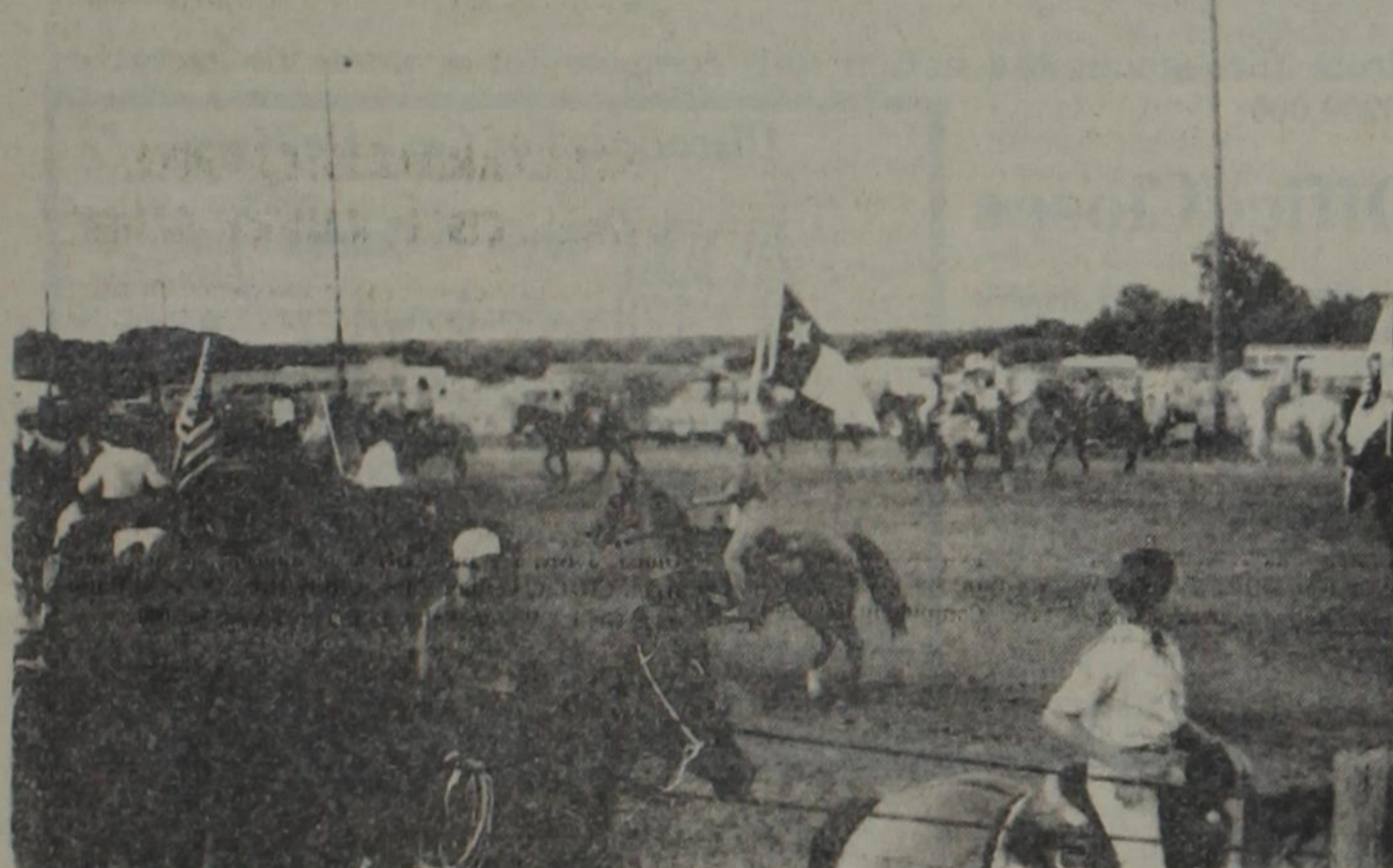

EASTLAND COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

Pruitt, County Auditor, estimated that General Fund revenue would decline \$250,000 this year.

The County has two more years to go (approx. \$264,000) before the County Jail is paid off, Pruitt also reported.

A decline in tax property valuation was listed as a major cause of lack of revenue, as well as the loss of revenue sharing money and less fines coming through the court systems.

A County tax hike from approx. 28 to 30.5 was mentioned, but with little favorable comment. This amount is allowed by law before a rollback can be called by citizens, and was also said to be needed to bring in the same amount of money as used from the General Fund last year. (Approx. 1,786,000.) This does not include Road and Bridge expenditures, from a different fund.

Billy Bacon, Commissioner of pct. 4, said: "Taxes have been going up each year since 1951, and for once I'd like to see us just sit on it!"

Richard Robinson, Commissioner of Pct. 1, questioned the "drop in valuation" concept, stating that proper-

ty owners he knew always had higher taxes when the tax percentage was raised.

Steve Thomas, head of the Eastland County Appraisal District, was called in to explain revenues and the lower valuation.

Thomas said that "On housing it's about half and half. Lots have been reduced." He explained that this had occurred in Cisco, Eastland, Ranger and Rising Star.

He also said that the most loss in tax value overall had been in oil and gas and some businesses. He added that every county in the state will be faced with the same situation.

Robinson said that it looked like the property owner was having to make up for the drop in mineral revenue.

The Commissioners said there was enough in County Reserve Funds to cover a shortfall for one more year, but one year only. They mentioned Indigent Health Care, and the cost of crime trials are areas where it was hard to know how much to budget. They were not certain when the 1988-89 budget would be finalized, but it is required to be in place by Oct. 1.

Local Lunch Prices Will Remain Same

The Rising Star school serves nutritious meals every school day. The lunches cost \$1.15 for students in K-6 and \$1.25 for 7-12 grade students; breakfast is \$.60.

Children from households that meet federal income guidelines are eligible for free meals or reduced-price meals at \$.30 for breakfast and \$.40 for lunch.

If you currently receive food stamps or "Aid to Families with Dependent Children" for your child, you only have to list your child's name and food stamp or AFDC case number, print your name and sign the application. Since you have already given income information to the welfare office, the school can confirm your eligibility.

If your household income is at or below the level show on the scale (available at the school), your child is eligible for either free or reduced-price meals. To apply for meal benefits, you must provide the following information and sign the application: 1) List the names of everyone who lives in your household. Include parents, grandparents, all children, other relatives and unrelated people who live in your household. 2) List the Social Security number of each adult age 21 or older. If an adult does not have a Social Security number print "none." 3) List total monthly income and amount of income (BEFORE deductions for taxes, Social Security, etc.) each person received last month and where it is from, such as wages, retirement or welfare. If you have a household member for whom last month's income was higher or lower than usual, list the person's expected average monthly income.

The information on the application may be checked by school officials at any time during the school year.

If you list income information and your child is approved for meal benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increases by \$50 or more per month (\$600 per year) or when your household size decreases. If you list a food stamp case number or AFDC number, you must tell the school when you no longer receive food stamps or AFDC for your child.

Your taster child may be eligible for meal benefits. If you wish to apply for meal benefits for a foster child, contact the school for help with the application.

Children who receive free or reduced-price meal benefits are treated the same as children who pay for meals. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the result of verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have the right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing Superintendent Don Bryan, Box 37, Rising Star, TX 76741 or calling 643-3521.

The information you provided will be treated confidentially and will be used only for eligibility determination and verification of data.

You may apply for benefits any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now but need to apply later in the year, please fill out an application at that time. You will be notified when the application is approved or denied.

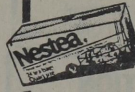

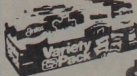

BAIRD

Sipe Springs Homecoming

Many Musical Memories In Play

"Treasure these memories," sings the bride's mother in "The First Wedding in Eastland County."

These lyrics, which may state one theme of this play, are by Ruth York of Cisco, and are taken from music written expressly for this production.

Though not originally envisioned as a musical, the play very nearly grew into one. The cast showed patience and adaptability in working out the resulting changes. Talent, diligence, and hard work from the musicians, vocalists, and pianist Donna Parrigan of Cisco make possible this musically rich "First Wedding."

An introduction/conclusion with words and music by David Price of Carbon is "Oh How Well I Remember." It contains the same theme of remembrance. Of treasuring historical heritage. Of recognizing the difficulties our forefathers faced - and overcame. As sung and played by Price and his sister, Donna Parrigan, the song is a beautiful accompaniment to the play.

The first music within the play itself, however, is a song of faith and inspiration by Kevin Reed of Cisco. Sung in Kevin's clear, strong

baritone, "His Plan" concludes the funeral of a woman and child killed by Indians.

"His Plan" begins with Kevin's gently haunting lyrics and melody. "Lost again - one of our loved ones has gone!... Sorrow comes, but with His help it'll fade away/It's God's plan that we'll all meet someday."

Those lines flow into a powerful, compelling chorus: "You know His promises were made long ago/They were made for us, you see/Just keep your faith and the laws and you'll be/With Him for eternity."

"One song springs from a spirited exchange between the bride, Sarah Jane Blair, and her neighbors in Fort Blair. The words and music are by Ruth York.

"Get the preacher/Set the date," sings fort commander Lt. Singleton Gilbert (Raymond Hart).

Mrs. Kirkendall (Sherra Cates) chimes in, "Get the papers!"

"I can't wait!" exclaims Joe Smith (Tommy Partain.)

Then, as the music slows, Mrs. Kirkendall queries: "But Sarah, what I want to know/Is can you cook and can you sew?"

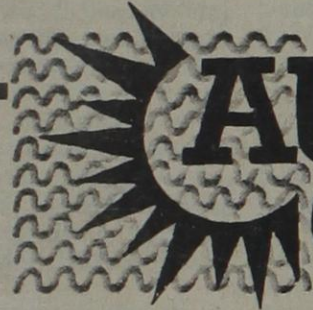

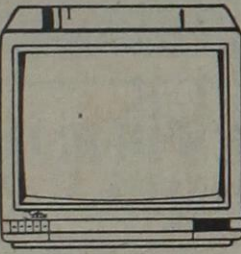

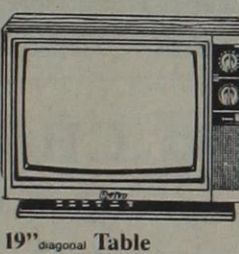
