## County Election Results

### SEE PRECINCT RETURNS CHART INSIDE PAGE

About a third (3,815) of the qualified voters in Eastland County turned out Tuesday to vote in the General Election.

In incomplete totals, countians voted against 15 of the Constitutional Amendments and for ten. In totals, countians voted against state school board appointments and against legalizing pari-mutuel wagering.

Statewide incomplete returns showed the state voted for legal wagering and against board appointments.

Statewide, almost the same ratio, reversed, was reflected by Texas voters: 17 amendments passed and eight failed.

Statewide: Amendments 1, 3, 4, 8, 10, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 22, 23 and 25 passed. In Eastland County, these amendments passed: 3, 8, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 22, 23 and 25.

The wagering proposition in this county was 2,083 against and 1,695 for. The wagering proposition carried only in the

Lake Leon box (77 for and 35 against). Other boxes were close, some by one vote margins.

Eastland voted 403 for, 564 against; Olden, 43 for and 54 against; Ranger, 305 for and 317 against; Desdemona, 40 for and 53 against; Gorman 147 for and 148 against; Carbon, 52 for and 62 against; Rising Star, 164 for and 180 against; Cisco, 456 for and 573 against; and absentee, 49 for and 62 against.

Guy Nell Westerman West, Chairman of the Board of Directors, explained the Memorial Scholarship Fund set up to honor the memory of Mary Claborn and H.L. Geye. Mrs. Claborn and Mr. Geye were both long-time teachers in the Rising Star schools and very influential in the community as well.

President Goldston introduced the speaker, Dr. Pat Howard, a 1958 graduate and the daughter of Lillian Howard of Rising Star.

Dr. Howard spoke of how we carry Rising Star and the heritage we received here with us wherever we go. ## Wildcats Maul the Tigers

The Rising Star Wildcats roasted the Blanket Tigers in front of a homecoming crowd Saturday, November 7, 57-14. The Wildcats took an early lead when Blanket was forced to punt on their opening drive. The snap went over the punter's head and into the end zone. The Wildcat defense swarmed and seniors Kerry Hill and Lupe Pavon teamed up for the safety putting the Wildcats ahead 2-0. The Cats started their opening drive on their own 46 yard line. With 6:50 left in the quarter junior Stacy Green ran six yards for the touchdown. Stacy Green's kick for the extra point was good moving the score to 9-0. The next scoring play came when senior David White passed to junior Reil Barron for 47

yards. Barron refused to go down and ran into the end zone with 2:45 left in the first quarter. Once again Stacy Green's PAT was good and the first quarter ended, Wildcats 16, Tigers, 0.

Early in the second quarter the Wildcats struck again when Stacy Green ran one yard for his second touchdown of the night. Green's kick for the extra point split the uprights and with 10:54 left in the first half, the Cats lead 23-0. Blanket finally put points on the scoreboard when they connected on a 73 yard pass play. The PAT was good and the score was 23-7 at 10:19. The Cats retaliated and found the end zone yet again. This time David White passed 19 yards to senior Ronnie Evans. Green's PAT at-

tempt was off and the score was 29-7 Wildcats' favor. The Wildcat defense proved too much for the Tigers. Senior James Holman came up with the only quarterback sack of the night. On the very next play, Lupe Pavon's rush caused the quarterback to get rid of the ball and the Tigers were forced to punt. David White did what he does best, he followed good blocking and dodged in and out of defenders and raced 64 yards to the end zone. Green's PAT was good and with 5:35 left in the second quarter, the Cats stretched their lead to 36-7. According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

The charge for the screening mammogram is \$50.00. This charge includes radiologist reading fee. The Unit accepts cash, check, Visa, Mastercard and American Express.

Appointment will be scheduled 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. by calling (817) 725-7698.

I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.

II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.

III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.

IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has 97 percent five year survival rate and a 90 percent 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, ● even before it can be felt.

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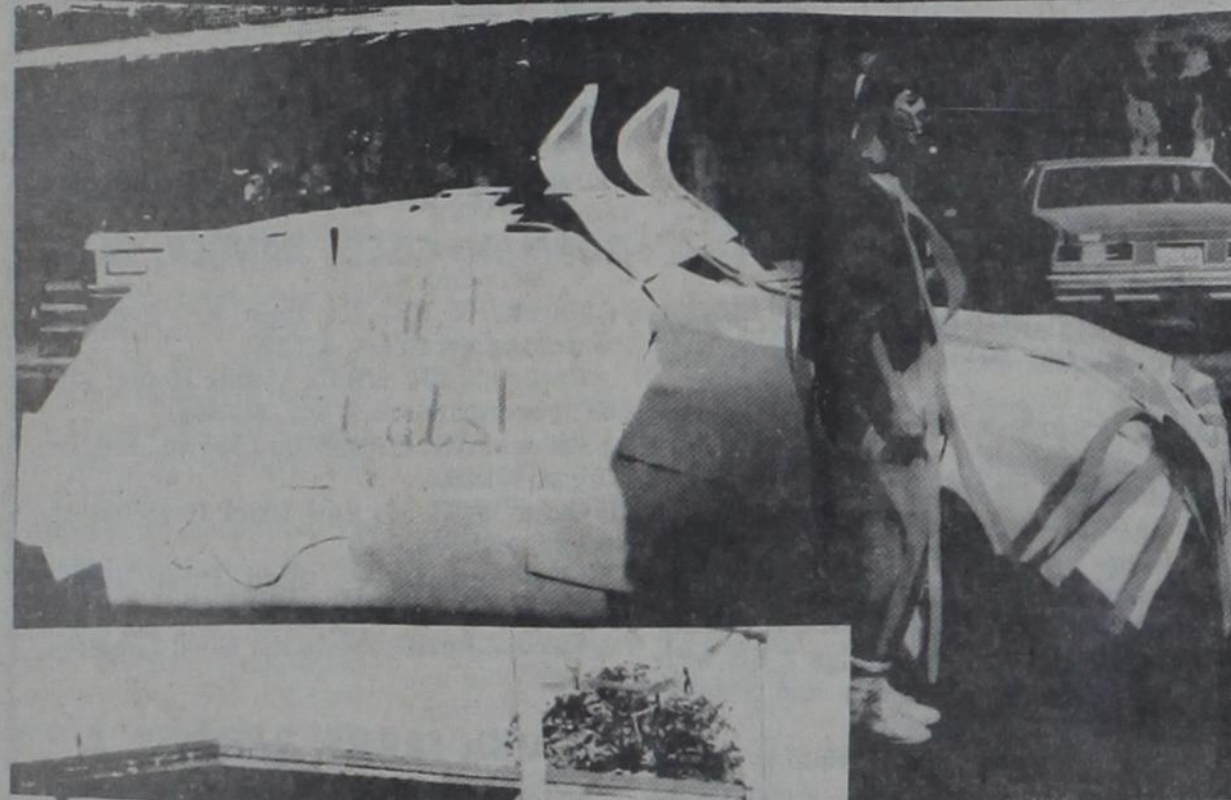
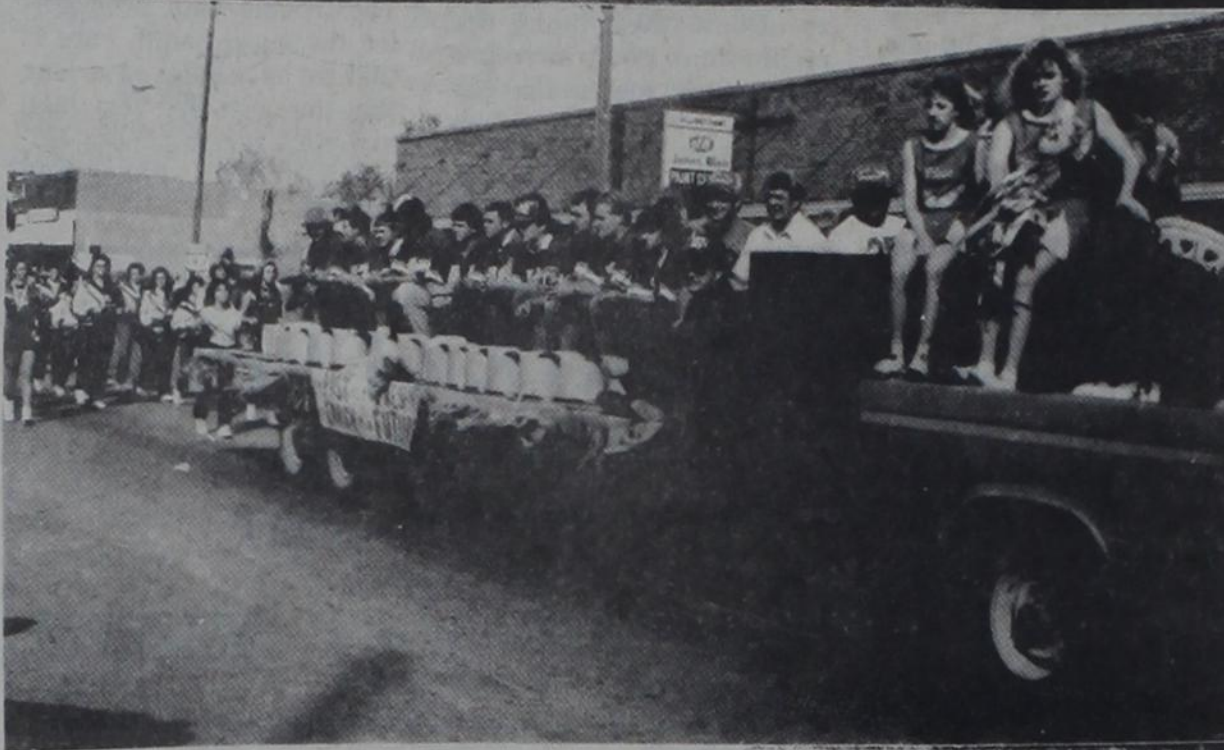
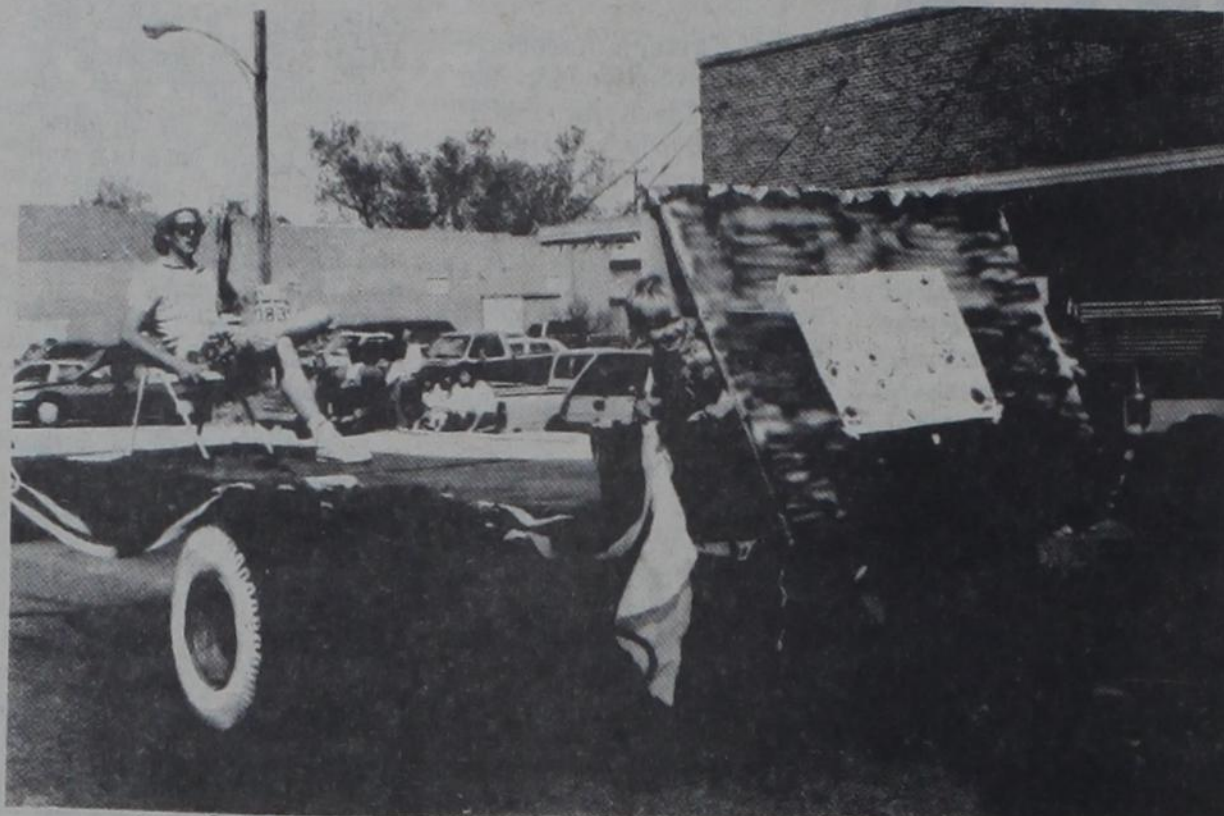
