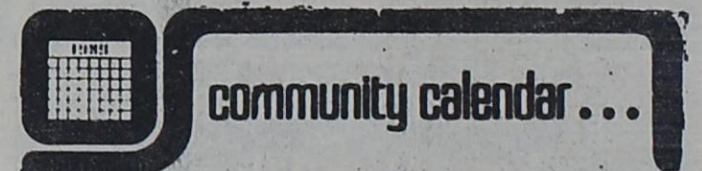

Annual Christmas Madrigal Dinner To Be Held December 8&9

The 15th annual Christmas Madrigal Dinner will be presented Thursday and Friday, December 8 and 9, at 7:00 p.m. in the Hilton Community Center, by the Fine Arts Department of Cisco Junior College.

Kathleen Sloan, nine-year old violinist, of Breckenridge, will perform three numbers on the program, Thursday and Friday. Kathleen, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Parks Sloan, began studying the Suzuki method of violin playing at the age of three. She studied five years with Suzann Fox Walker of Stamford, and she is studying with Betty Dyer at TCU in Fort Worth. She will perform works by Corelli, Handel, and Mozart, accompanied by Steven Zell at the harpsichord.

Wyley Peebles, director of the CJC Madrigal Singers said that "the Madrigal Dinner is sort of an escape back in time to the 16th century to drink wassail and dine on English roast beef with Yorkshire pudding." As the guests dine, the Madrigal Singers will entertain with trumpet fanfares and appropriate Christmas carols.

The concert of madrigals, which follows the meal, consists of secular music per-

formed in the polyphonic style of the 16th century. This year's program includes a Canadian Indian Carol, "The Huron Carol", and one by the 20th century composer, Zoltan Kodaly. A new piece by Crawford Thoburn will also be presented. This is "A Lovely Rose Is All My Song", a very ancient Old English text in a contemporary musical setting.

Other than the trumpet fanfares, performed by members of the CJC Band and directed by Tim Jones, there will also be harpsichord music performed by Steven Zell and some violin music performed by guest violinist. The costumes worn by the 12-member ensemble were designed and constructed by the CJC Drama Department under the supervision of Carol Brown.

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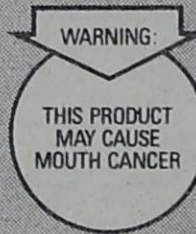

Your local fire department which wants to keep your holiday fire safe reminds us that most fatal fires happen during the Christmas holidays.

A holiday safety list you should check twice includes:

Artificial trees

- Buy only those with a safety approved label.
- Never use electrical decorations in a metallic tree.
- Keep a safe distance away from any flames.

Candles

- Never use candles on a tree or near other decorations.
- Keep candles away from Christmas wrappings.
- Place candles where they won't be easily knocked over.
- Use glass, metal, or other non-flammable candle holders.

Natural trees

- Select only a fresh tree that is deep green in color, has a strong scent of pine, the needles do not fall readily, and has a sticky tree butt.
- Do not rely on chemical sprays to make your tree flame resistant.
- Keep your tree in a water-holding stand and keep it full of water.
- Place the tree away from heat sources and out of the traffic pattern of the room.

Trimnings

- Use non-flammable trimmings; never use paper, fabric, cotton or anything that can burn.
- Avoid decorations that may break easily or have sharp edges.
- Never use ornaments that could be mistaken for food.
- Keep pets and small children away from small trimming and breakable ornaments.

Lights

- Use only testing laboratory approved lights.
- Discard any lights that have frayed or worn cords, broken or cracked sockets, loose connections, or bare wires.
- Never use indoor lights outdoors.
- Never use more than 3 sets of lights per single extension.
- Keep young children away from all electrical decorations and lights.
- Never place presents too near the lights of your tree.
- Always turn off all tree lights and electrical decorations when you leave your house or go to bed at night.

Other tips...

- Never allow smoking near trees or decorations.
- Safely dispose of Christmas wrappings immediately after opening gifts.
- Never burn Christmas wrappings in the fireplace.
- Be extra careful when wearing long loose flowing clothing near open flames of a fireplace, candle, or stove.
- Keep candles, matches, and lighters out of reach of small children.

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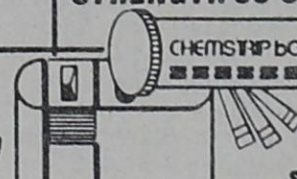
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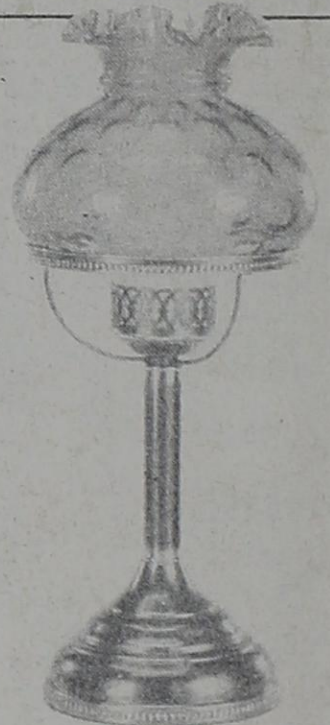

Rising Star High School 11th graders beat out their peers across the state by almost one and a half percent in passing the TEAMS test.
Mr. Robby Stuteville, RSHS principal, released the results Tuesday morning that showed that 76.47 percent of the 11th graders passed all sections of the Texas Educational Assessment of

Minimum Skills exit test, compared with 75 percent passing statewide.
Students must pass both parts of the TEAMS exam before they can receive a high school diploma.

Miss Texas National Teen-Ager

Scholarships will be presented to Texas participants in the 18th Annual Miss Texas National Teen-Ager program that will be held at Texas Christian University in Fort Worth on June 16th, 17th, and 18th, 1989.

Young women must be between the ages of 13 through 18 and are judged on scholastic achievement, leadership, poise, personality, and appearance. There is no swimsuit competition. Each finalist may, at her option, present a talent or an essay on "What's Right About America".

The Texas winner will receive \$1,000 U.S. Savings Bond and a two year tuition scholarship to Oklahoma City University (with provision for renewal) and an all expense paid trip to compete in the national program in August where \$40,000 in cash scholarships and other prizes will be awarded.

To provide additional scholarships for Texas participants, tuition scholarships will be awarded based solely on scholastic achievement and leadership, and others based on potential in Business and Hospitality related programs. Tax Rebate

AUSTIN - State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Tuesday that the monthly tax rebates sent to cities and counties that collect local sales tax increased again in November.

"The payments to cities and counties continue to improve," Bullock said. "The state's economic recovery continues to pick up steam." Bullock's office sent checks totaling \$118.4 million to 1,045 cities.

Statewide, the 1988 year-to-date payments to cities are up 12.4 percent over last year.

November's checks represent taxes collected by monthly filers in September and

taxes collected by quarterly filers in July, August and September.

Totals for Rising Star were: net payment this period \$2,360.49; comparable payment prior year \$3,612.12; percent change -34.65%; 1988 payments to date 17,068.81; 1987 payments to date \$18,759.75; percent change -9.01%.

Totals for Eastland County were: net payment this period \$78,929.51; comparable payment prior year \$74,943.46; percent change 5.32; 1988 payments to date \$569,169.90; 1987 payments to date \$544,911.30; percent change 4.45.

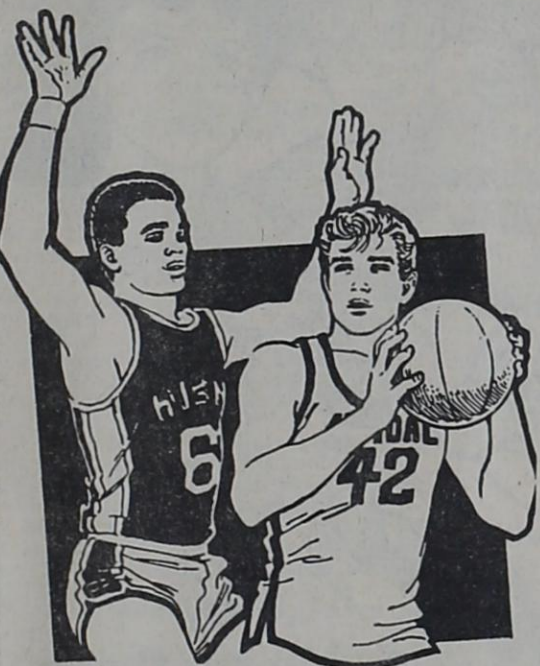

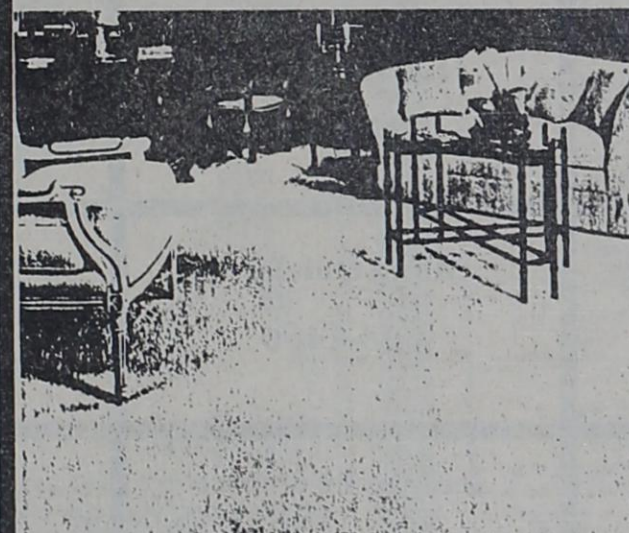

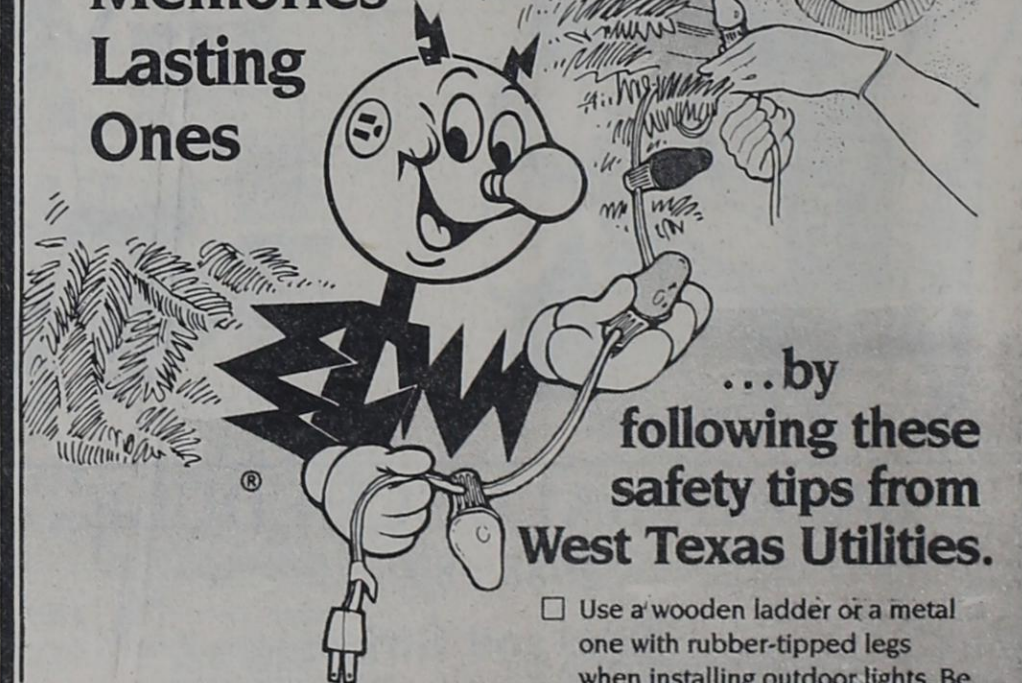

Eastland Co. 'Agriculture In Classroom' Recognized

Eastland County was one of the Texas counties receiving certificates at the Texas Farm Bureau Convention Monday, Dec. 5 for an outstanding "agriculture in the classroom" program in the local schools.

This program is a new one for the Eastland County Schools, and sponsored by the Farm Bureau. The Bureau furnishes textbooks, materials and video film for each 4th grade in the county, and teachers instruct with the material.

Other Texas counties receiving a similar award were Delta, Erath, Guadalupe, Hidalgo, Karnes, Kendall, Lamb, Medina, Runnels,

Trinity and Wharton.

Meeting in Corpus Christi, the Texas State Farm Bureau also presented awards for public relations activities, farm safety, and counties showing the largest gain in Farm Bureau membership. Counties with the largest number of new members were also recognized, as well as those with the longest continuous gain and the highest renewal percentage.

A lot of other business was conducted at this 55th annual meeting of the Texas Farm Bureau. S.M. True, State President, spoke to the delegates Monday, telling them that most farmers want an extension of the 1985 farm bill, with some fine tuning.

True said that other issues facing agriculture include environmental and animal rights issues, school financing, workers compensation, water rights and the federal deficit.

The cotton, grain and beef cattle farmer from Plainview, said preliminary work on the 1990 farm bill will begin next year.

"And we could have to fight some of the battles next year," the state farm leader told the 1,300 delegates representing 216 organized county Farm Bureaus.

True said most farmers and ranchers agree that the present farm bill is working.

"It has given us the tools to

make American farm products more competitive in world markets," he said. "It has shifted the focus away from growing crops for government storage, to producing for markets here and abroad."

The TFB president warned that environmental issues will become more and more important.

"The Endangered Species Act is a priority issue now and will be for some time to come," he said. "We must have some balance between the environment and the economy. We need amendments providing for economic impact statements before damaging regulations are implemented."

As for groundwater contamination, the farm leader said no one wants to drink unsafe water and no one wants to contaminate drinking water.

He added that farmers and ranchers must be included in shaping any regulations that are applied to the problem.

"What we don't want is the Environmental Protection Agency coming in to take control of underground water because of quality," he said.

True told the delegates that the "animal rights issue is creeping up on us like a bad dream."

"If you keep up with the news, you know the promoters of animal rights are fanatical in their zeal to impose their ideas on all who deal with animals — farm medical laboratories to caged laying hens," he said.

True told the delegates that taxes will be agriculture's biggest challenge in the 70th Legislature beginning in January.

He said farmers and ranchers will have to oppose nearly all of the proposals put forth to solve the problem of school financing, an issue brought about by a court ruling that the present system is unconstitutional and unfair to poor school districts.

"We cannot support massive school consolidation. We're against a state income tax to provide the financing. And we certainly don't want to lose our agricultural use valuation," the state farm leader said.

True noted that the state Workers Compensation program in Texas is giving all employers, including farmers, a lot of trouble. He said that among all states, Texas is known for having the lowest premiums and the lowest benefits for injured workers.

The TFB leader said water continues to be one of the big issues in Austin, and in the case of groundwater, the question is whether there will be local or state control.

"Our position is that landowners who capture the water beneath the surface also

own that water," he said. "We are being challenged by others who believe that groundwater, like surface water, is a matter of state control."

True said that solving the federal deficit is vital to all Americans.

"If it is not solved, we face a future of rising inflation and interest rates. Both of these conditions are deadly to agriculture," he said.

More taxes as a solution could lead to a recession here that would affect world and domestic markets for farm exports, True said. He added that there is a better way.

"We can freeze spending on current levels," he said.

"This would keep the economy growing. In time, economic growth would take care of the deficit."

ACR MAINTENANCE - Those participating in the 1988 Feed Grain, Wheat or Cotton Program are reminded that land designated as Acreage Conservation Reserve (ACR) must be maintained throughout the 1988 calendar year. Land must remain in an approved cover and weeds must be controlled.
 Provisions of the **DISASTER ASSISTANCE ACT** of 1988 provides payments for losses in excess of 35% of a farm's normal yield. The loss must be due to drought, hail, or excessive moisture.
 The disaster program covers losses on wheat, feed grains, cotton, peanuts and other nonprogram crops such as hay, melons, rye, guar, peaches, pecans and other commercially grown crops. Losses will be recognized for low yield and approved prevented planting.
 Producers requesting disaster payments for losses of 65% or more must agree to obtain FCIC multi-peril crop insurance for 1989 if crop insurance is available for the crop.
 Abandoned corn, grain sorghum, peanuts and cotton must be appraised if the crop will not be harvested. Crop acreages must be certified and late-filed acreage reports will be accepted.

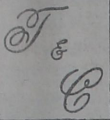

Fishing Outdoors

Lake Sam Rayburn at its lowest.

Lake Sam Rayburn located in the heart of the Piney Woods has reached a record setting low of 14 foot. Many of the boat ramps and marinas are setting high and dry. One such ramp is around 1.8 miles from water. For those of you who have been on Rayburn I will try to give you some reference points to give you some idea how low it really is. Crossing the Attoyac River on highway 103 there is only the river channel itself, about 20 foot wide. From this bridge a person can see down lake about 2 miles and the river channel is all you can see. The San Augustine area heading up the Ayish Bayou in the timber you come to Cedar Island. From this point on again there is only a river all the water in the flats is gone.

The lake is very low and maneuvering is difficult. The Corps of Engineers have stated that an additional 3 feet of water will be allowed out before shutting the gates. During our visit Sam Rayburn was dropping around 1 inch per day.

But on the up side fishing has been pretty good. The hydrilla beds around the lake still seem to be the hot spots. Blue back and pearl Rat-L-Traps and Pumpkin seed worms are working well in the Powell Park area of the main lake.

During my recent trip east I also was able to stop in at one of the recognized big bass lakes of East Texas, Lake Nacogdoches. A small city owned impoundment near the town of Nacogdoches. Nacogdoches is around 10 feet low itself, but both ramps are in good water still. One problem we saw was the creeks had dropped to the point that the hydrilla prevented access to the backs for the winter hawk hunt.

Area lakes are hurting too folks. Cisco is at its lowest in history, and most dangerous too. With the upcoming E.C.B.C. tournament set for December 11, 1988 at this lake anglers be aware. There is no boat ramp accessible. There are only a few select areas where you can get your boat in and out. And then only if your vehicle is

unloaded. Areas in the middle of the main lake are only 5 foot deep. If you normally fish up the creek, be prepared to run aground going in the south creek area, just after leaving the boat ramp point. The north creek is full of standing timber much of it just under the water. The north creek does have around 7 feet of water for a short distance. Near the dam area stay clear of the banks unless fishing there are a number of large boulders just right to tear off a lower unit.

This will be the last tournament for 1988 in the Eastland County Bass Club. The angler of the year, Big Bass of the Year, T.A.B.C. Top Six and the top Sixteen Classic contenders is at stake. And its all very close folks, with a mere 2 ounces separating first and second places for angler of the year.

New officers for the E.C.B.C. were elected at the December meeting. Those were President Steve Pennington, Secretary Chuck Burgess, Tournament Director Jerry King, Entertainment Will Johnson. Also new board members were selected but I was unable to get a complete list of these gentlemen.

January 21st has been selected for the Annual Awards Banquet. This years event will be held at The Crossin' in Eastland. For more details you may contact Eddie Green at 629-2184.
