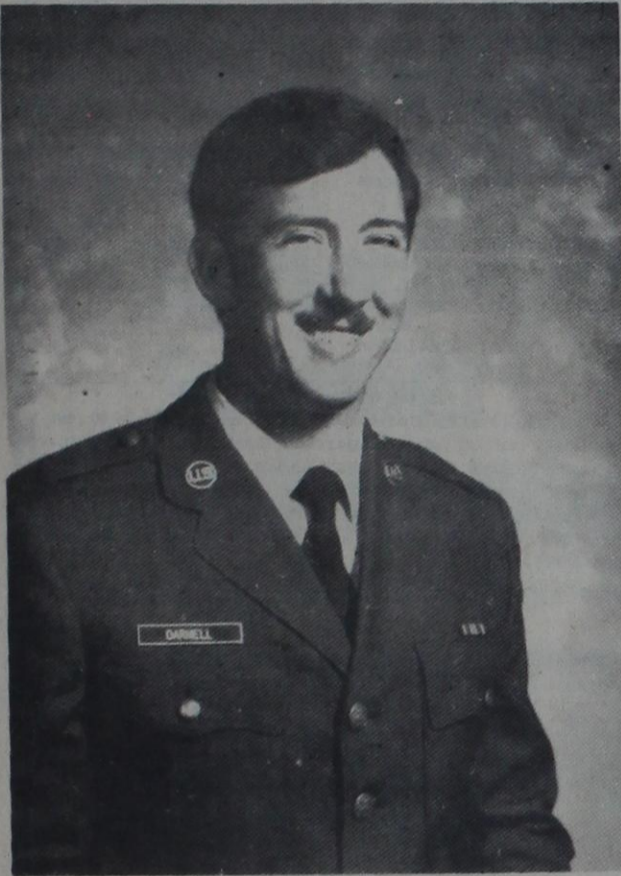

## School Board Has Lengthy Agenda

RSISD BOARD MEETING Regular Board Meeting of the Rising Star Independent School District Board of Trustees April 13, 1981

MEMBERS PRESENT: Bob Rust, Sue Barnes, Bob Clark, Jack Hubbard, Aubrey Lawrence, Douglas Walker, Jack Shults.

SCHOOL PERSONNEL PRESENT: Gene Williams, Frank Gray, Weldon Hill.

BUSINESS: Call to order by the President, Jack Hubbard.

1. Minutes of the regular board meeting March 9, 1981, were read and approved with no additions or corrections by general consent of the board.

2. Motion by Bob Rust second by Bob Clark that the bills incurred by the Rising Star ISD be ordered paid. Motion carried.

3. Motion by Douglas Walker second by Sue Barnes to include \$1085.54 as a bonus to be paid with Mrs. Dorothy Diddle's earned salary and to grant her a leave of absence until July 1, 1981, and to hire Mrs. Carol Goode at foundation salary beginning February 24, 1981 and ending July 1, 1981 as her replacement. Motion carried.

4. Motion by R.L. Rust, second by Bob Clark to pay David Cooper the sum of \$15.00 per rendition for the total of \$5,220.00 to be paid:

\$2250.00 less for pre-paid February 10, 1981

\$525.00 (35 renditions mailed not completed)  
\$1462.50 due after the board of equalization meets and upon completion of the 35 renditions.

8. Motion by Bob Rust, seconded by Douglas Walker to hire Gwynn Tharp as bus driver for the remainder of the 1980-81 school year to replace Robert Seale, beginning April 1, 1981, salary to be the same as the other bus drivers. Motion carried.

9. Motion by Douglas Walker, seconded by Sue Barnes to pay the judge and clerks at the Trustee Election \$4.00 per hour. Motion carried.

10. Motion by Bob Rust, seconded by Bob Clark to pay tuition and expenses to Rowena Chambers for the annual summer work conference in Austin, Texas June 22, 23, and 24th. Motion carried.

11. Motion by Aubrey Lawrence, seconded by Douglas Walker to accept the tally sheets as presented by the election judge and sign the order declaring the results of the election. Motion carried.

12. As a result of the election, and in obedience to the law; Jack Hubbard, Sue Barnes and David Harris were issued their certificates of Election and after taking the oath of office signed same to be filed.

"This country must, at whatever cost, maintain the capacity of the land to produce food and fiber," cites the National Association of Conservation Districts (NACD) in its booklet for the 1981 observance. ## City Receives Rebate

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday said rebates of the one-percent city sales tax for the first five months this year are up more than 40 percent over the same period last year.

Bullock said his office is sending Texas cities more than \$96.1 million in sales tax rebates for May.

He said 1981 payments now total \$282.3 million, compared to \$201.5 million during the same time last year.

Bullock said he felt an upswing in first

quarter sales and the agency's rapid rebate system to the cities accounted for larger than normal checks this month.

The city sales tax is collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and businesses and is rebated monthly by the Comptroller's office to cities where it is levied.

Rising Star's check this month is \$3854.40, which is a 20% increase over last year's payment of \$1107.99. Total payments for 1981 are \$8409.95.

## Roundup Time in Texas— 4-H Style

It's "roundup" time in Texas—4-H style.

To some 1,500 boys and girls across Texas, State 4-H Roundup is a highlight of their 4-H careers, points out Dr. John T. Pelham, state 4-H and youth leader with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. It's a time to "show off" their skills and expertise that they have acquired through long hours of study and practice, including winning top honors in county and district competition.

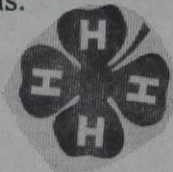
The food show allows members to exhibit food dishes they have prepared and to answer questions about nutrition as posed by judges. In the

The heart of Roundup, the 38 contests and events, will begin bright and early the next morning. Top teams and individuals in these events will be recognized at a special assembly that evening at 8 p.m.

Two outstanding 4-H adult volunteer leaders from each of the 14 Extension districts will be recognized at a special luncheon June 3. Some 20,000 individuals serve as 4-H adult volunteer leaders in Texas.

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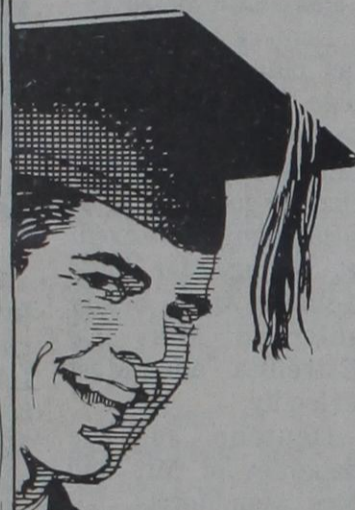

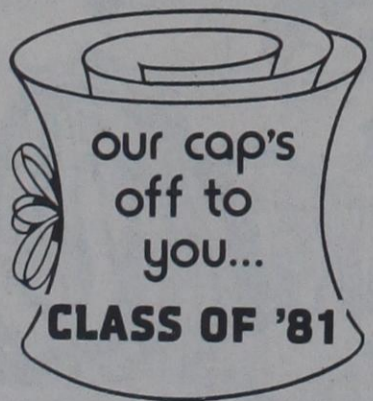

**COMMENTARY**

II Corinthians 3:1-6: Do we begin again to commend ourselves? or need we, as some others, epistles of commendation to you, or letters of commendation from you? Ye are our epistle written in our hearts, known and read of all men: Forasmuch as ye are manifestly declared to be the epistle of Christ

ministered by us, written not with ink, but with the Spirit of the living God; not in tables of stone, but in fleshy tables of the heart. And such trust have we through Christ to God-ward: Not that we are sufficient of ourselves to think any thing as of ourselves; but our sufficiency is of God: Who also hath made us able ministers of the new testament: not of the letter, but of the spirit; for the letter killeth, but the spirit

giveth life. The Bible teaches us that there is only one way to the heart of God. Not through our goodness but through the goodness of His Son Jesus Christ, are we "accepted in the beloved," also, our "life is hid with Christ in God." Even though you come before God with a sense of personal unworthiness, you can come boldly, for you approach God in the name of His Son. God views you through Christ and His perfect righteousness, which is imputed to you. Christ is the key to your acceptance by God. He is the key to your heal-

ing. It is not enough for ministers to stand up and tell the truth and to preach the Word of God. He is the key to your healing. They must also feel the anointing of God's Holy Spirit, for it is not just what they say that counts, but it is also the spirit in which they say it. It is the Holy Spirit upon them that makes the word of God they preach and bring forth that mighty faith that God has placed there. When I say I "have faith in God," I mean that I believe God is, always was, and always will be God. Almost everyone believes in the badness

of the devil, but what is desirable and needful is believing in the goodness of God. It is the initial step toward deliverance. First, we must have faith in God's goodness; then recovery can come. Your faith in God and His goodness will release His power in your life. Just as we are not saved by feeling but by faith, so we continue in our salvation through faith in God. Joy and peace come as a result of the continual use of our faith in Jesus Christ. Someday there will be a judgement for believers only. This will convene at the judgement seat of Christ, where upon the basis of each believer's work on earth, rewards will be given. Wise is the Christian who redeems the time, who uses every opportunity to win souls, "He that winneth souls is wise (Pro.11:30)(II Cor. 4:13-5:7-10).

## Loss of Memory? Get It Back

Here are some factors that really do affect memory:

• Job satisfaction.  
• Disappointments of all types.  
• Family stresses.  
• Security.

#### FORGETTING--A SYMPTOM

Forgetting actually is a symptom of something else, Ms. Warren says.

Many people over age 50 begin experiencing losses in their world—some real, some imagined.

Failing memory often is a SYMPTOM of the person's feelings about these other losses, she says.

Once something, even a name, slips his mind, then his anxiety about "all the losses lately" starts to grow, and this does affect mental alertness.

At that point, the person assumes his mind is "beginning to go," too. "I'm getting senile" may be said jokingly, but this label is very disturbing to any older adult, the specialist emphasizes.

Ms. Warren is on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

#### SENILITY--MUCH TREATABLE

Actually, senility has nothing to do with normal aging. It is simply a word—perhaps the most dreaded for the aging person, and it is a word used for many, many conditions with an equally large number of causes, Ms. Warren stresses.

#### LOSS OF MEMORY

Many of these conditions respond to treatment, she points out. Furthermore, the vast majority of people who experience a failing memory

have a correctable problem. 'SAME OLD' BRAIN

Basically, everyone has the "same old" brain they had all of their adult life, Ms. Warren says.

Even though scientists do think the brain starts to lose cells after a person reaches their 20's, recent research suggests the brain doesn't really change very much with age, IF there is a stimulating environment.

#### A SLIGHT 'SLOWDOWN'

There IS a seemingly slight "slowdown" in the brain's working capacity, however, the specialist explains.

"Think of it this way: it takes more time to process 60 years of information, for example, than it does to process 20 years of it," Ms. Warren says.

"Still, while it may take more time, the quality—or end result—is not decreased," she adds.

#### MEMORY 'LOSS'?—CHECK IT OUT

If you think you're becoming "forgetful" or feel you are losing your mental edge, take a close look at your life, the specialist advises.

Maybe it's time to say "no" to being on the sixth committee or that extra project.

Maybe just the simple realization that disappointment—personal or professional—happens to all of us will help," Ms. Warren stresses.

If that doesn't help, and your loss of memory continues, check with a doctor who does not dismiss complaints as "just old age," she says.

Ask about the following treatable disorders:

• HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE—this may be controlled by diet, exercise or drugs.

• VITAMIN DEFICIENCIES—ask about B-vitamins, in particular. Vitamin deficiencies often can be corrected by diet, or if that isn't possible, the doctor may prescribe vitamin supplements.

METABOLIC DISORDERS—such as low thyroid. Tests can indicate these.

• HIGH BLOOD-CHOLESTEROL LEVELS—these may be corrected through diet.

• DRUG-INDUCED MEMORY LOSS—large doses of tranquilizers, sedatives and sleeping pills can cause memory loss. This may be corrected through reduced drug intake.

• DEPRESSION—this may be treated with counseling and medication.

• CHRONIC INFECTION OF BRAIN TISSUE—this is often treatable.

#### PREVENTION—A KEY

While you can't always foresee disappointments or family problems, you can become more realistic about what stresses are affecting your life, Ms. Warren says. Change what you can and try to cope with the rest, she says.

"Be pro-active—try not to let potential problems build up, whether they're at the job or in a personal relationship. "Beat the problem before it beats you into a depression," Ms. Warren adds.

"Keeping the mind and body active is one of the best ways to avoid problems associated with a brain disorder.

"Develop new interests, hobbies or careers.

"Become physically fit and eat properly.

"While the memory is a remarkable storage system, it may be used—to keep the files from getting rusty."

A recently published Veterans Administration research bulletin discloses that the agency pays over \$11 billion annually, nearly one-half of the VA yearly budget, to five million veterans and survivors under the agency's various compensation and pension programs.

Some of the facts highlighting this statistical report include:

- Over forty percent of the recipients live in six states: California, Florida, New York, Texas, Pennsylvania and Ohio.

- 2.3 million veterans receive compensation totaling over one billion dollars for service-connected disabilities.

- Of those veterans receiving compensation, 24 percent were disabled during the Vietnam Era, while 53 percent were disabled in World War II.

- Female veterans comprise one percent of the total receiving compensation from all wars.

- Eighty-four percent of the veteran population receiving compensation is under 65 years of age.

- Over 920,000 veterans receive a non-service-connected disability pension. In this group, 49 percent are

65 years of age or older.

- VA pays monthly survivor benefits to approximately 1.8 million surviving spouses, children and dependent parents.
- Survivor benefits account for \$2.7 billion in annual expenditures for compensation and pension.

**Not All Are Pests Insects**

Contrary to the beliefs of many people not all insects are harmful or pestiferous. Only about 3% of the approximately one million known insects are pests. Of those that are left about 7% are classified as beneficials, the rest are of no consequence to man.

However the 3% which are pests have given the entire class of animals a bad name. Everyone has had some experience with a Mosquito or Ant bite, a Cockroach scurrying across the kitchen floor, Fleas on their pet, or Tomato Horn Worm devouring their prize tomatoes.

It is because of these personal bad experiences or social conditioning that we often over react when we encounter any Insect in the yard or garden. Of course none of us want to share our Homes with any unwanted guests.

Nevertheless, it should be remembered that many Insects perform valuable services for us all. Bees are involved in the tedious work of pollination of many fruit and vegetable crops. Many Insects are involved in the breakdown of dead animals and plants.

Probably the most beneficial work done by Insects is the control of other Insect populations. Insects which feed on other Insects fall into two classes: Parasites and Predators.

The Beneficial Parasitic Insects which live on or in other Insects are usually Flies or Wasps. These Flies or Wasps lay their eggs on or in soft bodied adults (such as Aphids) or Larvae (such as Leaf Feeding Caterpillars). After the eggs are hatch the Larvae of these Flies or Wasps feed on the Pest Insects.

The Beneficial Predator Insects are probably better known. These Insects devour their prey. Some of the better known Beneficial

Predators include Lady Beetles and their Larvae, Lace-Winged Fly or Aphid Lion, Praying Mantis, and Assassin Bugs. Many Spiders also fit into this category.

The moral of the story is you shouldn't always kill an Insect just because he's an Insect. You might be killing one that does Mankind a ser-

vice. If you have any questions or have any Insects which you would like identified, contact the county Extension Office.

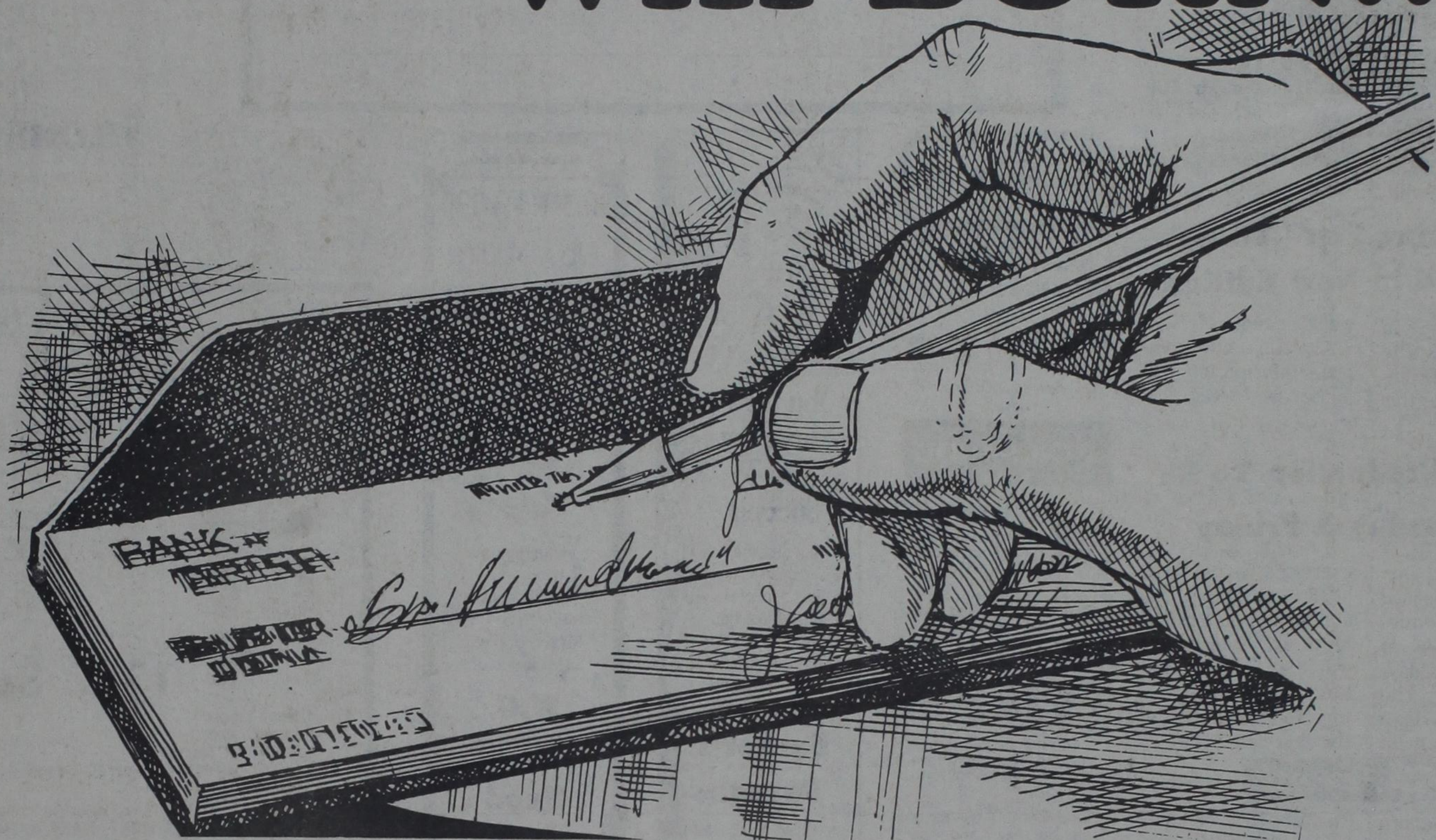

- A worthless check written for from \$5<sup>00</sup> to \$20<sup>00</sup> could result in a 180-day jail sentence and/or a \$1,000 fine.
- A worthless check written for from \$20<sup>00</sup> to \$200<sup>00</sup> could result in a year in jail and/or a \$2,000 fine
- A worthless check written for from \$200 up to \$10,000 could result in a prison sentence of from 2 to 10 years and/or a \$5,000 fine.

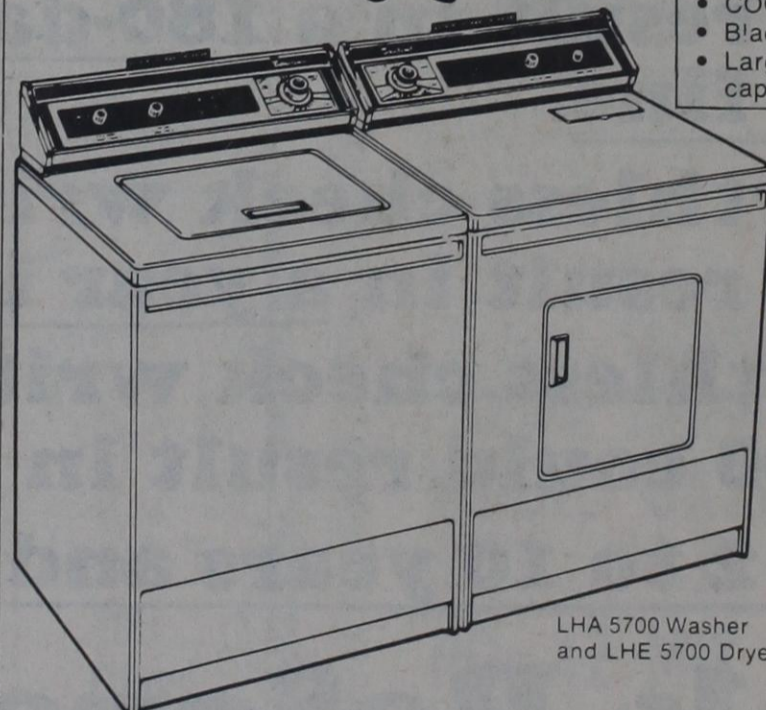
