## Crimestoppers To Be At Freedom Festival

At the monthly meeting of the directors of Eastland County Crimestoppers, plans were initiated for a Crimestopper float to be in the Rising Star Freedom Festival Parade in July. Some fun-type activities for the Festival involving Rising Star residents with the proceeds to benefit Crimestoppers were also suggested.

Sheriff Dec Hogan, a guest at the meeting, informed Crimestoppers that Rising Star was seeking more participants for their Freedom Festival and parade in order to make it a big event for that city.

Answering a question about the drug situation in the county, Sheriff Hogan said that the drug problem continues but that it has greatly reduced during his time in office as indicated by the number of felony calls we

receive are drug related, Hogan continued, and the number of calls has dropped from 150 a month when I took office to about 15 a month at the present. Crimestoppers increase the chances that lawbreakers will be caught and help with this reduction, he added.

Deputy Terry Simmons, the Crimestopper Co-ordinator, reported that Crimestoppers received a couple of calls last month relating to drugs, but they were found to be unfounded. It indicates however that county residents are being alert.

If you have information which might possibly help officers to solve crime, call 629-TIPS. You don't have to identify yourself and you could receive a reward up to \$1000.

## Disaster Deadline Is Approaching

Federal and state officials today cautioned all Texas residents and businesses suffering damages during the Spring, 1990 storms that July 1, 1990 is the last day to apply for aid in all of the 62 counties now designated eligible for assistance for three major aid programs.

These programs include Temporary Housing, Individual and Family Grant program and disaster loans available through the Small Business Administration.

"We realize that some Texas residents still are unable to get back into homes and businesses to assess

damages," said Brad Harris, Regional Director of the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA).

"Applications may be made before water recedes and complete damages are determined. This will speed the application process and an amended application may be filed at a later date.

Experienced operators are staffing the toll-free number, 1-800-782-6681, during the hours of 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. seven days a week.

Both Eastland and Callahan Counties are among those listed as eligible for Individual Assistance and Public Assistance.



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

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

# Peanuts Are 'Red, Hot' Crop For Texas Producers

"We're not just talking goobers - we're talking America's finest goobers," Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower said here, applauding Texas peanut producers for their efforts to help diversify the state's agricultural bounty.

"From direct marketing to international sales, and from

market promotion to agricultural diversification, the Texas Department of Agriculture has worked closely with Mary Webb and the Texas Peanut Producers Board for the past seven years to find new markets for 3,300 Texas peanut farmers," Hightower said.

"Texas ranks fourth in the

nation in peanut production, but we are rapidly assuming the top spot in marketing and promotion of peanuts," Hightower said. "Peanuts are grown in more than 100 counties in South, East, Central and West Texas. Texas farmers harvested almost 240,000 tons (476 million pounds) of peanuts last year - principally the Runner, Spanish, Virginia and Valencia varieties. In fact, peanuts are the state's seventh most valuable crop with annual cash receipts to farm-

ers of approximately \$120 million a year," Hightower said.

Hightower made the comments at a news conference at this Central Texas community near Stephenville where he joined with Webb, executive director of the Texas Peanut Producers Board, and several area peanut producers.

"At the Texas Department of Agriculture, we've worked since 1983 to widen and deepen the mainstream of agriculture in this state," Hightower said. For example, we're helping farmers and ranchers find new ways to increase their profits in the production of peanuts, cotton, livestock and other crops. We're also assisting enterprising farmers in their efforts to develop new crops, like pinto beans and exotic livestock, that will be part of tomorrow's mainstream.

production in East and Central Texas and create 60 new jobs to boot: A peanut processing plant under development in Morris County would employ 45 people and generate \$35 million a year in new sales, and a peanut shelling facility in Lee County would employ 15 new people and generate sales of \$2 million a year.

"In each of the last seven years, TDA's 'Taste of Texas' marketing specialists have joined with the Peanut Producers Board to promote the availability and nutritional value of Texas-grown peanuts. TDA marketing specialists meet with newspaper food editors, television personalities and radio hosts from Seattle to Miami and from San Antonio to New York City. These appearances are designed to inform consumers that peanuts are versatile as well as a nutritious and economical protein source. While traditional snacks are discussed and demonstrated, emphasis is placed on new and innovative main course dishes, salads, vegetables and breads, featuring peanuts.

"Promoting peanuts in the United States is not the only avenue TDA has explored for the industry. At MEFEX '90, a major international trade show in Bahrain, Texas peanuts were represented by Comanche Peanuts. Later on the same TDA-sponsored trade mission, both Comanche Peanuts and Picosos' Peanuts participated in mini-trade shows in Dubai and

# Humid Heat Can Cause Hypothermia

The late spring of 1990 may well be remembered in some parts of the state as the time when torrential rains, flooding, high winds and lightning repeatedly brought death and property destruction. The Trinity River flood in May, for example, killed as many as 12 Texans. The extent of damage along the river's course through East Texas is still uncalculated.

But as if the ravages of violent weather were not enough, an early heat wave has combined with high humidity to pose a less obvious, but also deadly, threat to humans.

Health officials warn that heat stress, or hyperthermia, causes about 200 deaths and thousands of illnesses each year in the U.S. The victims usually are the elderly, the

very young, or people weakened by other illnesses, although prolonged heat stress can be fatal to anyone. Last year, as many as nine Texans may have died from excessive heat, although weather records for the state show that the hot months of 1989 were generally cooler than average.

Dr. Patti Patterson, Acting Associate Commissioner for Personal Health Services at the Texas Department of Health (TDH), said that high temperature alone is physically tolerable to most people. Combined with high humidity, though, heat can cause a person's natural cooling system, perspiration, to work overtime. "If a person fails to replace fluids and salts they lose during perspiration," Dr. Patterson said, "dehydration

can follow."

The symptoms of dehydration include muscle cramps, dizziness, nausea, low blood pressure and headaches. "These are serious warning signs," Patterson said. "Anyone with these symptoms should immediately find shade, ventilation and fluids—preferably water—to drink until the symptoms subside." She explained that if fluids are not soon replaced, heat stroke can follow, causing sudden weakness, severe headache, disorientation leading to loss of consciousness, brain damage and death.

To avoid overheating, Dr. Patterson said, people should wear light-colored, loose-fitting clothing and drink more than their normal intake of water. Those with heart or respiratory conditions or people taking medications should be especially aware of early signs of physical problems.

"One of the best ways to know whether to take special

precautions on a given day is to follow a local weather forecast. Although forecasts cannot be exact all the time, meteorologists are usually accurate enough to predict approximate temperatures and humidity," she added.

Forecasters often refer to a "heat stress index," a numeric table which reflects how hot the air will feel to humans. A heat stress reading of 105 degrees is considered very dangerous, yet it can occur while thermometer readings are still in the mid 80s.

The following is the official National Weather Service heat index table. To calculate heat stress, find the index number in the column under current humidity (top line) that is directly to the right of the your thermometer reading (left column).

Oldsters do lose some memory skills as they age, says a neuroscientist at University of California/Irving—but they keep improving verbal reasoning skills and semantic memory used in complex decision-making.

New automated eye test for infants has been invented by a neurologist at MIT. Doctors recommend vision testing at six months for preemies and babies with family history of lazy eye or eye misalignment.

Doctor at the University of Missouri in Kansas City used a balloon catheter to dilate clogged brain arteries of patients at risk for stroke. Blood vessels stayed open up to five years in most patients.

Expectant mothers at risk at Magee Women's Hospital in Pittsburgh were trained to recognize early warning signs of premature labor. Result: early births dropped from 14 percent to 9 percent.

Shock waves within the body, delivered via endoscope, are shown to be effective against gallstones, doctors at University Hospital, Boston University School of Medicine, report. Procedure takes about an hour.

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
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
