Bailey Seeks Relection in County Judge Spot

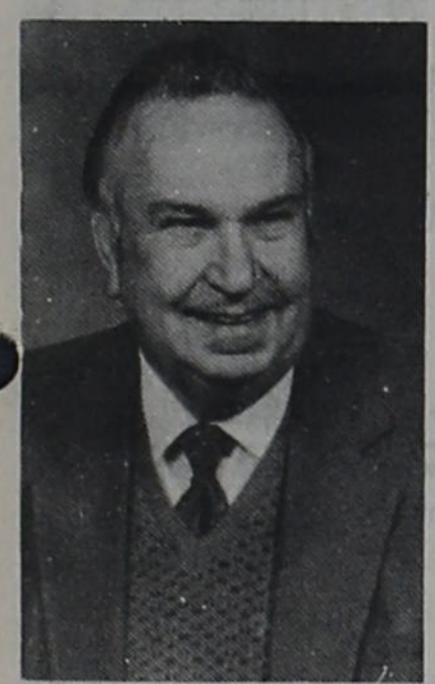
Eastland County Judge Scott Bailey released the following statement concerning his candidacy for re-election as Eastland County Judge.

William 'Bill' Sikes Is County Judge Candidate

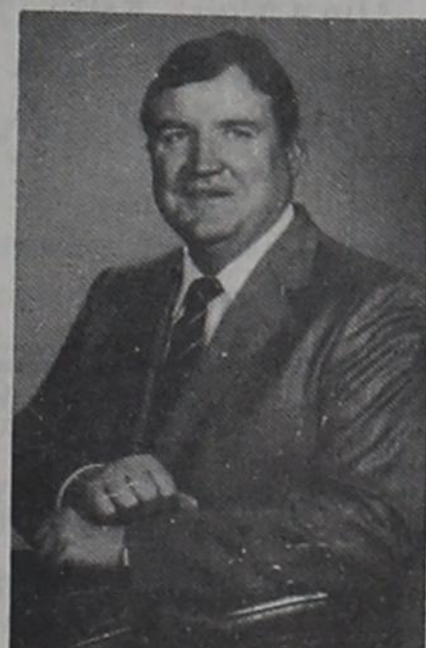
William E. (Bill) Sikes has issued the following statement:

Polling Places in County

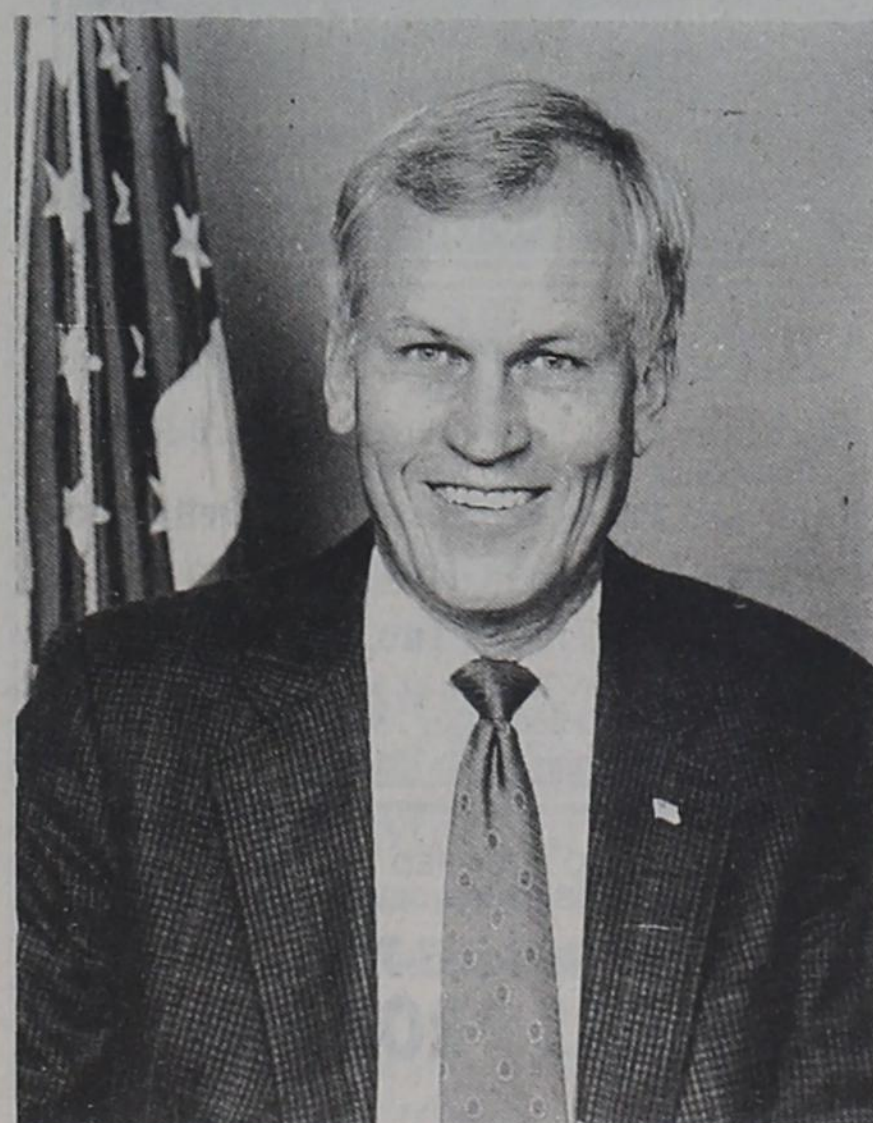
Help protect your child by having their fingerprints made at school on Thursday, March 15, 9:30 a.m. in the grade school library.

Primary Election Is Tuesday

Polls will be open at 14 locations in Eastland County Tuesday for the Early Spring Party Primaries.

Democrats will be voting at nine sites and Republicans at five locations.

Absentee voting ends Friday afternoon, and polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. to select the nominees for the fall General Election.

A number of primary run-offs are anticipated.

Democrats will be voting in Eastland, Olden, Ranger, Desdemona, Carbon, Gorman, Rising Star, Cisco and Lake Leon.

Republicans will be voting at Eastland, Cisco, Ranger, Gorman and Rising Star.

Approximately 11,000 are registered and qualified to vote, and each will first have to select a party, and both provide a wide assortment of choices from United States Senate to precinct chairman.

The Democratic ballot also offers three non-binding referendum choices for voters.

Contested races abound locally, in the county, the district and state wide.

Attracting the most county-wide attention would proba-

bly be these races: district clerk, sought by four; county judge, sought by two; and district attorney, sought by three.

Statewide, seven Democrats and three Republicans seek the Commissioner of Agriculture spot.

Seven Republicans and seven Democrats race for governor. Apparent front-runners for the Democrats are Mark White, Ann Richards and Jim Mattox.

Leading for the Republicans are Clayton Williams, Kent Hance and Jack Rains.

In the local precinct Justice of the Peace race, three candidates are entered.

Absentee Voting Ends Friday

Absentee voting for the March 13 Primary Elections will end at 5 p.m. on Friday, March 9, reports Joann Johnson, Eastland County Clerk.

You may vote Absentee from 8 a.m. - 5 p.m. through the deadline Friday at the County Clerk's office, First Floor of the Courthouse. Due to changes in the state law, voters no longer have to give a reason for voting early.

By Monday, March 5 only 225 voters (mail-in and in person) had cast Absentee ballots in both Democratic and Republican primaries. Early voting is expected to pick up during the week.

Local Bank Names New President



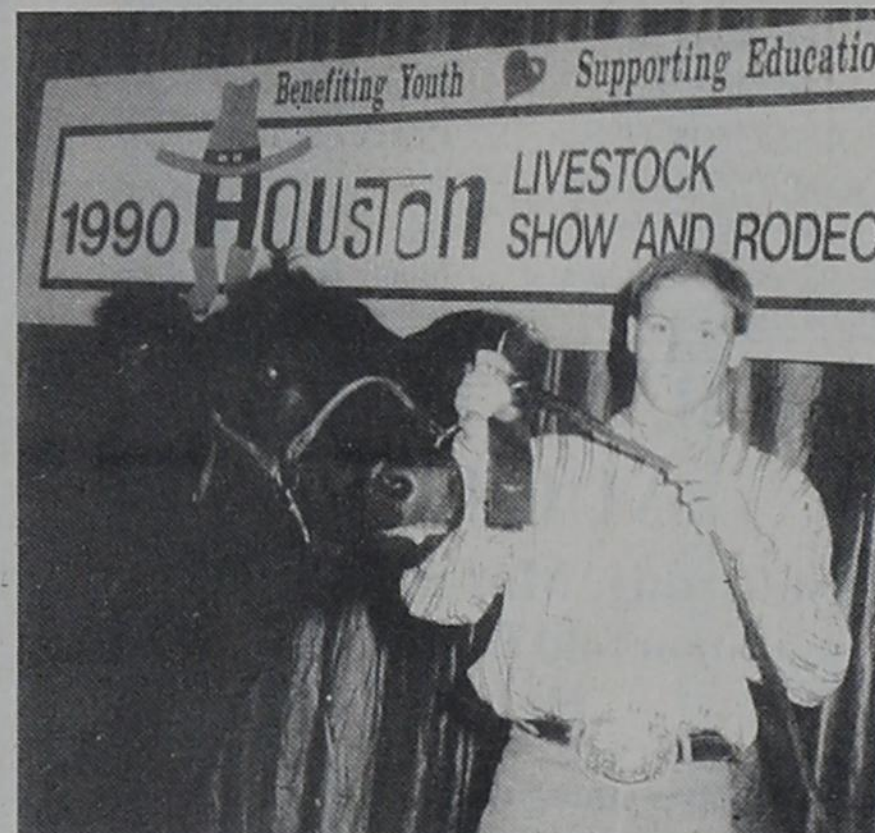
James Ramsay

dent in Eastland Junior High. My family also consists of my mother-in-law, Mrs. L. F. Hunt, who lives in Eastland. As a family man, I am concerned about the welfare, safety and future of our children and families. I am a teacher for the Men's Fellowship Bible Class in Eastland and I attend the First Baptist Church in Eastland. During the Korean War I served our country in the United States Air Force and received an Honorable Discharge after serving 4 years.

It is my belief that each of us should try to add something to the communities in which we live. I was active in the formation and afterwards for several years in all phases of the girls summer softball programs in Eastland County. I am a charter member, past president and a current director of the Eastland County Law Enforcement Officers Association. I have served as president of the Eastland Lions Club, Eastland Civic Theatre and Cross Timbers Shrine Club, as a Master of the Eastland Masonic Lodge, and as a vice president and director of United Fund. I have participated in the Quarterback Club and Chamber of Commerce. I am also a member of the Texas District and County Attorneys Association and the National District Attorneys Association.

In addition to my extensive trial and appellate experience of criminal cases in Eastland County, I am a graduate of North Texas State and of Baylor University School of Law. Daily Crude Oil Production Average Decreased In December

Texas crude oil production averaged 1,675,160 barrels daily in December, according to preliminary figures released by Railroad Commission Chairman Kent Hance. December 1988's preliminary production was 1,837,819 barrels daily.

This figure compares with preliminary November production of 1,736,623 barrels daily. Final production reports for November indicated average production at 1,756,266 barrels daily.

The preliminary Texas oil production figure for December is 51,929,949 barrels, down from 52,098,686 barrels in November. December 1988's preliminary Texas oil production figure was 56,972,402 barrels.

Texas crude production for 1989 totaled 650,513,557 barrels, a six percent decrease compared to the 1988 total of

Referendum and Election of TPPB Approaching

The Texas Peanut Producers Board will hold its biennial election on May 1, 1990. The current terms of three of the nine board members will expire at that time. (Two from Dist. 1 and one from State at Large). Any person living within the following counties who is engaged in the business of producing, or causing to be produced, peanuts for commercial purposes, is eligible to vote in his district, including owners of farms and their tenants and share croppers, if such person is subject to paying the assessment that is collected on peanuts within the following counties:

District No. 1 includes the following counties: Coryell, Hamilton, Comanche, Brown, Mills, San Saba, McCulloch, Llano, Lampasas, Mason, Gillespie, and Runnels.

State at Large include all the peanut producing counties in the State of Texas.

NOMINATION TO THE BALLOT

Any person qualifying to vote in the election may place his name in nomination for membership on the Texas Peanut Producers Board for a six year term from the district in which he farms by application to the above organization, signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the election. Such application must be received at least 30 days prior to the election date - May 1, 1990, in order to have his name placed on the ballot.

PEANUT REFERENDUM TO SET ASSESSMENT

Texas peanut producers qualified to vote in the election may also vote on a proposition to set the refundable peanut assessment rate in an amount not to exceed \$2.00 per net ton of farmers stock peanuts. Such assessments to be collected at the point of first processing or sale on a "refund only" basis, and to be used for funding programs of research disease and insect control, education, and promotion designed to encourage the production, marketing and use of peanuts design to enhance producer income. All Texas counties are within the proposed referendum area.

The election and proposition vote will be held by physical balloting under provisions of the Texas Commodity Referendum law, Chapter 41, Texas Agriculture Code. Balloting locations will be open from 7:00 a.m. on May 1, 1990 and kept open until 7:00 p.m.

Balloting locations are at

the following county extension offices: Atascosa Co., Jourdanton; Frio Co., Pershall; Wilson Co., Floresville; Lee Col, Giddings; Waller Co., Hempstead; Hill Co., Hillsboro; Erath Co., Stephenville; Parker Co., Weatherford; Houston Co., Crockett; Fannin Co., Bonham; Grayson Co., Sherman; Denton Co., Denton; Eastland Co., Eastland; Comanche Co., Comanche; Brown Co., Brownwood; San Saba Co., San Saba; Mason Co., Mason; Haskell Co., Haskell; Hall Co., Memphis;

Gaines Co., Seminole; Bailey Co., Muleshoe.

Absentee ballots will be made available in the county agent's office of each peanut producing county two weeks prior to May 1. Any person qualified to vote may request an absentee ballot from the county agent's office in the county in which the peanuts are produced or from the Texas Peanut Producers Board, P. O. Box 398, Gorman, TX 76454, telephone no. 817-734-2853.

Absentee ballots must be postmarked no later than April 28, 1990 to be valid.

Literacy Council Meets

In August 1989 a group of concerned citizens met to discuss the problem of adult illiteracy in our county and to devise solutions. From a series of meetings the Eastland County Literacy Council was formed to support adult literacy and learning opportunities in our county.

Organizationally, by laws have been approved, the organization has been chartered in Texas as a non-profit corporation, permanent officers will be elected in April and papers are being filed for federal tax-exempt status. Council members are drawn from throughout the county with current members representing Cisco, Eastland, Ranger, and Rising Star.

The primary goals for the Council this first year include formalizing the structure and status of the organization,

increasing public awareness of the problem of illiteracy and the opportunities in our area, and assisting in the creation of literacy programs in the various communities. The Council has several activities about to begin.

On Thursday, Feb. 22, 1990 Community Education classes began in Cisco. These sessions will be held on the 2nd and 4th Thursday of each month, free of charge, and will include information on Cooking with Commodities, Dealing with Family Stress, Managing a Checking Account, Buying a Used car, Household Fire Safety, and Poisoning. The site for these sessions will be East Cisco Baptist Church, Fellowship Hall, with child care for 9 years and under available in the Education Building.

On March 2 & 3 a Laubach Basic Literacy Tutor Training Workshop will be held at Cisco Junior College. Anyone interested in becoming a tutor or finding out more about literacy efforts are invited to attend. The workshop is free of charge with registration through Charlotte Speegle, CJC, 442-2567.

The Council has also participated in a grant proposal submitted by Cisco Junior College for Student Literacy Corps funds. The Grant would assist in conducting family literacy programs in Cisco, Eastland and other county communities where there is sufficient interest. Notification on this grant will not be until, May, 1990.

Gordon Spot

Does the following sound like you? It is borrowed from Dale Rollins' Extension Wildlife newsletter, 'On the Wild Side'. Dale is Extension Service Wildlife Specialist in San Angelo. As I read it, it reminded me of the way I sometimes do things.

Did you hear about the fellow who noticed a screw coming out of the hinge on his front door. As he was going to the basement to get a screwdriver, he noticed a puddle of water in the kitchen, so he went to the closet to get a mop. Laying by the closet door was a cuff link. He picked it up, put it in his pocket and started for the bedroom. In his pocket, he found a receipt he had been looking for, so he started to the study to put it away. Halfway down the hallway he noticed the hall clock had stopped, so he headed for the garage to get the ladder. In the garage he remembered to check the oil in his car, sure enough, it was low. He remembered the oil was in the storage building in the backyard. So...to the backyard he went where he noticed that the flowers needed watering, but the hose was in the front yard. He went around to the front yard to get the hose and saw some sort of flyer on the front door. It said they were having a big sale at the hardware store, so he went in the house to get the keys so he could go to the sale. As he opened the front door, he noticed a screw coming out of a hinge. He thought, 'Now I wonder where my screwdriver is?'

Dale says it is like a quail

hunter, who when aiming at the whole covey, hits nothing. He said it's better to pick one bird, stay on it and follow through and your bag will be the heavier for it. We could well use this same principle in doing all our daily jobs.

We get questions every year about the proper time to prune roses. Early March is the best time to prune roses in Eastland County. Hybrid Teas, Floribundas and Grandifloras are usually pruned heavily at this time (down to 18"-24" from the ground). Weak or dead canes should be removed or shortened to healthy tissue anytime during the year. Weak growth along with canes that cross and some general thinning can be accomplished at this time. Some rose growers prefer a less drastic approach to annual pruning. Shaping the plants and cutting back the vigorous canes one-fourth to one-third their length can result in more attractive plants, especially for old shrub-type roses. Care should be taken to prune most climbers and one-time bloomers after they flower in the spring so as not to reduce their seasonal show.

Most old garden roses are attractive landscape plants with a pleasing natural form. This form should still be apparent after pruning. In addition to pruning in late winter, some rosarians cut plants back moderately in mid-August. This practice along with a light application of fertilizer can help promote fall flowering.

The Texas Horticulture industry is still in the process of determining the effects of record low temperatures that swept across the state in December. Plant losses have been extensive, with the citrus industry being hit the worst. Nursery and greenhouse producers estimate a loss of 10-20%, while vegetable producers lost approximately 30% of the planted acreage.

Many landscape plants were also severely damaged as the result of these cold temperatures. However, the extent of injury will probably not be totally evident until spring.

Since frozen plants look so bad, the practical thing to do is to prune back the obvious dead wood so the remaining landscape is a little more appealing. Once this is done research has shown that further pruning should be delayed until first spring flush has hardened off. At this time, cut back all limbs to healthy wood. This practice will result in the best plants in the shortest time.

Support Level Set for 1990 Crop Quota Peanuts

WASHINGTON - The U.S. Department of Agriculture announced that the national average support level for 1990 crop quota peanuts will be \$631.47 per short ton, compared with \$615.87 for the 1989 crop.

The following provisions were also announced: -The national average support level for additional peanuts will be \$149.75 per short ton, unchanged from the 1989 crop.

--1990 crop additional peanuts owned or controlled by USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation will be sold for export edible use at no less than \$400 per ton, unchanged from the 1989 crop.

CCC outlays for 1990 crop year peanut loans to producer associations will be subject to a reduction of 1.4 percent under the deficit reduction sequester order.

The Agricultural Act of 1990, as amended, requires that the national average support level for the 1990 crop of quota peanuts reflect any increase in the national

average cost of peanut production for the preceding year, excluding any change in the cost of land. This statute also provides that the quota support rate for the crop may not exceed the support rate for the preceding crop by more than 6 percent.

The national average support level for 1990 crop quota peanuts was increased from the 1989 level of \$615.87 per short ton based on data which indicated that the cost of producing the 1989 crop of peanuts was greater than the cost of producing the 1988 crop peanuts.

The price support level for additional peanuts must be set at a level which ensures no loss to CCC from sales or disposal of the peanuts. In determining this level, USDA must consider the demand for peanut oil and peanut meal, the expected prices for other vegetable oils and protein meals and the demand for peanuts in foreign markets. The price support levels are subject to quality and other adjustments.

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It's A Lesson To History...

Education is freedom. For Texans, that is not just a saying but a part of our history and everyday life.

When Texas Public School's Week was first set up by the Texas Masonic Lodges, it was meant to coincide with March 2, Texas Independence Day, pointing out that freedom and education go hand in hand.

came into being with the signing of the Texas Common School Law of 1854. The law also created the first school districts whereby each county was divided into districts to suit their population.

A \$2 million endowment for the permanent fund provided the initial funding for the public schools system. The Texas Common School Law also provided for the distribution of the interest earned from the "Special Fund" on a per-student basis.

Facing a drastically changed state of economy in the post World War II era, Texans restructured the public schools system in 1949 to meet the needs of future generations.

The Texas Education Agency became what it is today under the Gilmer-Aiken laws of 1949. The appointed school board became an elected body of 21 members. The elected superintendent of Public Instruction changed to the State Commissioner of Education, appointed to a four year term by the State Board.

An "economic index," a more complex formula for school funding based on a local school districts ability to raise their own revenues,

replaced the per-student funding formula. The new structure also provided minimum salaries for teachers.

In the 136 years the Texas public school system has been in place, Texans have placed education as their top priority. Education is the largest single item in the state budget.

But Texans are not satisfied with that. One national poll indicates that most people believe that we are still not spending enough on education and would be willing to raise taxes to expand our public school system.

Texans continually push for educational excellence and innovations. Now serving over 3 million students, Texas public schools have seen test scores in math and reading steadily rise in the last decade.

Renewed emphasis on science, math and writing highlight the most recent reforms in Texas public schools. Texans also measure educational accomplishments, not by what we have gained in the past, but what we need in the future. That is why Texas schools are "Building Brighter Futures."

Railroad Commission Chairman Kent Hance announced that Texas oil and gas wells produced 468,180,306 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas in December 1989, compared to the November gas production total of 454,967,152 Mcf. December's production was down five percent compared to December 1988's production of 495,043,702 Mcf.

Texas gas production for 1989 totaled 5,595,189,980 Mcf, a two percent decrease compared to the 1988 total of 5,710,867,485 Mcf.

The state's top producing counties, rank ordered by preliminary December production were: Pecos, 28,673,344 Mcf; Zapata, 26,327,967 Mcf; Webb, 24,887,003 Mcf; Panola, 16,712,480 Mcf; Hidalgo, 15,484,470 Mcf; Crane, 12,575,825 Mcf; Hemphill, 10,009,890 Mcf; Ector, 9,528,770 Mcf; Crockett, 8,767,606 Mcf; and McMullin, 8,434,531 Mcf.

Texas gas production in December came from 184,699 oil wells and 46,248 gas wells.

Total gas production in Eastland County for December is listed as 1,017,353 mcf, above that of about half the other counties in the state.

Pharmacy Topics

No-surgery technique to dissolve gallstones has been reported from the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minnesota. Methyl tert-butyl ether (similar to a gasoline additive) can dissolve some stones within 24 hours.

Preliminary research indicates a relationship between depression and thyroid malfunction, according to a report to the American Psychiatric Association. New research may discover which comes first.

Melanoma can be totally cured if it's caught early enough, say doctors at the University of Pennsylvania.

Tubal pregnancies can be removed more easily via laparoscopy than by abdominal surgery, says a University of Southern California gynecologist. Tiny lighted tube is inserted through a small incision in the navel. Microsurgical instruments are guided through a second incision.

Researchers in Finland reported a direct relationship between smoking cigarettes and clogging of carotid arteries. Test subjects were pairs of twins, one a smoker and one not, for direct comparison.

Letter to Granny

Following are excerpts from a letter written to Roby Kornegay recently. Dear Granny,

We are adjusting well to our new home (in Saudi Arabia) and thought we'd tell you a little about it. We arrived in Jeddah on Jan. 6 and our first four weeks have been pleasant and trouble free. Also, so far we have experienced very little "culture shock."

We stayed at the Marriott for 10 days until our air shipment of linens and dishes arrived - undamaged! - then we moved into our new home. The compound is allowing us to use beds, tables and couches until our furniture arrives. It should arrive at the end of the month. We shipped via ocean our own toys, clocks, pictures and decorator items, which have not yet arrived.

We are enjoying the new house. The downstairs is very spacious with two large living areas, a small TV room, big dining room, a huge kitchen and breakfast room and a bath and a half. The four bedrooms and two baths upstairs are adequate. The house has high ceilings and lots of windows which have electric metal shutters for added security. They roll up and down like a garage door and are hidden by a decorative attachment. (I have decided to export them to Texas when we return!)

The house and grounds are surrounded by a tall wall and Jacob is the official gate opener for driving the cars in and out. There is no grass, but lots of trees, shrubs and flowered with gravel topping. The driveway and long sidewalks are good for riding toys. Jacob's favorite feature of the house is the pool. Even though the water is much too cool for me and me (71-75°), he swims nearly every day. The pool has a large tiled area and lattice covering for shade beside the pool. The pool is fenced off from the rest of the yard, but so

far Nathaniel has shown little interest in getting in the water. He is content to ride his toys around the pool (and see how close he can get to the edge without falling in!)

Maintenance service is provided with the house, so every day a man comes to clean the pool, sweep, mop, tend the plants and take the trash. I really like this (who wouldn't) and is especially helpful because overnight a thin film of sand coats the tile and chairs. The temperature has been pleasant, 70s and 80s, and low humidity.

Jacob started school two days after we arrived and we were quite pleased with his ease in adjusting. His school has an American curriculum, but of course his classmates are from many nationalities, for which we are glad. Nathaniel and I walk him across the street to school at 8:00 and pick him up at 2:00. He enjoys getting out an hour and a half earlier than his Katy school. One difference to which I haven't become accustomed is that school and business days are Saturday through Wednesday; Thursday and Friday are the weekend.

We haven't had the chance to make any friends yet, but I have met one lady who is a Baylor graduate and several from Houston. Gene has found a Saudi Aggie at the bank.

The compound adjacent to the house is nice in that it is large enough for Nathaniel and me to take our walk each morning and get plenty of exercise. The small grocery store is helpful; Nathaniel has visited the nursery school and asks to go nearly every day. There is also a nice restaurant which even has delivery service to your door.

The city is very interesting visually and we can hear the prayer call five times a day from a loud speaker near our home. We have to adjust our shopping slightly

because the stores close for the 20-30 minutes of prayer several times a day. Some stores allow people to stay inside and shop if you are there when prayertime starts, you just can't check out; other stores ask everyone to leave.

I have been surprised at the number of women who don't wear an abaya (black robe). I wear one shopping, but don't wear it to walk Jacob to and from school or inside the compound.

There are several small malls and nice supermarkets. We have been able to find most of the things we need, like chocolate chips or M&M's, you just have to know where to go to get it. There is not a lot of one-stop shopping, but the fresh fruits and seafood are marvelous! Prices do seem to be some higher.

The biggest inconvenience so far has been my not being allowed to drive. We (Conoco) now have a GMC mini-van and a Volvo, but I have to wait for Gene to take me everywhere. It is hard to go grocery shopping at 5 p.m. when the boys are tired and hungry and then we get caught by prayer time.

That will change after we hire a driver who can take me shopping in the mornings. Most stores are open from 10-1 and then 5-11. Nearly everything closes during the middle of the afternoon because of the heat, and the late evenings are very busy.

Jeddah is different, but in a lot of ways it is just like any big city in Texas. People still have to work, eat, drive, etc., there are just different methods of doing it.

Area anglers are invited to come fish this Saturday at one of the top producing bass lakes in our area, Lake Proctor. All entrants are required to be a current member of the Eastland County Bass Club. Memberships will be available at the tournament headquarters in the Promotary Park area. For more information contact Tom Maynard at 629-3550.

The fishing at Proctor for those bucket mouth bass has been a little hit and miss. Some excellent strings to 23 pounds for five fish have been reported over the past two weeks. The norm seems to be around 10 pounds per string with a few fish in the seven pound range. The top baits

seem to be spinners and crawworms in shallow water. During the past tournaments held at this lake some of the top strings each year are caught, so everyone make plans now to attend.

The recent West Texas Tournament Trail event held at Lake E. V. Spence was a big success in entries with a reported 220 contestants. And finishing in 10th place was home grown angler Bobby Maynard. Bob's finish netted him \$75.00 and guaranteed him a spot in the classic to compete for a fully rigged bass boat.

I understand that these fish came from the same small point at which Bobby and myself placed tenth in the 1st 1990 Anglers Choice Northwest Team event at Spence.

Both strings from this area were just over five pounds.

The next anglers choice event for this region will be held at Hubbard Creek Lake March 18. And the next West Texas Tournaments event will be at Lake Brownwood April 1, 1990. For more information on these and other tournaments please feel free to give me call.

Hubbards black bass were less than cooperative this past weekend, with few fish to 3 1/2 pounds own jigs. A number of small fish were taken on Rat-L-Traps in the main lake area.

Brownwood bassers are wondering if all there bass are gone. Fishing has been slow with only one good report, that being a five fish limit of fifteen pounds. This string was taken on crankbaits around main lake boat houses.

The overall outlook for the 1990 bassin year looks great. Most area lakes are catching some water and placing plenty of cover just right for spawn-

ing. But lets all remember keep only what fish you can use and release the rest. At this time of year a 100% release will insure you plenty of fishing for years to come.

Jesse Runnels of Dallas may hold the record for catching the biggest bass ever caught accidentally.

Runnels was standing on the fishing pier at Lake Bob Sandlin State Park fishing for crappie when a big fish bit his minnow-bait hook.

With his wife helping to net the fish, Runnels somehow managed to corral the 14-pound, five ounce bass with the light spincasting outfit. They took the fish to the park store where the fish was weighed and reported to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's Lone Star Lunker Program. But only after another local angler promised Mr. Runnels a larger amount of fish for his family to eat.

Lake Bob Sandlin State Park is located southwest of

Mount Pleasant on Farm Road 127. For camping reservations or other information, call the park at (214) 572-5371.

inspire teachers to continue in our honored profession," Morris said.

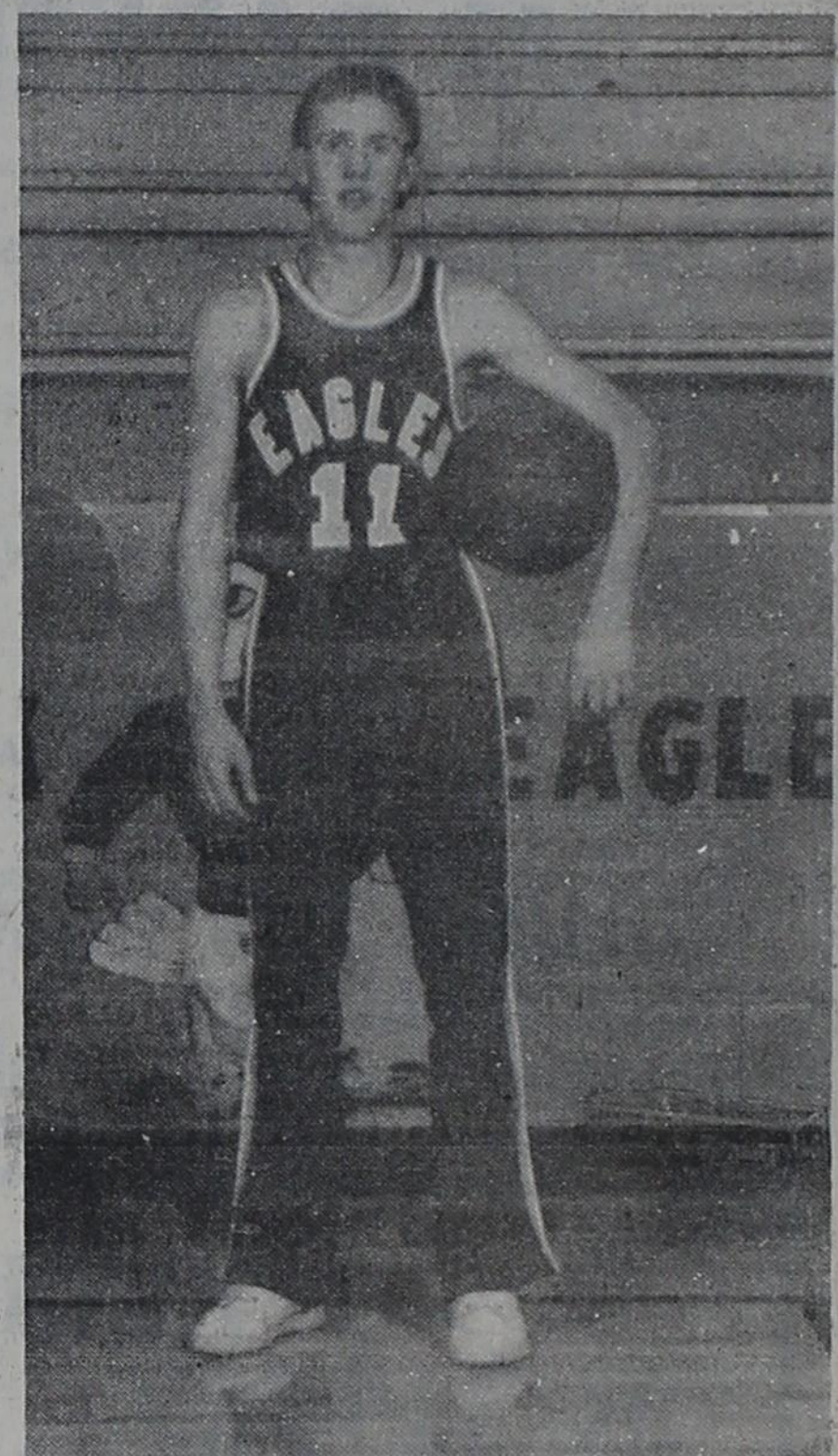
Regarding the state's Class A districts, he said ETSU administrators and faculty are aware that educational reforms in recent years have put financial pressures on the smaller schools.

County Treasurer Attends Workshop

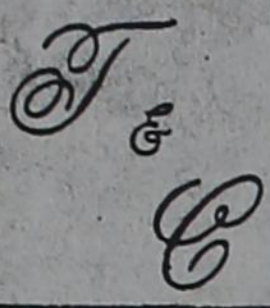

Region 6 County Treasurers is made up of 22 counties and meet twice a year. Eastland County was host to the meeting in February 1988.

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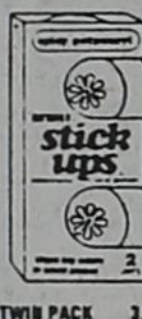
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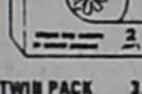
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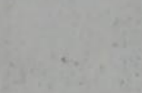
