## Linda Discards Braces, Crutches; Mother Praises March of Dimes



Grady Hogue of Cisco was elected secretary of the organization with J. M. Flournoy of Lisco as treasurer.



"By beginning now to prepare their returns," he added, "taxpayers will be able to give themselves a breathing spell in which to take an objective look at their work. For many, it may be worthwhile saving; for us, it should make for better and more efficient processing."
