

Recreation Center Open to Youth

What is being done to give our youth something to do and to endeavor to keep them from the local drug scene?

For one, Mary Ann and Billy Paul Underwood have joined the Texas War on Drugs and would like to set up a parent-peer group in Rising Star.

They have information pamphlets from Austin on teaching parents awareness of drugs and drug-related problems among young people. To get an information packet of your own, get in touch with the Underwoods for the address.

Mr. and Mrs. Underwood have worked two years setting up a recreation center that encourages family type entertainment and gives young people a place to go.

The center features table action games such as pool and air hockey; video games, such Puc-Man, Galaxy and Tank; two gun games; a juke box, and

an arcade game. None of the games cost more than 25 cents and each week two games may be played for free. The free games are rotated among those available except pool, which is free every Friday.

A supervisor is on hand at all times, parents who would not want to leave young children unchaperoned need not be concerned on that point.

The present location of the center is one block south of the old hospital on S. Cooper and Smith. The Underwood's have begun readying the old Jobe building on S. main to move into, and expect to make the move by summer.
