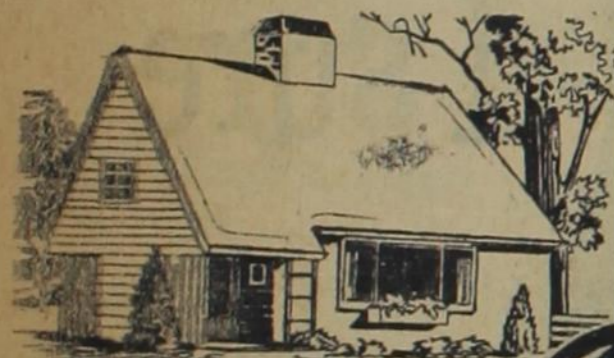

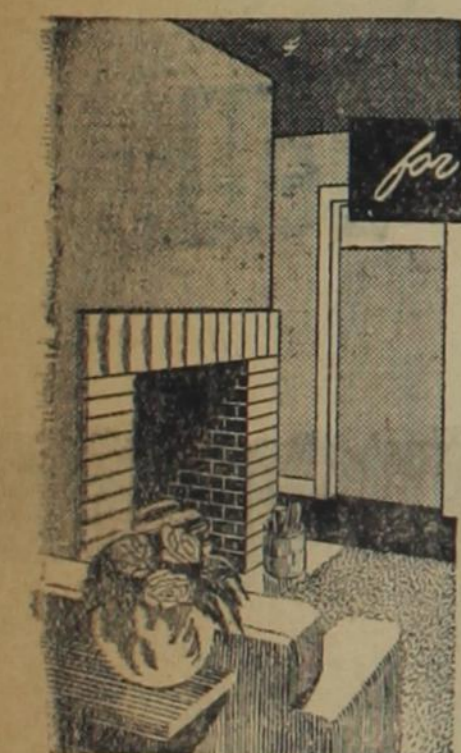

**GRAZES LAND WHILE BUILDS FERTILITY**

**May Farmer Uses Vetch and Rye To Restore Land**

Ira Nelson knows how to restore high fertility to depleted cropland. Nelson has 100 acres

of sandy loam cropland on his farm one mile north of May. In 1946 he became dissatisfied with the economy involved in a row crop operation on this land and decided to try vetch and rye for winter pasture and at the same time restore the land to a high fertility level. "My peanut and cotton allotments were too small to justify maintaining and the land had been in continuous row crop operation so long that the fertility was gone anyway," said Nelson. He decided to try vetch and rye in the fall of 1946 and after two years decided to stick with it. He sows 30 pounds of rye and 10 pounds of inoculated vetch seed per acre. He plants during the last half of September, depending on moisture conditions, and fertilizes with phosphate or a balanced fertilizer, such as 7-14-7. Nelson begins grazing the vetch and rye in November with 60 to 70 head of cattle. He feeds a mixture of hulls, grain and minerals for rapid gains. In order to get a seed harvest, he stops grazing about the first of April. The seed harvest pays for the cost of plowing, planting and harvesting. He has failed to make a seed harvest only one

year since 1946. This was in 1958 when the aphids prevented seed maturity. Ira has been getting four and a half months grazing from this 100 acres each year and at the same time has been steadily increasing the fertility of the soil with the vetch. With an average of 60 head of cattle on 100 acres, this figures about five acres per animal year long, which is good production for dry cropland.
