Rising Star Needs An Ambulance

Just last week there was a near fatal accident just on the outskirts of town and help was on the scene within minutes. The police and Fire Dept. crew did what they could but precious minutes were lost because of the simple fact Rising Star does not have an ambulance. Luckly the Cross Plains ambulance was available to rush this injured boy to Abilene.

This has just been one of many occasions when an ambulance was needed in our community. Next time it may be your wife, husband, close relative, children or even you that will require the use of an ambulance. When this happens, TIME is of the importance. Time until an ambulance with trained personel arrives could mean life or death. When a loved one is lying in pain those precious moments till help arrives can be the longest wait anyone can imagine. Then is when we will say "If only we had an ambulance here.'

It's true we're busy with our families, jobs and every day duties but we must stop thinking, "If I sit back and say I don't have time, that's true. I'm sure there will be enough people to volunteer without my help!" That attitude will get us NOWHERE. We need your help and without your help, who will help? The words help look small on paper but they mean everything when someone is hurt and you can stand there and say, "I took the time to care. I can help this person that would otherwise lie there until an ambulance from another town arrives." Another reason for ambulance volunteers

is that our city of Rising Star consists mostly of of elderly people. Many of them would like to see this dream become a reality. Many would volunteer themselves but cannot because of their health. How many of you reading this now know someone like that? Perhaps a grandmother or grand-father? What would you do if that loved one suddenly had a heart attack? Would you put that person in your own car and rush to the nearest hospital? Would you call the ambulance from a near by town and sit there waiting and waiting, while those first few crucial moments slip away? What if that person stopped breathing?

If this town does have an ambulance, the personel will receive training that would answer all the questions above. These people will know how to administer C.P.R., how to transfer patients, how to administer oxygen and how to treat shock.

Back in June there was an article in The **Rising Star explaining** that Cross Plains has offered to help us in developing and training all volunteers. Time is running out and Cross Plains is waiting for our volunteers to say we're ready. So far only five people have offered to help. We need more so the work load will not fall on these few and require them to be on call constantly. If you can volunteer your help and be on call for the weekend, at night or any other times we will be glad to have you. When I say "we" I mean the people of this community. Geye's Host Exchange **Family From** Kentucky

Ed and Nell Sears of Whitely County Kentucky are visiting in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Terry Geye. The couple arrived in Brownwood on Thursday after a three day bus ride with one other chaperone and fourteen teenagers. They are involved in an interstate 4-H exchange program started this year.

The group is staying with families in the Brownwood area for 5 days to see how Texans lead their everyday lives. Special tours have been arranged by some families to visit Six Flags, the state capitol in Austin and other places of interest.

According to Kit Horne, the county agent in charge of 4-H, members from Brown County are already making plans for a return visit to the Kentuckians next summer.

"It's a two-year process," he said. "First they come here, then next year we go there. Then after this exchange, we'll start with another county elsewhere in the U.S.' Horne said that 40 "feeler" letters were sent out to all areas of the country to gauge interest, before the group which came was finally chosen. Horne added that the exchange program is an excellent educational opportunity, giving the teeneagers a chance to see other parts of the country from the "inside", rather than as tourists. Each group pays its own way for the program. Already, activities designed to help raise money for the Brownwood group's trip are being planned, including an auction of donated goods conducted by Henry Storey. There are some 200,000 brands recorded in Texas and on file with the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association in Fort Worth. This is the state's most complete record.

The "branding" was an idea of Dr. O.D. Butler, for many years head of Texas A&M's Animal Science Department and now associate vice president for agriculture and renewable resources. He said that not only are cattle brands a rich part of Texas livestock history but a prized possession of ranchers in identification of their cattle. "We felt that the branding

ceremonies would bring about a closer tie-in between cattlemen and our animal science facilities on campus as well as with research and educational work throughout Texas." Butler said. Maddox said that branding
