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

Farm Bill Veto Likely

"Farm policy proposals of Secretary of Agriculture John Block to the Congress increase the chances of veto of the 1981 farm bill," believes Dr. Ronald D. Knutson, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas University A&M System.

"Block's proposals for eliminating target prices and providing increased secretarial discretion for loan rates and reserve release prices as well as storage and interest charges within the reserve are designed to provide a safety net policy for farmers," says Knutson.

"This safety net concept is the same terminology that has been used for proposals calling for cuts in welfare programs," points out

Knutson. "This analogy of farm program and farm welfare objectives is not likely to be appreciated by producers. Farmers have traditionally looked upon government programs that stabilize farm prices and incomes as being necessary to sustain high levels of productivity in both the producer and consumer interest."

Knutson notes that under the Block proposals the farmer-held reserve and the related price support loan program would become the only tools for price and income protection for cotton and grain producers.

"It is doubtful that farmer-held reserve can provide either an economically or politically acceptable level of price and

income protection for agriculture," emphasizes Knutson. "The chances of the reserve not providing adequate price and income protection is enhanced by proposed limitations of the size of the reserve.

"The bottom line is an increased chance that the Congress and the President will be unable to get together on an acceptable farm policy package in says Knutson. "This being the case, the Congress and the Administration would find it necessary to simply extend the 1977 farm act for another year. Then the farm policy debate would start over again in







However, it has an added significance for many persons who drew at least one benefit check from Social Security for 1980. Those who had earnings in 1980 in excess of \$3720 (if under age 65) or \$5000 (if at least age 65) must file an annual report of earnings with the Social Security Administration. The deadline for this report is also April 15, 1981. It must be made before that date or a benefit penalty may be impos-

Persons who had previously provided SSA with an estimate of earnings for 1980 of over the allowable limits should receive an annual report form in the mail during February. However, failure to receive the mailed form does not excuse a failure to file before April 15. If a form is not received by mail it will be

April 15, 1981. This available at any Social ate is quickly Security office.

The reports are necessary to determine the exact amount of benefits due in 1980. Since the payments were made on an estimate of earnings they may vary as being either too high or too low. SSA will make an adjustment for 1980 after the report is filed.

Though the filing deadlines for annual reports and tax returns are the same they are unrelated. Filing a tax return with the Internal Revenue Service will not be sufficient to meet the Social Security annual report requirement. This must be done directly through SSA.



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

FINAL CERTIFICA-TION DATE

All small grains must be reported by May 1, 1981. All planted acreages should be reported to maintain program eligibility. All planted acreage of wheat, barley, rye and oats should be reported regardless of use, such as for cover, grazing, or harvest. Failure to accurately and timely report your planted acreage will mean a loss of program benefits.

WHEAT-FAILED BARLEY

Producers having disaster affected wheat or barley that will not be harvested as grain must file Form ASCS 574, Application for Disaster Credit to be assured coverage for program benefits. The form must be filed within 15 days after the crop is abandoned and before the crop is put to another use.

TRANSFER PEANUT ACREAGE AND **QUOTA**

Transfer of peanut acreage and quota may be made through June 15, 1981. This office maintains a listing for those interested in transferring to or from the farm. Transfers must be signed by all perons by the final date.

PEANUT LIMITA-TION

The 50 acre limit on transfers still apply and includes all permanent transfers in prior years regardless of ownership.

PEANUT PLANTING REQUIREMENTS

The National Quota factor for 1981 is .6290. In 1980 the National Quota factor was .7510 and in 1979 was .7527. This means that in 1981 a farm must plant 62.9% of the farms effective allotment to be eligible to carry forward any undermarketings of quota. A farm must plant 47.18% of the farms effective allotment to be eligible to transfer quota from the farm during the second leasing period, June 15 thru December 31.

RELEASE-REAPPORTION-**MENT PEANUTS**

The final date to release unwanted peanut acreage and quota to the County Committee or to request additional acreage and quota from the County Committee is MAY 15, 1981. **EMERGENCY FEED PROGRAM**

HoneyBee-Vegetable **Growers Friend**

Honeybees have a king-size job in Texasthat of pollinating the \$50 million crop of cucurbits. Cucurbits include watermelons, cucumbers, cantaloupes, pumpkins, squash and gourds.

Some 79,000 acres of cucurbits are grown annually in Texas in every county, either commercially or in backyard gardens, says Tom Longbrake, horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas University System.

"The cucurbit family absolutely depends on insect help to transfer pollen from male to female flowers," points out Longbrake.

Only female flowers can produce fruit, but to do so each female flower must receive pollen from a male flower. Once transferred, the pollen fertilizes the immature seed, causing it to be fertile and grow. Unfertilized fruit abort when viable pollen is not transferred.

"Most cucurbit flowers are open for only one day. Since honeybees account for about 85 percent of all flower pollination, the importance importance of this insect to the cucurbit family is vital," emphasizes Longbrake.

One strong hive of honeybees is required to pollinate the closer row-spacing cucumbers, squash and cantaloupe. Pumpkin and watermelon may get by with a strong hive per four or five acres. Each open female flower may require five to ten visits by bees for adequate pollination. Therefore, skimping on the number of bees available to pollinate can affect potential yields.
