

## County Commissioners Discuss Highway 183 Erosion Control

Three roadside erosion control projects and Highway 183 between Romney and Rising Star were among the main topics discussed by the Eastland County commissioners Monday.

Ronald Bailey, with the Soil Conservation Service, met with commissioners and told of plans for the roadside erosion control projects for the future in cooperation with the county.

Commissioners also agreed to write a letter to the state highway department in Brownwood and to send a copy to Austin concerning Highway 183, between Romney and Rising Star.

The county has already purchased the right-of-way and landowners have moved fences and the area is now ready for work by the state.

This stretch of road is considered to be one of the most dangerous in the state and

several fatal accidents have occurred in the area.

In other business, the law library to be erected in the courthouse was discussed. Commissioners are awaiting information from the County Bar Assn.

Also, R.B. White, democratic nominee for Eastland County sheriff, appeared before the commissioners and stated he would be available as a deputy sheriff for the remainder of the year.

A discussion was held on the future finances of roads and bridges in the county.

Mr. John Bishop, president of the local club, stated that the warning signal was sounded both afternoons to alert citizens of the impending danger. The tornado warning consists of three separate blasts of the fire siren, rather than the continuous sound indicating a fire.

## E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital Offers Practical Experience For RN's

The E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital is to be Eastland County's first hospital to offer practical experience for registered nurse students.

Arleto State University and E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital signed a contract recently whereby Graham Memorial Hospital will offer in - hospital training and experience to students enrolled in the registered nurse program at Arleto State University.

Graham Memorial Hospital was one of five hospitals requested to participate in this program. The other four are Brownwood, Mineral Wells, Weatherford, and Clifton.

This distinct honor was extended to Graham Memorial Hospital because of the hospital's fully accredited status and patient care. Such hospital training can only be offered by law in fully accredited hospitals, including J.C.A.H. approval.

Aubrey Allen, Graham Memorial Hospital Administrator, said, "The hospital staff is most delighted at this opportunity, and we look forward to working with these students." The hospital was already serving under similar circumstances with the Licensed Vocational Nurse

Program in cooperation with Cisco Junior College. Mr. Allen also reported that he hoped the hospital would be cooperating in a similar program for lab technicians in the near future. CJC is currently looking into a study on such a program to be offered through their facility. Should such a program become available, and it is believed that such will be the case, area students will then have a wider range of medical professions training available.

Mr. Allen also pointed out that these programs prove that small rural hospitals can and do offer equivalent care as those hospitals of the urban - metropolitan areas. He thanks all the fine citizens who have written letters to their legislative representatives protesting public law 93 - 641.

He also added that it would help to forward similar letters to Governor Dolph Briscoe's office requesting his support and endeavor to repeal PL 93 - 641. At the Texas Hospital Association Convention last week, the THA house of delegates passed a resolution requesting repeal or amendment of PL 93 - 641. The Texas Medical Association passed a similar resolution several weeks ago.

## Church of Christ

The same thing is true with regard to one who has come out of paganism or even out of a human, sectarian context into the simple, sublime way of the Gospel alone. This feeling is so often voiced in the plaintive question: "Why can't they see that? It seems so plain!"

One reason why most seem not to understand the advantage of having a life built on the exalted principles of the Gospel, or of choosing a religious context in strict harmony with the Scriptures, is that "the god of this world has blinded their eyes" (2 Corinthians 4:4). By this, Paul means that Satan has so woven his web of deceit that wrong appears to be right, evil seems to be good and vices virtuous.

This is, however, no miraculous, overwhelming influence of the human will. It is simply a powerful enticement, but capable of being seen for what it is and rejected (2 Corinthians 4:6; John 1:1-5, 9-12). By appealing to the pride of the human heart and catering to the appetites of the body, the impression is given that only in a purely earthly and sensual context can true happiness ever be found, that one ought to "eat, drink and be merry, for tomorrow he may die" (1 Corinthians 15:32). But the wrecks of human history testify that this is not so. Solomon realized finally that it was not so (Ecclesiastes 12:8, 13). And the one who has seen both sides of the matter also knows better and wonders why others don't see it, too! (More later).

 It is about pickling time again, so I will give some helpful hints and a pickle recipe. Apple cider vinegar used in pickle recipes will help the pickle retain its color. Now for the best dill pickle recipe which may be used for cucumbers, green tomatoes, okra, beans, zucchini squash, carrots and other vegetables: 1 Cup vinegar, 7/8 cup salt (Not iodized) in 1 gallon of water, bring to a boil and pour over washed, dried and tightly packed vegetables with 4 blossoms of fresh dill or 1 teaspoon dry, sold per quart jar, pods of hot pepper, garlic or any seasoning may be used. Seal jars as tightly as possible and give a hot bath in water six inches up on jars for 30 minutes--wait two weeks to eat.
